

# City shares plan of attack for big storm

Crews expected to start clearing subdivisions today



The city of Novi is asking residents to "be patient" as snow removal crews will likely be working until the weekend to ensure all major and neighborhood roads in the city are

the National Weather Service was calling for more than a foot of snow that was expect ed to start Tuesday evening and continue until Wednesday

Rob Hayes, public services director for the city of Novi, said Tuesday morning they plan on having snow plows on pian on having show plows or the road as soon as the snow starts falling, and crews will sleep at the department of public services or fire station No. 1 overnight.

"I anticipate if we get the 12 inches of snow forecasted it is going to take us the bet-ter part of Wednesday and Wednesday evening before Wednesday evening before we have (the major roads) cleared," he said. "I don't think we will be getting into any subdivisions until Thursday at the soonest, and

crews will work around the clock until the subdivisions

are cleared." The city will employ three crews, with an average of eight employees per crew, to take on the storm and clear the 500 lane miles of pavement in the city. Hayes also expects to have the city's 16 plow trucks on the road the entire time as well.

A charge of possessing a firearm while intoxicated against former state Speake of the House Craig DeRoche was tossed out of court today with 52-1 District Judge Brian MacKenzie stating that the gun isn't negated inst because

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

# Parkview Elementary putting students in charge

Parkview Elementary hosted an event Jan. 25 to share a leadership and character building process they are piloting throughout the school that helps kids learn how to be in charge of their own success and become leaders of their own lives. Parkview Principal Jenifer Michos and her staff are leading the way for Parkview and hoping to create a movement toward implementing the program throughout our K-6 schools. She believes that in order to proaclively prepare students for today's and tomor row's world, we must be deliberate with a common language to equip students with the skills that parents and businesses want. "We want children to have the influence, attitude adaptability, personal management, and group effectiveness skills that will set them

apart from mediocrity," said Michos. "These new skills must be acquired by all students." Fifty people attended the 90-minute sesch included an overview of the goal of a leadership school and the history of the movement, followed by short, four-mir "speed sharing" sessions in which attendees

vere introduced to each of the seven habits The energy and response was really positive," said Heather Kirby, Parkview PTO president. "The parents of Novi are excited about this for themselves and their children. Empowering our children by helping them live the seven habits would provide such an amazing foundation of character and morale. We are planning another informa-

The goal is to teach students skills that will help them believe in themselves and be confident that they have the tools to create success for themselves. Lessons focus on things like being proactive, listening and inderstanding others, and thinking abou what they need to do to keep themselves happy and healthy. They are encouraged to ember to "stop and think before reactple. Students are then encouraged to use what they've learned in all aspects of their school and home lives.

Parkview has trained eight teachers formally in the seven habits, and is rolling out this shift in culture across all grades. The first graders began the school year introducing The seven habits within their classrooms. First grade teacher Bridget Zahradnik has been trained in the seven habits two times and is very passionate about teaching these timeless principles to children. She has been teaching elementary school for 14 years. She says she can see the kids making positive changes in their thoughts and actions.

"I truly believe that all children should have the opportunity to learn the timeless principles of the seven habits because it has had such a profound impact in my own life positive impact it has had on the students

Parents were enthusiastic about what they learned about how these lessons are benefi-cial for elementary school kids. Parkview parent Tracy Richereek said, "Even though the seven habits were originally intended for adults. I believe the messages are just as mportant for kids. I wish that my elementary school teachers would have taught me about setting priorities, working together for a common goal, and being responsible for the choices I made. 

# Supplies low, so blood drives are

The treacherous winter weather throughout much of the United States over the last few veeks has caused horrific driving conditions and power outages. But these winter storms have had another consequence that was more subtle, though no less important: their impact on our nation's blood supply.

with blood supplies already low the American Red Cross has seen its efforts hindered, halted or re-routed by the storms. Some 300 blood drives have been cancelled so far, causing a shortfall of more than 14,000 pints of blood since January I. To this week's

cancer patients and accident victims, who will

require anywhere from one to 40 pints in their treatment, that loss could be significant. Additionally, the supply of type O-negative blood at the American Red Cross has dro to critical levels. Currently the local Red Cross is not able to fully fill requests from hospitals for type O-negative, and is moving blood among hospitals to where it is needed most while sup-

plies are critically low.



The man who succeeds Peter Dion as superintendent of Novi schools will have his hands full, to say the least. We'll know who that is tonight when the Novi Board of Education picks either Shawn Lewis-Lakin or Steve

- Here are some of things one of them will deal with:
- Nearly 6,300 students
- 650 employees

Those are the givens, the easy part. Not so much for

· A general fund budget of \$71 million that can sway drastically up or down, depending on how much the State of Michigan decides to give ... or take. It also fluctuates according to the economy; the number of students; and increases in the district's health care costs And he'll get to deal with it every year.

 Community expectations: How do you keep up the outstanding reputation of the district, which attracts people to Novi? How do you maintain programs and opportunities for students in a climate of having to cut

 Assessment and accountability are going to play bigger roles in education with less mandates from the state and more from the feds.

Novi's diverse population is one of the great things about the district, but it's also a huge challenge. As we continue to diversify, more resources are needed.

· The succession plan for the district's new administrators is in place, but the new superintendent will have to jump right in to that selection process as new seats are to be filled by July 1.

· He'll have to learn the complex culture of the Novi

community quickly.

October began this entire selection process of finding the next person to administer the Novi school district - to be accountable for the safety of its students, its academic programs, and its budget. Search consultants were interviewed and one was eventually chosen to develop a candidate profile iscreen applicants and ther present five worthy individuals to the board.

And now we're down to two - both are currently superintendents, and both have said they want to end their careers here. What super wouldn't want to? Yes, the expectations and challenges are extremely high here, but so are the rewards.



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



## Michigan retailers upheat to start 2011

The latest Michigan Retail Index survey confirms what many believed: the 2010 holiday shopping season was the best in more than a decade for Michigan retailers.

More than three out of four retailers (76) percent) reported sales gains over the previous vear, with more than half reporting increases greater than 5 percent. The average gain for survey respondents was 11 percent, highest since 1994, the first year of the survey conduct ed by Michigan Retailers Association (MRA) and the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

"The season started strong, posting excellent numbers in November and good numbers in December," said James P. Hallan, MRA president and chief executive officer. "This was the year shoppers' spending exceeded even retailers'

Retailers had gone into the season project-

ing sales increases averaging 6 percent, a figure some thought was overly optimistic. It was retailers highest forecast since 2004.

In a major shakeup of the architecture of the U.S. market, the second tier has moved closer to the leaders, creating a tighter cluster of seven or eight mainstream than at any time since the Fifties. And this trend comprises the most significant break from pattern since Japanese brands shook the Big Three hegemony in the Eighties. Look for shake things up even further this year. Infotainment Wars. Automakers and their suppliers have been falling all over one another to up the ante in new infotainment" systems and devices at

the Consumer Electronics Show in early January and since then. Now consumers can even buy an OnStar "button" in the aftermarket. After Ford's success with Sync, OEMs are all determined to emphasize electronic connectivity in new products and

product story of the last few years, as car-based platforms took over from the boxy SUVs that drove sales beginning in the mid-Nineties. Minivans and pickup trucks have each taken their turns at propelling the U.S. market over the last few decades. What will be this decade's big segment story, and will it become evident in 2011? 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
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
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
