# State may cut last threads of school aid

By SUZANNE HOLLYER

Novi Community Schools could become a renegade district, free from the constraints of statemandated education reforms, if a proposal by Gov. John Engler makes its way into the law books.

Engler proposed last week to end state funding to school retirement and social security funds. Novi schools already receives no perpupil funding. Social security payments and the retirement fund are the final two programs the state funds for Novi schools. With the demise of state funding of the two programs, the state would have no purse strings to tie around Novi

School board Trustee Raymond Byers wondered why the district would need to comply with state mandates if it was receiving no state

"You're not giving us one dime." Byers said.

Board Vice President Robert Schram agreed, saying he had always wanted Novi to be a private district.

"If that happens, I'm with Ray." Schram said.

"We're going to be a private district, and we can tell the state to

Currently, the state funds less than a percent of school district operations. Retirement funds and social security payments made by the state in the name of the school district do not show up in district revenue figures, said Superintendent William Barr.

Engler's plan, which would result in a \$1 million loss to the district, has a bright side for local educators that goes beyond freedom


from state mandated programs. The governor's plan calls for phasing out tax base sharing and the "recapture" of funds for programs like transportation and special

Novi will lose close to a half million dollars this year through tax base sharing, a new plan that requires property-wealthy districts to share some of their commercial and industrial taxes. The district also loses a similar amount to "recapture" of social security payments and other categorical aid.

Assistant Superintendent for the Oakland County Intermediate School District Richard Simonson told the school board at its Thursday meeting the district would see a net loss of \$1 million under Engler's new plan. Covering the retirement benefits and social security payments of school district emple would cost Novi schools about \$2 million, Simonson said. But ending recapture and tax base sharing would save the district about \$1

The bottom line is a \$1 million loss for Novi," Simonson said. School districts that will benefit financially from Engler's plans will

# Dog owner reacts to proposed pit bull ban

Randi Holtzman is inviting the Novi City Council to meet a well-

loved member of her family, Kip. The fun-loving and friendly 2-year-old show dog is registered as an American Staffordshire Terrier with the American Kennel Club. Holtzman may also sign up the pup with the Kalmazoo-headquartered United Kennel Club (UKC), which categorizes the same breed as the American Pit Bull Terrier.

Minus Kip but with a field representative from the UKC, she will be at the city council meeting tonight to dissuade Novi from adopting any ordinance outlawing the breed popularly — but incorrectly, owners say -- known as "pit bulls."

In January, the Novi City Council requested that the city attorney research a possible ban of pit bull terriers here, in response to the arrest of a lakes area man for possession of dangerous animals. His two adult pit bull terriers and 15 halfbreed puppies, kept in a fenced-in back yard, have terrifled a nextdoor neighbor.

A current city ordinance bars possession of a "dangerous animal" within Novi limits, unless the critter is restrained from contact with the

Media coverage of pit buil terriers mauling adults and children has been widely circulated, contributing to public fear.

Since reading about the Novi case, Holtzman, a member of the Mid-Michigan American Pit Bull Terrier Club, has been telephoning dog owners and associations all over the country to rally support. She's also formed a new group, Novi Advocates for Non-Breed Specific

"This is one incident. I don't think it's fair to impose any kind of ordinance when a woman got scared," Holzman said Thursday.

"Any dog can bite, any dog can attack. People do provoke dogs. People do come into a dogs yard.

# Novi schools seek renewal of 13 mills

Novi schools will ask voters to approve a 13-mill, three-year tax renewal

The 13 mills, which expired on Dec. 31, represent over one-third of 33.04 mills authorized for Novi schools.

To the taxpayer, one mill represents \$1 on each \$1,000 of state equalized valuation of property. The 13 mills up for renewal would cost taxpayers \$13 on each \$1,000 of their property's assessed value if the district levies the full amount.

Novi schools typically levies slightly more than 11 of the 13 allowable mills that are up for renewal, Barr said.

But because of a tax freeze that went into effect Jan. 1, the district probably has the option of levying more of the voter-approved mills this year. Barr said. Although the law is unclear, the Headlee Amendment most likely will not restrict the number of allowable mills the district can levy this year.

Barr said he is not ready to guess how many of mills the Novi school district will need next year.

# Novi is favored site of new court

Developers interested in building the new 52-1 district court clearly read the lips of the Oakland County official overseeing the project.

Of 13 proposals for district courthouses turned in by the Jan. 31 deadline, 11 were for Novi-based facilities, including several bids for sites along Grand River Avenue. One application per city was submitted by developers interested in building in Walled Lake and Wixom.

But others aren't so sure Novi is the ideal location for the facility.

A 20-year-old state law calls for a district courthouse to be placed in the most populous community, in this case the less-than-centrallylocated Novi.

The statute just seems too clear to me, as the law reads today. It would be economically unsound to do anything other than putting it into Novi," said Jack Hays, Oakland County's Director of Corporation Counsel.

As Gov. John Engler tries to downsize state government, the Michigan Supreme Court is asking for a major increase in the judiciary. But the recommendations for new judgeships do not include one for 52-1 District Court in Walled Lake. The story is on page

What seems clear to Hays appears to be getting cloudier and cloudier. A move is afoot by State Rep. Barbara Dobb, R-Commerce Township, to introduce legislation which would give the county the discretion to place a courthouse anywhere within a district. Dobb's constituency includes Walled Lake.

collective letter of protest to the county, saying that traveling to Novi with their cases would eat up too much staff time and transportation

# Letters ask for heavy sentence

Kenneth Loveday's sentencing for negligent homicide in the deaths of two joggers last June was postponed to tomorrow, Feb. 11.

His sentencing had been scheduled for Feb. 5 but was delayed after Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Francis X. O'Brien recessed to read letters sent to the court on the victims' behalf.

The letters, including one from the Northville Action Council urging an appropriate sentence that lets (Loveday) know his actions are unacceptable," were among about 20 received regarding the case.

Loveday was convicted Jan. 9 of

negligent homicide in the June 5 deaths of Yusuf Hanania and Albert Abdelnour on Eight Mile Road Just east of Beck Road. His westbound Jeep Wrangler struck the two joggers after swerving off the road tow-

He had faced the more severe charge of involuntary manslaughter with a motor vehicle, a felony punishable by up to 15 years in prison. The maximum charge for negligent homicide, a misdemea-

nor, is two years. A probation supervisor's report recommends sentencing Loveday to the State Prison of Southern Michigan for 16 to 24 months, the maximum advised by state sentencing guidelines. The report cites

Loveday's prior misdemeanor convictions for disorderly conduct, trespassing, and possession of marijuana, as well as the fact that a marijuana cigarette was found in the Jeep's ashtray after the

Jeep passenger Michael Gibson testifled during the trial that he and Loveday smoked a marijuana cigarette just prior to the collision.

Loveday's desense attorneys, Jerry and Ronald D'Avanzo, wrote in their own sentencing memorandum that the incident occurred when Loveday's Jeep "veered off Eight Mile Road to avoid oncoming traffic." The attorneys asked the court to take into consideration the fact that the road narrows to two

lanes just prior to the point where Loveday's Jeep struck the joggers, and that the narrow shoulder where the men were jogging was not designed for that use.

The joggers' family members, who expressed outrage when Loveday was found guilty of the lesser charge Jan. 9, are seeking two consecutive two-year sentences.

Loveday spent nearly six months in Oakland County Jail before being released on bond Dec. 23, and would likely be credited with the time served.

Hanania, a Novi resident and vice president at Singh Development Co., was 38 years old. His wife





# School district may cut loose from state

be subjected to an onslaught of new requirements, Simonson said.

Simonson said he already warned state leaders that they would have no control over school districts that fall out of the state's funding formula. But if legislators agree with Engler's plan, and the proposal becomes law, then the Novi school district will have new doors opened to it.

For example, the school district completed days of paperwork to comply with Public Act 25 during the 1991-92 school year. But because of the district's wealth. Novi schools was ineligible to receive \$25 per student in state funding provided to im-

plement the law. Simonson warned that Engler's plan must still be approved by the state Legislature.

"Until they're done, . . . go along with them and comply with the law."

Simonson said. Novi schools would not be able to operate above the law, limiting enrollment or requiring prayer in school. Federal education requirements would still impact the district. The federal government funds over 1 percent of school district operations, according to district figures.

Engler's plan cuts funding to the wealthy districts, and brings a 2 to 2.5 percent increase in funding to the remaining districts, Simonson said. Oakland County school districts will lose about \$87 million if Engler's proposal becomes law. Simonson

They're territorial. They're there to be protective. Most dogs don't just go on the nut and snap."

Holizman underscores that she is not "waving the flag" for one breed. but working for all. Today, dogs such as the German shepard, doberman pinscher, akita and chow have begun to gain a reputation as "viscious." Rottwellers have also picked up the stigma, particularily following two recent cases where the dogs attacked people in the Detroit area.

The media has picked up on this and they've created hysteria. Bad owners can make any dog viscious."

There are some dogs that are bad, genetically not sound. But it's the owner who will make the dog a nice dog. . . Owners and non-owners can be dog-ignorant and the general public is uneducated on how to meet arry dog."

Those who own the pit bull terriers say they are much-maligned, that the animals are loving, majestic and loyal. They're also intelligent. Perhaps the most famous pit bull terrier of all time was the black-eyed "actor" who portrayed "Petey," the canine

companion of Spanky, Alfalfa and company in the "Our Gang" comedies.

Kip loves children and plays with Holzman's neighbors kids and grandkids. Many mistake the 60-pound dog for a boxer. Enthusiasts point out that the dogs are used for pet therapy in senior citizen homes and with children.

Holzman and Novi Advocates plan to keep a watchful eye on city government. Also looking over the city's shoulder are Milan resident John Doran, president of the Michigan American Pit Bull Terrier Club and the club's secretary, Howell resident Gayle Greenwood.

Maneuvers to ban this particular breed have not been markedly successful. Organizations such as the New York State-based American Dog Owners Association (ADOA) and the National American Pit Bull Terrier Association have raised legal defense funds to protect ownership of the animals.

An ordinance in Detroit was repealed. Another passed by Waterford Township is tied up in litigation brought by the ADOA and the Pontiac Kennel Club.

Moves to keep the dogs out of Van

Buren Township and Howell were effectively quashed.

In 1989, the Massachusetts state supreme court knocked down a municipal ordinance there on the grounds that there was no scientific way to prove a breed and therefore no standards for enforcement. Doran said.

Bessemer, a small town in the Upper Peninsula, slapped a ban on the dogs when a boy was fatally attacked there by a pit bull terrier.

Michigan Public Act No. 426 of 1988, authorizes the destruction of dangerous animals which attack people. The animal may be killed only after a serious injury or the death of a human or another dog. In the case of a death, the pet's owner may face involuntary manslaughter charges. while serious injuries may lead to a felony rap.

The law also calls for misdemeanor charges for less severe animal bites and the tatooing, confinement and/or sterilization of animals found dangerous but non-lethal by a judge. Doran lobbied the state to ensure

that this legislation was not directed toward pit bull terriers. Enough protection is already pro-

vided by the existing regulations

Holtzman says.

"I'm urging council not to impose additional ordinances for law-

abiding citizens," she said. "You just don't ban an entire breed. It's been found unconstitutional throughout the county. It violates our due process."

As she sees it, the issue boils down to well-mannered owners as much as well-behaved dogs.

Greenwood agrees.

"All dogs can bite. I do a lot of temperament training. You find the same range of temperament in all dogs, whether they're Golden Retrievers or pit bull terriers," Greenwood said. "Idon't have any problems with my

neighbors at all. But my theory of good dog behavior is that you don't let out more than one dog at a time in your backyard unless you're , watching." Doran and Holtzman concede that

the much-publicized Rottweiler attacks are frightening. The recession has led to dogs abandoned on the street, Holtzman said.

Doran compares dog attacks to car-jackings.

"I think it reflects the way society is deteriorating. You're going to see it in any aspect of life," he said.

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# Pursell announces congress candidacy

Congressional districts haven't even yet been decided, but already one candidate has announced heli likely run for election in the district which covers Novi.

Congressman Carl D. Pursell has said he will seek re-election in the second congressional district, which would include Novi under both the Republican and Democratic apportionment plans now under consideration by the courts.

Although we are awaiting final court action on redistricting, it appears highly likely the second district will include my hometown Plymouth area and a large part of Oakland County," Pursell said.

"I lived in Oakland County and started my family here. I also represented western Oakland County as a state senator, and the people of this area helped elect me in my first race for Congress.

No matter which party wins the fight over redrawing districts for U.S. Congress, Novi area residents are likely to wind up in the second district. Novi presently is represented by William Broomfield, R-Lake Orion.

Both the Republican and Democratic parties recently submitted redistricting plans to a three-judge panel. The judges hope to pick one plan, or create a new one of their own, by the end of March.

The second District would be a very different district than at present - instead of stretching west from Northville and Plymouth, it would go north through all of western Oakland County into Genessee County.

Under that Republican plan, Broomfield's district would shift farther to the north and east, taking in much of eastern Oakland County and most of Lapeer County.

Under the Democrats' plan. Pursell and Broomfield would be thrown into the same district, setting up a possible face-off between the two of them to represent the redrawn 2nd District.

The Democrats' version of the second include Novi. Northville, much of southwest Oakland County. The district would stretch east to include portions of Troy and Rochester Hills. It would also include northwestern Wayne County and Salem Township in Washtenaw County.

Redistricting takes place every decade, after the U.S. Census.







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


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

# Get away to a feast of food and wine

The awning of The Rowe - Michigan's Country Inn reads "La Maison des Champignons, Le Gout du Nord." (The house of mushrooms, a taste of the north). Inside, and out of the chill of a winter storm. The Rowe Inn's owner Wes Westhoven and his haute culsine crew are preparing the day's feasts that will accompany one of Michigan's best restaurant wine lists.

We are attracted to The Rowe for the wine as well as the food. The impressive list includes 800 labels and 14,000 bottles. The quality of Westhoven's wine list is not only our opinion. The Wine Spectator has awarded The Rowe Inn its "Best of" Award of Excellence.

"Americans have been spoiled by year-round availability of tomatoes and other fruits and vegetables," Westhoven maintains. "In Michigan, we appreciate the flavor of each fruit and vegetable in their own season. When we taste local apples and morel mushrooms, we are happy that we live here.

"Some may say The Rowe is influenced by French or Italian cuisine, but we really prepare what's grown locally. We are aware of trends and try to select the best, but we don't have to copy anyone else."

The philosophy at The Rowe Inn is to prepare good food, serve the best wines and be delighted by the response of customers.

"Some people take this whole food thing too seriously," Westhoven said. "This ain't art; it's eatin'. Even Andre Soltner, chef at New York's Lutece, isn't an artist, he's a craftsman. Most techniques of food preparation have been known and used for centuries."

As practiced purveyors of food and spirits, The Rowe attracts local customers as well as those from the Detroit Metro area and northern

Westhoven grew up in a restaurant family in Toledo, Ohio. His parents operated a country club dining room. In 1972, he and his wife Arlene bought The Rowe, and Arlene became the ursi chel. Pete Pete n, owner/chei Tapawingo (Ellsworth) was chef from 1980-84 and Jim Milliman, now of Hattie's Grill in Sutton's Bay, served in the kitchen at The Rowe from 1985-1988. Since then, Kathleen Ruis has

been resident chef. "I could tell Kathy was talented the first day she walked in the kitchen," said Westhoven. "I really prefer female chefs, they have less ego to

overcome." Long before they became popular in the Detroit Metro area. The Rowe sponsored winemaker dinners in Ellsworth, featuring the Italian wines of Angelo Gaja, the Rhone Wines of guigal and the Bordeaux of Chateau Mouton-Rothschild and Chateau Cheval Blanc.

Although open year-round, the "1992 Season" for The Rowe's wine extravaganza begins Friday, April 24. The Rowe will present a menu to accompany the wines of Chateau Lynch-Bages, a fifth-growth Bordeaux with first-growth quality. Currently available wines (1989, 1988 and 1985) plus wines from great older vintages (1961 and 1970) will highlight a seven-course

There are, after all, certain behaviors and body responses common to all people who are in love. The heart races, the pupils dilate, and we even break into a barely noticeable excited sweat. That tingly feeling you get when you're close to your Sweet Baboo isn't just your imagination. It's your neurotransmitters doing the slam dance of

romance across your synapses. Your energy level rises, and your senses become more sensitive to stimulus. Taste

# Expert chefs fine tune for peak performance

The question of the week has been, "How did your practice go?"

It is so exciting to have so many of you interested in the Culinary Olympics. It is time to expound on the competition.

The contest is held every four years in Frankfurt, Germany. Chefs from all over the world practice, practice, then practice more with hopes of winning a coveted gold medal. Or, better still, the gold with distinction. A perfect score. What a thrill that would be.

Literally thousands of cooks descend upon the city for 10 days in October. That gives us just hine more months to perfect our food. Scary. In that nine months we will do our food a hundred times and be able to reproduce it in our sleep. Without

The Internationale Kochkunst Ausstellung is the world's oldest and largest culinary competition. Started as a local cooking contest in 1896, it has grown to a monster of an event. In 1988 Frankfurt was host to over 1,000 competing chefs. Included were individuals, regional teams and 30 official national teams.

In 1956 the first team to represent the United States was entered. Our food was not taken seriously, and it wasn't for the next 20 years:

Then, in 1976, the U.S. team brought home 28 gold medals to celebrate its bicentennial year. The food had changed drastically. We were suddenly world class leaders with our American cuisine.

Since that year, the team has done better and better. This year the intensity and degree of precision will be at heights never experienced.

There are four major categories: show platters, hot meals displayed cold, pastry and hot food competition. The first three categories consist of food prepared off-site

of the convention hall and displayed cold. There are deadlines set for "having your food on the table." Being late will cost a

gold medal. It can be compared to falling while doing the triple loop. Points off after months of rehearsal. Time is the number

Judging is done without tasting the food. Proper presentation, utilization, correct cooking methods and new, innovativeideas are the criteria.

In the hot food cooking, a team consisting of five chefs prepare food for 150 consisting of soup, entree and dessert. The food is tasted by a judging panel that watches every move that the chefs make during each stage of preparation. Cleanliness is next to godliness as are professionalism and creativity. To win the hot food is a true measure of a chef's ability.

Michigan sent its first team in 1988.

That team brought home more golds than any other state except Florida, that sent their entire team from Disney World. Although Michigan chefs have been winning medals since 1968, this is only the second team to be sent to the Olympics representing Michigan.

So, Back to the practice. As there were two slots to be filled, this was also a tryout. Everyone had to do their best. The food displayed was awe-inspiring.

Better than many judged shows. The two empty slots were filled by chefs Kevin Gawronski and Joe Decker, both of Schoolcraft College. Schoolcraft has been

designated as our team headquarters. We will eat, sleep and work there for many hours before October.

Yesterday we all met and talked about the commitment involved. War stories were told by the seasoned master chefs.

Blisters on toes that caused such bleeding that blood squished from shoes; working in ankle deep water for days in old, dangerous kitchens; divorces and lost jobs.

But the bottom line was this: commitment.

Chef Milos gave an analogy to commitment using bacon and egs. The chicken makes a contribution to the meal while the pig makes a definite commitment.

The significance of committing to a project such as this is profound. I know that I speak for all my team members. Kelli Lewton, Mario Enternad, Ray Hollingsworth. Kevin and Joe when I say that we are! proud to represent our state and this area of Michigan. We are so fortunate to have the team behind the team.

Electrifying, exhilarating, inspiring. Only nine more months.

Among herbs and spices, garlic. despite its intrusion on kissing, was trumpeted by both Greeks and Romans, and the Chinese. Also favored by the Chinese is ginseng, which they called the "elixir of life."
