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Council plans to tighten its budgetary belt

Taxes will not be raised an average of \$30 per year to help Novi through its current budget crunch, the Novi City Council majority decided in a special meeting

Thursday. With the understanding that staff members will not be laid off, City Manager Edward Kriewall was sent back to implement the paring of \$144,000 from of this year's budget.

Novi is more than half way through fiscal year 1992/1993. The city faces entering the next fiscal year, 1993/1994, with \$400,000 less than it had at the beginning of this fiscal year.

A proposal from the city administration to help make good the loss — and avoid lay-offs — by tapping into money set aside in years past for park land urchases was protested by several parks and recreation commissioners. The council had \$144,000 on hold from the general fund to finance a purchase option and the first payment on park land at Napier and Nine Mile roads. Another \$188,000 in special 1985 mid-decade census funds had also been dedicated to park E City Council members Thusiday praised Novi department heads for the reductions each has proposed for this year's budget, but Finance Director Les Gibson cautioned that not all of this may be do-able. 
Novi has a \$12 million general fund budget.

Kriewall said that several years of keeping the general fund millage before the Truth In Taxation benchmark have croded the city's abil ity to bounce back from the Tax Tribunal losses. Novi is permitted by city charter to assess a 6.5 millage rate for the general fund. Last year, the council levied this at 4.37, the same rate as the year before. Truth in Taxation is a state regulation which requires governments to roll back tax millage to offset increases in property tax values. A community may override Truth in Taxation after holding a public hearing. "We've actually penalized ourselves by passing budgets below Truth in Taxation," Kriewall said. "When we've been running as tight as we have for the last couple of years, we cannot absorb the shock of the Tax Tribunal."

Plan wins approval over protests

The Novi Planning Commission gave its blessing to a new subdivision design at its Jan. 20 meeting, despite recommendations to adjust its view of the adjusted lot size plan.

Council approves phone tower

If you're tired of the voice on the other end fading in and out as you chat away on your mobile phone while cruising Interstate 96, improvements could be on the way.

The installation of a 180-foot tower owned by Detroit Cellular Telephone Company was recently approved by the Novi City Council.

The site selected is five industrially-zoned acres on the south side of Grand River Avenue between Beck and Wixom Road, behind the J. Kelly Company.

In applying for a variance for the tower, the company noted that customers frequently complain about service in this area, with customers receiving busy tones and poor quality calls. The new tower will aid capacity in central and northern Novi, especially along the freeway system.

Existing towers serving the area are now well over capacity, the firm contends.

Representing Detroit Cellular Telephone Company, attorney and engineer Jonathan Crane said that the unmanned tower will only be service twice a month and will generate no smoke, fumes or traffic.

Crane said that at the request of Novi's Zoning Board of Appeals, the tower will be built to withstand wind gusts of up to 100 miles per hour.

According to planning consultant Brandon Rogers said the new facility is higher than existing Ameritech and Cellular One towers in Novi. but that the structure will be painted to blend in with the sky and will serve a large area.

"It's a service to the community as well as the motoring public. This ordinance has been in place 10 or 12 years. I think it's out-of-date with the state-of-the art," Rogers.

"If the tower falls, only 40 percent falls and then it implodes."

The city-approved variance allows the tower to be 120 feet higher than what local ordinances. Based on city requirements, 180 feet of setback would be needed, but only 123 feet is available.

"It doesn't seem to be near any residential area it could impact. This seems to be an excellent location for this tower," City Manager Edward Kriewall said.

The firm notes that it will be providing additional service to Novi by through towers planned for Commerce Township and Northville.

Rogers advised that the ordinance review committee look at the current requirements for towers, which are based on possibly outdated building standards which anticipated that towers would fall over sideways, rather than collapse inwards.

Police find pot, consider charges

Police officers with a search warrant burst into a home on Austin Street Jan. 19 and confiscated marijuana from a suspected dealer.

Officers from the Oakland County Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET) and the Novi Police Department found four people at home, but only one is suspected of dealing.

Officers discovered and confiscated approximately 46 grams of marijuana along with a scale and associated paraphernalia, as well as over \$250 cash.

NET Lt. Beth Moranty said that the amount of mariluana and the other items led officers to believe

of the home. There is no specific cut-off point in such a case that would make the difference between possession of

marijuana for personal use or for sale. "It's based on the prior experience of narcotics officers and prosecuting attorneys," Moranty said. "Most often, generally speaking, 46 grams would indicate the suspect is

selling it." Moranty said only one of the four residents of the home is suspected of selling marijuana. The others in the house may have been children, but Moranty was unable to confirm

No arrest had been made as of

the suspect was likely selling it out Friday, but officers were making plans to seek criminal charges through the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office.

> "Warrants are pending," said Moranty. "We're going to the prosecutor on Monday and a decision will be made then as to whether we will be making any arrests.

Moranty would not say what led NET officers to suspect the Austin Street home, adding that it could jeopardize other investigations currently underway. However, she said, this incident was not connected with any other suspected drug dealings in the Novi area.

A second search warrant led to another drug bust that same night on Woodland Place in the Country

Alarm rules revised

Those who get a sense of security working order so that fewer false alarms from having a burglar alarm and yet do are turned in to the police department. not want to pay out large sums if the system sometimes goes off accidentally can ow rest easy.

The Novi City Council recently took action to reduce the fines to be charged when burglar alarm systems in the city turn in false alarms to the Novi Police Department.

Where previously, a false alarm would result in a \$50 fine the very first time, owners of alarm systems can now have up to as many as three false alarms within a 12 month period without incurring costs. Under the old version of the ordinance, the fines would quickly escalate to \$500 on the fourth false alarm. but now the law won't fine owners that much until they've reached the seventh false alarm.



Why shy away from fabulous, fun avocado?

Avocados are often given a bad rap and frequently put in the "foods to avoid" category. They are the only other commonly eaten vegetable besides olives that are high in calories and fat. It's true that a half a medium size avocado contains approximately 150 calories with 88 percent of these calories coming from 15 grams of fat. Don't panic, more than two-thirds of the fat is monounsaturated, the same type of fat that is in olive oil, the "good" kind!

This strange fruit contains no less than 11 vitamins, 14 minerals and protein. Nutritionally the avocado is high in potassium, ounce for ounce containing 60 percent more potassium than bananas. Avocados are good sources of vitamin A and thiamine and fair sources of vitamin C and E, niacin, iron, phosphorus and fiber. An avocado is about 75 percent water and easy to digest. They are nutrient rich, low in sodium and sugar and cholesterol-free (all fruits are anyhow) but this does not mean you should eat a whole avocado daily. What it does mean is that you can enjoy them frequently without guilt.

This strange exotic fruit is a native of Central America but now grown in California and Florida. California's crop peaks during spring and summer while Florida's is from August through October; but they are available year round. The two varieties available here have a smooth green skin or a thick, leathery, pebbly skin that turns dark green to a purple black as it ripens.

Like the banana, the avocado is never allowed to mature on the tree, generally you buy them under-ripe and ripen them yourself. Plan your purchase ahead so there is time for them to ripen for several days. You can hasten the ripening process by putting them in a paper bag.

Choose avocados that are heavy, without dark, sunken or bruised spots. Take the avocado in your hand and just apply gentle pres-

It's deepest, darkest mid-winter in Michigan. It's cold, it's snowing, the car has a dead battery, and you just won't make it through the night unless you can wolf down a Plata Azul Especial from El Nibble Nook.

Who ya gonna call? Well, if you live in Novi (east of Novi Road) you can call Door 2 Door, the restaurant delivery service.

Maybe you'd like some pastries from Sweet Lorraines, or Thai food from the Bangkok Club or the ribs from E.G. Nick's. Whatever the case, you can order from Door 2 Door just by calling the number 288-FOOD.

The minute you place your order, your dinner is being cooked at the restaurant of your choice, ready to be picked up by Door 2 Door's uniformed driver and whisked to your home or office.

It's one of those ideas that somebody should have thought up ages ago. For Door 2 Door founder Kirk Scott, the idea for Door 2 Door started with a phone call in 1987, said Scott.

"I called a friend of mine out in California," he said. "He was a chef in L.A. and was affiliated with a similar service. But it was all done by phone and hand-written orders, with the drivers coming in the back door. He said it would be great if you could computerize it.

"So I took my background in computers, and being in Domino's backyard, I knew the power of deliveries. I founded Door 2 Door in 1988, and started delivering in 1989. It took me a year to write the software program." Scott's partner is Norman Blemaster, a former con-

sultant for Arthur Andersen with 25 years in the franchising business.

Blemaster points out that computerization gives

sure, if the fruit yields slightly, it is ready to eat that day. At home you can use a toothpick to test for ripeness. Poke the toothpick in the stem end and if it's eating ripe the tooth pick will glide to the core. The full distinctive flavor of an avocado does not develop until the fruit has softened.

Ripe avocados can be stored in the bottom of the refrigerator for several days. Take a sharp knife to slice around the outside length of the avocado, holding it with both hands, twist in opposite directions for a clean split. Remove the pit with a small rap of a knife blade against the pit and pull it out gently. Once cut in half, place the fruit face down in the paim of your hand and remove skin. The flesh will discolor rapidly when exposed to the air so sprinkle with citrus juice (lemon or lime) to prevent browning.

Whole, diced or sliced avocados do not freeze well, but can be refrigerated a short time. To store partially used avocados, rub the cut surface with lemon juice and cover tightly with plastic wrap or foil to prevent moisture loss, then refrigerate.

The real appeal of the avocado is its meliow. nutty taste and smooth texture. Culinary enthusiasts enjoy creating and using avocado recipes any time of year. Avocados are generally eaten raw but can be added to hot dishes at the very end of cooking. Overcooking will make an avocado bitter.

With the popularity of Mexican food avocados have come alive. guacamole can be used as a dip or a garnish. Mashed seasoned avocado (guacamole) is great on the top of hamburgers, tacos, burritos, and tostados. To make a quick version of guacamole use prepared canned salsa with the avocado, put it in the blender or

work in volume, the servic now offers food from 100 restaurants and covers a 250-square-mile delivery area. Try doing that with hand-written notes and operators phoning in orders.

The computer eliminates the human element from the process. Here's how it works. When a call comes in to the 288-FOOD number, an operator is there to take the order. The operator works from a computer screen which displays the menu from the restaurant of your choice.

You get to see the menu, too. Door 2 Door distributes a quarterly Menu Guide free at each of the restaurants it serves. The Guide lists the menus of each of the 100 restaurants the company serves.

The operator then types in your order, calculates a price which includes the delivery charge and gives you an estimated time of arrival. The operator's computer has a direct modem line into each restaurant. By the time you hang up your phone, your order is already being printed out on a special fax machine in the restaurant's kitchen.

When I first started this business, my goal was to deliver every order within 45 minutes," said Scott, adding that the majority of his orders take 45 minutes to an hour. "Now we've grown so much that we can't always do that. If it's rush hour, it'll be different. And if there's five inches of snow on the ground, we won't try to kid them. We'll tell them two hours right off the bat.

"The funny thing is, people don't seem to mind. I'll lose only about 10 out of 200 orders that way. Most people will wait two hours for a good meal rather than go out in the snow. I think people know that they're not just calling Domino's, to whip out a pizza and fly one mile to deliver it."

Door 2 Door's delivery system works very similar to a radio-dispatched taxi service. Drivers are sent to certain segments of the company's delivery area, and will wait for a call on the two-way radio. Between runs, the driver will wait in his car in that area, like a taxi at a cab stand. Each car also has an on-board thremal carrier to keep orders warm.

The minimum delivery charge is \$2, plus 75 cents per mile from the restaurant to your door. The average delivery charge is about \$3.50 because, as Scott says, people tend to dine within their own communities, and will

order mainly from restaurants they're familiar with. But there is no limit on how far a driver will travel within Door 2 Door's service area. If a customer in Novi wants to order from Mon Jin Lau in Troy, they're more than welcome to, though the delivery charge may run around \$10.

The delivery charge remains the same no matter how large your order. There's no minimum order either, which makes Door 2 Door popular with singles.


You can order \$1,000 worth of food, and it's still a \$2 delivery charge. It's like instant catering," said Scott.

"The difference is that caterers cater from their kitchens, and they're an unknown. With us, you have 100 kitchens working for you. A hundred well-known kitchens.

"And it's a lot less expensive," Blemaster added. "And a lot of people don't know that if you eat your lunch in the office, you can write off 100 percent on your taxes. If you eat out, you can't."

Combination methods are most often used for foods considered flavorful, but only after long cooking times. The first step in most cooking of this type is to sear the main item. This would not be the case in, say, chicken pot pie. Searing functions as a sealer for the meat's juices. As the protein touches the hot pan the surface is seared or closed, preventing any of the wonderful juices with all the flavor from escaping. When scaring, always have a very hot pan and use a little bit of fat. Be careful of the splattering of fat that will pop out at

When braising, the item is then cooked in a liquid medium. Braising is used for the cuts of more exercised portions of an

It seems that often referred to as "peasant" dishes and animal or older, mature birds and fish. The main benefit is that the less tender cuts become tender as the liquid penetrates the tough connective tissues. A relatively small amount of liquid is needed in relation to the size of the main item. Stocks, vegetable juices and wine are examples of good braising liquids. Mixing and matching is permissable.

A bed of vegetables, called a mirepoix, is placed on the bottom of the pan first. This provides additional flavor and moisture to the product. Although braising has been a traditional cooking method for tough cuts, chefs today are using braising on delicate seafood and fish. It is important, in this case, to reduce the oven temperature, cook for a shorter period of time and decrease the amount of liquid.

Braising is a nice low-calorie cooking

technique. The steps to follow are: • Sear the meat, remove from the pot and sweat a mirepoix of carrots, onion and celery at least. Add others as you see fit, add the cooking liquid, cover the pot and place it in a moderate oven until tender. The konger the item will need to cooked the larger the cut of the vegetable should be. Tomatoes are often included in braises as they act as natrual tenderizer.

• Add other vegetables to cook with the meat as it nears readiness.

• Save the liquid. Strain and thicken with arrowroot or cornstarch in a cold liquid or as a healthful alternative.

• Puree the mirepoix and return to the liquid.

Stewing is similar to braising and uses the same cuts of meat, but cut into bite size pieces. The technique is nearly identical also, with differences mainly apparent with the origin of the stew. For instance, a blanquette is a white stew made from white meat, veal or chicken, and is garnished with mushrooms and pearl onions. The sauce is thickened with egg yolks and heavy cream.

Bouillabaisse is a Mediterranean style fish stew. Fricassee is a white stew often boasting dumplings and goulash is a hungarian stew seasoned and colored with paprika. Ragout, a French term for stew, literally translates as "restores the appetite."

Writing this article has gotten my tastebuds going. Gotta go. Stay warm.
