

County plans to replace 1920s bridge

The 1920s-vintage Grand River Avenue railroad bridge is an eroding piece of history. And it could soon be merely history, if the Oakland County Road Commission has

Built by convict labor in the '20s, the structure — which is on the State of Michigan Historical Bridge List — is the sixth longest concrete camelback girder bridge left in Michigan, according to a profile commissioned by the state and the road commission.

"it can't be restored. The construction is such that there's no way to do any rehabilitation work on it. It's all one unit. Some of the modern bridges have a deck separate from the abutment. This deck was put up with the support system," said Kent Rubley, director of engineering for the road

The Novi City Council didn't zig-zag in quickly and unanimously passing an ordinance amendment May 18 banning possession of drug paraphernalia in Novi.

Novi already prohibits the sale of such implements of indulgence. Now ownership is also a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up

to\$500 and/or up to 90 days in Jail. Mayor Matthew Quinn said the amendment was drafted at the request of Novi Police Detective Bill Brown and focuses on intent to use the instruments, such as cocaine

Otherwise, unless you're a medical professional, pharmacist, manulacturer, mortician, or laboratory technician, possession of an empty gelatin capsule, hypodermic syr-

inge or needle is verboten. Within two weeks, ownership of the following implements will also be taboo:

*Cocaine spoon means a spoon with a bowl so small that the primary use for which it is reasonably adapted or designed is to hold or administer cocaine and which is so small as to be unsuited for the typical, lawful uses of a spoon. A cocaine spoon may or may not be merchandised on a chain and may or may not be labeled as a cocaine spoon or coke spoon.

"Marijuana or hashish pipe means a pipe characterized by a bowl which is so small that the primary use for which it is reasonably adapted or designed is the smoking of marijuana or hashish, rather than lawful smoking to-bacco, and which may or may not be equipped with a screen."

If a car is full of narcotics and its likely a felony charge will be filed, Brown said the paraphernalia ordinance would not be applied. The officer will probably lean on the new ordinance when stopping someone for a traffic violation and finding a little more than bargained for.

Schools seek input on tax hike

Supporters of lower taxes, lacrosse, high school choir and band. Japanese language prog-

rams and instrumental strings are wanted. The Novi school board hopes the public will come and share its views about a proposed

1.75-mill tax increase. Rather than decreasing the expected school millage as predicted last week, the proposed Novi school millage levy increased by a quarter mill in budget discussions.

The school board voted Thursday to set the levy increase at 1.75 mills. District administration recommended a 1.5-mill increase.

The levy was set for purposes of a truth-intaxation hearing only. Atax increase of some sort is nearly certain. But board members can lower the 1.75-mill increase before establishing a final budget plan - and many said they would not approve the higher increase.

But members wanted to encourage the public to participate in the budget process. Parents have encourged the board to allocate money for lacrosse, band and choir uniforms and instrument improvements, implementing Japanese and beginning an instrumental strings program.

Board Trustee Raymond Byers suggested increasing the levy for the truth-in-taxation hearing to the maximum allowable by law, about a 3-mill increase, just to encourage public participation in the budgeting process. The proposed 1.5-mill levy does not allow enough revenue to

Parkview kids will not be moved

and decided to keep school boundaries where District administration had proposed to move some students to Orchard Hills Elementary from

Parkview Elementary because of overcrowding. The students, some of whom began their education at Orchard Hills only to be transferred to

Parkview when it opened three years ago, num-

Parent Becky Staab was on the committee that recommended the school boundaries as they exist now. She echoed the sentiments school board members expressed at earlier meetings in predicting the district will need a

new elementary school within the decade. School board members and district administrators have discussed asking voters to approve a bond issue to build an addition onto Parkview.

The proposal could be before voters as soon as next winter.

Staab said the district should wait to move boundaries until a committee can be formed to study the changing population trends.

She said uprooting Parkview students would be unfair because of the difference between the two facilities. Orchard Hills students spend less time on computers than Parkview students, and

WL schools to move to Pure-Pak building

The Walled Lake Board of Education approved the purchase earlier this month of a 54,000 square-foot building located at the former Textron site on Ladd Road in Walled

The building, which housed Textron's Pure-Pak Division, will create housing for school services and programs currently scattered across the district, some in rented quarters. The purchase price is \$1,255,000, less than \$25 per square foot. The expense is expected to be offset by as much as 50 percent with the sale of unusable district properties such as the Meadowbrook Road site and the now abandoned bus garage on Ladd

In recommending the purchase Superintendent James R. Geisler noted that it was the most efficient and least expensive of several options studied in the search for a solution to the school district's worsening space shortage. The need to arrive at an economical solution has been heightened by the planned exetension in late 1993 or early 1994, of Maple Road in Walled Lake which will require sale and demolition of the current adminisration building. These used to finance the purchase.

"We looked at renovating the current Walled Lake Middle School on Pontiac Trail after students moved to the new school next fall," he said. However, at a renovation cost of \$65 a square foot, the total cost including asbestos management would have been nearly \$13 million. And the cost of new construction is running even

higher, \$75 or more per square foot." Current office rental rates in the area range from \$8 to \$12 per square foot, according to district officials, which translates to \$432,000 to \$684,000 rent in the first year alone for a building of this size.

in commenting on the purchase, Geisler acknowledged that observers may question an expenditure of this size, given the project reductions the district is expecting as a result of the state's diminishing contribution to Walled Lake School's revenues.

"We need to remember," he said, "that as our enrollment increases, our needs are going to increase rather than decrease. As difficult as this year is financially, we must look beyond it and make the most economical decisions possible for the future. The opportunity to solve several space problems simultaneously at minimal cost, when we know a different solution two or three years out will amount to several times the cost, represents responsible fiscal

Instead, the district chose to purchase the existing Pure-Pak building, which will be known as the Educational Services Center. The move will free the current middle school for use without renovation by the Community Education Department, possibley enabling the schools to provide daytime community education offerings and senior citizens' activities. Alternative Education programs, currently housed at inadequate rented locations, will move

Beginning next fall, the Education Services Center on Ladd Road will house programs and services includ-

ing the following: Special education services, gifted and talented, business services, pupil accounting, voter registration, vocational education office, fine arts, language arts, Chapter I office, staff development office, employee training programs (now held in rented facilities), athletic office, central administrative office, board of education room, conference rooms/public

The building also contains undeveloped space which can accommodate future needs. The cost of purchasing and renovating the Educational Services Center will be borne by a reserve in this year's general fund to address housing problems.







WL schools hurl big budget ax at teachers

Faced with the need to cut \$3.5 million from its 1992-93 budget to offset expected state school finance reform initiatives, the Walled Lake Board of Education started trimming its spending this month. It approved the conditional layoff of more than 30 teachers, a move that could save the

district almost \$1.5 million. According to Lois Lange, interim assistant superintendent of personnel, the board had to act when it did because of the teacher's collective bargaming agreement, which stipulates faculty members must be given two months notice before they can be

Layoffs would take effect with the 1992-93 school year. But Lange and board treasurer David Flammer emphasized that the district hopes to recall as many of the targeted teachers. as possible.

"While we're issuing 'X' number of layoff notices, the key is we really hope and we really believe the actual number of layoffs won't be anywhere near that level," said Lange. Flammer said the layoff affects 36 teachers, to be taken primarily from the bottom of the seniority list. With Lange estimating an average er-teacher cost (including salary

and benefits) of \$42,000, the staff reductions would save the district approximately \$1.47 million in next year's budget. Several factors could contribute to quick recall of a number of the Walled

Lake teachers, Lange said. At the top of the list is the possibility pending state school aid bills might take less of a bite out of districts. If that happens, there probably would be additional money for teacher salaries.

"We have been working the last few weeks to target a reduction number based on what we think is going to be the effect of the proposed state aid act," Lange said. "That's a very difficult number to come up with. "We don't know when to expect ac-

tion from the Legislature." Another factor is the district doesn't yet know how many teachers will be retiring before the next school

But whatever 1992-93 staffing levels are, Lange said they should be firmed up by the end of the current school year. Other intended budget cuts also should be better defined by then as well

At that time, the district should know if any of the laid-off teachers could be immediately recalled, she

Other moves are also being looked at to trim the budget, Flammer said. Possibilities include laying off assistant athletic coaches and not ordering new sports equipment for next

A 1982 Ford Escort was involved - designed, manufactured and inspected in the Wayne Assembly plant in westem Wayne County. Where do you file the lawsuit? Two couples, the Lorenczes and the Grosses, elected Wayne County and filed separate suits.

Now: Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties - particularly Wayne — have reputations as producing jurors generous with defendants they perceive to have deep pockets, like Ford Motor Co. Ford asked the circuit judges - Marvin Stempien, a local resident, and Marianne Battani - to change venue to Gratiot County. The judges agreed and were upheld by the Court of Appeals.

The state Supreme Court thought otherwise. In a 6-1 decision (Robert Griffin dissenting), the high court said Wayne County was the right place. And now it gets thick. It seems the Legislature in 1985 was amending the Revised Judicature Act "to eliminate forum shopping," said the high court. The first draft of House bill 5150 set priori-

ties for determining venue: (A) The county in which all or a part of the injury The House rejected that version. It dropped the priority list and said venue shall be the place in which all or a part of the cause of action arose," removing the words limiting venue to the site of the injury.

The Senate went along, and Gov. James Blanchard signed it seven months later.

Blanchard's legal adviser is now a Justice of the Supreme Court. Conrad I. Mallett said the law is clear. "That a cause of action may arise in more than one place, making venue proper in more than one Jurisdiction, is apparent from the clear wording of the statute," he wrote. The high court kicked the case back to Wayne County for trial.

I called Ford attorney Gary Hayden, but he had to toss the issue to a PR man who issued this bland statement. Ford is disappointed by the Supreme Court's ruling. As Justice Mallett noted in his opinion, the Legislature clearly intended to enact a statute that would eliminate forum shopping and filing of inappropriate cases in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb county courts. However, the legislators' unfortunate choice of words nullifed their intent."





Passing on the GIFT of SIGHT

When Kim Larson was a little girl, she received a gift from the Lions

Because one of her eyes did not completely develop at birth, she needed an artificial eye. The Lions provided it.

That was 25 years ago. Two weeks ago, Kim Larson passed on the good deed and helped provide the gift of sight to approximately 10,000 povertyridden Panamanian people. She traveled there with 20 fellow LensCrafters employees to give free eye exams and provide used glasses, which had been donated by area residents to the Lions Club. The mission was sponsored by LensCrafters and Lions Club International.

Larson is assistant retail manager of the Lens Crafters store in Twelve Oaks Mall. She was selected to join the 20-person mission team from over

To apply for a position on the mission team, she wrote a letter that 'expressed why I wanted to go, and my supervisor wrote a letter saying why I would be a good candidate," she said. A co-worker also wrote a letter on

In her own letter, Larson wrote of her experience with a Lions Club

She was about 2 years old when she received her first artificial eye from the Lions. She doesn't remember it, but "my parents always reminded me of it, and I always felt grateful," she said. "This was my way of helping others in a similar situation.

"I'm blind in one eye, and I know that I'll never be able to correct that, to see out of both eyes. But I wanted to do what I could to help other people whose sight can be corrected - to see."

Larson said it was an "amazing" experience to put the glasses on the faces of people who had never worn them before. When people need glasses, they are usually shocked to discover how much clearer and brighter everything is when they first put on a new pair.

The people Larson helped in Panama were often adults whose eyes had progressively worsened since childhood — to the point where they were probably unable to function well — but had never had any glasses.

*Oh, their eyes would just light up, * she said, smiling at the memory. *I don't think they realized what they'd been missing. If you don't have, you

Larson and the other members of her team went to the cities of San Miguelito and Changuinola. She described San Miguelito as a community

Changuinola, she said, is more rural. Despite its title of "banana capital of the world," it is much poorer, too. "The roads were just one pothole after another." In San Miguelito, Larson's team set up shop in a school gymnasium

where people filled the bleachers as they waited to receive eye exams and glasses. In Changuinola, people waited outdoors in hot weather all day, with no water. In that city they set up in a "hospital" that was nothing but a building with no modern facilities. "While we were there, someone cut himself and we couldn't find a

Band-Aid," she said.

Although the group did the best it could in the time available, there were still some people who had to go home without glasses.

Some people needed prescriptions that the mission group did not have

on hand. For some of them, especially children, Larson said her group will make glasses and mail them back. But there were others who they simply had to turn away because there was no way they could get to them. "It got to the point where we were just doing the best we could in the

time frame available, she said. If she ever got the chance, she said, she would go back and try to help

more people. But she knows that she helped a lot of people while she was "This gave me a personal knowledge that I've helped not just someone but a bunch of people that never would have had a chance," she said. "I

feel really good about myself." This trip was the second LensCrasters/Lions Club mission to thirdworld areas. Last year a similar group went to Costa Rica and performed the same service, and next year there will be another trip to a yet-

unnamed country. For the Panama mission, 2,715 pairs of eyeglasses came from the Detroit area. Used eyeglasses for the next mission can be donated at any Lens Crafters store, including the Twelve Oaks location. The donated eyeglasses are cleaned, repaired and sorted by prescription by Lions





Q: We'll be in Montana this summer. Any ideas for entertaining our kids?

A: Your children might enjoy an old ghost town in Garnet. Mont., about 14 miles west of Drummond. Back in 1866 \$1 million in gold and silver was mined in the town, which was being considered as a possible

site for the state capital. A fortune is still buried in the steep cliffs around the town, according to local legend. Visitors who tour the old buildings and souvenir shops are welcome to try

and dig for the treasure. Garnet is about a two-hour drive from the current capital of Helena. For further information on what to do and how to get there contact the Bureau of Land Management at (406) 329-3914. Information is also available from your local travel agent.

9: We're going to a seminar at Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania. Is this a particularly historical area?

A: Swarthmore, Pa., is about five-minute drive from Chester, an interesting old port town with shipyards that once built Navy

and merchant marine vessels. Chester is the oldest settlement in Pennsylvania, 15 miles southwest of Philadelphia on the Delaware River. It was established in 1643 by the Swedish Trading Co., and colonized by William Penn, who arrived in 1682.

Also in the area is one of the country's oldest courthouses, the Morton Homestead, built around 1655, and the Caleb Pusey Home on Landingford Plantation, built around 1683.

Causes of anemia can be varied



tively common allment that refers to a deficiency of red blood cells (RBCs). Since RBCs carry the oxygen in the blood, it is easy to predict what a deficiency would do. The patient may feel weak, tired, have a lowered activity level and be pale-

looking. Red blood cells are produced in the bone marrow and have a normal life span of 120 days. This production is governed by the genetic "plan" passed on by the parents and by the availability of the necessary building blocks such as iron. In addition, anything that destroys or shortens the life span of RBCs leads to anemia. In fact, there are basically three types of anemia based upon what has just been mentioned: anemia due to production of a faulty RBC because of a mistake in the "blueprint," anemia due to the lack of the necessary building blocks and anemia caused by increased loss

of RBCs. The best example of anemia caused by a defect in the "blueprint" is sickel cell anemia. In this condition the "blueprint" calls for the

Health tips

oxygen-carrying molecule of the RBC. The result is that in certain situations the blood cells lose their normal doughnut shaped disc appearance and become banana- or sickleshaped. This unusual shape makes passage of the blood through the body more difficult and shortens the life span of the cells to 10-12 days. Although treatable, the disease is incurable since the defect is inherited as a permanent part of that individual's genetic plan for making blood. Other similar conditions include Thalassemia and hereditary spherocytosis.


For blood to be produced in an effective manner, the necessary building blocks must be present in sufficient quanity. Three defects of this type are B12, folic acid or iron deficiency. Iron deficiency is the most common type. Usually the amount of iron lost by the body is equal to the amount taken in every day. In addition, when RBCs are destroyed by the body after their life span is over, iron is reused. In an adult the most common reason for iron loss is bleeding. If more iron is lost than is replaced, anemia occurs. In women, heavy menstrual bleeding is the most common cause. In men, blood loss through bleeding from ulcers, gastritis, polyps wrong amino acid in a particular portion of the or gastrointestinal cancer is most common. For lead to a complete evaluation of the stomach and bowel by the physician. Folic acid is a substance found in leafy veget-

ables and is essential to RBC formation. Fortunately, in the United States such nutritional deficiency is rare. B12 deficiency will lead to anemia and is uncommon except in cases such as pernicious anemia where B12 is not absorbed because of a lack of the necessary factor by the stomach. Once fatal, it is now easily

The last type of anemia is due to bone marrow failure. This can be caused by exposure to specific poisons such as radiation, benzene. certain rare reactions to antibiotics and many of the drugs used to treat cancer. In these situations the bone marrow is destroyed and not able to produce the cells. Invasion of the bones by cancer can also cause anemia by simply replacing the blood-forming cells in the bone marrow.

in summary, anemia can result from various causes. It is important to identify the type since the therapy may be different. Fortunately the therapy is usually quite good.

I was surprised to learn recently that a large number of foreign vacationers use their ownership of a time-share interval in a resort in their country to arrange vacation accommodations in the United

Many time-share owners at resorts in this country exchange their units with others in foreign countries. In other words, they use their purchased time-share interval in this country to arrange vacation accommodations at selected points worldwide.

By the same token, time-share owners in foreign countries use their interval ownership at a resort

in their country to arrange accommodations in the United States.

Recent vacationers have included those from England, France. Germany, Holland, Singapore and Japan, according to Charles Abul-Haj, manager of the Harbortown Point Resort operation in California. All of his units are booked through Christmas.

Most time-share owners use their interval as an exchange vehicle, said by Frank Marasco, a partner with Darrik Marten Development, Inc., a time-share resort developer.

"Some interval owners haven't stayed in their own resort for a single one-week interval," he said. They always exchange for another

The Channing: An airy world unto itself

house, and two more bedrooms face the street.


The family room is every bit as large and bright as the living room, though the ceiling is not as high. Sliding-glass doors open onto a wooden deck.

Preserving flowers

The easiest way to dry flowers is by hanging them upside down. The first step is to find a spot that is dark and dry with good air circulation. An attic is really best because your basement may be too

damp. Harvest before the flowers are fully open and strip the foliage from the stems. Tie small flowers in bunches so that their flower heads don't touch, then hang upside down. Within two to three weeks, they should be dry.

The most popular annual for drying is the strawflower. They grow up to 2 inches tall, with flowers in all shades of pink, gold and red. The showy, stiff bracts surround and conceal the tiny flowers inside.

For fuchsia or vivid purplecolored flowers, try statice or globe amaranth. The 3/4-inch round flower heads of globe amaranth dry quickly and are long-lasting. Sea lavender and purple statice (like florists use) are easily dried at home. Rattailed statice has 18-inch-long pencil-thin spires of tiny lilaccolored blossoms and should be cut when the flowers are fully expanded.

For warm colors-golds, red and yellows — grow marigolds.

yarrow, celosia and calendula. All retain their colors when dried, but the bright, clear colore of cockscomb or celosia are unsurpassed. The flowers come in brilliant shades of orange, red, yellow and pur-


Bells of Ireland are delicate green spikes that enhance any arrangement. Pick off most of the leaves so the bells will be more conspicuous. Dusty milier dries to a delicate silver white and compliments soft pink and lavender flowers.

For a light, airy touch add dried grasses. Just about any ornamental grass will do such as a rabbittail grass, quaking grass, squirreltail grass and animated oats.

Air drying is easy and quick. When the flowers are dry, use them generously in flower arrangements, wreaths, etc. Why not add even more flowering annuals (just for drying) in your garden?

A list of annuals that can be dried upside down: baby's breath bells of Ireland, beebalm, calendula. Chinese lantern, chives, celosia, cockscomb, dusty miller, everlastings, grasses, honesty,

But the fact is, it cut short the life of this majestic oak.


By gouging into the bark, vandals crippled the tree's vascular system. So, like thousands of other innocent victims each year, the tree slowly died.
