Cornelius could not recall the last time the City held a special election, but said the major difference vot-ers will notice is the combination of precincts located in the same polling location.

There is no change to the physical location of any precinets," she said explaining precinets 1 and 2 will remain at Meadowbrook Congregational Church, but voters will cast their ballots in one area, as opposed to being divided into two separate precinct groups. The same goes for precincts 6 and 7 at Holy Family Catholic Church; precincts 9 and 11 at Brightmoor Christian Church; precincts 16 and 17 at the Novi Civic Center; and precincts 20 and 21 at Deerfield Elementary. 
of food, so we want to surpass that

Our mayor eloquently wrote in a letter to resi-dents about why the May 5 parks and recre-ation .5-mill ballot proposal, intended to build a Signature Park, is a need and not a want.

He stated, businesses locate to communities that offer recreational opportunities for their workers. Parks attract businesses and jobs. Workers purchase homes and patronize businesses. This in turn maintains a healthy tax base and holds up the value of our homes.

But, we do have many amenities in existence that we feel offer a large draw. One that comes to mind is Lakeshore Park.

There are not many communities that encompass such a beautiful park, containing open space and trails, with a lakefront beach.

And for those not focused on parks, Novi offers i state-of-the-art hospital, mall anchored by Nordstrom's, convenient access to major express ways and, what we believe is the No. 1 draw, a top-rated school district.

Novi Community Schools district is one of the top-rated districts in the state of Michigan, if not the nation.

For these reasons, we believe the construction of a Signature Park, which city officials say is the reason they are proposing the .5-mill increase on May 5, is a want and not a need. Would a Signature Park be nice for Novi?

Absolutely. One model offered by city officials is Summit

on the Park in Canton. They said ours, too, would be a signature destination, including a full array of recreation opportunities, structured programs and activities, as well as festivals and events for all ages. Initial development includes trails, a multi-generational recreation center (theater gymnasiums, wellness area, multi-use activ-ity space), sprayground/outdoor ice skating area, nunity festival area and outdoor sports fields (cricket, soccer, football).

But in this economy, we cannot say the city needs a Signature Park. And if residents want what is proposed, they should vote "yes." We is is an individual decision.

We don't argue the city needs more of its own gymnasium space, and that a permanent theater would be a benefit to Novi's program.

It is a valid point that it is hard to use the school's theater space, which is offered when the district doesn't need it. Also, it would be easier for the theater department to crect a set that could remain in place.

But a theater may be better suited in a more heavily trafficked area such as Main Street. And. could a corporate or residential donor opportu nity be available?

In Northville, The Tipping Pointe Theatre was created in the City's downtown thanks to the generosity of Northville residents.

So many are without jobs, or lesser paying jobs than what they are accustomed to.

To those residents, saying passage of this proposal would only cost a homeowner with a \$300,000 market value home about \$75 a year seems insurmountable.

Mayor David Landry said we must do some thing about this economy, and we can by boosting the value of our homes with this proposal. We encourage all voters to go the City Web site and

look at the plans for the proposed Signature Park. The plans are available and the city's financing

proposals are also presented through five years. These dollar amounts include operating costs. This is another important aspect of the plan, that must be considered before making your

decision on May 5. The mayor states, tax revenue from businesses ntial property pays for the long term
