# **50's Festival canceled** for '09; economy cited

The Michigan 50's Festival board of directors announced the festival, origi-nally planned for July 2009, will be

postponed for one year. Festival president Lori Kapleczak cited economic conditions as the main

"After careful consideration it was determined that in order for us to maintain the quality event that residents of Novi have come to enjoy over the last 21 years, we need the support of the business community," she stated in a press release. "During these tough economic times, it is increasingly difficult for businesses to find extra monies to support our community event." According to Robert McCann, presi-

dent of Bright House Networks and vice president of the festival board, the festival has not missed a year in the

past 21 years. Bright House was one of the festival's largest sponsors.

It is estimated that it takes up to

\$150,000 annually to produce the event, and 100 percent of the net pro-ceeds go back to the community.

"This is by no means a cancellation of this outstanding event, sim-ply a delay in order for the Board of Directors to spend more time raising funds for future events," Kapleczak stated. "The Novi business community has been staunch supporters for many years, and we know they will be back when times warrant."

Kapleczak said she hopes the delay

will give organizers the opportunity to move the festival to a permanent venue, such as the proposed Signature Park at 11 Mile and Beck roads should voters support the ballot proposal for creation of the park during the May ection. City of Novi Mayor David Landry

### Local business boosts energy drink market

"It's pretty carefully balanced," Sperber said.

The functionality of the product is targeted toward working adults.
"It's small. You don't have to sit

there and nurse a 16-ounce drink," he said, "It's not a fashion statement, it's just something you take when you're

tired at 2 in the afternoon, and you

can't take a nap on the job."

5-Hour Energy also comes in Extra Strength and Decaffeinated.

"We came out with a decaf version for the people who are sensitive to caffeine," Sperber said. "Currently, there are no products on the market for the?"

gas stations and grocery stores, among others.







### When Medicare Says No

Dear Savvy Senior, What do you do when Medicare won't pay for son thing that they've covered in the past? Denied Dav

Dear Dave

If you think Medicare should have paid for, or did not pay enough for, an item or service you received, you can appeal. And you'll be happy to know that most people win, so it's definitely worth your time. Here's what you should know.

According to the Medicare Rights Center, 80 percent of Medicare Part A appeals and 92 percent percent of Medicare Part A appeals and 92 percent of Part B appeals turn out in favor of the person appealing. The main reason for the high success rate is because many denials are a result of simple billing code ervors made in the doctors office. But its also important to keep in mind that Medicare will only cover goods and services that are deemed "medically

HOW TO APPEAL

If you have Original Medicare (Part A or Part B)

start with your Medicare Summary Notice (MSN) that you received in the mail. This statement should list all of the services, supplies and equipment billed to Medicare for your medical treatment. This notice should also tell you why any specific claim was denied Circle the items you're disputing and the reason why. Then write "Please Review" on the bottom of your MSN, sign the back and provide your telephone num-ber, and send it by certified mail or with delivery con-

tirmation to the address on the form.

You'll also want to include any information (like a letter of support) from the doctor or hospital about why the disputed service was medically necessary. And be sure to make photocopies and records of all communications, whether written or oral with Medicare concerning your denial, as a backup. You have 120 days from the date on the MSN to submit a

appear.

If you're unhappy with the response you get back from Medicare, you can appeal to the next level which is a Qualified Independent Contractor, and if you are still unhappy, you can take it to an Administrative Law Judge. The final internal step is the Medicare Appeals Court, but, after that, denials still can be challenged in the Federal District Court.

### PRIVATE APPEALS

If you're enrolled in Medicare Advantage (Medicare's private plans, like an HMO or PPO) the Ordeneares private plants, nice an Fixed or FryO free appeals process is slightly different. One difference is that you have only 60 days from the date on the denial notice to file an appeal. Your health plan will give you the steps you need to take to appeal a denied claim, with the first step going directly to the plan for reconsideration. If it doesn't decide in your favor, you can have it reviewed by an independent organization that works for Medicare, not for the plan.

APPEALING PART D If you're in a Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plan, and you find out that your plan woult pay for a drug you think should be covered, you have options here too. Your first step is for you or your doctor to call or write your drug plan and request a written explanation (called a "coverage determination") o why they won't cover your particular medicine. It's best to do it in writing with your doctor's statement explaining the medical necessity of your prescription. If you aren't satisfied with their answer, you can appeal directly to the plan. If that fails, you

can request a reconsideration from an indepen-dent review entity. Check your plan's membership materials or contact your plan for details on how to ppeal, or see www.medicare.gov/publications/pubs/

medicare gov and click on "Medicare Appeals." You can also get help through your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) which pro-vides free Medicare counseling to beneficiaries and their families and can help you understand the billing process and even file your appeal for you. To locate your local SHIP, go to www.shiptalk.org or call Medicare at (800) 633-4227. Some other great resources that can belo if you have a question or complaint are your Quality Improvement Organization (to find your area office see www.medgic.org - click on "QIO Listings"), and the Medicare Rights Center which offers a consumer hotline at (800) 333-4114.

## **Board of Review** is good option for homeowners

If you are a homeowner in Novi, you should have received your property tax assessment from the city by now. Considering property values have plummeted in recent years, you may not be happy with your tax bill. You're not alone. Most homeowners will see an increased tax bill. That's largely a result of Proposal A, which

was passed years ago to prevent residents from being taxed out of their homes. Although the state equalized value (SEV) of most homes has come down, the taxable value has steadily risen, and will continue to do so at the rate of inflation or 5 percent annually (whichever is lower) until those two totals inter

Despite this formula, which for years worked in favor of property owners, most residents won't be happy to see their tax bill go up in this economy. The Assessor's Office has been receiving a steady stream of calls from people questioning their tax assessment.

If you feel your bill is too high, or out of whack vith reality, there is an option: appealing to Novi's Board of Review, which has the authority

This week, the city of Novi Board of Review is holding hearings until all property owners with appointments have been heard.


Novi City Assessor Glenn Lemmon said about 20 percent of the residential property owners who appealed last year via a hearing or letter received some relief.

But homeowners should be prepared if they are coming before the Board of Review this

Bringing documents like a recent home appraisal from a lending institution or a list of homes recently sold in your neighborhood and what they sold for will be helpful. Homeowners may also check with the Assessor's Office to make sure all the data for their home is corion rect, so people aren't being assessed for own-ing a swimming pool if they don't have one, for

People can also get their tax bill lowered for things like financial hardship. If you do go before the Board of Review and you don't like the decision it hands down, you do have another option, and that is appealing it to the Michigan Tax Tribunal.
