

22 visit **Novi from** sister city

Novi and Owani officials are finding more and more in common.

A delegation from Owani, Japan spent five days in Novi last week. Owani is Novi's sister city and Novi schools sister school district.

Novi schools selected a new superintendent last week, a process Owani schools recently experienced. This year's visit from Owani was the second in what looks like it may become an annual tradition. Among the 15 students and seven adults in the delegation was the new superintendent for Owani schools, Tetsuo

Another similarity was found in the agricultural industries of Owani and Novi. Both cities produces apples.

The union between the two cities was made official by Novi and Owani city and school leaders. The delegation exchanged resolutions and gifts with Novi officials at a Thursday reception.

Little wooden dolls made from wood found near Owani were given to Assistant Superintendent Rita Traynor and other organizers of the visits. Board President Stephen Hitchcock was among recipients of kites made in

The Owani visitors received "Team Novi" hats from the city and mugs and clocks from the school district.

Penny and Craig Perry hosted a 16-year-old student from Owani. Kazuko Harako stayed at the Perry house during the five day visit.

They found communication difficult the first day, Penny Perry said. Throughout the visit, Harako had to rely occasionally on a Japanese and English dictionary. But despite the difficulty the family formed a close bond with their visitor.

Lippe hired as superintendent

Asix-month search ended Thursday when the Novi school board selected Emmett Lippe to be its new superintendent.

Lippe's appointment is subject to final contract approval expected at the school board's Feb. 6 meeting.

The school board began its search for a new superintendent when former Superintendent Robert Piwko accepted a job in Illinois. Piwko left Novi last July.

It was a trip to Williamston that convinced one school board member Emmett Lippe would serve Novi better than any of the 87 applicants for the position of superintendent.

"(Williamston) has the first high school I've seen that rivals Novi," Trustee Raymond Byers

Byers, who led the board on its superintendent search, made an unannounced trip with three other school board members to Williamston last month to find out what Lippe had accomplished in his 15 years with Williamston

Board Secretary Craig Foreback was most impressed with the city's water tower. The tower says: "Williamston, a great place to live and

Trustees Sandra Thornton and Michael Meyer also made the trek to Williamston. They went to a local realtor, posing as a couple interested in moving to Williamston.

The realtor was very familiar with Williamston schools and with Lippe. She told the undercover school board members that her daughter once had a problem in school and Lippe called home to

"I'm delighted with the choice," Meyer told the school board.

School Board Vice President Robert Schram said he thinks Lippe will be able to take Novi schools "up a notch." Schram added that he enjoyed meeting Lippe's wife at an informal dinner interview in December.

Before Lippe comes on board in Novi schools. a final contract must be negotiated. Board President Stephen Hitchcock has been negotiating contracts with both Lippe and Jon Reynolds, a sinalist who was not selected.

Driver found guilty on less severe count

An Oakland County Circuit Court jury took less than seven hours Thursday to find former Novi resident Kenneth Loveday guilty of negligent homicide in the June 5 deaths of Yusuf Hanania of Novi and Albert Abdelnour of Livonia.

Loveday, 20, had faced the more severe charges of involuntary manslaughter with a motor vehicle for striking the two joggers with his Jeep on Eight Mile Road.

Manslaughter with a motor vehicle is a felony punishable by up to 15 years in prison. The maximum charge for negligent homicide, a misdemeanor, is two years. Sentencing is set for Jan. 22.

The jury's lesser verdict drew cries of outrage from the dozen family members and several friends of the joggers gathered at Oakland County Circuit Court. Abdelnour's brother Basim stormed out of the courtroom saying, "It's not fair," while Hanania's wife, Angela, and her mother began sobbing and screaming in the front row of spectators.

One family member screamed murderer," while another collapsed and had to be led out of the

Businesses will protest sign law

Members of the Novi business community are expected to throw down the gauntlet to City Council tonight over Novi's sign ordinance.

A petition circulated by the Novi Chamber of Commerce has gathered about 35 signatures that read like a "Who's Who" of Novi entrepreneurs.

On the collision course has been the desire by city officials to create

an attractive community through strict control of signage and merchants' desire to attract their customers by creative - and highly visible - outdoor advertising.

Strain resigns as part of settlement

Novi High School's suspended band director resigned as part of an agreement approved Thursday by the school board.

Craig Strain had been suspended with pay from his position as band director since October when a student accused him of sexual misconduct.

Strain and the school district reached a settlement prior to Thursday's meeting. Terms of the agreement are printed in a document the school district is calling a "Memorandum of Understanding."

Strain's resignation apparently was part of the agreement. Other terms of the agreement have not been released, but the Novi News

has filed a Freedom of Information Act request to gain access to the settlement.

The school board approved a contract extension with Tim Hoey at its Thursday meeting. Hoey has been acting as Strain's replacement since late October. Hoey's contract was extended through June 13,

Thursday's agreement with the school board does not close the case against Strain.

Strain stood mute to charges of second degree criminal sexual conduct Jan. 3 in the 16th District

The case resumes with a preliminary exam Feb. 11 at 9 a.m. in the Livonia courthouse.

Drinking wine in moderation benefits health

We don't watch TV often. However, if there was one time we wished we had the tube tuned to "60 Minutes," it was Sunday, Nov. 17.

We're assuming that like us, many of you were busy that evening and missed the "French Paradox' segment exploring the benefits of moderate wine and alcohol consumption.

A transcript of the topic reveals interviews with leading French and American researchers. Morley Safer highlighted the following points as possible reasons for the up to 40 percent lower incidence of coronary heart disease among the French, as compared to Americans: • The French regularly eat three meals a day.

consume more fresh foods and do not snack between meals. • The French put more emphasis on food preparation and enjoyment.

 Alcohol, particularly red wine, is consumed in moderation as part of French midday and "Several things contribute to heart attacks,"

Safer commented. "Diet, of course, is one of them. So why is it that the French, who eat 30 percent more fat than we do, suffer fewer heart attacks, even though they smoke more and exercise less?

"If you're a middle-aged American man, your chances of dying of a heart attack are three times greater than a Frenchman of the same age. It's obvious that the French are doing something right, something Americans are not




