One family's battle with cancer

Logan Corrion is a survivor. And though he is only three years old, he's already been through a great deal in his

life Diagnosed at 18 months with a Wilm's tumor, Corrion has spent the majority of his life visiting doctors' offices and trying to be a normal little boy.

est things she's ever had to go through. "You never want to see your child go through this," said Corrion, a social worker at Novi High School. "I would have

A Wilm's turnor is a cancer of the kidneys primarily affecting children. According to the Pediatric Oncology Resource Center, Wilms accounts for about







The history of donating

 On average, more than 260 patients receive transplants through the National Marrow Donor Program each month. More than 25,000 total transplants have been done since the National Marrow Donor Program began in 1987. The first bone marrow transplant was in 1968 at the University of Minnesola. The recipient was a child with severe combined immunodeficiency disease. The donor was a sibling . In 1973 a team of physicians at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City performed the first unrelated bone marrow transplant on a 5-year-old patient suffering from severe combined immunodeficiency syndrome. In 1984 the U.S. Congress passed the National Organ Transplant Act, which included language to evaluate unrelated bone marrow transplants and the need for establishing a national donor registry.

Some of the issues listed below can be related to the age of the home or the systems in the home. However it is interesting to note that many of the 10 issues listed are techned. to water and moisture concerns

I. Improper Surface Grading and Improper Surface Graining and Drainage. By far the most frequent problem. It is responsible for the most common household aggravations, including water penetration into the basement or crawlspace. All basements will eventually lack if the water is not moved away from the foundation.

2. Improper Electrical Wiring, This includes such situations as insufficient electrical service coming into the house to meet modern day requirements. It also includes inadequate overload pro-tection, and anateur (often dangerous) iring connec



3. Roof Damage Ranked third, leaking roofs are a frequent problem. This is caused by old or damaged shingles or improp-er flashing and drainage which has

• Treating Systems. Toreet terms in this category include broken or mal-functioning controls, blocked chimneys and exhaust, dirty filters, hundidfires, which are not functioning properly, and older conventional furnace which are operating post their useful life and are a potential for carbon monoxide in the home.

5. Poor Overall Maintenance. A com-5. Foor Overall Maintenance. A com-mon problem with all homeowners. Some of the signs of poor maintenance include cracked, peeling or dirup pain-ed surfaces: crunobling masonry: makeshift wring or plumbing broken lighting fixtures and/or appliances. damage exterior trim, guters, down-spours, and driveway/walkways in need of repair. Every home needs to have TLC in order to look nice and have proper protection from weather

6. Structurally Related Problems. As a result of problems in one or more of these categories, damage is sustained by such stru ural components as foundasuch structural components as rounda-tion walls, floor joists, raffers, windows, and door headers. Having a leak go innoniced or tepaired can allow water to penetrate into the wall and create var-ious issues as a result.

nhing. Though not ranke number one problem, plumbing defects still rank high. This includes the existence of old or incompatible piping materials, as well as dripping faucets, faulty fixtures, and damages or clogged

8. Exteriors. Flaws in this category, such as exterior seals around windows, doors and wall surface joints, rately have structural significance but may pose discomfort to the occupants due to water and sit penetration. The must common oulpris are inadequate caulking and/or weather-stripping.

9. Poor Ventilation. In an effort to save energy, many homeowners have "over sealed" their homes, resulting in excessive interior moisture. Significant moisture can lead to decaying and failure of both the structural and non-structural elements. This includes interior mois-ture from bathing (bath exbaust fans), cooking(lack of having exhaust vent to exterior), and humidifiers setting to high in winter months.

10. Miscellaneous. This category includes interior components (often cosmetic in nature). Things such as cracked will plates, broken floor mold-ings, holes in walls under ainks which water pipes come through, cracked win-dow panes, and windows which have failed seals (when moisture gets between the glass and the window looks flogg)). These can lead to an inefficient heating
