

Novi cops warn area stores of operation

An undercover liquor enforcement action by Novi Police, which will make use of underage "decoys" who will attempt to purchase liq-uor, is expected to begin in the next few weeks, Novi Police Chief Doug Shaeffer said.

Mailings have already been sent out to stores, restaurants and other establishments that sell liquor, informing owners of the department's plan.

"So far I've just had some light conversation with some of the license holders, to make sure they received the letters and they know what the standards are," Shaeffer said. "We want to be as upfront as possible.

The purpose is not to catch somebody selling to minors, but to keep them from doing it in the first place."

A recent similar program in Farmington Hills found 70 percent of the stores tested sold to minors, in spite of advance notification letters from police.

Shaeffer said once the program starts, it will be ongoing. The letter that has been sent to liquor license holders is likely to be the only warning they will get.

Report shows no guidelines for water line

City Attorney David Fried's report on the South Hill Construction Co.'s diversion of a public water main into Mystic Forest subdivision was not warmly received Monday.

Fried concluded that "a total lack of formal policy" led Novi's consult-ing engineers JCK & Associates into undertaking policy decisions which should have been made by Novi City Council or the administration. He advised the city to set up guidelines for the engineers.

Council Member Nancy Cassis, who instigated the investigation, blasted the 17-page document for containing "watered down conclusions." The project's costs have spiraled upward from \$72,000 to \$130,000.

Cassis refers to the issue as "Watermaingate."

"I think your report confirmed that main provided financial benefit to Mystic Forest not enjoyed by other property owners and increased the engineering costs to the city by at least \$46,000," Cassis said.

"It's too benign, benevolent and blind. The report misses the mark due to presumption and unanswered questions, overlooking the law and the city charter."

Novi's "Watermaingate" began in March 1991. when City Council began mulling ways to finance construction of a water main down Novi Road, City attorney David Fried recently concluded that there was nothing improper in the city's contract and that the consulting engineer probably knew the line would have to be rerouted. But Fried's report has come under attack. The story is on page 8.

contractor who won the bid to install the water main.

At Council Member Joseph Toth's request, the report will be discussed in depth in an as-yetunscheduled special meeting.

Fried was instructed in July to investigate the issue after research by Cassis showed that the water main was re-directed from a proposed straight shot along Novi Road into the subdivision.

However, he added, stores that pass the test" and refuse to sell to minors might be receiving a congratulatory letter, commending them on their compliance with the law and their efforts to stop underage drinking.

Stores caught selling to minors will be fined and reported to the state liquor control board. An accumulation of such reports will lead to revokation of their liquor license.

"I'm sure liquor sales are a major part of their income," Shaeffer said. "If (an establishment) wants to make that very small additional profit margin by selling to minors if they want to risk that --- then they should receive that penalty."

Shaeffer said the "decoy" minors used in the exercises will not carry fake IDs, wear excessive makeup, have facial hair, or any other things that might make them look older than they are.

"Our intent is not to trick anybody," he said. "We prefer to just prevent it to begin with."

The underage decoys have not been chosen yet, but "it will be good exposure for some of the kids," Shaeffer said. "It will be a good experience for them, and good for the community."

Foreign affair International Fest draws thousands

Four years ago the International Festival was just a dream in May Sanghyi's head.

But today the Novi doctor is sitting back and reflecting on the third of what has become an annual event in Novi. And although there are some things he would like to see different, he knows the festival is growing into a regular Novi feature.

Trailer park warned to boil water

"Don't drink the water" is advice usually given to Americans planning a vacation south of the border.

But it has been the word around Country Cousins Mobile Village for more than two weeks. and as of Monday residents there were still up in the air over the Oakland County Health Department's tests that turned up coliform bacteria in the water supply.

According to Nathan Foote, an environmental health specialist for the state health department, Country Cousins is one of 26 mobile home communities in Michigan where residents are currently being warned to boll their drinking water.

But there may be an end in sight. Foote said a third battery of testing took place Monday morning, and results were expected by Wednesday afternoon.

The new tests followed a flushing-out of the Country Cousins water system, which he said was designed to remove any bacteria build-up that may have naturally accumulated in the pipes.

The problem was discovered when routine water testing, performed during the week of July 20, turned up a presence of coliform, said Bob Long, administrative assistant for Oakland County Environmental Health Services.

Coliform bacteria in and of itself is natural and basically harmless, Foote said.

If you lick the end of your finger right now you will cat hundreds of coliform bacteria," he said.

"You find it all the time, crawling on food, on tables -- they're everywhere."

The problem is, coliform in the water supply can sometimes be an indicator of a possible outside influence, such as sewage, Long said. "But it's important to note that we have found

no association with fecal material or sewage in the Country Cousins water," Foote stressed, Coliform can possibly be dangerous to infants or elderly people, he explained, because it can cause diarrhea. However, it would have to be ingested in huge doses.

"If an infant got a formula bottle that was just loaded with the bacteria he could get diarrhea," he said. That would be the worst that could happen.

But diarrhea can lead to dehydration, and that can be dangerous. Our biggest concern is with infants and elderly people."

Foote said a small amount of coliform in the water is natural, and probably exists in every water supply.

"But we should be able to fill a tiny (sample) bottle and not get any bacteria," he said. When a first testing shows a presence of coli-

form, local and state health departments then follow up with four more tests. If the coliform turns up a second time, residents are notified and put on a "boil water" notice.

In the Country Cousins case, coliform was found in the first testing, then in one of the four samples in the second testing.

Normally, when there is a real problem, the coliform will turn up in all of the followup samples," Foote said.

"I am confident that although the Country Cousins supply does have some aesthetic problems - problems with color, taste and smell the water is probably safe. All of the chemical and bacteria testing has been very good up to this time."

However, if the third testing indicates that coliform is still present, residents will continue to boil their water. A chlorination process would then be performed to kill any remaining bacteria.

"This indeed is much more serious than initially I thought it was," she said.

Expo finds win-win situation at council

The Novi Expo Center was twiceblessed by the city Monday.

The convention center won one of Novi's precious Class C liquor licenses

And the Novi City Council agreed to pursue a \$2.5 million state grant to build the second half of a ring road to curve past the Expo Center and connect Novi Road to Grand River Avenue in the northwest quadrant of the town center.

But the second boon came with a warning — the businesses must chip in and pay in cash or right-ofway donations worth a good share of the city's \$624,000 match for the grant.

In March, the city council reserved the liquor license for the the Expo Center for six months.


"We didn't want to wait until the last minute, particularily because of the issues that surround liquor licenses in the city at this point," Expo Center president Blair Bowman said, to explain why he was coming back for final approval.

Dragon City owner Scott Wang has asked the American Civil Liberties Union to investigate if the council's denial of a license to his Chinese restaurant was discriminatory.

The council found the facility met liquor license ordinance requirements as a convention center capable of serving a sit-down meal to 800 people. The Novi Sheraton Oaks vouched it has the capability of catering to a crowd of up to 2,000 there.

The Expo Center's grand opening is slated for October.

After a month long investigation into what has been called "Watermaingate,* City Attorney David Fried has concluded that the root of the growing controversy is the lack of city policy -- which in some instances could make Novi vulnerable to a lawsuit.

The absence of procedures led the city's consulting engineers, JCK & Associates, to "assume policy decisions which should have been addressed by the city council and/or city administration," Fried wrote. But the motive was not "wrongful or improper," he said.

Choices made by the engineers saved \$75,000 for South Hill Construction, which built the water main, according to the report. Fried advised the city to come up

with a set of guidelines for engineering work, including a system of accountability for project cost estimates. Novi City Council gave Fried the



"It (the liquor license) provides the center with the ability to really tout itself as a full-service center, "Bowman

Bowman said work is going on to spruce up the former Mohawk Liquor factory, including the addition of 28 doors to the vast building, the creation of north and south lobbies, a 2,000 square-foot concession area and parking lot improvements. The firm, which currently doesn't have enough parking spaces to meet city regulations, is expected to return in September with a new parking plan.

Plans call for contracting for both the food and liquor services. Bowman said the license was not critical but "highly beneficial" for trade shows. It will allow on-premise beer, wine and

Council Members Carol Mason and Nancy Cassis bucked the trend and didn't agree with the license recommendation now forwarded to the state liquor control commission.

"I'm not against the Expo Center at this time," Mason said. "I don't think things are in place as they should be. I don't want to be part of any litigation that might come up, that some one will say we're part of a favoritism kind of situation."

The Novi Expo Center has a 10-year lease on the building with an option for two five-year leases and an option to purchase from the property's owners, the Adell Brothers' Childrens Trust. Bowman said the Expo Center has given a five-year free lease to tenants the Novi Chamber of Commerce and the Motorsports Museum and Hall of Fame.

The council also gave the city staff the permission to apply for a Michigan Transportation Economic Development Fund Category A grant to continue the ring road. Work is already starting on the first half of the state-funded drive, leading from Novi Road and stopping near the Expo-Center.

The extension would provide a second road access to General Filters and Novi Industries, now planning to add 180 new employees as part of a major expansion.

Several council members urged the business owners to donate the needed easement to the city, rather tiate for dayments

"I really would like to see a combined effort with the city and the private sector, with rights-of-way donations," Council Member Tim Pope

"If we get the money, I won't support it if there's not a strong public/ private partnership. It benefits many of the businesses in that area." The proposed road design is tricky, city engineers say, since it must accommodate both the Rouge

River and a wetlands area. Mason was the only council member to withhold approval for seeking

the grant. "We don't know if it's (Novi's share) going to be \$625,000," she said.







MSU, for example, recently was torn and badly damaged by a savage power struggle between members of its board, football coach George Perles and President John DiBiaggio. DiBiaggio resigned this summer to become president at a smaller private school. Rumor has it that past board disunity is hindering the search for a successor.

I happen to know something about this, as I ran (sucressfully) for election to the U-M board in 1990. The system is bizarre. Nobody knows who you are or what office you are running for, let alone what your credentials are or what your views on higher education might

Media coverage is almost entirely lacking. Radio and TV totally ignore the races. Newspapers seldom cover what the candidates say. Excepting the Detroit News and Free Press and the Booth Newspapers, editorial analysis and endorsements are perfunctory.

Should the system be changed? Attempts have been made. The arguments for appointment sound pretty good. The election turns into a popularity contest, often determined by presidential or gubernatorial coattails. The political process at state conventions often is erratic, selecting candidates who are sometimes good and sometimes not so good. Many able and qualified people decline to submit to the nonsense or scrutiny (you pick) which inevitably accompanies a partisan race. But no system is perfect


Appointing governors can be inattentive or swayed by favoritism or big contributions, or even corrupt. A 1991 survey taken by the Governing Boards of Colleges and Universities found that two-thirds of presidents were not consulted by appointing governors and that 25 percent thought appointments were made with "little or no care."

In my view, there are real advantages to electing boards. Candidates must campaign, which is an eye-opening reality test for many. And electing board members confers legitimacy on their functions, a standing that in Michigan has produced considerable independence for universities against the whims of the legislature. Maybe a good solution would be to return to the system used before the 1963 Constitution was adopted, in which

'Pure muscle'

Just what are 'family values'

Republican orators, with one exception, apparently did a poor ob defining "family values" last week in Houston. To some, the Grand Old Party was preaching morality, the

church's job, when it should have been dealing in economics. To others, abortion falls under family values because it prevents unwanted families. To still others, it raised the marital fidelity question.

Let me offer one newsman's unofficial grasp of the Republican buzzword: A man marries a woman - not another man - some time before the first baby arrives. Abortion never occurs to them. The man supports his family. The couple keeps the kids clean and sends them to school on time. They take the kids to church, and morn gives some time to PTA. Sometimes things sour between the mom and dad, and they split. Dad still supports them and sees the kids on

weekends. If they don't live happily ever after, at least they aim toward that ideal. The Revi Keith Butler, a Detroit councilman, spelled out government's role in promoting family values somewhat

nore bluntly than did the prime time orators. Butler spoke of "providing incentives for families to stay together, discouraging births out of wedlock and requiring

able-bodied welfare recipients to enroll in job training." Butler mentioned a housing preservation program "so that tenants and renters can own their own home, sink roots deep into their neighborhood and grab a piece of the American dream."

What are anti-family values? Mom gets pregnant at 15 and has four kids by the time she's 21. None of the fathers marries her or pays a penny of

support. The first baby has a low birth weight and other compli-

cations because of mom's youth and lack of pre-natal care. Medicare has spent \$90,000 by the time the child can be discharged from the hospital. Another baby is accidentally shot by someone driving past a crack house. A third child is a truant from school, joins a gang and lands in prison after fathering a few kids of his own. The fourth one begins reproducing at 14 . . . and her daughter at 13. After the last child reaches 18, mom is no longer eligible for AFDC and begins collecting general assistance (until it

was abolished). They are glorified in the liberal media - e.g., the Detroit Free Press article about "Single Mothers: A Family Tradition."

The government, in Mario Cuomo's words, becomes family, providing AFDC, Medicare, rent supplements, WIC, food stamps and more. Their social worker advocates setting up voter registration booths at the DSS office.

Except for Butler, most GOP orators pussy-footed around the topic. Half of Republicans and two-thirds of Democrats, I suspect, were unclear what the code phrase "family values" implied.

Vice President Dan Quayle was counter-productive in explaining family values when he picked on unwed mother Murphy Brown. His target was a mature woman with a high-paying job. In real life, 90 percent of unwed mothers become clients of the social services lobby. And since it's unwise to pick on women, Quayle should

be targeting the males who have fun and run. That is how one newsman interprets this year's buzzword. No orator came close to spelling it out bluntly, so I sat down and read the platform, particularly pages 10 through 34.

Not all Republicans embrace — or even understand — "family values." Not all Democrats hold anti-family values. You as a voter will have to decide (1) whether family values are important and (2) whether the candidates in your district do or don't subscribe.


Kristen Kenny hopes to lead her team into a winning season

"Her job is to score," he said. "She needs to score if we are going to be successful. Kristen will have to be a leader on the floor."




the director and a member of the residence council. The commission members determine what they can do.

Lockboxes boost marketing capabilities

The key to a board of Realtors' marketing capability is usually in its multiple listing service operation. And the key to individual MLS-listed homes is usually in a little metal container called a lockbox or key-safe.

This device, commonly attached to the front door, is used by authorized MLS members to access the home's interior and show it to prospective buyers. The house key is contained and protected in this metal box. The sales agent uses a master key and/or combination or electronic program to gain access to the box.

A new high-tech type of lockbox is now being used or considered by several MLS groups throughout the country. Instead of the common system using a key and/or manual combination to open the box, MLS members use an electronic device programmed to enter the boxes.

The heart of the new system is an "electronic key" or card that is required to open each lockbox. Each card has a memory unit that stores the date, time and identity of the most recent 600 key safes it


has opened.

With this system, the MLS can quickly determine who has used the lockbox on what date and at what time. The box has an electronic memory unit and keeps a record of the previous 600 openings.

Another advantage of the new system is that it can be programmed to open only at specified time periods during the day or only if a special code is used, available from the listing agent. In other words, if a "day sleeper" lives in the house, the device could be programmed to work only after 2 p.m. Or if a working mother doesn't want to allow access after the kids return from school, the period from 3-6 p.m. could be blocked out.

The memory capability of the new device also is helpful as a marketing tool for the listing broker. It can produce printout reports on the number of times the property was shown to prospects over a specified time period.

The primary benefit of an enhanced lockbox system is to provide maximum protection for listed properties and minimize the liability risk for brokers and MLSs, Continued on 2







A pristine yard

A beautiful, eye-catching yard, one that features a lush, green lawn and well-pruned plants and shrubs, is relatively simple to achieve if you start early and work periodically to maintain it.

Start with the lawn. When winter comes to an end and the last frost has melted and cleared, it's time to rid the turf of grass and leaf clippings left over from the previous fall. An old-fashioned raking will do just fine.

Many towns and municipalities now charge for the pickup of lawn waste, as well as for the actual bags in which the materials are placed. Consider purchasing a shredder, it can reduce eight bags of leaves to one, saving you money and lessening the burden on the nation's overflowing landfills.

Once the lawn is cleared, prep it for the coming summer by tilling or using another aerating device to let the turf breathe. Then lay down grass seed as needed in bare spots or thinned areas. Many professional landscapers recommend applying a fertilizer high in nitrogen to provide an added boost to the developing lawn.

Lawns thrive when they receive an inch of water a day. Many cities face drought each season and, therefore, enforce water restrictions, so water wisely. Turn on the sprinklers in the early evening. This allows the soil to absorb the moisture before the sun's warm rays evaporate it the next morning, Beds can benefit from prop-

er watering, too. A landscape fabric laid atop the soil allows air and water to filter through while physically blocking the growth of weeds. An inchthick layer of mulch or wood chips placed over the fabric continues to permit air and water through while making a decorative addition to the landscape and reducing the number of waterings necessarv

Chips can be produced by recycling broken and pruned branches collected during a yard cleanup.

Trees, shrubs, perennials and annuals all benefit greatly from pruning, though this task needs to be done properly and at the appropriate season. The myth that all pruning

Tradition is the topping for Shield's pizza

So often the growth of the suburbs at the expense of Detroit means little more than new subdivisions and glass-and-steel offices.

But in the case of Shield's Restaurant, Bar and Pizzeria, the suburbs have inherited a true Detroit tradition. The Novi Shield's, on Grand River Avenue west of Meadowbrook Road, brought a piece of the city's culture to town when it opened in 1989.
