2002 Reward offered for info on killer The Novi News' Year in

It's likely Eric Darnell Barnes never even noticed the person who ended his life with a single gunshot to the head in Wixom Dec. 17.

Wixom Police have narrowed the field of suspects down to "three or four" suspects, all from Wayne County, and are hoping the promise of a \$5,000 reward from Forest City Technologies will shake loose some vital information leading to the arrest and conviction of Barnes' killer. Wixom Police Chief Clarence

Goodline announced Dec. 27 that the Wellington, Ohio-based auto parts maker had posted the reward. Although Barnes was charged

with carrying a concealed weapon by police in Madison Heights in August, Goodline downplayed that connection. "He was not carrying a firearm; it was a knife," said Goodline, adding, "I think that puts a little different spin on it."

Goodline said he didn't believe there was a connection between the two incidents

Detective Jim Osborne said that Detective Jim Osborne said that while investigators had found a few people at Forest City Technologies "who said they had had some problems with him," Barnes had recently been promo-ed and a company official said he was well liked overall. Barnes, said Goodline, appeared to have been a crea-ture of habit. Goodline said the victim always came to work an

Sponsors sought for Chamber auction

"A Celebration of Life. Art and Healing" this vear's theme

It's still months away, but the Novi Chamber of Commerce is looking for sponsors for its 11th annual charity auction.

This year the chamber will be raising money for the Assarian Cancer Center at Providence Hospital and Medical Center's Novi campus at Grand River Avenue and Beck Road under the banner of "A Celebration of Life, Art and Healing." Chamber President Nora

Chamber President Nora Champion said the event has raised more than \$60,000 for area charities over the past decade. She said last year's event brought in \$37,000, leaving \$15,000 for area charities after expenses.

Randy Patterson, chairman of the chamber's Media and Promotion Committee, said he would like to improve on that percentage by getting sponsors for nearly everything. Patterson will be contacting local businesses for sponsorships ranging from bronze at \$2,500 to plantinum at \$10,000. He said he's looking for sponsorships on everything from auction items to the seven-course dinner

that will be served at the auction. This year's auction will be held April 12 at the Novi Hilton, which by then will be the Novi Sheraton located on Haggerty Road, just north of Eight Mile Road.

Patterson said the chamber picked the Assarian Cancer Center as the beneficiary of this year's charity auction because of its innovative Healing Arts program. The program, which does not generate revenue for the hospital, introduces cancer patients

Arsenic clean-up begins: Employees of the City of Novi Department of Public Works blocked access to transferred acreage of North Novi Park, preparing for the commence-ment of arsenic contamination clean-up efforts. Ash Trees decline: During the month of July, Novi Forester Steve Printz announced the city's Ash tree population was being attacked by an Asian Emerald Ash Borer. Printz compared the ash decline to the Dutch clm disease epi-demic in the 1950s and 60s, Printz said the impact to the city would be significant for wildlife and economic values. 

Commission decides to wait on Seely Sanctuary

Rather than risk a no vote from the Novi Planning Commission that would have killed plans for a new house of worship, Khanh Pham, a manag-er with West Bloomfield's Singh Development Company, opted to try again another day. Commission members voted

unanimously to table the Singh's request for preliminary site plan approval, along with wetland, woodland and special land use

ermits for the Seely Sanctuary's 9.659-acre site on 13 Mile Road between M5 and Meadowbrook Road after Phan asked for "more time to come back with a more sensitive plan.

It was a decision that will likely cost the members of the Seely Sanctuary 60 days of the company construction season.

Commission members focused heavily on a proposed 7,200-square-foot administra-tion building that the Indian religious community has no imme-diate plans to build. "There's only so much money for con-struction." Phan explained. He said the Sanctuary, which is a predominantly Indian uni-

tarian-like religious community with elements of Hinduism and Buddism, wants to build a 29,000-square-foot house of

worship with seating for 800 people. Pharn said the community's plans call for the eventual construction of an administra-tion building with classrooms on the western edge of their site.

Commission chairman Antonia Nagy complained there were "too many variances for me to support this."

Pham countered that the variance and waiver requests in seely Sanctuary's application were the result of trying to accommodate planning staff's wishes or the result of earlier planning commission actions. He noted, for example, that the locations of earlier church and subdivision entrances approved north by city planners on the north side of 13 Mile Road made it impossible to meet the city's 400-foot spacing requirement for opposite side driveways.

Commissioner Tim Shrover Commissioner inn Shroyer said he though the design for the sanctuary was "great" but he was concerned about plans that show parking in front of the facility, which is prohibited by city code. Pham noted there is parking in front of the nearby Brightmoor Church. Several commission members

Several commission members said they were concerned about increased traffic impacts, but just two weeks earlier the comnission voted to approve pre-liminary plans for 60-acres resi-dential behind Brightmoor. Following the commission meeting, Pham said he was "frustrated."
