The 2007 State of the County Address on February 7th was brimming with interesting news and information that highlighted Oakland County's impressive achievements of the past year while trumpeting exciting new programs for the coming year.

In his nearly one hour address before a packed auditorium at the Michigan State University Management Education Center in Troy, Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson talked at length about the great success of the Wireless Oakland project and outlined five separate options for funding an expanded Cobo Hall without putting the burden on taxpayers.

He also expressed a desire over the next 18 months to focus on what he calls "Quality of Life" issues to counter balance the attention he's given in recent years to economic development programs such as Emerging Sectors and Automation Alley.

"On the drawing board for the '08 calendar year will be the first Oakland County one-half marathon, 10k and 5k races modeled after the extremely successful Bobby Crim race in Genesee County," Mr. Patterson announced. The County Executive also said plans are in the works for the first ever Oakland County Winter Carnival featuring a cross country skiing challenge, sleigh rides, snow shoeing and ice carving.

In addition, Mr. Patterson wants to put on an "Over 50 Hockey Championship Series" involving 100 qualified teams from around the region.

As he does every year, Mr. Patterson also took a few minutes to recognize and applaud the many

achievements of Oakland County employees over the past year who collectively and individually earned numerous honors and awards:

County women find paradise in Costa Rica

After a six-hour plane ride, **Derenda Howard**, **Katie Stavale** and **Rachel Meyers**, Parks & Recreation Department employees, landed in Liberia, a northern town in Costa Rica. Tourists flock there to see stunning beaches, a magnificent setting with islands offshore, lush

rainforest laced with a network of easy-to-walk trails and wildlife galore.

The group chose Costa Rica for their 10-day journey based on Howard's past travels to the country and economics.

"We decided we wanted to go cheap," Howard said. "Costa Rica is that, very tourist friendly, and the most developed of the eco-tour countries."

A quick first night was spent in a low budget hotel, complete with fleas. The following day the three adventurers took a bus to Hotel Manuel Antonio, the first hotel built near Manuel Antonio National Park, where they stayed four glorious nights overlooking the pristine Pacific Ocean and unending coastline.

"The town is a beautiful, beach bum kind of locale", Howard said.

They hiked in the national park and town in Quepos and ventured into the rainforest for a canopy tour adventure, traveling along zip lines from platform to platform, face to face with jungle flora and fauna.


"The highlight of the trip was the canopy tour," Meyers said. "I liked the zip line that we used to fly from tree to tree to see the whole rain forest. It was amazing!"

Travel inland by bus took them to Tabacon Hot Springs Resort at the base of Arenal Volcano for four more glorious days. The Tabacon Hot Springs, set amidst stunning lush greenery, rare orchids and superb waterfalls, offers the ultimate indulgence for those who want some peace and quiet.

"The volcano is active and the hot springs water is naturally heated by the volcano lava," Howard said. "We walked across the lava flow. "

"I think my absolute favorite tour was when Derenda and I did an extensive seven-hour hike that took us up a hill off the beaten path,"

Stavale said.



Stavale added, "Our jaunt ended with a hike down to a 150-foot waterfall. It was one of the most physically challenging hikes I have taken. Our 'trail' was very muddy but worth every step! The only downfall was not being able to take pictures due to the rain and mud."

"By the end our muscles were quivering," Howard said. A visit to the hot springs completed the day's journey.

While Howard and Stavale climbed, Meyers opted for a soak in the hot springs and spa day at the resort.

"The spa day included a volcanic mud bath where warm mud was slathered on me and dried", Meyers said. "Then I was wrapped in hot towels and finally showered to get it all off. Then I had a relaxing massage. The two-hour experience was heavenly."

They saw and heard a number of howler monkeys. "A monkey howling outside our hotel room window woke us up. The howl is like a bark and a howl combined," Howard said.

According to Howard, typical Costa Rican cuisine is beans and rice with a vegetable and chicken or fish.

"We went to a restaurant with the best guacamole – they made it right in front of us and we got to pick what they put in it," Howard added.

The group returned to Liberia on day 10 to catch a return flight home.

"Costa Rica was amazing! I have never seen a place that was so green!" Stavale concluded. "I recommend a trip to Costa Rica for anyone and everyone!"

Count Your Steps Gets a Rousing Send Off for 2007

More than 1,200 enthusiastic and energetic 4th grade students from elementary schools in Walled Lake jammed the auditorium of Walled Lake Central High School on Monday, March 5th to give the 2007 version of Count Your Steps a high energy, musical launch that even a Broadway producer would have been proud of.

Radio Disney (910 AM) air personality Nik-EE and her D-Tour troupe lit up the stage at Walled Lake Central with great music and interactive games for the kids featuring hoola-hoop and jump rope contests as well as a unique version of musical chairs.

Nik-EE and her talented gang had the auditorium literally "rocking and reeling" with pulsating music. The kids really loved it and threw themselves into the festivities with all the enthusiasm they could muster.

Even our erstwhile Health Division Manager George Miller participated in the hoola-hoop contest, proving very graphically why someone of his age and physical condition should never do anything like that again in public. Let's just say that George's "hoola-hoop days" are far behind him.

As emcee for the event though, George did a terrific job talking about the importance of Count Your Steps and the urgent need to coax kids out from behind their Playstations and Nintendos to engage in daily physical activity. He also told the audience the program founded by Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson was a pro-active way to address the growing national epidemic of childhood obesity.

Walled Lake was chosen as the location for the 2007 CYS kick off because the district's 3rd and 4th grade students took top honors in the program last year walking a combined total of 275,355,247 steps. Count Your Steps ran from March 5th - 30th. This year 180 schools, representing 883 classrooms and more than 22,000 3rd and 4th grade students participated in the program.

Mothers, Daughters, and Leaders of Oakland County

The nominations were made, the votes were tallied, and the extraordinary women from our local community are showcased and on display at the Rochester Hills Museum through June 16, 2007.

Learn about the world-renowned surgeon from Stony Creek Village, the slave who purchased land from the founder of Pontiac, the soprano soloist who spent months performing for Holocaust survivors, and many other incredible women of Oakland County. The exhibit also presents historic women's events from a national and statewide perspective, spanning from women's suffrage to the first female governor of Michigan.

Elizabeth Denison Forth, otherwise known as Lisette Forth was an ex-slave who became the first black property owner in Pontiac. She purchased the land from Stephan Mack, Pontiac's founder, and that property is now Oak Hill Cemetery. For many years, Lisette worked for Detroit Mayor John Biddle and his family.

Martha Baldwin spearheaded many women's suffrage movements, village improvement movements, and ran fundraisers for the local library. As such, after Martha's death her local library was named the Baldwin Library in Birmingham, Michigan.


Next time your computer goes down – a good guy to know is Joe Tabor. He's the supervisor of the workstation services group at IT. It's

L. Brooks Patterson

Many times over the past 14 years, Oakland County employees have stepped up to help people touched by tragedy and misfortune. Since the Casual Day program began in 1993, your contributions to the "jean jars" have totaled more than half a million dollars. These funds have been distributed to literally hundreds of charities and needy individuals throughout Oakland County and beyond. The dollars collected have gone to purchase food, clothing, defray medical expenses and for a vast array of other purposes. Your caring, compassion and generosity have made it possible for those experiencing setbacks



to rise above their circumstances and deal as best they can with the sometimes harsh vicissitudes of life.

This includes my own family. When I lost my son, Brooksie, suddenly and tragically in February, our employees responded with an outpouring of sympathy which gave me and my family great strength and comfort.

A number of employees came forward to suggest a Special Casual Day for Brooksie's widow, Jessie, and their three young children. Quite honestly, the idea never occurred to me. But with so many people wanting to do something to help, a decision was made to go ahead with a special Casual Day for the family on February 22nd. As you can imagine the sudden and unexpected passing of my son left his financial estate in disarray and immediate needs of his family had to be met. More than \$6,000 was collected which will help Jessie and her children temporarily meet their day-to-day living expenses until their financial affairs can be put in order.
