■ Sleep-in program will be phased in

By Pam Fleming

Novi Fire Chief Art Lenaghan is looking for a few good men —

or women. Why? The chief said staffing at Fire Station #2 — with just eight paid on-call firefighters at last count — is so low that the station has had to close its doors several

times in the last year.

The chief wants to recruit more firefighters for the station on the north side of 13 Mile Road a half mile west of Novi Road, And, he wants to phase in a sleep-in program at this station on the north end of town.

We realize that only a certain number of employees would be willing to participate," he said. A sleep-in program has been in effect at Fire Station #1 on Grand

River Avenue just east of Novi Road for more than 10 years, according to Lenaghan. In this program, the station is

Monday through Friday, with two paid-on call members spending the night, working 24 hours on Saturday and 24 hours on Sunday. This allows us to be a member

of the First Responder Program,

of the First Responder Program,"
Lenaghan said.

The county requires city personnel who are part of this program to be able to respond to calls
on average in about six minutes.

The 24-hour supervisor program has improved the overall
department's response time,
respectively all consultants. according to Lenaghan.

Paid on-call staff required

For the sleep-in program to be phased in at Fire Station #2, the department has to first find paid oncall staff willing to work weekends.

"The program will depend on whether we can get enough of our current qualified staff who are able and willing to participate," Lenaghan said. "The critical time is Saturday and Sunday during the

day."
He noted that Fire Station #2 should have 20 employees instead of less than 10.

Fight back this flu season

Flu shots will be available for all on Monday

By Tracy Mishler STAFF WRITER

Jane Sheldwick has lost too many weeks to the flu during her lifetime to risk not getting vacci-

"Life is too short," said the 72-year-old Novi resident.
"Why spend it on the couch with
a 100-degree fever?" Sheldwick said she has gotten

the flu vaccine for the past five years, but panicked during last year's shortage.

"I haven't gotten the flu in years," she said. "Why start years."

now?"

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness and at times lead

to death.
On average, about 10-20 per-

cent of the U.S. population gets the flu each year, according to the Atlanta, Ga.-based Center for Disease Control.

"The best way to prevent the flu is to get the shot," said Mary Pat Kaminski, Novi resident and registered nurse for the Greater Oakland Visiting Nurses. Association. "There are plenty of vaccines available this year. If you have the opportunity to get the shot, get it."

Kaminski, a nurse for more

than 45 years, said she will give several hundred vaccines this flu

season.
"Anyone who works with the public should get a shot," she

said. The flu shot has been avail-The flu shot has been available to high-risk individuals since Oct. 1, but starting Monday the vaccine will be available to the public.

The Center for Disease Control chose Monday for open distribution for two reasons:

36,000 people die each year • Not everyone can take a flu shot, including those aller-gle to eggs (used in making the vaccine), very ill with a high fever or have had a

severe reaction in the past.

• Flu viruses change from ear to year. The immunity that is built up one year does n't always hold up when a new strain is circulating.







Commissioners may back down on their leadership pay increases

Request to go through process

Oakland Commissioners may decide not to give themselves a pay hike if the request doesn't make it through the committee process During a meeting of the gen-eral government committee last Monday, commissioners decided to review the proposed pay

hikes for leadership positions.

"We're putting it back through the committee process," said Bill Patterson (R-Oxford). chairman of the general govern

ment committee.

The increases approved by commissioners on Sept. 22 would provide an extra \$10.656 r Bill Bullard (R-Highland). chairman, on top of a 5 percen pay luke last year. An increase of \$5,000 was approved for Hugh Crawford (R-Novi), vice chairman, the Democratic chair and Republican Caucus chair.

County commissioners, who fill a part-time job, now make \$32,149 a year. The 2 percent increase in pay would push their pay to \$32,791. All raises are pay to \$52,794. Alt tasks are scheduled to begin lan, 1, 2006. The discussion on the pay increases will now move to the eneral board meeting next

1. Memory loss. Forgetting recently learned information is one of the most common early signs of dementia. A person begins to

forget more often and is unable to recall the information later 2. Difficulty performing familiar tasks. People with dementia often find it hard to plan or complete everyday tasks. Individuals may lose track of the steps involved in preparing a meal, placing a telephone call or playing a game.

 Problems with language. People with Alzheimer's disease often forget simple words or substitute unusual words, making. their speech or writing hard to understand.

4. Disorientation to time and place. People with Alzheimer's disease can become lost in their own neighborhood, forget where they are and how they got there, and not know how to get back

5. Poor or decreased judgment. Those with Alzheimer's may dress inappropriately, wearing several layers on a warm day or little clothing in the cold.

6. Problems with abstract thinking. Someone with Alzheimer's disease may have unusual difficulty performing complex mental tasks, like forgetting what numbers are for and how they should

7. Misplacing things. A person with Alzheimer's disease may put things in unusual places: An Iron in the freezer or a wristwatch

8. Changes in mood or behavior. Someone with Alzheimer's disease may show rapid mood swings.

9. Changes in personality. The personalities of people with

dementia can change dramatically. They may become extremely confused, suspicious, fearful or dependent on a family member. 10 Loss of Initiative. A person with Alzheimer's disease may

become very passive, sitting in front of the TV for hours, sleeping more than usual or not wanting to do usual activities.

Novi News editor Phil Jerome wasn't able to attend the 1988 showdown between Novi Northville to see the fruits of his

That was the year the Novi News and the Northville Record staffs ne up with the idea of creating a trophy for the teams to compete for, and it's the official birthday of the Baseline Jug.

Baseline Jug.
"We thought it would be a good idea and we thought it would be a great way to make the rivalry between Northville and Novi official." Jerome said.

Novi News reporter Ann Wilson, found a ceramic jug that became the Baseline trophy. The night it was unveiled and became an instant hit.

"I was surprised it was so popular," Jerome said. "I don't even remember who won, but I heard that the students and the football arm was chanting 'We want the g! We want the Jug!'"
Northville was the first recipient

of the trophy, earning it following a 23-18 victory over Novi. Since then, it has changed hands several

The longest streak is Novi's current four-year stranglehold. Prior to the creation of the trophy, the longest winning streak was a five-year Northville stretch from 1974-

Novi earned it's fifth-straight victory over Northville in the first round of the playoffs last year. though that game didn't count for

The Baseline Jug being hoisted today isn't the original, which was destroyed in the late 1990s. Instead, it's a donated milk jug from Guernsey Dairy, which sits on the dividing line of Northville and

the playoffs every year as Novi's head coach. And with a 6-2 record, the 'Cats are guaranteed a playoff berth again this season.

Northville, well.... they can come watch Novi's two-quarterback sys-tem - Steve Hart passing (1,405 yards and 10 TDs this year) and Adam Chandler running the option.

David and Brandon Carnegie have combined for over 1,100 yards of total offense, including 15 touchdowns. And on the other side of the line, Novi has 473 tackles, seven interceptions, 16 sacks and two blocked kicks.
