where the building is going." The west lot will be closed for the duration of the project. Alternate parking will be avail-able in the north and east lots of the library, and the north lot of Novi High School.

"We're working with the schools to make this transition as smooth as possible," Farkas said, adding

there is a sidewalk adjacent to 10 Mile that connects the high school lot to the library's front lot. "The main entrance to the building will always be available and the walkup book return will remain open." From Feb. 16-28, the main drive From Feb. 16-28, the main drive into the library and some of the front parking spaces are expected to be temporarily closed. During that two-week span, patrons will enter the library via Wildcat Drive. "Some of the parking spaces in the library's north lot will be unavailable for approximately two weeks, but otherwise we expect

weeks, but otherwise we expect to have 62 spaces, including eight handicap accessible spots, avail-able in the library's north and east lots throughout the project, plus

the additional spaces in the school lot," said Assistant Director Mary Ellen Mulcrone. The east gate of the high school

lot will be open during library hours to keep traffic moving. Signs directing traffic will be

posted throughout the construc-tion process, which is slated for completion summer 2010. Farkas said the library sees the highest traffic volume 10 a.m. to

"We've got a full plate of pro-grams we're making available," she said, anticipating no changes to services and programming due to construction.

"This is not one Rotary club's mission, this is all Rotarians' mission worldwide," Barrons said. "It is just two people who had



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Second suspect confirmed in Novi man's hit-and-run death

The Walled Lake Police Department confirmed a sec-ond vehicle was involved in Sunday's hit-and-run death of Novi resident Brian Latuszek. Latuszek, 40, was struck and killed just after midnight Feb. 8, while walking on Pontiac Trail, west of West Park Drive in Walled Lake. Police said they don't see

much foot traffic in the area, but Latuszek lived in the Portsmouth Apartment complex near the scene of the accilent,

The driver of the first vehicle that struck the victim is cur-rently in custody, but police are

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still searching for the second suspect, who left the scene of the accident.

Voted millage for general obligation

New limited voted millage (suggested 25-year limit) Charter amendment to increase existing

or add new permanent millage Combination - charter amendment for

headlee override return current millage to .5 mills or add new permanent millage PLUS a new voted millage for debt.

It appears council members are leaning toward the second option - a limited voted millage.

Tuesday will mark the last opportunity to be involved on the really nuts-and-bolts level, where financing and ballot proposal language is designed. Only two residents spoke earlier this week

at the special city council meeting regarding the Signature Park, where conceptual plans were revealed and finances were discussed. And, following two days in the community asking residents their opinions on the subject, we came up empty handed with how residents feel about the proposed develop-



Patterson's record in **Oakland speaks for itself**

akland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson gave his annual State of the County speech Feb. 3 -- at exactly the same time Governor Jennifer Granholm gave her State of the State address. Other than some snarky comments about the simultaneous scheduling, Patterson's talk received far less notice than Granholm's. That's only fair; Oakland County has 1.2 million people; the whole state, around 10 million.

non people; the whole state, around 10 million. But for these who paid attention to both, the tone couldn't have been more different. The governor talked about how Michigan's economy has gone from "bad to worse," hinted at the projected huge state budget deficit for the com-ion force way and meaned activity in a bast ng fiscal year and expressed optimism about energy and "alternative energy jobs." She also said Lt. Gov. John Cherry will head a "comprehensive effort to dramatically change the size and shape of state government," a task that may not be done till after she leaves office. To be sure, Patterson also talked about "the perfect storm" battering Michigan, but defiant-ly pledged that "Oakland County intends to do more than just ride out the storm" and plans to lead "this state out of these dark and desperate days into the sunlight of new growth, opportunity and prosperity." He pointed out that Oakland's books are balanced for 2009 and 2010, the result of being the only county in Michigan that operates on a

the one rolling budget. By contrast, the state and most municipalities budget on a year-to-year basis, which leaves them with "certainly no room to implement long-range strategy." But the contrasts with the state go much farther. Oakland County has a AAA bond rating on Wall Street, which keeps borrowing costs low. It's the first county in the nation to fully fund retiree health care. Oakland took the lead in converting employees to a defined contribu-tion pension system, instead of the old, very expensive defined benefit program. And county employees pay raises have been trimmed in the face of the ongoing crisis. By contrast, consider neighboring Macomb

County (struggling with a \$20 million budget deficit) and Wayne County (forced to cut spending by 20 percent.) Patterson attributes all this financial san-ity and success to his economic team, led by Deputy County Executive Bob Daddow, plainly a whiz-bang finance and budget exp Anybody can manage in good times," said development of a sense of self-worth,

Patterson. "It's the tough times that will test us."

"I have asked numerous chief executives in the private sector just what would happen if their financial folks reported all is well in October and came up with unfavor-able numbers such as these just 60 days later.
