With a new year set to begin Tuesday, some of Novi's schools are attempting to fix traffic con-gestion problems near their buildings.

With so many students dropped off during bus arrival times, the sight of kids running

across the street among heavy traffic hasn't been uncommon in recent years.

#### Meadow-ing with mayhem
