

Sixth try is a charm for recall petition

Perseverance paid off for Doug Erwin when the Oakland County Board of Election Commissioners certified Monday, at his sixth attempt, petition language to recall five Novi City Council members for their support of Main Street.

Targeted are Mayor Kathleen McLallen, Mayor Pro Tem Hugh Crawford and Council Members Robert Schmid, Rob Mitzel and Joseph Toth.

Recall headquarters will be set up today at Erwin's business, Erwin Farms on Novi Road. He's already drafted four people to circulate the petitions and will be distributing more, as well as collecting signatures at his grocery

Erwin said that in the last five months, many citizens have urged him to keep trying, as his petitions were rejected by the board for lack of clarity.

"The response I get from the people in the store, they are are upset with the City of Novi. They constantly go up there and they are not listened to," Erwin explained Tuesday. "We need to get control of our

city once again. We can't have our

elected officials ignoring our com-

plaints. We can't have our elected officials putting in so many or so big commercial and residential communities without doing something about our traffic problem." The petitions which made the grade with the election commissioners are worded: "For allowing

the use of city land in the Main Street project by James Chen, a private developer."

The five council members are

mainly showing a relaxed attitude towards the recall campaign. "What will be, will be. I don't

think it's the most productive thing we've ever done. The recall process as its structured is a difficult process for everyone concerned," McLallen said Monday.

Mitzel is taking a business as usual approach.

"The only thing I can do at this time is do the best job I can on the council and wait and see what happens," Mitzel said.

Schmid says he doesn't think the recall attempt will be success-

"I really haven't been that concerned about it. Mr. Erwin certainly has the right to recall, but I think he's wrong. I don't think the city council did anything wrong and I think most people realize that," he added.

Erwin must collect about 2,500 signatures for each of the five council members over the next 90 days, but will try for 3,000. If he makes this, the county elections division then has 15 days to verify the signatures, then the Novi city clerk has 35 days to verify them, Oakland County Elections Clerk Jan Stickley said.

Following that, a special election is scheduled within 60 days. That could come as late as the end of September or early Octo-

"I've been up there (Pontiac) four out of the six times. The language is vague, confusing and misleading and I still feel that way. However, the election commission chose to approve it, so we'll go from there," Crawford

Vistas plan approved as density is cut

By JAN JEFFRES Staff Writer Developers of The Vistas of Novi won some and lost some as they sought city approval last week of their ambitious plan to create a "small town" on vacant land near Walled Lake.

During the March 2 session, the council retracted its July 18 approval of the area plan and tinkered with the details of what Community Development Director Jim Wahl called "the most complex project the city has had to deal with perhaps as far back as Twelve Oaks Mall."

A final decision on the planned unit development (PUD) agreement between Novi and Hughlan Development Company is expect-

The late night meeting saw Mayor Kathleen McLallen and Tim Pope at loggerheads. McLallen was opposed to reducing the housing units by 20, making a statement which Pope said he found "alarming."

The PUD was limited to 1,193

City moves on senior housing

Eileen O'Brien, 78, and Lusia Murray, 65, are tired of soaring rents at their mobile home park, which they say eat up most of their disposable income.

The two local women are eager to move into the \$8.1 million senior citizen housing complex the Novi City Council agreed Monday will likely be built here.

"I can't afford to live where I live now, Chateau of Novi. The rent keeps going up. I think it's time that Novi would do something for senior citizens, because I think we've been really left out," Murray said.

"The seniors put Novi where we are today. We've been mistreated and we haven't been

Since 1986, a series of committees have researched the senior housing issue. Now, the council's created a building authority which will ultimately be able to issue bonds and get the project constructed. Research by the Senior Citizen Housing Committee concluded that a 122,000-square-foot, 150-unit building can be placed on six acres and pay back the bond issue and its estimated 6.5 percent interest through rentals in the \$449 to \$511 range. The committee suggested that land can

be purchased for about \$50,000 per acre. We think it's time now to move forward with senior housing in Novi. Today we can see even more of a need for senior housing," committee member Kim Capello said. "Senior housing can stand on its own without any subsidy whatsoever."

It'll be built without the direct approval of the voters. Council Member Tim Pope's attempt to put the issue on the ballot was quashed, with a slim council majority opting nstead to incorporate the building authority.

With voter approval, the bond interest rate would be slightly lower. But Novi voters in the 1980s said that although they'd like senior housing here, they weren't prepared to pay for

While no one will be taxed for the \$8 million in bonds to be issued by the authority, there is an element of risk. If the project goes bankrupt, Novi's general fund will be liable for

the payments. Novi's bonding attorney Dennis Neiman told the council he's been in a legal consultant to

Money saving coupons

Consultant is back in town to query residents

Kathy Feaster was back in the Novi Community School District Monday for a repeat engagement.

The consultant, hired by the school district to prepare and conduct a survey to gauge the community's acceptance of future bond proposals, returned this week to continue gathering data for her forthcoming telephone

Feaster is drafting a survey she will use to poll 400 district residents this spring. The survey is aimed at getting to the reason why the district's \$33 million bond proposal failed in December. It may also provide some indication why district voters defeated the two mill enhancement request the district requested last June.

Feaster is a self-employed school public relations consultant. She started her business in 1991 after stepping down as the coordinator of opinion research with the Michigan Department of Education's Project Outreach. She had held that position since

1985 but resigned when she and her husband decided to relocate from Lansing to Menominee.

Before that the mother of 14 held various positions in opinion research with consulting firms in Lansing, Port Huron and in the Lansing School District.

During her tenure she's conducted similar surveys in about 70 percent of Michigan School Districts and in others in Illinois, Maryland, Missouri, Ohio, Florida, and Virginia.

To get a better impression of the district and a handle on issues facing the schools, she met two weeks ago with school administrators, elected officials, PTO groups, school board candidates and business leaders.

She returned this week to met with seniors citizens, Novi City Council and Planning Commissioners. There were other residents who were invited to attend the second round of interviews including Jerry LeBlanc and Andrew Mutch - two residents who voiced opposition to the



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

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

The athletic injury known as runner's knee is not a problem solely restricted to runners. Those who take to bicycles, hiking trails, inline skates, step aerobics, and stair-climbing machines may also experience tenderness around the kneecap that progresses to a sharp ache during exercise. Normally, the kneecap glides along a groove in the knee joint, but overuse, muscular imbalances foot malpositioning, and/or excessive pronation can create faulty movement that causes in flammation, sore muscles, and decreased leg strength. Treatment involves rest, Ice, compression, and elevation (RICE). To prevent a recurrence once the problem subsides, engage in legflexibility and-strengthening exercises, employ proper technique, and avoid over-exertion.

Let's bring recall to a halt

the Oakland County Election -Commission has given its approval to the wording of Doug Irwin's petitions for the recall of five Novi City Council members and he can now go ahead with the process of collecting signatures.

Now, if you can figure out why the "reasons for recall" as stated in this final version of the petition language are so superior to the earlier versions that this one got approved while the others

did not, then you're more literate than L. The wording is simple enough: "For allowing the use of city land in the Main Street project by James -Chen, a private developer." And to me, that's pretty clear. But then, the way I read the earlier versions,

When the state Legislature adopted the so-called "clarity standard" for recall petitions a few years back, lawmakers said it was an attempt to be fair to those public officials targeted by recalls. The Legislature might not be able to limit the reasons for which recalls can be run but, legislators figured, they could make sure the reasons as stated on the petitions were clear enough so that everyone in the community could tell what the issue was over which the officials were being recalled.

As it was put into practice by the Oakland County Election Commission, the "clarity standard" was really little more than a means of throwing obstacles in the way of Irwin's attempt to exercise a right guaranteed by the state Constitution.

And now that the commission has approved the petition, it is obvious that clarity was not the standard by which it made its decision. It made its decision on persistence.

Irwin's right to run this recall campaign. I'll now be arguing that this recall should not proceed.

I'd urge Irwin call the campaign off. If he proceeds. I'd urge Novi voters not to lend their support or signatures. And if the recall manages to make it to the ballot, I'd urge not to oust these council The list of reasons is long:

• First, we already have a means of getting rid of council members we disagree with. It's called an election and Novi City Council has one coming up this November. Three of the five members targeted for recall already will have to run for reelection in the fall. So why not put up an opposition candidate and just try to oust them then? It would certainly be cheaper, saving the city the \$11,000 cost of a special election, not to mention the cost of running

the campaigns both for and against recall. • This really is not an appropriate use of the recall process. Yes, the constitution does allow recalls to be run for any reason, I believe strongly the use of the recall process should be reserved for those cases in which there is misfeasance or malfeasance

in office by a public official. • Successful recalls are highly disruptive. If the recall were successful in this case, it would remove five of the seven members on that panel. For at least some time, council would not have enough membership to make quorum.

• Finally, the Main Street project is a good one for the community, and the council has done nothing it couldn't do ordinarily in assisting a developer. This recall should be stopped, before Novi goes



"This is a test. This is only a test. Had this been a real emergency, you would have been advised to

And this is one test you don't want to fail. When the 162 emergency sirens in Oakland County go off March 30 at 1 p.m., it is just a test. But it is you who should be taking the test.

Passing the test means having a "safe place" ready as we head into tornado season. A safe place plan includes knowing where to go

and when. If a tornado watch is issued, conditions are favorable for a tornado, but one has not been spotted yet.

In this case, stay close to a battery-operated radio or television for further instructions. When a tornado warning is issued, it means that a tornado has been sighted, either by a human

observer or on radar. It's time to implement your safe place plan. A safe place at home is in the basement away from outside walls and windows and under something sturdy. At work or school, interior hallways or

small rooms on the lowest level are considered the safest place. One of the biggest myths about tornadoes is that you should open the windows. "We used to teach people to open the windows to equalize pressure." said Leanne Robinson, Emergency Management Coordinator. "Since the '70s, we have come along

to know where to go during the thunderstorm warning. They don't have time to wait until the tornado warning.

Avoid areas with glass and wide free-span roofs. Supermarkets and gymnasiums are not good choices because once the roof comes off, there is no protection, according to Robin-

After a tornado, do not leave your safe place. Wait until an all-clear has been

The three minute siren tone means a tornado warning is in effect. Oakland County Emergency Management Division has declared March 26 through April 1 as Severe Weather Awareness Week which culminates with the county wide test that will enable everyone to have a dry run while there's still

time. "There have been an average of four tornado warnings per year in Oakland County, each lasting an average of 45 minutes," said Robinson, Nationally, Michigan has the third highest average number of tornado

deaths per year.

Novi has twice been hit by tornadoes in recent years. The worst was in June of 1987 when a small twister touched down in the Chateau Estates mobile home park at Thirteen Mile and Decker roads. The result was one dead, six injured and 227 homes damaged.

More recently, a fast striking cyclone hit the Yorkshire subdivision at Ten Mile and Taft roads in

September of 1990, destroying one home and damaging six others. The twister passed over and damaged the Novi Library, Civic Center and police headquarters. Novi High School had just let its students out for the day when the warning was issued, and staff hustled students back into the building, but

stragglers still in the parking lot were pushed to the ground by the winds when the tornado pass. Still, no one was

injured. If a tornado warning has been issued, it's too late to start thinking about a "safe place" plan. The time to put a

plan in place is now. Between now and March 30. companies can train their employees, schools can educate students, homeowners

can develop a safe place plan and know how to use it. During the siren test, businesses, schools, hospitals and

homeowners can test the effectiveness of their 'safe place' plans. Oakland County Emergency Management Service sends out information to all schools and to 700 major businesses, hospitals, and governments in Oakland

County.

Oakland County has 162 tornado sirens, the largest number in the state. "They were never meant to penetrate a building," said Robinson. "They were meant to get people off the streets and into a safe

location." People inside need to rely on an internal communications system, such as television and

If you hear a thunderstorm, turn on the radio and television, advised Robinson.

"With the new Doppler radar, we are getting better at picking up tornadoes, especially smaller tornadoes," said Robinson,

Most tornadoes occur in the United States in the spring or early summer. Although they usually occur in the late afternoon, just after the temperatures have reached the highest levels of the day. they have been known to form at anytime of the day or night after a thunderstorm.

"You can't tell how long it will be before it hits," said Robinson. With a slow moving storm you have more time, and with a faster moving storm you have

Tornadoes occur at the end of a severe thunder-

A tornado starts forming inside a severe thunderstorm. A tornado-producing thunderstorm creates wind shear, which causes the normal updrafts and downdrafts in a thunderstorm to spin, creating a

The invisible vortex works its way downward through the middle section of the severe thunderstorm. When it dips below the base of the thunderstorm cloud, it is called a funnel cloud. When this funnel cloud touches down, it is called a tornado. Once the tornado touches down, the vortex can

There are common characteristics to listen for. The air is often calm just before the tornado hits. The sound of a roar of a passenger freight train can

"We provide the food for anywhere from 50 to 100 persons, she said, "cook it and serve," the money coming from crafts sales and donations.

Pat Kochyan, who is a housewife, mother, and a nurse in home health care, said, "I have worked with people living hand to mouth," and volunteering on this committee "makes me appreciate even more what I have.





Tax Tips You Can Use

Both the Individual Income Tax rate and the Single Business Tax rate have been lowered this year by the Governor and the State Legislature. Because these changes took place on May 1, the 1994 individual income tax rate and calendar year 1994 single business tax rate will be a blended rate. For 1994 only, the rate used to calculate your individual income

tax will be 4.47%. In 1995, the rate will be reduced to 4.4%. For single business tax payers, the 1994 calendar year blended

rate is 2.3375%. If your business is on a fiscal year that does not coincide with the calendar year, please check the new SBT tax forms for the annual rate which applies to your business.

Homeowners should be aware that, because local school property taxes were lower in 1994 than in 1993, their Homestead Property Tax Credit may also be less for 1994. The credit is calculated based on the property taxes levied on your homestead in 1994 and your household income, which must be below \$82,650 to qualify. Because property taxes have been cut by the provisions of Proposal A, your total property tax bill will be less in the calculation of the

Homeowners will continue to qualify for the credit up to a maximum of \$1,200, but officials remind those who have received the full credit in the past that the 1994 credit may be less if their property taxes were significantly less.

Renters who also qualify for the Homestead Property Tax Credit should be aware that the figure used for calculating the credit has been increased from 17% to 20% of annual rent paid, giving renters




