### Novi sees increase in its K-12 population

The number of students attending Novi schools just keeps right on climbing - for the ninth year in a row, if the figures from a recent head count hold up.

Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources John Swallow presented a report on district enrollment to the Board of Education at its Sept. 23 meeting. The report includes an informal student count from Sept. 17. Those numbers should closely reflect the official fourth Friday count which took place three days ago (after press

The Sept. 17 figures show a net district increase of 200 students over last year, with a majority of them in grades K-4. If the numbers hold up, the district will increase in population for the ninth straight

More is at stake in the enrollment figures than simple curiosity. The figures affect state school aid money and district long-term planning.


Fourth Friday counts are the basis by which Michigan public school districts receive aid from the state. The more students in class for the count on the fourth Friday of the school year, the more money a district gets from Lansing.

Lansings \$6.5 billion property tax wipeout this July — taking with it the primary source of school operating money — could make the counts even more important next

Many legislators favor a replacement plan which increases state taxes to provide "base grants" to students and which allows districts to raise additional funds with locally-voted taxes.

Under the plan, the state would allocate a set base grant amount of money to each public school student in Michigan, sent to the district he or she attends. Districts could ask voters to approve local property or possibly income taxes on top of that.

# Candidates vie for endorsements "It's at kind of a low level right

Three of Novi's four mayoral candidates - Joe Toth, Kathy McLallen and Nancy Cassis - spent the summer rallying supporters, organizing their forces, drumming up money and polishing the prose in their campaign literature.

The fourth, write-in candidate Lee BeCole. is taking a more laid back approach until election

day, Nov. 2, gets closer.

"It's at kind of a low level right now, but I'm working," he said.

"It's my feeling a write-in candidate can't peak too early.

Low level but not stagnant. BeGole, a retired Novi police chief, drops in at the city clerk's office each day to learn who has taken out an absentee ballot. He then immediately sends a handwritten note to those voters, asking that they jot in his name in the mayor's slot. Sometimes, he'll call the absentee voter.

To date, he's spent \$30 on the campaign. Others are hustling a little more visibly.

Since Mayor Matthew Quinn beat Cassis in the 1987 race, no one has dared to take him on at the polls. After six years on the job—each term of office is two years - Quinn decided to step down.

Few were surprised when Cassis declared she was game for another try. She's been on the City Council for eight years and was the top votegetter in 1989.

In August, Cassis set up a door-to-door campaign schedule for each Friday, Saturday and

"It's a heavy schedule. It's one I feel is managable, but it's very important to go back to the people and touch base with them I'm not taking anything for granted in this race. I'm working very hard, she said.

She says she plans to spend about \$10,000 on her campaign and started out with a fundraiser in June, followed by one in July. In October, State Rep. Willis Bullard Jr., K-Milford, and State Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield,

will host a final fundraiser for Cassis at her husband's restaurant, Victor's.

McLallen stepped down from her volunteer position as chair of the Novi Planning Commission to run for mayor. She was the first to

"I realize I'm the person with the least name recognition. I'd like to tell people who I am. It's been a lot of personal phone calls and networking," she said.

McLallen was on the planning commission for eight years, the last as chair.

She said she expects to spend \$8,000 to \$10,000 to get her message across. She held a kickoff fundraiser at her home in the summer where she raised "a nice chunk of change" and is planning a get-together and a breakfast to add to the war chest.

McLallen is also planning to tramp from door to door.

Toth held his fundraiser at the Country

Epicure. He expects to spend about \$5,000 on the race. Like McLallen and Cassis, he said he plans to fo-

cus on the issues in his campaign. Unlike Cassis, Toth will not lose his place on the council if he doesn't win the mayor's seat. His term does not expire until 1995.

Toth was a planning commissioner when he was appointed to the council in 1986. He was elected to a four-year term in 1987 and in 1991.

BeGole says he plans to hold no fundraisers but will get anyone who wants to volunteer together this week to plan a strategy. This will likely include volunteers at the polls who will hand out stickers with his name on them which voters may place on the ballot.

But he won't turn down any funds that come his way, BeGole added.

"My campaign is more or less my record of service to the people of Novi," he explained.

BeGole was Novi's first police chief and held that job for 37 years until his retirement in 1991. He formally filed to run for mayor on June 22 but withdrew his name two days after the deadline when he learned that four candidates were running, triggering a September primary. Be-Gole said he wanted to spare the city the \$10,000 cost of a primary, but did not intend to stop

His unorthodox campaign has had some

repercussions. In August, when real estate broker Shirley Cash asked the mayoral candidates to appear on her public access cable televison show, Cash Taiks, Cassis and Toth declined when they learned BeGole was invited.

Cash then interviewed McLallen and BeGole. The show began airing on cable Channel 12 last

"My campaign committee and myself decided against that. We believed it should include just those individuals who had been approved by the county to be on the ballot. He was given a similar standing with those of us who have gone through the process," Cassis explained.

Toth said when he found out the program was only a half-hour long and included the fourth candidate, he bowed out.

"Chief BeGole is not a listed candidate. He claims he's a write-in candidate, but he's not a listed candidate on the ballot," Toth explained.

# Child safety is program's top intention

If things go well and people vol-unteer, Novi will soon have a community child watch program in

The program — officially titled Michigan Community ChildWatch - is a volunteer organization of parents who are screened and trained by the schools and police department to watch for suspicious neighborhood activity and provide safe homes for area children.

Novi Crime Prevention and DARE officer Todd Anger said the program is still in its early planning stages, but he has already discussed it with Novi Schools Superintendent Emmett Lippe and intends to speak with each Novi parent-teacher organization early next month.

"I really hope to get it into the community," Anger said. "It's going to be monumental because I want to do it citywide for all of the different elementary schools. But I

think it can be done." It's been done in many other communities across the state. ChildWatch and another program, MacGruff, are set up in hundreds of Michigan communities. Anger said Novi has been without any such program for "at least several years" and probably longer.

According to Walled Lake resident Char Patterson, who was largely responsible for bringing ChildWatch to that community, the program improves neighborhoods by bringing people together and making them more aware of the people in surroundings.

"It brings community awareness to a higher level," she said. Hickory Woods Elementary School, which is

a Walled Lake school located in the Novi school district, already has ChildWatch within its district.

"We brought it into Novi in that area of the elementary school in Walled Lake," she said. "Officer Anger will take it into the rest of the

In order to begin the ChildWatch program here, Anger said, the police department and school district sign a letter of intent stating that they are willing to participate and organize the program in Novi.

Anger said he hopes to work closely with the various Novi PTOs to gain community approval and enthusiasm for ChildWatch.

There are so many people who might have a concern," Anger said. "We need to get the approval of the people

ChildWatch volunteers are first screened for any criminal history that might send up a "red flag" that they might not be right for the program. If any volunteer were rejected for the program. Anger said, the department would simply send the person a letter thanking them for their interest but indicating that they have not been accepted for the

Those who successfully make it through the screening would then go through a training program and, upon successful completion, get a "Ŵatchful Eye" poster to put in the

window. Then, the police department would check the volunteers homes every year to make sure the poster is still in place. Volunteers would also be re-screened each year.

Anyone over the age of 17 who lives in the volunteer's home is also screened.

# Pay freeze or pay slurpee?

A case in point came up last week. Early in September, the Northville Board of Education ratified a new contract with its teachers' union. The contract called for the pay schedule to remain unchanged in 1993-94 and to increase 3 per-

cent in 1994-95, the second year of the pact. School officials, not to mention the teachers' union, I'm sure, were hoping for a headline that blared "Teachers accept pay freeze.

Most newspapers would have acceded. After all, if the contract doesn't move, it's a pay freeze, isn't it? Those would have been the words bandied about the school board's ratification meeting, and most newspapers would have picked them up and used them in their reports on the

We didn't. What we reported was that 30 percent of Northville teachers could see wage hikes of almost 9 per-

cent in the first year of the contract. How could that happen? How could some teachers see wage hikes of almost 9 percent when the contract calls for getting raises, you can't call it a pay freeze . . . because it a "pay freeze?"

The answer, of course, is the increments. Teachers receive "increment increases" every year through their first 11 years of service. So, even if the contract is frozen, teachers with less than 11 years of service will continue to cash in on those incremental increases.



# All's not well in California's wine country

A recent trip to California bore witness to the fact that all is not well in wine country especially the Napa Valley.

The spread of phylloxera continues to play a pivotal role. Napa Valley winegrowers are in the early stages of replanting with new, phylloxera resistant rootstock - a most expensive undertaking that will continue until the year 2000.

It is estimated that over the next four to seven years, 50 percent of the valley's 34,000 vineyard acres will be replanted.

Current decline of Napa Valley vineyards (and others in California wine country) is caused by a strain of phylloxera that feeds on AxR#I rootstock. Approximately 50 percent of the vineyards in Napa Valley are currently planted on AXR#I.

Only last year at this time, there were economic forecasts of a grape shortage beginning with the 1993 harvest. This has not come to pass. Recent record harvests and inaccuracy in assessing actual plantings have in fact created an oversupply of grapes causing a sea of wine. especially chardonnay, that has dropped from \$1,200 to \$800 per ton. Will the consumer seea drop in prices? Not for premium wines.

Remember, there will always be a shortage of grapes from the best vineyard sites. However, prices for premium and ultrapremium wines will stabilize.

Our prediction is that the consumer will witness heated competition among the fighting varietals. And this time, the fracas will include producers of these modestly-priced (\$5-\$8) bottlings from southern France, Chile and South Africa where wines have improved significantly over the last three years. There'll be plenty of quality, everyday drinking wine at some of the best prices ever.

While the Napa Valley realtor multilist is nearly as thick as the area's Yellow Pages. many Napa Valley wineries are doing just fine. thank you, and that's the upside of the report. One winery riding at the top of its game is. Shafer Vineyards. The Shafers have begun replanting efforts while at the same time releasing some of winemaker Doug Shafer's best

wines to date. Released this month is Firebreak (\$19), a new wine in the Shafer stables. It is truly a smokin' and hot offering of 61 percent sangiovese and 39 percent cabernet sauvignon.

The Italian Super Tuscan blends set the style that is the new wave in California reds. Shafer's bottling is up to the competition in this category. The downside here is that this wine is in very limited quantity.

Also dynamite from Shafer is the 1990 Cabernet Sauvignon, Napa Valley, Stags Leap District (\$19). This focused, nearly seamless wine is complex and rich. Shafer 1991 Merlot (\$18) is power-packed in flavors with a seducing finish.

Coming soon to this market is Shafer's 1992 Chardonnay (\$15). Buy this one for winter drinking. You'll envision yourself in a tropical paradise.

When you purchase wines at this price, you want to make certain they fully complement the meal they accompany. Four sure-fire recipes tested in the Shafer kitchen follow inside.

Over the next several months, we'll be reviewing several California wineries and their wines. These producers are practicing their craft well and remain sound amid uncertain financial times.

# Chili cook set to go national

You'll have to forgive Jim Sgriccia if he's all fired up. This longtime chili cook has demonstrated his ability by once again qualifying for worldwide competition with his sensational Day Later Chili. On Oct. 3, the Northville resident will travel to the International Chili Cookoff in Reno, Nev., at the Eldorado Hotel and Casino. Last year's finals in Scottsdale, Ariz., drew 125 cooks from all over the United States, as well as Europe and

To qualify for the world championship, a chili cook has to finish well in one of the many regional competitions. Each regional holds a handful of qualifiers per year. Sgriccia won the North Central Regional cookoff in Wayne last July, competing against 60 cooks from all the Great Lakes States, Illinois, Missouri, and even Canada.

It's not unusual for competitive chili cooks to travel hundreds of miles for a cookoff.

"Jerry Simmons is from Missouri, and I run into him all the time," Sgriccia said. "I know him better than most people that I live close to."

Sgriccia's winner, Day Later Chili, is a recipe he's used for years, although he tinkers with it constantly with the goal of improving it. Apparently the tinkering has payed off.

"I made some changes to the recipe I've been using," he said. "I was real happy. I was going to try out at The Lark (the Birmingham restaurant which annually hosts a sanctioned chili cookoff), too, but then I took first place at Wayne and won that big trophy."

The secret to Sgriccia's burgeoning success has been some intense study into the art and science of chili peppers. He did some reading in The Chili Book by Mark Miller, and then began sampling all the many varieties of dried chili peppers. To his surprise, he discovered that indeed there were discernible differences in the flavors of the various chilis. Sgriccia talked about them the way a connoisseur talks about wine.

The chilis are all so subtle and different," he said. "You have to experiment to see what you like."

The chilis Sgriccia mixes into his chili powder are cascabel, mulato, pasilla, ancho, guajillo, and ordinary mild California chili. All of these chilis are all mild, and indeed three of them are used for the traditional Mexican mole. For heat, he cooks one teaspoon of chipotle chili powder in with the meat as he browns it. Chipotle rates high in Scoville units (the scientific measure of the hotness of a chili), but it's also got a unique smoky barbecue flavor that makes it irresistable.

Sgriccia keeps all of his chilis in marked plastic containers in the refrigerator. He'll mix and match powders when he cooks chili at home.

"I enjoy cooking, and I've always loved chili," he said. Sgriccia's other big secret is the one which gives Day Later Chili its name. He will brown the meat, cook the vegetables, and toss in all his spices. Then he'll let it all simmer for about an hour.

When all the flavors have mingled nicely, he'll pull the chili off the burner, and plunge the pot into a cooler full of ice. Later, when it's time to serve the chili he'll heat it back up again.


"I got the idea several years ago at a competition," Sgriccia said. "I got done cooking the chili, and I had an hour and a half until the judging, so I left it to cool down on ice. The result was Day Later Chili."

The rationale is obvious to anyone who's ever eaten leftover chili that's sat in the refrigerator overnight. Not only does it taste better, but the process of cooling and reheating the chili thickens it, an important criterion on which competitive chilis are judged.

For the uninitiated, cooking chili at home is one thing, but preparing it for competition is quite another. The International Chill Society has some clearly defined rules about what can go in the pot and what can't. No thickeners such as rice, pasta or beans are allowed. That's right. Competitive chili is served Texas style: no beans.

Competitive chili is also not supposed to be extremely hot. It should have fire, for sure, but not to the point where it's repulsive. Sgriccia points to the example of the 1991 International Chili Cookoff winner, Randy Robinson of Columbus, Ohio.

"I tried his chili, and it wasn't hot," he said. "It didn't



have a lot of fire, but I liked it."

With continued practice, Sgriccia hopes to create a chili that is as tomato-less as possible; just meat and

Competitive chili cooks don't need any special credentials, Sgriccia adds.

"Anybody can get in." Sgriccia said. "You just have to love chili, and be ready for disappointment."

Sgriccia knows about disappointment. Although he first started competing in 1984, he didn't get his first recognition, a fifth-place finish, until 1987. Before he even entered his first competition, he spent two years visiting chili cookoffs and sampling all the different

Over the years, he's won four cookoffs, and has taken a couple of seconds and a third. There have also been numerous top 10 flnishes.

Though he competed as many as a 20 times a year. Spriccia has cut down to just four shows a year lately. He competes in Wayne, Windsor, Livonia and the com-

Jim Lark, owner of the Lark restaurant is a big chili fan himself. His goal is to one day host a cookoff of 40 chili cooks, all of them previous winners and thus international competitors. He's already got one in Jimi

That was the dream when I started," he said. "Now I can't believe I'm going back again."


