Planners act to allow for B & B inns

Bed and breakfast inns in Novi? The vision is a step closer to reality.

The Novi Planning Commission at its June 2 meeting got behind a proposed amendment to city ordinance that would allow historically significant homes to become "B & Bs." The Novi City Council, which reviewed an earlier draft of the amendment in March and requested changes, will next examine

Even if it's approved, however, there won't be a stampede of homeowners seeking to get the OK for a bed and breakfast establishment. Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers said that Novi doesn't have a lot of "estate homes" which would qualify for the ordinance -only about a dozen. Rogers recommended that the ordinance be adopted.

Commissioners voted 6-1 (Chairperson Kathleen McLallen was absent) to send the council a fa-

vorable recommendation on the proposed ordinance.

The bed and breakfast issue is one that the city has kicked around for over four years. Backers intend it to allow historic homes' preservation, and to give those who live in them the chance to be able to afford to stay there. Two members of the Novi Historical Society asked the commission to support the ordinance for those reasons. Rogers

"It can provide an income for people who would otherwise not be able to keep their homes," he said.

Commissioners said they also favored the plan because it would add a variety to Novi. They wanted to make sure, however, that the language was stringent enough to prevent abuses and allow something that wasn't intended to slip through a loophole.

They approved of the ordinance's language that limited tenants' stay

Lions celebrate 20 years of service

"Wherever the earth crumbles and the rivers swell and the skies pour, the Lions roar." With that comment, Toastmaster Bill Barr be-

gan the celebrations at the Novi Lions Club's

20th anniversary installation banquet Wednesday night in the Novi Expo Center. Since 1925, when Helen Keller challenged the

Lions to be "knights of the blind," the Lions have devoted much of their energy toward serving the needs of people around the world. And the Novi Lions Club, which organized in 1973, marked 20 years of such service last week.

"It takes four things to be a Lion," said Barr, who is one of the charter members and currently serves as District 11A-2 Governor. "It takes desire, commitment, time, and a little bit of

But mainly, it takes the kind of person ready to give of himself. The club's motto, "We Serve,"

One of the Lions International directors, Larry Young of Detroit, attended the Wednesday night... festivities. He offered his perspectives on the club's work after returning from a recent Lionsrelated trip to India.

"I have something in common with the charter members here because for 20 years you have been helping and serving," he said. That's how long he's been a Lion.

"As a result of members like you, unknown people of India - 10,000 who are blind simply for the lack of cataract surgery — are able to see because we provided the medical service and people they needed," he told the crowd, which included the Novi Lions as well as the Farmington Area Lions, the Wixom-Walled Lake Lion and Lioness clubs, and representatives from several other Detroit-area Lions clubs.

"It's hard to even compare what we call poor

seems to be taken very seriously by its members. people in our country to those in India." Young told the crowd that, during his time in Calcutta. he saw children along the road "picking like chickens, looking for a particle of food. If they found a tiny particle of grass, they would pick it up and eat it."

He also saw women washing clothes in filthy water with no shoes; a complete lack of toilet facilities; and garbage trucks filled with dead

"Oh, we are so blessed," Young said. "We take for granted the United States of America. We are so lucky, so blessed to be a part of it."

Young said local Lions clubs, including Novi, are helping the Lions of India, which is "determined to make a difference.

"They are in the forefront of providing places just for people to die, so they don't have to die in

Leak is no danger but snarls traffic

An underground nitrogen gas leak on Twelve Mile near Haggerty Friday led to road closures and traffic snarls that were expected to continue into the night.

Novi Fire Chief Art Lenaghan said the leak, which was discovered around 10 a.m., started in the northwest corner of the Twelve Mile and Haggerty intersection.

The pavement had actually risen a foot and a half," Lenaghan said.

The nitrogen gas was coming from an underground cable conduit for Detroit Edison. The cables conduits are filled with nitrogen gas to keep moisture out.

There was a break (in the cable) and it was escaping into the ground. It raised the road surface the connector," he explained. Nitrogen gas is non-flammable,

but Lenaghan said the fire department's concerns centered around a petroleum fuel pipeline that also runs through the area. "That's under a lot of pressure


and our concern was that any time there is enough impact to cause that much disturbance in the ground, it could cause problems with that pipeline."

Novi firefighters stood by while the petroleum pipeline was shut down, and traffic was diverted from

Lenaghan said Detroit Edison was in the process of pulling up the westbound lane of Twelve Mile to reach the leaking pipe. Both Twelve Mile and Haggerty remained closed at presstime, and he estimated they would remain closed for at least 24

Convicted burglar accuses a state police officer of roughing him up after arrest



Chad Garrison, 20 and Keith Sousa, 22, of Detroit, rob a house in Canton Township near Sheldon and Ford (M-153) Roads at 12:40 p.m. February 18. The robbery is witnessed by members of a Michigan State Police serveillance team, who take up pursuit when the two drive off.

Sousa realizes police are pursuing him and turns around in a gas station parking lot at Joy and Newburgh Roads.

The two fugitives drive north on 1-275, throwing stolen merchandise, including a video cassette recorder, out the windows as they drive.

When their car spins out of control on Novi Road just north of 12-1/2 mile road, Garrison runs east into the woods. Sousa is arrested at the scene. and alleges the arresting officer, Trooper Wayne McKaipain, slams his head into the payament saveral times after throwing him to the ground and placing him in hand cuffs.

Sousa is taken to the Michigan State Police post in Northville and placed in a holding cell, where he alleges Trooper McKalpain hits him several more times. Police ignore his subsequent requests for medical attention,

Sousa eventually is taken to the Canton Public Safety Department for further questioning. Following the questioning, he is taken by Canton Fire Department officials to Annapolis Hospital in Wayne for medical treatment.

Man alleges trooper beat him after chase

Keith Sousa admits that he's no

Sousa readily acknowledges that he led police on a high-speed chase up I-275 to Novi, following a burglary that he and partner Chad Garrison committed in Canton. He concedes that the act was foolish, and says he deserves to be punished by the judicial system.

But he objects to being beaten up by a police officer before receiving his sentence from the state.

Sousa, 22, alleges that a Michigan State Police officer slammed his head to the ground several times afterhis Feb. 18 arrest on Twelve Mile Road in Novi. The same officer entered his holding cell at the Northville state police post and hit him several more times, Sousa said.

During each incident, Sousa recalled, the trooper kept repeating the same phrase - "I should have shot your f---- a--.

The trooper, Kevin McKalpain, declined to comment on Sousa's allegations. An internal inquiry completed under the command of Post Commander Jack Moulik concluded that the allegations were untrue.

Post Commander David Werner says he agrees with that investigation's conclusion, but added that he has reopened the file to tie up some loose ends. While several witnesses at the arrest scene and the state police post already have been interviewed. Werner said he still wants to talk with two Canton rescue workers who transported Sousa to a nearby hospital that evening at

This investigation was all completed before I arrived here and it was handed to me, and I'm the one that's saying This is not a complete investigation yet. You haven't done some things that you should have done," Warner said. "I want to shore up those things that haven't been done before we can make a final conclusion . . .

But (judging from) the things that have been done, I'm convinced that there was no assault."

Sousa's arrest followed a highspeed chase from Canton through Westland, Plymouth, Livonia and Farmington Hills. The pursuit began shortly before 1 p.m. when Sousa and Garrison left the house they had just burglarized in Canton, their Ford EXP loaded with stolen electronic equipment and

Though they had no way of knowing it, their crime had just been witnessed by members of a Michigan State Police surveillance team. The two were suspects in a string of vehicle, and other thefts throughout metro Detroit, and had been under surveillance for several

Sousa, who drove from the scene in Canton, said he realized they were being followed by Canton patrol cars while at a gas station at Joy and Newburgh. They fled, driving south on Newburgh to Ford Road, and west onto I-275, where they tossed stolen items onto the highway as they headed north. Sousa remembers Trooper McKaipain taking up pursuit at Seven Mile

Voters are avoided in uncontested race

Here we are at the point of the annual school elections, taking place today until 8 p.m., and The Novi News finds itself unable to endorse candidates for the Novi Board of Education . . . not because the two unopposed incumbents are not qualified for the two seats being decided, but because they declined to participate in our regular campaign

We won't endorse any candidate who won't explain for us what his or her positions are on the issues.

Granted, it hardly matters. John Streit and Craig Foreback, running unopposed to retain their seats, will be returned to office. And they will serve relatively well, as they have in the past. For the most part, they have done a good job, although we have had our criticism's of their performance, just as we have had criticisms of the board as a whole.


We should also mention that the reason Foreback and Streit declined our interviews is that this newspaper has ofissues like the early signing of employee contracts and the lack, until recently, of been critical but not unfair.

Still, the board is upset about those criticisms and has recently threatened to pull legal advertising from this newspaper. Likewise, Foreback and Streit. who had agreed to interviews, cancelled their appointments. We held off our editorial opinion about this race until today on the off chance the pair might change their minds. And several invitations to the candidates were made.

The shame of it is that voters won't get a chance to hear their views or to hold the candidates to the same standards they would if the two seats were being contested. While they have complaints against the newspaper, they do not seem to have explained their positions to voters in any other forums either. We are unaware of any candidate forums in which Foreback or Streit have participated that would give voters a chance to ask them about their views . . . and they have been asked.

Sauternes star gets challenge from neighbor

In Bordeaux, fabled for the great red wines of the Medoc, St. Emilion and Pomerol, there is a small southern region called Sauternes, renowned for its prestigious white dessert wines.

Here, Chateau Yquem rules as queen of Sauternes, but its high price tag (\$150) makes it a truly special-occasion wine.

At the foot of Yquem's domain are the contiguous vineyards of Chateau Raymond-Lafon, making exquisite wines rivaling those of the queen in many vintages, but at one-fifth the price (\$30).

The Meslier family, current proprietors of Raymond-Lason, reside in the property's modest chateau. They are pleased to have succeeded in re-establishing the reputation of Raymond-Lason, a property that had fallen into neglect prior to their purchase in 1972.

Imagine a white wine that ages longer than any red wine in the world; a wine with the richness to complement foie gras d'oie (goose liver pate), the intensity to stand up to Roquefort and the viscosity to completely coat the palate.

Contemplate a wine with intense honey aromas and peach flavors made from botrytisinfected, shriveled grapes picked berry by individual berry. That's the luxurious taste experience of Chateau Raymond-Lafon Sauternes.

What dessert lives up to that? None, just serve it well chilled as an exquisite finale to any meal.

In 1963, Pierre Meslier became director at Chateau Youem where he managed the vineyards and winemaking of both Yquem and Chateau de Fargues until 1989.

"At Yquem, I learned the importance of demanding the very best," Meslier said. "In Sauternes, we grow grapes under extremely difflcult conditions. I guess it is the struggle with nature that makes our wines so delicious."

While managing Yquem, Meslier became acquainted with other properties in Sauternes. and when the opportunity presented itself in 1972, he purchased the neighboring property of Raymond-Lafon.


Meslier continued managing Yquem while his wife Francine directed the operations at Raymond-Lafon. Together, the Mesliers have reacquired the original vineyards of the Chateau, raised the quality to that of a great growth, and in 1990, gave this treasure to their

Today, with the elder Mesliers continuing as consultants, Jean-Pierre, Charles-Henri and Marie-Francoise have assumed the roles of international marketer, winemaker and manager,

respectively. The quality of Raymond-Lafon Sauternes is a result of impeccably high winemaking standards and strict grape selection employed in the vineyard.

"Our vines must struggle against the odds to make a great wine," said Meslier. "Our soil is chalk and clay with gravel, not very hospitable to most crops, but poor soil is best for grapes.

Fun Fare, Italian Style New menu at Hilton bears chef's mark

Unusual things happen in a restaurant when Chef L. Dean George is around. George is the executive chef at the Novi

Hilton who has overseen the transformation of the Hilton's main dining room into the new DaVinci's Market, a new Italian restaurant that would make Michelangelo drop his paintbrush.

Whether he's showing up to work in white clogs or Birkenstocks (foresaking the traditional black work shoes), serving up an insalata pomodora as an hors d'oeuvre, or being tossed into a rack of candy, there's never a dull moment when Chef George is around.

George came to the Hilton late last year with an impressive pedigree. Educated at the Cincinnati branch of the Culinary Institute of America, Chef George became the youngest and first American Chef de Cuisine at the Gourmet Room of the Terrace Hilton, a 42-year-old highly ac-

claimed French restaurant. The emphasis is on traditional French cuisine at the Gourmet Room. It's a Mobil four-star restaurant, a rare distinction, and one of three in the Hilton chain.

"Meals are served on Lennox china. and the silver dates from the 1940s," said

He also prepared dinner for President Bill Clinton last March at The Gridiron Club in Washington, as one of two chefs

chosen for the honor. It's also a far cry from his former employment as restaurant manager at a small-town family style joint.

"I was a restaurant manager for a lot of years, and I decided I wanted to cook." he said. "I had an epiphany one day as I was being thrown into a Pennsylvania Dutch candy tree by a bunch of bikers."

At the Hilton, the atmosphere is a little more sedate, but everyone's supposed to have fun.

Take thefinsalata pomodora for example. Where most places put bread and butter on the table, DaVinci's gives you bread and a bowl of roma and sun-dried tomatoes with chopped fresh basil. Smear the bread through a dash of olive oil, then add some tomatoes. It takes the edge off nicely until dinner arrives.

A house chianti is served in a pitcher at your table. Drink as many glasses as you'd like, but not so many that you lose count. Payment for wine is on the honor system. You just tell the server at the end

of the meal how many glasses you had, and he or she will charge you a dollar

A dollar a glass for chianti is a bargain, and this is good chianti. That's typical of the new Hilton attitude at DaVinci's, though.

Since the hotel sees a lot of solo business travelers, there's an emphasis on value. No entree on the menu costs more than \$13.95 (a fabulous filet mignon with horsradish whipped potatoes). Careful research went into the choice of Italian cui-

sine for the Hilton. There's a renewed interest in Italian food with the focus on simplicity and freshness allowing the tastes and aromas to be enjoyed without heavy sauces or

over-preparation," said George. Said food and beverage manager Mark Blakely, The Novi Hilton is trying to break that stoic image. It's not your typical hotel restaurant. And this restaurant is being used as a testbed for other Hiltons. If it

works, others will pick it up." What they won't be able to pick up, though, is Chef George's attitude toward work in the kitchen. He arrives at 8:30 most mornings and stays until 6:30 or 7

in the evening. To the people who work for him, he characterizes himself as a "counselor and leader." He knows how to have fun in the kitchen and still get the Job done without slipping into the stereotypical role of the tyrannical chef.

"I've worked for plenty of those, and I'm not like that," George said.

He's also happy to share his knowledge with customers. Recently he received a call from a customer who had eaten at Da-Vinci's and wanted help in creating the same sauce in her kitchen. George was happy to provide her with ingredients and instructions.

"I don't believe in keeping secrets in my kitchen," said George. "My goal is to provide the diner with a good meal, and if that means they want to try duplicating it at home. I consider that a compliment on a job well done."

In that spirit, here is one of Chef George's signature dishes from the new DaVinci's menu.

"It is a challenge to teach that mix," she says. "I believe it is important to take each student just where they are and move them forward. To challange them to their best. To build a sense of ownership and pride in their own educational achievement.

"Whatever it takes to do that is the challenge of every teacher. I'm committed to that!"
