

Change continues to be the "Name of the Game".

During 1974, the collection of costs, restitutions and fines, as ordered by our Circuit Court Judges, has gone forward, the program has been refined, and the procedures improved. The Reimbursement Division maintains a close liaison with the Probation Department, and the transfer of the financial responsibility from the Probation Department to the Reimbursement Division has eliminated the need of the probation officer of "wearing two hats", resulting in an improved relationship between probationer and probation officer.

This transfer has proven rewarding as well as it relates to the financial, as in the past, many of these young people have never had to face up to financial obligations, and because they are now required to approach the payment in an adult, responsible manner, it appears they are benefitting.

Recovery of monies expended for Circuit Court appointed attorneys resulted in collection of some \$20,000, with a minimal effort expended. During 1975, it is hoped that the program can be improved by developing a closer liaison with the District Courts. Hopefully, improved communication with the client will result, and through better communication, collections should increase.

On August 6, 1974, Governor William Milliken signed the new Mental Health Act 258, transferring the reimbursement responsibility from the Department of Treasury to the Department of Mental Health. Effective date of the reimbursement Section Eight was November 6, 1974. Section Three, the county to state financial section becomes effective August 6, 1975. After August 6, 1975, the county will be required to pay the state 10% of the net total cost for all residents of Oakland County in state mental hospitals, rather than as it is now, full cost for the first year hospitalized.

To date, little has been done at the state level to implement this transition, and even after the transfer is finalized, it will be in the counties' best interest to remain involved so as to make sure an equitable program is maintained.

In 1974, we were asked by the Bureau of Social Services to assist them with their Restrictive and Protective Payee accounts. We receive from the state approximately \$5,000 per month benefits for some 20 odd clients, which is subsequently paid out to landlords, utility companies, and replacement to the county for advances for personal needs of the clients.

This procedure eliminates emergency expenditures, and the necessity for payment of county funds to meet these emergencies.

This year, like last year, we did have a busy, changing year.

The Reimbursement Division is responsible for collection of all charges ordered by the Probate Judges for care supplied by the County through the Juvenile Court. When - ever a child receives this care, a financial statement is taken and an order is entered commensurate with the parents' ability to pay.

^{*} This amount includes \$826.75 credited to Oakland County on the State Support of Patients and represents one-half of the Social Security and Veterans' benefits collected by the Department of Revenue.

^{**} Probate Support accounts represent monies collected and paid out as received to the person caring for the child. This is as decreed by a Probate Court order.

It is the responsibility of the Reimbursement Division to collect monies due the County of Oakland, as ordered by the Probate Judges, or from those admitted voluntarily, on all active and past due mental hospital accounts. All responsible relatives are interviewed by the Reimbursement Division and a detailed financial statement is compiled and submitted to the Probate Judge to assist him in making his determination as to ability to pay. Through these interviews, the need for verification of settlement and residence is often indicated, and the matter is investigated by the Reimbursement Division. Many hundreds of dollars each year are saved by this County as a result of these investigations; the charge is properly billed to the patient's county of residence, or assumed by the state-at-large, rather than by our county, the committing county.

Oakland County was originally charged for hospitalization for all patients under 21 years of age. Subsequently, many of the patients were qualified for Title XIX benefits (Medicaid), and Oakland County received credit for charges that remained after insurance credits, in the amount of some \$347,000. The Reimbursement Division made financial investigations (see explanation under voluntary admissions on Page 7), and filed and collected insurance benefits due on these accounts. These insurance monies are included in reimbursement total "Mental Institutions and Emergency Care".

^{*} The new Mental Health Act 258, effective November 6, 1974, requires that attorneys be appointed to represent patients in hearings before the Probate Court. For the months of November and December, Oakland County expended \$6,536.00 in payment to attorneys and this amount has been deducted from monies owing to the State of Michigan for cost of care of these patients.

In 1972, a new voluntary admission statute became effective. This resulted in many patients being admitted to state institutions voluntarily, rather than by Probate Court Orders. Prior to 1972, the majority of patients were admitted by Court Order.

Even though the superintendent of the hospital, prior to November 6, 1974, was designated by statute as the person who was to make the financial determination, the county remained responsible for payment to the State of Michigan for the cost of care for the first year, and because of this financial responsibility, it was in the county's best interest to continue to secure financial information from the patient and/or responsible relatives, so ability to pay, as well as residency, could be determined. Recommendation as to ability to pay is made to the superintendent.

The above report was compiled from the "Support of Patients" - the form used by the Department of Revenue, State of Michigan, to bill counties for the first 365 days of hospitalization in state institutions. Oakland County is charged for the first 365 days an Oakland County resident is hospitalized, and care after this initial period is as a state-at-large patient. Therefore, a percentage of those patients listed as discharged might still be hospitalized as state-at-large charges.

Since August 15, 1960, the County of residence has received day credit for this emergency hospitalization as a part of the first year of care in a state institution. These days accrue after days covered by Act 229 have been exhausted.

The new Mental Health Act 258, effective November 6, 1974, requires that the Department of Mental Health provide care and treatment for all emergency mentally ill persons. This eliminated the need for hospitalization of patients by Oakland County at Woodside Medical, Inc., after November 6, 1974.
