# Clerk pleased with election day turnout, flow

## Republicans prove to be top party choice

The winning candidates were not the only ones celebrating a successful election last Tuesday.

Novi City Clerk Maryanne Cornelius and her team of employees and volunteer workers were able to efficiently push residents through the polls with little wait time during the day and wrapped up final results by 10 p.m.

Cornelius said changes to the software precinct workers used to check in voters as a result of some issues during the August primary made the process flow much smoother.

"Every worker came back smiling and happy," she said. "This was fantastic. I consider it a very successful election when workers are not complaining." In the majority of Novi's precincts, the wait time maxed out at about 10 minutes, with 52 percent of the regis-

tered voters in the city turning out. Cornelius said she predicted voter turnout would be around 50 percent for the midterm election, up

from the 24 percent who showed in August. Still, the 52-percent turnout is 10 percent lower than the most recent

midterm election in 2006, but Cornelius was unable to determine why that number was so high. The top precinct Tuesday in Novi

was No. 10, in which 77 percent of the registered voters came to the polls. The lowest number was Precinct 12, which posted just 29-percent voter turnout.

#### **UP NEXT**

Two of Novi's local winners, Kathy Crawford and Jason Manar, will have to wait a little while before officially jumping into their new roles.

Crawford, who serves on the Novi City Council, will likely remain in that role until late November, while also working in her new position on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners serving District 9. She will be sworn in Jan. 5.

Manar is the lone new face on the Novi Board of Education, and he will take over Jan. 6 for Katie Raeon.

State Rep. Hugh Crawford is the lone incumbent in the area and it was back to business as usual for him in Lansing as soon as the election ended.

The other item Novi voters saw on their ballot was the sinking fund millage renewal, which 58 percent of voters were in favor of.

Of the 19,110 people who voted in Novi, 4,575 did so via absentee ballot. Cornelius employed an absentee counting board to handle those ballots and report the results.

"I cannot tell you the number of people who asked us if we count these or just if it is close," Cornelius said, citing that it is required by the state. "We always count them."

## Council wants replacement for Crawford in place by December

Majority vote needed to fill position

The Novi City Council moved forward Monday with its search for a replacement for outgoing council member Kathy Crawford.

Crawford, who was elected to council in 2007, successfully won a seat on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners in last Tuesday's general election. She will be serving the 9th district, which includes the cities of Novi, Northville and Novi Township, for the next two ears.

The lifelong Novi resident also decided to step down from her seat on city council

Landry said the goal is to get the new person in place in early December so they have a month to prepare for January's goal setting session and budget

The city is soliciting applications for the position until 4 p.m. on Nov. 23. There will be a special council meeting at 7 p.m. on Nov. 29 to conduct interviews, and a new member is expected to be appointed on Dec. 6.



## Film credit reform blueprint introduced

recently introduced a legislative blueprint for the next governor and Legislature on how to reform the Michigan ilm credit program to make it sustainable and affordable.

Similar to Governor-elect Rick Snyder's stated approach, mv legislation would cap but keep the credits. Snyder said, How do we scale it back in erms of size and scope so t can still work to create a oositive industry in the long term but at a lower cost to the state?" Well, I have a plan. Senate Bill 1571 would phase down the film production credit over two years. It would cap the credit at \$80 million for 2011 and \$40 million for 2012, and reduce the top 42 percent credit for movies produced in core communities to 28 percent in 2011 and 14 per-

cent in 2012. My plan would also give an additional credit on actual construction of studios and film offices and cut in half the maximum salary that can qualify for the refundable credit to \$1 million.

My reform followed a second hearing on a Senate Fiscal Agency (SFA) report that raised serious questions about the effectiveness of Michigan's film credit program to create jobs. The report also illustrated the importance of enacting my film credit transparency measures, Senate Bills 796 and 889, which have been languishing in the House for almost a year. Without access to information, legislators cannot measure the effectiveness of the incentives. The agency's issue paper

on the film credits estimated the cost of the incentives to be more than \$193,000 per direct job created in 2009. The report states "The nature of the credit and the resulting activity is such that under current (and any realistic) tax rate the State will never he able to make the credit "pay for itself" from a State revenue

film credits were signed into law. According to the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, since the film credit was adopted in 2008, Michigan jobs in those sectors fell from 5,887 positions in April 2008

to 5,331 jobs in March 2010. Proponents of the film credits have offered many fantastic, anecdotal stories about the film incentives, but they

did not bring any tangible evidence refuting the SFA findings. They fail to address the cost-benefit to the state, next year's expected budget deficit or the resulting cuts to priorities like roads and schools that are needed to pay for the credit's \$137 million price tag.

The film production credit is an unaffordable subsidy. Film companies pay no state business taxes because the incentives are refundable, which eliminates their tax liability and results in the state sending them a check to subsidize up to 42 percent of a film's cost

We're going to get our business done and move on. Lame Duck, in my experience, is the worst time to conduct public policy."

# Veterans Day

## Our service members deserve our thanks, prayers

On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, a temporary cessation of hostilities was declared between the Allied nations and Germany in the First World War, then known as "the Great War." Commemorated as Armistice Day beginning the following year, Nov. 11 now has become the day that Americans pause to give thanks to the men and women who have answered the call to duty and served in the armed forces.

Today is Nov. 11, Veterans Day. At flag poles and veterans memorials, people will gather for ceremonies recalling the bravery of soldiers, sailors and Marines. Today we are a country at war, and the cost of our War on Terror since Sept. 11, 2001. is mind-boggling. In economic terms, our country has spent more than \$700 billion on the military operations. If you look at that amount as a stack of \$100 bills, the cost of those two wars, if those bills were laid out end-to-end, would circle the earth almost 34 times

But the ultimate cost of war is something much more valuable – the lives of our service men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice. More than 1,200 Americans have died since Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan was launched in October 2001. The war with Iraq, which was declared over Aug. 31, took another 4,422 American lives. The wounded in both wars is well in excess of 34,000.

Although we may be weary of fight, it is important to honor our service men and women who risk their lives to defend our freedoms now and in wars in the past. Hundreds of thousands of young men and women have put themselves in harm's way. It's up to us to recognize their efforts.

If Veterans Day has a message, it's to remind us of the human costs. As Rod Powers on the military page of about.com wrote: "One thing is certain. The one thing we can never forget is the cost of war - any war - is high. The price tag is not measured only in dollars. It's measured in the loss of the most valuable asset of all - the price of war is measured in the loss of human lives."

Our troops depend upon our unwavering support. We must give them nothing less. It is a lesson we learned in the Korean and Vietnam wars. Our veterans deserve our thanks. Because of their sacrifices, we remain the land of the free and the home of the brave.



Response to Bush tax cuts The distortion of statistics in this letter led me to respond with facts that are contextual rather than a manipulation of data to make a point. Mr. Lee stated Reagan's GDP growth rate was three times greater than Clinton. I believe Mr. Lee is using derivatives of rates of change to exaggerate the point. In fact, under Reagan the GDP went from \$3.126 trillion to \$5.100 trillion or an increase of 63.1 percent. Under Clinton the GDP went from \$6.667 trillion to \$9.951 trillion or an increase of 49.3 percent. The GDP did increase more under Reagan, but at what expense? Over Reagan's presidency the National debt increased three Republican administrations the national debt rose by \$9.2 trillion, while under Clinton the national debt decreased from 68 percent of GDP to 58 percent of GDP. The Reagan and Bush tax cuts just led to larger deficits as revenues lagged expenses by significant amounts. The next point made by Mr. Lee is that Reagan

added 15 times more jobs than Clinton. Since Reagan had periods of 10+ percent unemployment early in his presidency and it dropped to 6 percent during his last year, he had plenty of opportunity for adding new jobs. In contrast, Clinton started with a 7 percent unemployment rate which dropped to 4.5 percent in his final year. Which statistic is better?

Mr. Lee states that Reagan added \$2,683 to the pockets of Americans while Clinton

#### decreased income by \$2,127. I don't know where this comes from since the average income under Reagan was \$25,031 and under Clinton \$30,073 (in 2000 dollars). Plus, under Reagan the incomes of the top 20 percent of the people increased by 27 percent while the middle 40 percent increased only 11.6 percent. Under Clinton the incomes of the middle 40 percent increased

15.2 percent while that of the top 20 percent increased 19 percent. Finally, Mr. Lee claims that Reagan's accelerated rate of federal revenue increase was 9.5 times more than Clinton's. But, the actual numbers reveal that revenues under Reagan averaged about 29 percent of GDP from year to year and Clinton's revenues increased to 31 percent of GDP. Clinton also decreased spending from 33.7 to 32.3 percent of GDP.



## additional signage

In an effort to assist the Novi business community and promote holiday season sales, the City of Novi is providing a one-time, additional business sign allowance from Nov. 26-Dec. 26. The Novi City Council passed a resolution giving businesses the opportunity to take advan-tage of "temporary promotional event" signage. Rules for the sign allowance

To provide fairness and to maintain safe and attractive business areas, the following rules

• No City permit or fees are required for the additional sign, but interested businesses must complete the registration form inside this newsletter and return it to the Community Development Department prior to sign placement to participate in the one-time offering. • Each sign meeting the criteria below will be permitted from Friday, Nov. 26-Sunday, Dec. 26. Each sign shall be removed immediately

upon the expiration of this approval. • One additional sign per business registered with the City of Novi is permitted. • The sign must be a portable sign meaning a freestanding sign not permanently anchored or secured to either a building or the ground, such

as A-frame poles temporarily driven into the

ground and T-shaped signs in the nature of a traditional "for sale" sign. • The sign can be up to 24 square feet in area

and not in excess of six feet in height. • The sign must not be placed on public property or in the public road right-of-way or any road easement. To determine public property, behind the sidewalk is generally a good indicator of right-of-way lines. Tenants will need to coordinate and receive permission from property owners.

The City will not become involved in any leasee-leasor discussions. The signs must be placed on the same private property as the business being promoted. Be aware to not block sight lines for drivers entering and exiting the business area. The City reserves the right to direct changes to sign placement as required to maintain safety.

Before any sign is placed, a registration form must be completed and returned to the City of Novi, 45175 Ŵ. Ten Mile Road, Novi, MI 48375. For more information or to download the registration form, visit InvestNovi.org.
