Ask any resident how much they pay in prop-erty taxes, and they will likely know the dollar amount. But how many actually know what their taxes are used for?

Novi tax payers are currently paying the City for five voter approved millages, which equates to about 2 mills of the City's overall 10.54 millage rate.

The existing debt includes street bonds, refunding debt and construction of the new library, which was approved by voters in Narmshee 0007 November 2007. On May 5, Novi voters will be faced with

making a financial decision to either support or oppose the .5 mill increase to the parks, recre-ation and forestry levy, for the development of a Signature Park.


Signature Park. In the past 10 years, City Manager Clay Pearson said there were three millage questions that did not pass. A road millage in 1999, a fire millage in 2000 and a library millage in 2001. For about 10 years, the City has maintained

The same nill gerate, the city has institutined the same nill gerate, but if the proposal is approved, the rate would increase to 10.87 in the upcoming budget year. "We've got a largeted total city rate and that's what the recommendation is for 2009-10,"

Pearson said.

City officials propose offsetting an overall .5 mill increase by prioritizing budget items and paying off existing debt.

The 25-year limited millage proposal, which translates to an estimated increase of about \$75





Budget tops board agenda tonight

Officials begin talks of \$2 million in cuts

This is the first story in a series focusing on the Novi Community Schools district's 2009-10 budget.

The Novi Community School board of education meeting is expected to draw standing-room-only crowds tonight, as \$2.4 million in proposed district-wide cuts are discussed for the first time.

Also up for discussion is \$1.09 million in revenue enhancements to the 2009-10 district budget.

"Revenues are going down, expenses are going up," said

Gail Credit, assistant super intendent for business and operations. Credit said the dire eco-

nomic equation results from an increase in district expenses and a decline in stu-dent enrollment and state aid. About 80 percent of district revenue comes from the State per pupil foundation allowance

Credit said this year, the district has experienced a decrease in enrollment of 114 students. About 240 students have left the district between 2007-09.

The bulk of the proposed reductions are cuts or modifications to programs and staffing. One proposed change includes switching the high

This will be the first opportunity to discuss \$2.4 million of reductions and \$1.09 million in revenue enhancements to the 2009-10 district budget.

Along with tonight's meeting, there will be a public forum on April 30, a special board meet-ing on Saturday, May 2, and the May 7 Board of Education regular meeting. All are opportunities

to review the district's proposed budget. The bulk of the reductions are cuts or modifications to programs and staffing. One proposed change includes changing the

high school schedule to a six-period day, facilitating the elimination of 11 teachers. Eliminating middle school team teaching.

another proposal, would result in the elimination of seven teachers. Reducing literacy specialists, a middle school administrator and a high school career resource

specialist are also on the list. Revenue enhancements include implement

ing a club fee at Novi Meadows, increasing high school pay-to-participate sports fees and raising elementary food prices.

A backup list of reductions on the district's Web site features enforcing one-mile elementary and middle school walk zones, privatization of services and eliminating high school theater and elementary school music, physical education and art. District administrators stress these are only

recommendations, and no action will be taken until the May 7 Board of Education meeting.

Novi Community Schools is facing a serious financial situation. And, these are serious proposals. The district must, by June 30, account for declines in enrollment and per pupil state aid in

these public participation opportunities. Maintaining the quality education the district is known for is in the best interest of all area residents as we maneuver through these dire economic times.





a means of cardiovascular condi-

tioning and burning of calories, as

sauna is scarce. The premise behind infrared saunas burning up to 600 calories in 30 minutes is that infrared light emitted from the souna penetrates the skin and heats up the internal organs, leading to an increase in calories burned. It has never been researched whether this vould lead to an excessive amount of calories burned and weight loss. With that said, the effects of sau nas on weight loss are due to a loss of water from sweating, not actual fat loss. Bottom line, forget it for fat

Marking and lifting a ball


Marking a golf ball seems to be a simple thing, but most of us haven't spent much time reading the rules dealing with marking. For example most golfers believe that they have to mark the ball on a cart path before the lift it to take relief, but that is not the case. Rule 20-1 says you only need to mark a ball before lifting it if you are going to have to put it back (replace it). That would be the case on the putting green, or if someone asks you to lift your ball because it interferes ith his or her shot. But when you ar taking relief from a cart part, you not going to have to replace the ball on the path -you are going to drop it somewhere else. Therefore, you do not position of the ball. have to mark it. You can, but it is not necessary. This is also true if you are taking relief from any other imm obstruction, or abnormal ground conditions such as casual water, ground under repair, or a hole made by a burrowing animal. A ball may be lifted by the player, his or her partner or another person authorized by the player (such as the player's caddie). Just as a side note here it may be replaced by the player, his or her partner or the person who lifted it. So you can see that if a caddie lifts the ball, the player may replace it. But if the player lifts the ball, the caddie may not replace it. If a fellow competitor lifts our ball without your authority during a stroke play, there is still no penalty and the ball gets replaced. However, in

match play, if your opponent lifts your ball without your authority, he gets a one stroke penalty. When marking a ball on the green, the the ball must be replaced. marker may be placed behind, to the side of or in front of the ball as long as its new location!

You may measure from the side of the ball or from the ball-marker, as long as you reverse the exact same process to get the ball back on the spot from which it was lifted. What happens if the ball or ball-

marker is accidentally moved in this marking/lifting process? There is no penalty provided the movement of the ball or marker is directly attributable to the specific act of marking/lifting. That means if you nudge the ball forward as you are marking, you do not have a problem But, if you are walking up to mark you
