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# City to cut consulting services

Staff wher
While some communities are privatizing consulting work. Novi is looking to cut back some of its outsourced consultants to save money.
Novi city manager Richard Helwig said he would like to see the city

pare back on the use of consultants for engineering and environmental

According to Helwig, \$4,175,237

was dedicated to consulting firms' fees in the last fiscal year alone. As a result, Helwig has proposed to hire three civil engineers in house to handle projects that would otherwise be out-sourced.

By listing a city engineer as divisions.

By hiring a city engineer as divi-sion manager and add two additional civil engineers, the city expects to save approximately \$60,000 in the coming fiscal year and \$274,927 in 2002-2003. An additional \$281,614 will be saved in 2003-2004. Helwig said that he would like to see at least

two of the positions filled by this coming September. "We are not changing for the sake of changing," Helwig said, "We're changing to enhance accountabili-

Helwig said by consolidating serv-ices, there would be "better commu-

nication" over what is being done as far as engineering is concern. According to Helwig, there is too much excess paper work being done

in the city.

"Just having 23 sets of plans being required is too much. Any other place! have worked only required six or seven," Helwig said. "It just shows how splintered and fragmented we are."

Helwig said that by "lessening our dependence on consultants, projects would be more streamlined."

## Passed: judgeship may soon be reality

The proposal to realign the lovi and Clarkston District Courts, adding a new judge to Novi Court and transferring another from Novi to Clarkston, has leapt a major hurdle last

On May 1, Oakland County Board of Commissioners General Government Committee and the Public Services Committee approved the judge-ship restructuring and the pro-posal will now go to the full board for discussion today, May

Final approval is not expected until May 24, according to Oakland County Commissioner Hugh Crawford [R-Novi).

Last January, Governor John Engler signed legislation that would bring a judgeship to Novi via the electorate in 2002 - to take the bench in 2003. The take the bench in 2003. The Clarkston court would take Jurisdiction of Rose and White Lake Township. With the expiration of Judge Michael Batchik's seat in Novi, that vacancy could be filled as a judgeship in Clarkston also in 2003.



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

# Construction will focus on Novi intersections

South Lake Drive," Helwig said, "We'll do an upgrade there with a pedestrian pathway."
Initial designs are also being done on a number of ntersections in the city. Novi Road at Ten Mile, Novi Road and Grand River, Beck and Ten Mile, Fourteen Mile and Weich Road and Eight Mile and Beck Road are all in the design process.

The Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC)

will be widening Grand River between Wixom and Beck Road from three lanes to five this coming June That project is expected to cost \$4.4 million with funds from both the state and county.

Last month, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) closed Haggerty Road south of Twelve Mile Road to Bridge Street, just north of Eleven

According to MDOT officials, the road will be closed down until this fall to repair surface road and bridges over 1-96, 1-696, M-5 and east bound 1-96, Novi police are asking that commuters be aware of the closure and MDOT is suggesting a detour of Twelve Mile Road to M-5 to Crand River.



"I used to sit and watch her class es until I was old enough to take classes with her," Janisse said.


