Ron Knotts had many of what his daughter Deb Allen knows are the telltale signs of Huntington's disease His walk was ungain-

ly. She remembers him standing in line in a store and seeing a little drool coming from his mouth. He'd choke on the simplest of foods. But Allen, a Canton resident, figured those were signs of aging, not symptoms of a deadly disease. Little did she know how wrong she was or how much it would affect her above and beyond losing her father.

Knotts was diagnosed with Huntington's disease in 2007 and died what she called a slow. ugly death in 2010. Now his daughter, diagnosed a year after her father was, fears she faces the same fate. She's presymptomatic at the moment, but knows what's coming and she's getting
