### Council member puzzled by water line route

A contracting company's rerouting of a city-financed water line along Novi Road into the firm's own subdivison, Mystic Forest, has led City Council Member Nancy Cassis to retain an outside municipal attorney to assist her inquiry into the issue.

The 16-inch water main, approved by the city council in the midst of a state-imposed moratorium on most new water lines, would have run straight down Novi Road between Ten and Nine Mile roads.

South Hill Construction Co. of Wixom, the contractor whose bid won the city's approval for the almost \$345,000 job, is also the developer of Mystic Forest subdivision.

The main that was built early this summer curves into Mystic Forest subdivision. Cassis said she plans to discuss the mat-

ter at tonight's city council meeting. The council's grounds for approving a special assessment district to finance the water main were to improve water pressure

by looping the main and increase fire safety. In a July 13 letter to the city council, Cassis said that while driving down Novi Road. she noticed the water main veered.

"Council had approved only a staight shot water main along Novi Road, but in actuality, a 16-inch water main was re-routed into an (then) unapproved subdivision. I was surprised and the (city's) DPW director was surprised," she wrote in her letter. . Cassis, Council Member Tim Pope and

her attorney John Donohue met with Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall, Director of Public Services Anthony Nowicki and a city attorney over a week ago to discuss the matter.

Donohue is a city attorney for Farmington Hills and Walled Lake.

Cassis said Thursday that once a report on the matter is completed by City Attonrney David Fried, she will raise related issues.

Kriewall confirmed Friday that the water main on the west side of Novi Road had been redesigned to extend west rather than south. This was done to avoid tearing down trees along the road and to save on the cost of purchasing construction easements, he

They (South Hill) negotiated this with our engineers and right-of-way people. These kind of things happen all the time," he

Kriewall agreed that with the water main closer to the subdivision, the developer would save on the expense of extending water lines from the houses to the main.

"There's a cost savings there but our position is we don't care as long as it doesn't cost us anything. The savings in trees and easement costs offset the relocation of the main. It appears to me at this time that there is no disadvantage to the community,"

Cassis questions if the rerouting had a public benefit and is calling for the city council to join her into looking into the

"The real issue is that the rerouting was not disclosed to the council. We in essence may have been approving certain matters wihout sufficient information being disclosed to us," she said.

"I felt the need to go to an outside attorney to really advise me as to the proper way to

She says she also wonders about an increase in engineering services for the project from \$94,00 to \$131,000.

"I am not an engineer. I wouldn't go sit in on any kind of engineering matters. I am only saying this looks right or doesn't look right," she said.

### Noise proves a complex problem

Ever been awakened in the early hours of a Saturday - sleep-in morning by the gentle sounds of a half-dozen or more bulldozers and

If so, you may appreciate what a group of Woodland Glen Apartments and other Novi residents are asking the city council to consider - a noise ordinance modeled after one in adjacent Farmington Hills.

"Did you ever work an eight- to 10-hour day and you want to go home and relax on your patio or deck and have a burger or hot dog but you can't because you're eating dust?" Eleven Mile Road resident Denise Holmes asked the city council July 13.

"Do you ever wonder why God made the seventh day a day of rest. He didn't need it. We do."

The Farmington Hills regulation limits construction work to the hours of 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Sunday is an enforced day of rest for development contractors there. Over one hundred Woodland Glen residents have already signed a petition of protest. The move was triggered by the long hours kept by some contractors hired by Elbaz Construction Company, which is putting in the 32-home Yerkes Manor Subdivision on Eight Mile

The apartment-dwellers say that work on the Yerkes development runs seven days a week, frequently beginning at 6 a.m. and running

until 10 p.m. and later.

England said the petition was only circulated over the third of the complex immediately next-door to Yerkes Manor: "I could easily get 300 signatures more. Even if the people don't live right next to the construction, they're still affected

The Novi City Council is scheduled to discuss the proposed ordinance tonight.

In 1986, the city's ordinance review committee briefly considered a noise ordinance which covered a variety of soundmakers, including radios, television sets, musical intrustments, construction equip-Woodland Glen manager Angela ment, power boats and explosives.

"Noise disturbances" would have been prohibited between the hours of 10 p.m. to 7 a.m.

"It was just killed. The complaint was taken care of," City Clerk Gerry Stipp said. Since then, no one brought the

matter up - until now. The only regulation now in place in Novi limits noise levels in nonindustrial districts to 60 decibels.

With Michigan weather shortening the construction season, many builders rush to get as much work completed as quickly as possible. Time is money.

Elbaz Construction Company's Max Elbaz said he subcontracted the Yerkes Job.

"Basically, the people were pressed for time and they had to work over-time to keep up. It was really not requested by us," he said.

Elbaz said he had "mixed feelings" about a possible ordinance which could restrict construction based on noise considerations.

"Sometimes, they have an open field where the guy wants to work until 12 p.m. and he's not bothering anybody. I don't see any objection, he said.

"I can see the logic of limiting it near residential."

### Cooker pledges to fix wetlands

The proposed Cooker Bar and Grille received a site plan extension despite what one Planning Commissioner described as "gross wetland intrusion."

The restaurant, proposed for the south side of Twelve Mile Road west of Haggerty Road, was cited for a wetlands violation, said Commissioner Laura Lorenzo.

Lorenzo learned of the problem after talking with wetlands consultant Susan Tepatti.

Two Democrats, including accountant Walter Briggs IV and Novi's Michael Meyer, have been invited, but Staab was unsure if they would attend.


Members of the audience will be permitted to ask questions, Staab said. And candidates likely will be given a chance to make a short opening statement.



Secom expands: The light manufacturing firm on the south side of Grand River Avenue between Taft and Beck Roads was approved for an expansion July 15 by the Novi Planning Commission.

Secom General, owned by the Unislow Corp., plans to add a 32,000-square-foot warehouse at the rear of its site. The company owns more than 6 acres on a site zoned for light industrial. The vote was unanimous with Commissioner Robert Taub abstaining due to business interests with Secom.

Novi Industries: Secom is not the only company expanding in Novi. Novi Industries Inc. received permission to expand at its location at the souteast corner of I-96 and the CSX railroad.

Also known as Progressive Tool, Novi Industries received a large contract and needed the extra space. The commission granted preliminary

site plan approval at its July 15 meeting. The addition will include a 153,000-square-foot addition. Progressive Tool is located on almost 44 acres in an area zoned for general industrial.

New cellular phone tower: Ameritech Mobile Communications Inc. likely will build a new tower to accommodate the growing number of cellular phones in the area. Construction of the tower must still come to the Novi Planning Commission for approval, but Ameritech representatives said July 15 they are planning to build the tower on leased property on the west side of Haggerty Road.

A second tower already is in place in Novi at the corner of Novi and Eleven Mile roads.

Paid commissioners?: After an extended discussion among Novi Planning Commissioners at their July 15 meeting, new member Robert Taub joked they should vote themselves salaries. The commission currently is unpaid.







### WL moves to outlaw smoking in schools

Teachers and other employees of Walled Lake Consolidated Schools who happen to smoke have until next June to enjoy their cigarettes. During school hours, that is.

The school board last Thursday voted unanimously to OK a policy banning smoking within all district buildings and grounds, effective July 1, 1993, said district spokeswoman Lois Lange.

"This has been the topic of discussion at board meetings during the past year or so," Lange said Monday. "This (smoking ban) is the result of those discussions" and findings of a recent district-wide employee

In the survey, 72 percent of 761 respondents — including both smokers and non-smokers — stated they would like the district to enforce a smoke-free environment, Lange said.

The decision to implement the ban fully next July was made by the school board "so contractual ramifications could be worked out."

"What we're trying to do is spend

"What we're trying to do is spend the next year trying to implement this plan," said trustee Marc Belsky. "But we have to work through the teachers."

Belsky said the current contract with the Walled Lake Education Association, set to expire in February, includes a clause requiring all buildings have a designated lounge. The next contract, he continued, would clearly state that smoking not be allowed, either in buildings or on the surrounding grounds and parking

Michigan Education Association's Karen Murray, who represents both the Walled Lake and West Bloomfield teachers, said the Walled Lake smoking ban would be contingent on future negotiations for the teachers' next contract.

"But it's safe to say it's a fair projection that (no smoking policy) is something we'd be negotiating," Murray said. "I know that's going to be an issue."

Murray said she didn't know whether any other districts have been successful in deleting contract language about permitting employees to smoke in a lounge or designated area.

Such areas would be totally eliminated under the Walled Lake plan. The main reasons, Belsky said, are health and image.

health and image.

"First of all, we feel we'd have a healthier working environment (with the ban)," Belsky sald. "And secondly, we have extensive (curriculum) programs in all levels on health education.

"One of the things we stress is not to smoke. We want to be consistent with the role models."

The trustee emphasized there will be an attempt to help those employees who smoke to get over the hump, Belsky said. A possibility is for a team of teachers and administrators to work together on helping smokers make the transition.


"We want to make sure we're not going to distress any of our employees. Those who smoke, we need to get them the training and education to help them stop within the next year to make this work."

Lange was unable to supply statistics about how many employees in the district currently smoke.

But Belsky estimated smokers as "a small proportion . . . it seemed most employees are in favor of this."






### Summer salad deserves better than a bowl

Summer salads are much more than lettuce in a bowll in the hot days of summer, salads are easy, satisfying one dish meals that the entire family will enjoy. There is no end to the possible combinations for salads. After the salad is made, all you need is a loaf of crusty

Select and combine greens, choose from many flavors and appearances. Romaine and iceberg lettuces provide crispness. Butter and oakleal provide softness and variety shapes. Red-leaf or radicchio brighten a salad. Shredded sorrel leaves add tartness while curly endive adds texture and bitterness. Spinach adds interest. Belgian endive, watercress or arugula will add a sharp bite.

Edible flowers that are free from chemical sprays add another dimension to the salads. Nasturtiums, chrysanthemums, violas, violets, alyssum, daylilles, roses and dianthus can all enhance salads. Herb flowers can add flavor and color, however can be intense in flavor so use sparingly.

When using Just "greens" in a salad, chill them and mix at the last possible moment. The cold helps to crisp the greens and numb your tastebuds so you'll be satisfied with less salad dressing. If you wet the greens, the dressing will not cling, and the flavors are diluted, so dry thoroughly after washing. Greens can be torn ahead and placed in a plastic bag or covered bowl and refrigerated for several hours before serving. Greens should be handled gently to prevent them from wilting.

Be creative and make interesting salads using frozen, dried, canned or leftover vegetables. Frozen corn, peas, dried tomatoes and mushrooms, canned water chestnuts, bottled artichokes or roasted peppers are just a few options. Potatoes, onion, sweet green peppers, cabbage, carrots and celery, of course, are old stand-bys for salads. Try some different vegetables in the salad such as sweet potatoes, yellow squash, kohlrabi, green beans and asparagus.

To enjoy the taste and texture of the vegetables, don't obscure them with an overabundance of oil dressing. About one tablespoon of dressing will coat a cup of salad.

Choose an oil with lots of flavor. Extra virgin oil is a great choice for flavor, while canola oil has a milder taste. For a stronger flavor, try peanut or seasame oil.

Take care in choosing a vinegar for a dressing. A malt or distilled white vinegar is too pungent for salads. Fruit flavored, apple cider, sherry, balsamic or white wine are good choices for mild flavoring.

Chop fresh herbs to add to your dressings. Parsley, basil, cilantro, mint, oregano or tarragon will add an interesting twist. Horseradish and dijon mustard in the mixed salad dressing will add some zest. Don't forget the garlic.

Presentation is also very important with a salad. Garnish with lemon wedges, walnut halves, toasted seasame seeds, unsalted dry roasted peanuts, fresh mint leaves or with a few dilly beans to add a tart, crisp flavor. A garnish of fresh oranges or grapefruit slices will add another dimension to a salad. Shave or make thin ribbon strips of summer squash to garnish the top when serving. Homemade croutons are much fresher and flavorful and will accent any kind of a salad. Once you make your own you'll probably never buy them again.

For a very nutritious, satisfying, easy one dish meal, consider a hot or cold salad. Be creative and imaginative, put your own signature on a salad and everyone will want you to bring it to the next picnic or party on those hot days when only a salad will satisfy.

# Getting to the root

### Follow your nose with flavorful favorite

"Gilroy at harvest time is the only town in America where you can marinate a steak just by hanging it out on the clothesline"

You don't even have to roll down the car windows to know when you pull off the interstate that you're in the town that calls itself "The Garlic Capital of the World."

Your nose knows. The aroma slaps you in the face faster than George Foreman can pummel a challenger.

And every summer Gilroy hosts a garlic festival. In the festival's Gourmet Alley Alone - where they serve garlic-laced pesto and pasta and scampi, garlic bread and pepper steak rolls — they use up more than 5,000 pounds of garlic, 7,000 loaves of French bread, 24,000 rolls, 1,400 pounds of onions, 5,190 pounds of butter, 14 bins of bell peppers, 4,000 pounds of mushrooms.

And this doesn't include the food served in dozens of booths, where they sell Greek and Thai cuisine with garlic as well as novelties, such as garlic ice cream and chocolate-covered garlic candy.

And when festivalgoers aren't eating, they're watching the annual Garlic Festival cook-off or any one of a number of cooking demonstrations by celebrity chefs ranging from local Gilroy standouts to public television chefs and cookbook author Martin Yan.

The bottom line is, if you're going to reek, you might as well enjoy it. Here are some winning recipes from past Gilroy Garlic Festivals.



- 4 dried Ancho or Pastilla chilies
- I cup water 1 tablespoon offive oil
- 1. onion, chopped
- 8 cloves fresh garlic, minced 2 tomatillos, chopped 2 tablespoons Worchestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- I tablespoon chocolate chips
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon 1 teaspoon cumin
- salt and pepper to taste 4 to 8 turkey tenderloins, about 1 1/2 to 2

1 cup fresh cilantro, chopped.

Yields 4 servings.

Stem and seed chilies. Heat water and pour over chilies. Let stand for at least 30

Heat oil in large saucepan. Saute onion and garlic until tender, not brown, about 5 minutes. Add tomatillos, chilies and 1/4 cup of chili liquid. Add Worcestershire sauce, sugar, chocolate chips, cinnamon and cumin. Simmer 20 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Pour into food processor or food mill and puree, then strain through a medium sieve. Sauce should be thick. (May be made two days ahead of serving.)

At least 2 hours before serving, trim turkey tenderloins and pour sauce over them in container with tight-fitting lid to marinate. Remove turkey from sauce. Reserve all sauce; set aside 1/2 cup for basting. Grill turkey tenderloins until just done, about 4 to 5 minutes per side, over hot charcoal or under broiler, basting with ½ cup sauce. Heat remaining reserved sauce and pass with cooked turkey. Garnish with chopped cilantro.

SKEWERED CHICKEN AND GARLIC

### Marinade:

14 cup white wine 1/4 cup lime juice

1/4 cup chopped fresh basil leaves or 4 teaspoons dried basil 2 jalapeno chilies, seeded and minced

hour or overnight. Thread chicken, garlic cloves and bell pepper chunks alternately onto skewers. Grill or broil 4 inches from heat for 6 minutes, or until chicken is browned and cooked through. Meanwhile, pour marinade into saucepan; bring to a boil over medium heat. Stir in tomatoes, green onions, cilantro and salt to taste; remove from heat. Serve with chicken. Garnish with basil or cilantro sprigs and lime

slices, if desired. Note: Parboiling the garlic cloves leaves them mild enough to eat but still firm

## '50s were revolutionary era in food world



The '50s Festival is coming to town. Or should I say the Town Center. The activities planned are phenomenal.

Why are we so infatuated by the '50s? The music, the cars and, yes, even the food. This

was the beginning of a new era. The war was over and extravagance abounded. Gourmet magazine premiered in 1941 and was followed by dozens of other publications about food. The days of Coke, burgers, TV dinner and ketchup were over.

Gourmets were considered "snobs" who would have nothing to do with a good hot dog or casserole. Pate', whole roasted garlic cloves, suktyaki and cassoulets were the new breed. Beef Wellingtons, moussaka, fondue and souffles found their way into American's lives.

Food took on a character of its own. Cocktail parties became the fashionable way to entertain. Hors d'oeuvre was just one of the French wordsto appear. "En croute" (in pastry), "au vine" (with wine), "a l'orange" (with oranges or orange essence), and "au poivre" (with pepper) all became part of the new culinary language.

Mateus and Lancer's were the wines of

choice and the popularity of napkin rings abounded. James Beard was the force behind much of the new wave cooking. He was partial to raw beef, anchovies, strong cheeses and sweetbreads, all of which, until this time, were not considered the "usual" bill of fare.

Beard's major complaint was with the rigidity of American cooking. Strict measurements and inflexible procedures were not acceptable to him. One of my favorite quotes of his is as follows, "For so many years, fun was lacking in our kitchens. The home economists approach their tasks with so much solemnity . . . just like the nutritionists of today. I want to say, to hell with all their rules."

Enjoyment became Beard's chant and

one of the vital principles of America's food

Along with their newfound food, gourmets' kitchens filled with new equipment. In 1949, the first self lowering toaster was introduced. Mixers, blenders, electric grills and automatic bean pots filled the shelves of department stores. It was hard to keep these new appliances in stock. Demand out-weighed supply.

In 1940 21/2 million refrigerators were sold. By 1950 over 6 million, mostly aqua, boxes adorned kitchens. For the real serious cooks freezers were available to hold their lobster tails mail-ordered from the

The '50s were the start of a new revolution, although much of the food served then is no longer popular. We have gotten back to more simplistic and simple fare. As a reminder though, and in conjunction with Kitchen Glamour and the Novi Town Center, I will give two demonstrations on '50s food. They will be held on Thursday and Friday at 2 p.m. at the Novi Kitchen Giamour.


