Repairs start on Novi ice arena's wall

Architects and engineers have determined the cause of a structural flaw at the \$8.5 million Novi Ice Arena and began late last week to fix the problem.

Designed to sink into the ground, the arena was built with 15 feet of backfill against to act like a retaining wall, said Dan Davis, director of Novi Parks and Recreation. However, pressure from the dirt proved to be too heavy for the structure.

The result was a shift in the front wall that set the opening of the arena back to the original mid-August start date.

An early finish to construction had the city optimistic about

opening, but youth hockey and figure skating camps scheduled for this month were canceled due to concerns about the wall's sta-

Davis said construction crews are implementing the solution this week. The backfill dirt around three sides of the structure will be removed and replaced with sand and an underground system of foundation supports designed to move the walls back their original place will be installed, he

"We're not going to have to rip it out and replace (the wall)," Davis

The repairs should take about three weeks, he said, putting the

Larry Nevers makes first speech to Rotary

"I'm a truly innocent man and I hope to have a chance to prove it in court," Larry Nevers told the Novi Rotary Club last Thursday in his first speaking engagement since getting out of federal prison last December.

Yes, the former Detroit police officer said in an interview following his speech, he did strike Malice Green in the head with a flashlight six to seven times during their encounter outside a known crack house in Detroit in Novem-

ber 1992. But that was because Green, Nevers contended, was reaching for the officer's gun. Green had his hand on the butt and the only thing holding the weapon in place

was a small strap and Nevers' hand. He hit Green while telling him to let go of the gun. Later, he hit Green again when Green attempted to swing at him with "a shiny object" in his hand. It turned out to be a set of keys with the keys extended through the knuckles, Nevers said.

Regardless, his actions were all in accordance with the rules and procedures laid down to guide officer conduct in the Detroit Police Department policy manual. Had a police department Board of Review been convened to examine the incident, Nevers said, it would

have reached that conclusion. Instead, Police Chief Stanley Knox denied a Board of Review hearing, Nevers said, Further,

50s Fest rocks this town



Oldies performers, car show draw crowds

Michigan 50s Festival headliner Lou Christie's plane trip to Novi wasn't lightening quick, but the 1960s teen singing sensation made it just in time to perform his famous single "Lightening Strikes" for the crowd.

"He was a true performer," said festival manager Jane Thomas, "He freshened up, changed his clothes and went on stage. He put on a great show."

Christie was to leave that morning from Newark but the airline canceled his flight, leaving him to drive and hour and a half to LaGuardia where another flight was scheduled. As of 4 p.m., organizers were taking deep breaths, unaware of where Christie actually was.

Chief of Police Doug Shaeffer was sent to pick him up at the airport and Christie rolled into the Expo Center about 8:30 p.m., only about a half hour late.

The wait all day Friday was an exercise in patience and

keeping calm, said Thomas. When Christic arrived "I just took a big sigh of relief and went on with it," she said.

Voters see two races in primary

Novi voters face a tough choice next Tuesday, Aug. 4 - to vote Republican and help settle the Bill Bullard-Barbara Dobb run-off for the 15th State Senate District primary or east their ballots Democratic so they can have a say in the Geoffrey Fieger-Larry Owen-Doug Ross contest.

Voters can cast ballots for any party, but may not split their ticket, voting in different party races on the same ballot. Split ballots will be invalidated.

Little else is on the upcoming ballot. Yes, there is a race in the Republican party for the nomination to the gubernatorial race in November, between incumbent John Engler and Gary Artinian, a physician and member of Wayne State University Board of Regents. And there will be candidates for delegate to the county convention for both parties in individual precincts.

But there are no other contests. Incumbents 11th District Congressman Joe Knollenberg, 38th District State Representative Nancy Cassis and 17th District County Commission Kay Schmid all get a by in the GOP primary. Knollenberg will have to face Democrat Travis Reed in the fall for the congressional post, as Cassis will have to confront Democrat Kristy Mary Demas, both of whom have no competition in the prima-

The winner of the Bullard-Dobb race will face Democrat S. Ruth Fuller in the fall for that State Senate seat, but she is the lone candidate on the Democratic side.

Polling begins at 7 a.m. and will run until 8 p.m. next Tuesday. The location of polls has been moved for five Novi precincts. Precinct 1, formerly at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, now votes at Meadowbrook Congregational Church, 21355 Meadowbrook Rd. Precinct 7, formerly casting ballots in Fire Station No. 1, now votes at Holy Family Church, 24505 Meadowbrook Rd. Precinct 10, formerly at Beachwalk Apartments, now votes at Hickory Woods Elementary School, 30655 Novi Rd. Precinct 14, which used to vote in Novi High School, casts ballots at the Novi Civic Center, 45175 W. Ten Mile Rd. Precinct 17, which used to vote at the Church of the Holy Cross, also moves to the Civic Center.

Incumbent State Senator Bill Bullard first won the post in 1996, in a contest then against Dobb, after David Honigman resigned the post due to illness. Bullard began his political career on the Highland Township Board and has served as a State Representa-

Dobb is currently the state Representative in the 39th House District, which includes Commerce

"It went well," said Marilyn Troshak, deputy director of parks and recreation. "We had comments from people like, 'We never knew there was a back part of the


Last year, the open house was held on the first Saturday of Memorial Day and drew 800 people. It was a little more than the department could handle so it was changed to a weekend in July.



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OCC students get 'lion's share' of scholarships

A "lion's share" of a new state scholarship program is going to Oakland Community College Stu-

"We are proud that we were singled out for the lion's share of Governor's Scholarships," said OCC Chancellor Richard Thompson. OCC will get \$1.6 million of the 820 million pot. It will help pay for 1.800 scholarships - more than double the number of the next highest provider, neighboring Macomb Community College.

Thompson said the 1,800 scholarships will cover a two-year cycle and be given to about 750 students. because some will be in two-year associate degree programs and others in shorter certificate pro-

"There is also \$30 million for tech centers (capital) - five or six in the state," Thompson added, "One by law will go to Focus:HOPE. The state is accepting proposals until mid-August. The grants probably will be announced in late October. We will be a candidate.

"We are working on getting our partners lined up in business, industry and the high schools along with Walsh College and Lawrence Technological Universi-

As families head out for that final summer getaway before school starts, their unoccupied homes become targets for burglars.

Unfortunately, August is not only a peak time for vacations, it is generally a month with the highest number of break-ins, according to an insurance inclusity spokesper-

Last year in Michigan, there were 70,912 burglary offenses reported in July and August. In 1996, that figure was 79,066. The number of burglaries last

year declined in the most populous counties of the state. Among the listed was Wayne County at a 10.7 percent decrease.

"Although the number of burglaries is decreasing in Michigan, homeowners still need to take precautions," Leanne Snay, executive director, Insurance Information Association of Michigan, said. "The most effective means of protection against this crime if often the most abvious.

There are some common-sense precautions residents can take to deter burglars, according to the Insurance industry spokesperson. The following are some sugges-

• Equip doors with dead-bolt locks, put a slide bolt on slidingglass doors and make sure all windows are locked; Use automatic timers to turn

Nevers argued a second autopsy of Green, who died on the way to the hospital, showed he succumbed due to an enlarged heart brought on by the use of cocaine and alcohol, not due to blunt force trauma to the head, which was the conclusion of the first autopsy.

apart. Motorists sometimes drive by shouting obscenities. Welcome to a day in the life of a City of Novl

Department of Public Works road repair crew. The repair crew was using a hot rubberized compound to seal cracks in a stretch of road behind West Oaks Mall in mid-July.

Combine the record-breaking temperatures with equipment that generates even more heat and you have a crew of seven men who, out of necessity, switch assignments about every hour to hour and a half.

When you see a crew member sitting in a pick up truck, you may think, "What a cushy job." But he may have just finished a shift on the torch or applicator equipment. The guy holding the stop sign or waving the directional flag has not been doing that all day. He

also takes turns on the torch and applicator. Starting pay is \$7.50 an hour for seasonal workers with returning college students earning \$8.

The road repair foreman, Mike Deaton, periodically drives to the site.

"He handles all work assignments and keeps track of the crews," said Craig Smith, DPW superintendent. Tim Wright, the crew leader, is on the site

his summer has been the hottest on a.m. to start up the double boiler machine record. Some employees may be which heats the rubberized compound. It takes one and a half hours to get the machine up to operating temperature. Boxes totaling about 1,000 pounds of rubberized compound which will be used throughout the day are loaded into the truck. About 200 pounds of propane is required each day to power both the torch and applicator machines.

The crew heads out to the road at 7:30 a.m. and works until 2:30 or 3:30 p.m. depending on the weather.

The maintenance program of applying the hot patch follows the pavement improvement program where patches of concrete have been cut out and replaced.

"I like to follow behind that pavement improvement program with these guys, they seal up the pavement good," Smith said. Certain roads are targeted each year and

Smith says to go through the entire city takes between three and four years. Bob West was working the torch, which

puts out between 375,000 to 400,000 BTUs. The exhaust gas is 2,200 degrees. West wore the required ear muffs, safety glasses, hat, safety vest, long sleeve shirt and

pants, and protective boots. "For this crew, that's about the nastiest



Wright has been working this type of road repair since the city bought the machine eight or nine years ago. Dean Reed, Marc Tolsdorf and Jerry Orchard have been with the crew for about three years.

Novi resident Ben Bedard, one of three seasonal crew members, is working for Novi's road repair crew for the first time this summer. He plans on going back to school to pursue a degree in criminal justice.

"I've never been indoors," Bedard said. "I like being outdoors.'

Reed was driving the truck which pulls the hot patch double boiler machine. Marc Tolsdorf was following behind with the hot patch applicator. One part of the double boiler contains hot

oil which is kept at 550 degrees. The other is 75 gallons of rubberized compound that comes out of the applicator wand at 370 degrees. When the kettle starts getting low we throw a couple of boxes of compound in and





It takes about 20 to 30 minutes for the compound to set up enough so that vehicles can drive over it. That's why the street may still be closed off a block away from where the torch and applicator guys are working. The hotter it is outside, the longer the compound takes to cool down.

When it is 85 degrees outside it takes about an hour to cool down. "If a car drove over this right now it would peel the whole thing up and it would just wrap around the tire," Wright said of recently applied compound.

It is slow, tiresome work. One or two miles of two-lane road that just has linear cracks will take about one day to complete. In about three hours, the crew was able to patch less than a one block stretch of road behind West Oaks Mall because of its deteriorating condition.

"When the road begins to look like it has more patch than road, it's time to redo the road," Wright Being a sign guy means putting


