

"It's Time to Be Bold Again"

House Speaker calls on leaders in Lansing to make tough choices to get state moving again

Newly-elected Speaker of the Michigan House Craig DeRoche wasted no time last in telling colleagues assembled for the start of the 93rd Legislative session last Wednesday

the 93rd Legislative session last Wednesday that it was time to make changes. "It's time to be bold again and it's time to tead," said DeRoche. "The kind of leadership that blasted the rust off our economy, created good jobs and made Michigan the envy of other states."

Council of State Legislatures, 31 states started 2003 with a hole in their budget. Today, Michigan remains one of only three states facing a deficit.

"America has turned the corner," said DeRoche. "It's leaving Michigan behind and it's time for us to get to work and start living within our means."

DeRoche pointed to a willingness in the past to rely on accounting gimmicks, tax shifts and fee increases to balance the state budget as a key factor in Michigan's ongoing budget woes. "It hasn't worked," said DeRoche, "Michigan isn't in better shape. And the base of the state of the w it's time to make the tough decisions.

DeRoche promised to work across party lines to seek input and member priorities in the budget process, but stated firm his commi-ment to pass a budget that funds only those priorities that the state can afford.

The new House Speaker pledged to fund "priorities that create good jobs, teach our kids, keep our families safe and healthy and meet our responsibility to taxpayers to spend their hard-carned money with caution and care." med mon



Almost a month after the Novi School District chos Community School District chose seven candidates from a pool of 31 to be interviewed for the job of superintendent, that number was wed once again, down to three.

The board spent most of last week, from Tuesday through Friday, interviewing the candidates and finally chose Virginia Kyro, superintendent of the Oxford Area Community School District; Peter Dion, superintendent of the Grosse lle Township School District; and Tom Hoster, superintendent of the Huron School District, to further interview.

The district is looking to replace longtime superintendent Emmett Lippe, who plans to retire at the end of the current school year. He has been with Novi 13 years, and his current salary (base plus additional compensation) is \$208,171. Adoption and safe delivery issues in sex education need board approval

Additions to curriculum would start in second semester

Pending school board approval on Thursday, Feb. 3, students at Novi High School may soon see some changes to their health classes.

This past year, the state legislature passed two new laws that revise the reproductive health committee structure and the sex education curriculum in the state of Michigan. That means that Novi High's new curriculum now must include information about



to Nancy Davis, assistant superintendent of instructional services, by state law, the district has to have two

public hearings at school board meetings to give any member of the public an opportunity to review the materials. The first public hearing was held on Jan. 6 and the next one will be tonight. Davis also said that anyone inter-ested in reviewing the materials before Feb. 3, who was not able to make it to any of the two meet-ings, can call her office during the day and make an appointment to come in and take a look at them.

"There are four pieces of print material that come directly from the Family Independence Agency," Davis said. "These are documents that give students information about the adoption process and the other topic is something called safe delivery."

Davis explained that there have been stories in newspapers and other media outlets about how birth teenagers sometimes give and then drop their babies off in a dumpster or leave them out in the cold.

This is information about a law that was passed in Michigan that basically assures a young mother or a father who has a baby mother or a father who has a baby and doesn't want it that they can take it safely to a police station, a fire station, or a hospital and the baby will be taken with no ques-tions asked and caref for with no detriment or penalty to the par-ents." Davis said. Davis also said that Novi has Davis also said that Novi has

already been complying with state laws in a superb fashion and is

receiving good participation from community members and parents on its reproductive health com-mittee, but the district did revise its structure anyway because of new requirements.

The law now requires that more than half of the committee be made up of parents within the school district and that the it be CO-chaired by a parent. Typically what happened in the past, and this was true in Novi, is a teacher who also is a parent, chaired the committee as well.

"She chaired the committee for several years here and she was very good, but she's a staff mem-ber as well as a parent," Davis said. "This new law was set in place to make sure that truly parents, not parents who happen to be employees of the district, are chairing the committee and I think that may have been to avoid any potential perception that even though it's a parent, because they're a teacher or a staff member, they may be more inclined to favor the district over what the parents want. It's really a safe

The new curriculum materials will need to be reviewed by the committee before they can be introduced in the classroom.

School district updating parental involvement policy

Board expected to approve new wording tonight

Because of a new senate bill, it appears that the Novi Community School District's parental involve-ment policy will soon be updated.

Pending school board approval tonight, The Novi Community Schools administration and staff shall establish and maintain programs and practices that enhance and encourage parent/guardian involvement and reflect the needs of students and their families. These programs and practices will be implemented at both the district and school level.

According to Bob Schram, executive director of administrative services, the board approved the parent/student handbook, which was released in August. There was a section of parent involvement in the book, but it was his feeling that, after review-ing the bill, the section probably robably needed to be expand upon. That's why he drafted a new policy, which he presented to the board

on Jan. 6. "It all started from Public Act 107 of 2004," Schram said. "That was a bill from (State Sen.) Nancy Cassis, it says, not later than January 1, 2005, the board of the school districts shall adopt and implement a parent involvement plan designed to encourage parent participation. The board of direc-

participation. The board of direc-tors should provide a copy of the plan to the parents or legal guardian of each pupil and that they also provide a copy to the department of education. That's in essence what the law says." The new policy draft states: The

Board strongly encourages and welcomes the involvement of parent(s)/guardian(s) in all of the district's educational programs. It is recognized and appreciated that parents/guardians are the "first teachers" of their children, and that their interest and involvement in the education of their children should not diminish once their should not diminish once their child enters the schools of the dis-trict. Accordingly, the board directs, by the adoption of this policy, that the administration shall design a program/plan that will encourage parent/guardian participation that may include, but not be limited to: not be limited to:

 Involvement in the develop-ment and review of instructional materials

· Two-way meaningful commu-

nication between school and home and home and school · Information and education on ting skills parer

· Volunteering opportunities on mutually aid student learning and support the district's curriculum Community collaboration used to strengthen schools, fami-

"I assume they're comfortable with that and it will probably be on the consent agenda," Schram said of tonight's school board meeting. Free credit reports on the horizon

The United States Congress ha the United States Congress has given you a tool to help ward off identity theft – the ability to moni-tor your credit reports for free. The Fair and Accurate Credit

Transactions Act of 2003 (FACTA) grants you one free credit report per year from each of the three nationwide consumer credit reporting companies – Equifax, TransUnion and Experian. You can request one, two, or all three reports at the same time, or stagger your requests over a 12-month period. One advantage of ordering all your reports at one time is you can compare the information each of the bureaus has col lected on you. However, if you opt to order a report every four months, you'll be able to see any unautho-rized activity that's occurred in the previous months.

Free credit reports became avail-able to consumers on the West coast in December 2004. Consumers in Midwestern states including Michigan can order copies beginning in March 2005, while consumers in the southern and eastern states will become eligible for the free reports in June and September, respectively.

How to order your reports

You can order free reports online at www.annualcreditreport.com beginning March 1. You can also request your reports by phone by calling toll free (877) 322-8228, or complete the Annual Credit Report Request Form (downloand it at www.ftc.gov/bcp/conline/edcams/cr edit/docs/fact_act_request_form.pdf) and mail it to: Annual Credit Report Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348-5281. Phone and mail requests will be processed within 15 days of receipt.

Your credit history is your finan-cial resume. It's what credit grantors, landlords, employers and insurance companies use to deter-mine your credit worthiness. The better credit you have, the better interest rates you'll secure on loans So, it's in your best interest to make sure the information contained in your report provides an accurate picture of your financial history.



Spot mistakes before they wreak havoc

A June 2004 study by the lational Association of State Public Research Interest Groups (U.S. PIRG) revealed some alarmng facts surrounding the accuracy rather, the inaccuracy – of infor-mation contained in credit reports.

The consumer advocacy group's study, which looked at credit reports belonging to 200 adults in 30 states, found that almost 80 per-



Other errors included closed accounts listed as active, loans listed multiple times and loans not listed at all. Most dis turbingly, the same study found that one in four credit reports contained errors grave enough to impact the consumer's ability to acquire affordable credit, and can even result in the denial of loans, housing and employment

It's your right; it's my right. While FACTA stops short of curb-ing the exchange of information between credit agencies and parties interested in your credit history, it empowers you, the consumer, to make certain the information is both accurate and up to date. We would all do well to exercise this right.

With home prices continuing to rise in 2005 and interest rates remaining low, the growing trend to remodel will probably remain strong throughout the

larly good year for commercial real estate, says Grubb & Ellis Co., a commercial property bro-ker and management firm. Economic growth in 2005 should be strong enough to pro-pel vacancies lower, but not

strong enough to push interest and mortgage rates higher, said a G&E report.

"In many respects, the slow to moderate growth forecast for this year is nearly ideal for real estate," said Robert Bach with G&E. "In many ways it will be just like the porridge for Goldilocks (in "The Three Bears"), not too hot and not too cold."

Beyond 2005, looming budg-et and trade deficits and high levels of household debt are likely to restrain the growth rate of the economy, but are unlikely by themselves to trigger a reces-sion, the G&E report concluded. Q: Will the real estate boom continue through 2005?

continue inrough 2005? A: A particularly interesting assessment of the real estate market was recently expressed by noted real estate consultant John Burns.

"As 2005 progresses, we find a housing market that is no longer a national boom, but instead a mix of regional booms, slowdowns and mostly 'status quos.' The outlook is for slowly 'status rising mortgage rates and slowly improving job growth. If both occur, the change in housing construction levels should be minimal this year," Burns said.

"Job growth is slowly increasing in most markets, with most noticeable improvements in the markets that were hit hardest by the technology downturn in 2000. Population growth is likely to be greater in the more affordable markets where jobs are also plenuiful. Your best local barometer for housing demand is probably the number of cars on the road during rush hour.

"If you're looking for the best "It you re looking for the best submarkets, find out where the office and industrial building construction is occurring and seek great neighborhoods near these emerging job centers," Burn concluded. Send inquiries to James M.
