

Lakeshore accident suit nears settlement

An out-of-court settlement appears to be near in the lawsuit filed by the parents of Brett Schneider, the child injured by a fallen electrical wire in Lakeshore Park.

Parties in the suit are the City of Novi, Detroit Edison and four Novi employees. "The case is being resolved. It will not go to trial. There has not been any settlement

put in the record yet. We're hoping it's very soon, within the next two weeks," Mary Pat Rosen, an attorney for the parents, Francis and Pamela Schneider, said May 6. In July 1991, Brett, then 6 years old, suffered burns over 50 percent of his body when he somehow came into contact with a downed 13,200-volt electrical wire at the park. The line was one of many felled throughout metro Detroit in what was later called the thunderstorm of the century.

Altorneys for Novi's insurance carrier, Municipal Risk Management Authority, are conducting the defense. Back in 1991, city attorney David Fried said Novi hoped to settle the case out of court but that the Schneiders' lawyers would not agree to it. The parents entered into the lawsuit in

November 1991 seeking over \$10,000 in damages for medical expenses and for the lifelong physical, mental and emotional injuries to Brett, as well as for their own mental anguish. A jury trial was requested.

The little boy hovered in critical condition for several days and underwent an extensive series of painful skin grafts before starting first grade that fall.

The suit charges that Novi endangered the public safety by opening Lakeshore Park when the wire was arcing and sparking, that Detroit Edison was negligent in maintaining the line, that it did not respond to the city's call for service and that it failed to advise the city on means to protect citizens from the line.

Parks and Recreation Director Dan Da-

vis and parks supervisor Jack Lewis were individually named in the lawsuit, as were Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan and firefighter Capt. Dennis Tarrant.

The Schneiders' lawyers contend that Lenaghan and Tarrant were negligent in not guarding the downed wire, one of several in the city. The fire department had ordered the park closed and the gate locked but did not place personnel at the scene.

Furthermore, the lawsuit charges that Davis and Lewis were negligent in allowing the daycampers to arrive that day without advising their parents that the line was down. Yellow caution tape was placed by

city staff around the wire.

It was not known precisely how the child, a recent kindergarten graduate, came into contact with the wire but his doctors said Brett probably did not pick it up.

Since the July 1991 storm and following an agreement reached with the Michigan Public Service Commission, Detroit Edison launched a three-year, \$236 million program to upgrade services.

Tree trimming to clear lines is scheduled to continue in Novi this month and in June. Fallen tree limbs are described by Edison as a major source of downed lines and power outages. The utility says it is spending \$101 million on line clearance alone.

Stores caught by decoy sting

Novi police issued liquor violations to both Novi Perty Drug Store locations April 30 in a sting operation using a 17-year-old decoy.

Police say that clerks at both the Ten Mile and West Oaks Perry locations sold beer to the decoy without checking her ID or asking for any verification of her age.

It was the fourth in a series of such operations, which began last year after a letter of warning was issued to all liquor license holders in the city.

Also busted in the April 30 sting was the Castle Wine Shoppe, located on Beck Road.

Calls to the Perry locations were referred to the company's headquarters, where calls on Friday were not returned by presstime. The owner of Castle Wine Shoppe could not be reached for comment. According to Novi police reports, the clerk in

the Ten Mile Perry location was in training at the time of the incident. Novi Police Officer Paul VanPelt and Sgt. Tim McNamara, who were working undercover, said the decoy was in that store shortly before 11:30

p.m. They watched as the decoy approached the counter to purchase a 40-ounce bottle of beer and the trainee asked her for ID.

However, the clerk who was training her then reportedly told her that she knew the decoy was old enough and told her to sell her the beer. After the decoy left the store, VanPelt and

McNamara left with her, then returned and ticketed both of the clerks. The Ten Mile Perry location was the third bust

of that evening. The West Oaks location was cited

at 9:30 p.m. and the Castle Wine Shoppe at 8:15 p.m.

The liquor law enforcement decoy practice uses underage volunteers who attempt to purchase liquor in party stores or bars within the city limits. Undercover officers watch as the licenseholders either pass the test by refusing to sell to the minors, or fail by selling alcohol without checking identification.

The waiters, bartenders or clerks who sell to the decoys receive misdemeanor citations that require a court appearance, and the owner of the establishment is reported to the state Liquor Control Commission (LCC). The LCC investigates the police report and, unless the violation is successfully appealed, places it on record and may issue a fine to the owner.

Too many such incidents will lead to revocation of the location's liquor license.

building may be painted in these shades, according to center president Blair Bowman.

Bowman told the Novi City Council recently that the goal is to have the facility's huge, potholed and muddy parking lot paved by September, with construction to begin in July.

Meanwhile, Novi officials are hoping a series of grants will bring in big bucks to ease the traffic crunch along Novi Road from Twelve Mile Road to Grand River Avenue. While the Expo Center has helped make an already bad situation worse, its presence has also brought in \$500,000 worth of state road grants to date.

On May 3, the council granted a revised preliminary site plan approval to the 300,000 square foot building. Almost 2,000 parking spaces will be in place, largely eliminating the need to park off-site, Bowman said.

The following day, the center won a series of variances from the Zoning Board of Appeals, city planning consultant Brandon Rogers said. This waives a greenbelt requirement along the freeway, allowing the business to gain another 180 spaces on its own land for parking. In exchange, the Expo Center will landscape a quarter-mile section of the Michigan Department of Transportation right-of-way along 1-96.

A final site plan is expected to be submitted this week, Rogers added.

said, adding that it can take 20 minutes to drive along Novi Road from Twelve Mile to Grand River.

A traffic study shows that traffic there moves at an average of 16 miles per hour. A 24-hour count found that 62,000 vehicles traverse the less than one-mile stretch which passes four shopping centers and a freeway interchange.


Major Expo shows such as Autorama are expected to bring in an additional 500 cars during peak weekday hours and 812 during peak weekend hours. Smaller shows are expected to swell the weekday traffic by 180 vehicles.

Novi has submitted to the federal government via the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) a \$483,000 grant application to help finance a \$600,000 computer-based traffic control system along Novi Road. This would integrate the traffic signals as a unit, city traffic consultant Rod Arroyo said.

In Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County is seeking \$398,000 in funding from the federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program to ease traffic and the pollution it generates in five communities. One of the targeted spots is the Twelve Mile Road/I-96/Novi Road area.

This program would encourage carpooling and shuttling, staggered work shifts and possible auto use restrictions.

Senate bill to cost Novi schools

Gov. John Engler's promise that local school districts wouldn't lose money if Proposal A passes June 2 may have a \$10 million leak.

The state Senate Thursday stripped out \$1 million of aid to Walled Lake School District and \$411,000 to Novi.

The money had previously been included as part of a \$1.1 billion school and bill that would base 1994 state aid on current-year spending.

whittle away at things people think are in Proposal A," warned Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, as the Senate removed his previously approved amendment to the bill, an amendment which pledged money for about 20 districts statewide.

This makes it more difficult to pass Proposal A." agreed Sen. Jim Berryman, D-Adrian. "Our credibility is at stake."

In the House, the battle was briefer, but the outcome was the same. Rep. Willis Bullard, R-Milford, introduced the Bouchard "Take this money off, and you amendment and saw it go down in

an uncounted blaze of red (no) lights. Bullard's district includes the Novi school district and portions of the Walled Lake school districts.

Proposal A is the elaborate constitutional amendment that would give a cut in school operating taxes, take 2 cents more in sales taxes and guarantee every district \$4,800 per pupil. Says Engler's campaign literature: "Every school district will receive a 3 percent increase."

"No, they're not," said Berryman. "If we keep rapping people on the knuckles, I'm going to pull off (supporting Proposal A)," said Bouchard. The Senate rejected Bouchard's

amendment on a 21-14 vote. Voting yes were Jack Faxon, D-

Farmington Hills, whose district includes Novi, and David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.

Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, voted no.

"I wouldn't lose a whole lot of sleep over these districts," said Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, an advocate of pulling funds away from

Lawsuit threatened; lot sizing plan is given nod

With a lawsuit from Haverhill Farm developers hanging over members' collective and individual heads,

the proposed subdivision on Fourteen Mile Road.

Questions raised by Council Member Robert Schmid led to the delay in action on the resubmitted request. seeking over \$1 million in damages

"This suit has caused the city literally hundreds of dollars, probably thousands of dollars, which is distressing in itself," Schmid said.

"This is probably one of the most congested subdivisions l've ever seen. There's almost no back yards We're creating here I think a disaster in an area that was supposed to be R-A (one acre lots)."

Havarm Limited Partnership, which includes developer Michael Horowitz and landowner Harry Klentner, filed the lawsuit against the city and each council member after they denied in January a request for

In 1992, the city council agreed to down-zone the residentialagricultral zoned land, which calls for one acre lots, to the smaller lot R-2 classification.

The developers then asked for the adjusted lot size option, which permits smaller lots if a substantial amount of wetlands and woodlands can be preserved and if these lands could not be saved with a conventional plat.

The lawsuit asks the court to permit the building of 121 homes on the land on the south side of Fourteen Mile between Haggerty and Decker roads.

A new proposal submitted by Havarm Limited asks the city to okay 117 homes on the 91 acres. Under its current R-2 zoning, the developers

contend, only 88 houses could be built,

But Schmid suggested that the conventional plat submitted by Havarm shows excessively large lots and that a different version of a conventional plat would save as much of the protected woodlands and wetlands as the adjusted lot size option. The option is allowed when it would preserve more sensitive lands than the conventional alternative.

The minimum lot size in R-2 is 18,000 square feet. Havarm's conventional plan shows yards as large as 32,000 square feet, Schmid said. The majority of lots in the Havarm adjusted lot size subdivision would range from 12,000 square feet to

15,000 square feet. The new plan brought in by Havarm increases the amount of woodments of lot averaging. I submit there would be very little savings of woodlands saved from four acres to 12.6 acres. All together, 45 acres of sensilands and wetlands had they not made these enormous lots - and tive land would be preserved. they did that on purpose, I would

A conventional plan shown by the developers would only save 33 acres of the woodlands and wetlands. The adjusted lot size is allowed if more than 35 percent of these lands are kept intact.

"If they did a conventional R-2 it would save all kinds of woodlands and wetlands. They made them (the lots) large so it appears there's no savings," Schmid contended.

They have to build conventional unless they can meet the require-



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

Consider trips to wine regions home, abroad

If recent inquiries from readers are any indication, there are a significant number of you planning travels to wine regions over the next several months. Undoubtedly, traveling to northern California, the domestic wine mecca, is easier to arrange than scheduling an equally great experience in a foreign country.



You'll flip for flapjacks

Breakfast faves take on thin dimensions

What could be more symbolic of a lazy Sunday brunch than a tall stack of flapjacks topped with a big pat of butter and drenched in maple syrup? Or maybe, for the more health-conscious diner, an catbran version with bananas and chopped walnuts.

We may think of hotcakes as a quintessentially American treat, but almost every culture has its own version. Just about every tourist who has visited Paris has breakfasted on crepes from a sidewalk vendor. [I like mine with chocolate]. And think of the paper-thin crepe-like pancakes wrapped around a savory moo shoo filling in Chinese cuisine.

Everyone loves the Russian-style blintzes and blinis, and, of course, the Swedish dine on their own diminutive version of the pancake — made in a special cast-iron pan. The Dutch have a dense oven-baked

version, and the Danes like theirs thin and light.

In Olney, England, there's even an annual pancake-flipping race that dates back to 1445. According to legend, a housewife was making pancakes and heard the church bell ringing, so she rushed to church - with skillet in hand. (The residents of Liberal, Kan., have adopted a similar ritual.)

To this day, the English celebrate Shrove Tuesday every February with a meal of pancakes.

"It's a cleaning-out-the-cupboards-forspring thing," says one Englishman. "We call them pancakes, but they're really more like crepes."

Pancakes are a spring thing on this side of the Atlantic, too. A perfect meal for a leisurely breakfast, associated with special treats for Mother's Day and Father's Day, or any morning you want to celebrate having nothing more to do than make a hearty treat.

True johnnycake devotees would say, however, that pancakes are just right for any meal.

Following are some creative pancake and crepe recipes from the California Culinary Academy's Breakfasts & Brunches book.

As the editors point out, most of us turn to a store-bought pancake mix to make our flapjacks, which is too bad. Pancake batter actually is very easy to make; you even can keep the dry ingredients mixed to have on hand to speed up the process.

Start by using the right utensils. Invest in a quality pancake griddle and season it with oil, as you would an omelet pan.

If crepes, Swedish pancakes or blinis will be a regular part of your breakfast repertoire, consider investing in special pans for those, as well. Crepe pans, for example, may look like omelet pans, but they have a flat, well-defined bottom and flaring sides instead of the gentle curves of an omelet pan.

A Swedish pancake pan is a cast-iron griddle with seven 3-inch round wells. With this pan, as with a crepe pan or griddle, don't wash after using. Instead, simply wipe the pan clean with a paper towel and a little oil.

The key to cooking really good flapjacks is not using too high a temperature. Cook them over a medium heat; the griddle is ready when a few drops of water dance across the griddle.


Crepes take a little more skill, but they're not hard to master. Breakfasts & Brunches offers these tips for making the perfect crepe.

 Tilt and swirl the hot crepe pan as you add the batter. Use just enough to cover the bottom with a thin layer of batter. • Turn the crepes when the surface looks dry and the underside is golden brown. Use a small spatula to loosen the crepe, and turn them with your fingers or

Visit from wine expert earns Sterling review

strategies, and the tasting and identification of varietal wines. Although fast and intense, it was very, very informative for myself, our night bartender Karen Hyland, bartenderwaitress Kristi Hurst and waitresses Pauline Bennie, Noreen Poltorak and Kim Hamiel.

It all started about three months ago

Yesterday six with a fiver touting the school. These things come in every day and many find their way to junk mail heaven instantaneously. However, this one seemed different. For starts, Evan Goldstien, the program's director has a list of credentials that don't stop.

> Most impressive, to me, was his affiliation with Square One, a cutting edge restaurant in San Francisco. Joyce Goldstien, his mother, is recognized as one of the most powerful forces behind today's progressive cuisine. She is highly respected in our profession and an incredible role model for women. Her dedication, intelligence, and success in a male-dominated business are a great prototype for aspiring and established cheis, throughout the country.

Evan is no slouch. He is the youngest person ever to pass the English-based Master Sommelier examination, one of only 20 in the U.S. and 40 in the world. He has studied cooking in Paris and in the U.S. and his wine lists win awards year after year.

It was hard to pass up the opportunity to spend a day learning from him. To give you an example of how much he is thought of in Detroit, consider the other restaurants that participated: The Golden Mushroom, Pike Street, Tapawingo, and R.I.K.'s. These are the people that keep things hopping in Michigan, with their food and wine. Talk about a great day . . .

We met at Brady's at 7:30 a.m., which is early, early, early for those of us that don't hit the pillow until one or two. Kristi, by far the youngest of the group, was positive that she'd have to sleep on the way. We wouldn't let her get away with it.

Promptly at 8:30 the first session began. Evan soon proved that this was not going to be a "sleeper" seminar. His enthusiasm, energy and friendly personality set those long pulls are worthless. the stage. He was able to keep 35 topnotch restaurateurs going for eight hours and beg for more.

The amount of knowledge imparted was incredible. For instance, the proper way to taste wine. I've always swirled the glass, took a huge sniff, a slurp and declared the wine fruity, intense, sweet, dry or whatever...most of the information I so called gathered meant nothing. Evan has changed that for me. For us.

Now when I taste a wine I will look at it's brightness and clarity first, then swirl and watch the speed at which the wine left on the sides of the glass returns to the bowl. This is referred to as the "legs." The faster the wine runs, the sweeter; and the sweeter it is, usually the higher in alcohol content.

Then another swirl to take a few quick sniffs. The nose fatigues in 5-6 seconds, so

At this point, it should be possible to determine different aromas. Blackberry, iam, licorice, mint, earth, mushrooms and sausage are just a handful of the smells of the wines we sampled.

By this time, after practice, it is very possible to determine the type of wine and its origin. And then the taste. Is it sweet, acid or bitter? How do you perceive the alcohol? Does it burn? Is it heavy, or does it burn the throat? The final test, and the only one that counts, do you like the wine?

Well, we liked the wine. We loved the class. We'll do our own little seminat and tasting for those that didn't go with us. We have made a commitment to continue our wine education. Although it can't be done overnight, "patience is a virtue," especially with wine.
