Town Center tenants on the move

Since Mervyn's closed at Novi Town Center two years ago, the future of the store-front has been a long-standing question mark in the community. Novi may soon have some



said Jim Clear, manager of the Novi Town Center, "We're relocating several tenants for the purpose of redevelopment."

Although Clear couldn't specify what those redevelopments will include the Town

fy what those redevelopments will include, several of the Town Center's remaining tenants along the southeastern edge weighed in on the future of their businesses and the complex.

"They're blowing up this whole side," said Jane Holtz, inventory manager at New Northville Diamond Jewelry. "For three years, it was supposed to be a Super Target, but they backed out."

Although Holiz, who has worked in the Town Center for six years, didn't know what would be replacing the southeastern store-fronts, she said the changes will move the remaining businesses closer together elsewhere in the complex as others leave the devel-

complex as others leave the oeveropment.

salon and day spa out of Novi in

The fate of Novi's Fuerst Farm up for discussion

McKenna Associates, Inc., the planning consultants hired to review the Fuerst Farm property on the southeast corner of Taft, and 10 Mile roads, will present their recommendations to coun-

cil at Monday's meeting.

Due to a full agenda, the meeting will begin an hour early, with McKenna's presenta-

eany, with Mickenna's presenta-tion expected at 6 p.m.

McKenna's report, which can be viewed on the city Web site at www.cityofnovi.org, includes two different concepts for the cityoward property.

in a state of disrepair.

Along with restoring the buildings for multi-purpose community uses such as an educational facility, theater, museum and meeting space, Concept 'A' includes the addition of an entryway plaza, amphitheater and common area.

According to the report, the proposed cost for the restoration

project is \$3.3 million.

Alternatively, Concept 'B' introduces the idea of adaptive reuse of the site, eliminating the barns and house to create a more modern campus. In place of the existing facili-

ties, the plan suggests raising a new multi-use building with dis-play area, kitchen, storage space and 125-person room with a

stage.
Concept 'B' also includes an entryway plaza, amphitheater and common area

The report projects a slightly lower cost for Concept 'B,' suggesting the city put the barns on the market.

But his Finishay injury's situation was a little different, as Lauria and the Noyi Police Ail Stars took to the ice to battle the Detroit Red Wings Alumni team at Noyi Ice Arena.

Although the Red Wings Although the Red Wings Alumni ranged in age from 37-64, they were still dangerous with the stick and managed to defeat the Novi Police 9-5.

The score wasn't the focal point of the night however, as a portion of the proceeds from the game went to Ted Clay, a city employee who does vehicle maintenance for Novi Police, who lost his home and three family pets in a fire March 24.

The remaining proceeds will go to Novi community groups, such as Novi Parks, Novi Youth Assistance and senior programs.

Last year, the event raised about \$6,000. Kris Barnes, general manager of the Novi Ice Arena, estimated between 200-300 people showed up last year.

"(Attendance) was a little down from last year. Ticket sales were up, but attendance was down, probably because of the weather," said Detective Kristie Gruenwald, who organized the event.

The fire at Clay's Farmington home started when a pet rabbit's heating lamp set things ablaze, according to Gruenwald, All family members and one of the pets escaped unharmed. Prior to the game, Novi Police and other city
