# Novi looks for state grant to build new road

By JAN JEFFRES

City officials hope winning a state economic development grant for a boulevard to the Novi Expo Center will also help develop one of four crucial corners targeted in the plan to re-build downtown Novi.

Word on the application — tentatively a \$655,009 request - is not expected until February at the earliest, staff planner Michael Csapo said Thursday.

If the funds are forthcoming, it could be because the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America has found a pitstop in the Expo Center.

The proposed four-lane boulevard would extend Fonda Street, which runs west from Novi Road, circling behind the Elias Brothers Big Boy Restaurant there, Portions of the area surrounding the intersection of Novi Road and Grand River Avenue are slated for a major overhaul.

Representatives from the Michi-

tion's (MDOT) Office of Economic Development have already toured the Novi Expo Center. The city applied in December for the grant Category A grant for economic deve-

lopment road projects. I think they (MDOT) really liked the project because it takes an existing vacant building and puts into it a priority project for the state, which is tourism. The Motorsports Museum adds credibility," City Manager Edward Kriewall said.

Tourism is one of several target industries MDOT looks at in approving economic development grants, Csapo said. The employment that will be created by a proiect is also taken into consideration.

Based on the tourism factor, Novi could only count the jobs the museum alone will create in its grant application - 22 new jobs and two existing positions. Overall, the Novi Expo Center is expected to

# Council questions need to alter rules

private political functions from the Novi Community Center should be dropped, the city's attorneys say. But a not-unanimously-

convinced City Council has tabled the matter until Jan. 13, to give the lawyers time to review their comments.

"I think it's unnecessary and I question why it was brought to our attention. I see no need for it to be revised," Mayor Pro Tem Hugh Crawford said during the Dec. 23 council meeting.

"You could have a political activity in this building if it was open to the general public."

The issue was underscored during the 1991 city council campaign, when candidate David Ruyle was denied use of the building because he planned to solicit funds at a "meet the candidate" night. Council contender Kevin Crain was allowed to rent the center for a similar event because contributions would not be

collected. "Mr. Ruyle wanted to have a fund-raiser here," said Council Member Tim Pope. "If I agree or disagree, under his First Amendment rights, he has a right to free speech as do his supporters. This is a govemment building and they should be allowed to participate in the process."

A letter from city attorneys David Fried and Dennis Watson said that

# District hopes to resolve search

Novi schools board members could name a new superintendent Thursday.

Earlier meetings to discuss the two final candidates were cancelled after the school board asked the pair for input on a proposed contract.

"I hope we're going to be able to chose one on the ninth," said board President Stephen Hitchcock. "We'll see if we can agree."

Both finalists wanted to make several changes in the contract, Hitchcock said. The contract issues are not totally resolved, but the board president said he expects to be far enough along in negotiations to select a candidate Jan. 9. Emmett Lippe and Jon Reynolds are the two

finalists. The school board originally had 87 applicants.

Lippe has been superintendent in the Williamston school district since 1976.

Reynolds has worked as superintendent in Waverly schools since 1983. The Waverly school district is on the west side of Lansing in Delta

Both Lippe and Reynolds received high praise from colleagues in interviews conducted by the

Lippe was said to be a hard worker who gets along well with others.

Reynolds, who also was well regarded by his colleagues, was a finalist in the 1980 search for a superintendent that ended with the board hiring

School board Trustee Raymond Byers said he is ready to chose a new superintendent at the next school board meeting.

Byers, who led the superintendent search, declined to say who he will support.

The school board meets at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 9 in the Educational Services Building, 25345 Taft Road. On the agenda is the superintendent

Superintendent Robert Piwko lest the district in July to take a job in an Illinois school district after 11 years in Novi.

Associate Superintendent William Barr has been acting as interim superintendent since Piwko left. Barr did not apply for the superintendency, and he plans to retire at the end of the

# Cable rates to climb next month

Novi cable television subcribers will pay another \$18 per year for the full basic service, beginning Feb. 1.

Along with the \$1.50 per month rate hike recently announced by MetroVision of Oakland County, prices for several additional services will see either increases or decreases.

Inflation, cost increases for programming and a systemwide standardization of rates were cited by Tom Bjorklund, MetroVision's vice-president and regional manager, as reasons for the mark-

Most cable customers subscribe to Tier III. which offers all but the premium cable channels. That bill will now be \$18.45 each month. Tier III cable service was first offered in Novi in

increase was \$1.45, while the 1990 hike was \$1.50. Overall, the base price has increased by

better than 150 percent. But Bjorklund said this percentage doesn't reflect the fact that the premium, or pay chan-

In harmony with stock-taking that occurs at the end of the year, we've assessed presentations in our column. We've been far too serious! Wine is fun. To make amends, we ofer the following tounge-incheek wine compendium presenting a straightforward

sale or just raising an ego. Realize that ordering wine in a restaurant can be fun. especially when you vary your technique. Practice and have some fun in the New Year!

method of enhancing one's reputation, making a big

Entertaining a client: Ask the waiter or sommelier for a wine recommendation with no intetion of taking the advice. Your client will be impressed and the wine steward will applaud your choice because he'd like a generous tip.

 Explain to your client the intricacles of matching wine and food. Diplomatically criticize the wine steward's suggestions as being too fruity for the sauce or too low in acid to complement the fish.

• Remark how unfortunate it is that American restaurant personnel are no longer educated in fine wine the way they are in Europe. • Remember that when all else fails, judge a wine by the far right-hand column. Be sure it is expensive enough to impress your client while at the same time explaining that good wine can be found at moderate

• If the wine is red, ask the bottle to be decanted. When the cork is presented, remark on its length and how only great producers spare no expense when selecting this Portugese product.

 When a small sample of the wine is poured for your judgment, check the color, swirl the wine, smell twice, taste by drawing air through the wine, ponder a moment, then ask the waiter to pour some for your client so he/she may judge. Explain to your wlater how this selection complements the chosen entrees.

Dining with Mom and Pop: • If you are paying, don't even look at the wine list. Ex-

plain to your folks that wine is meant to be consumed as an everyday table beverage. Note that you think it is a waste of money to spend more than \$5 on wine and order a carafe or house red or white. • If the waiter pours you a wine sample to taste, tell him

not to be so stingy and fill the glass. If Mom and Pop are treating, change your approach. There has to be one wine on the list that you can't afford.

• Let your folks know that you are glad to introduce them to the finer things in life and point them toward the old French Burgundles and Bordeaux. When the bottle is opened and the cork presented, have a little fun, bite the cork while watching the wai-

If your parents dislike the wine, explain malolactic fermentation and how it adds complexity to the wine. Encourage them to consider this unique, educational

Impressing a date: • Chat with the wine steward about the appropriate wine selection. Compliment each suggestion and ask if the wine was barrel-fermented or vinifled in stainless steel. If barrel-fermented, inquire about the origin of the oak. The rite of handling the wine steward is important and should not be overlooked as a means of raising your stature in the eyes of your companion.






