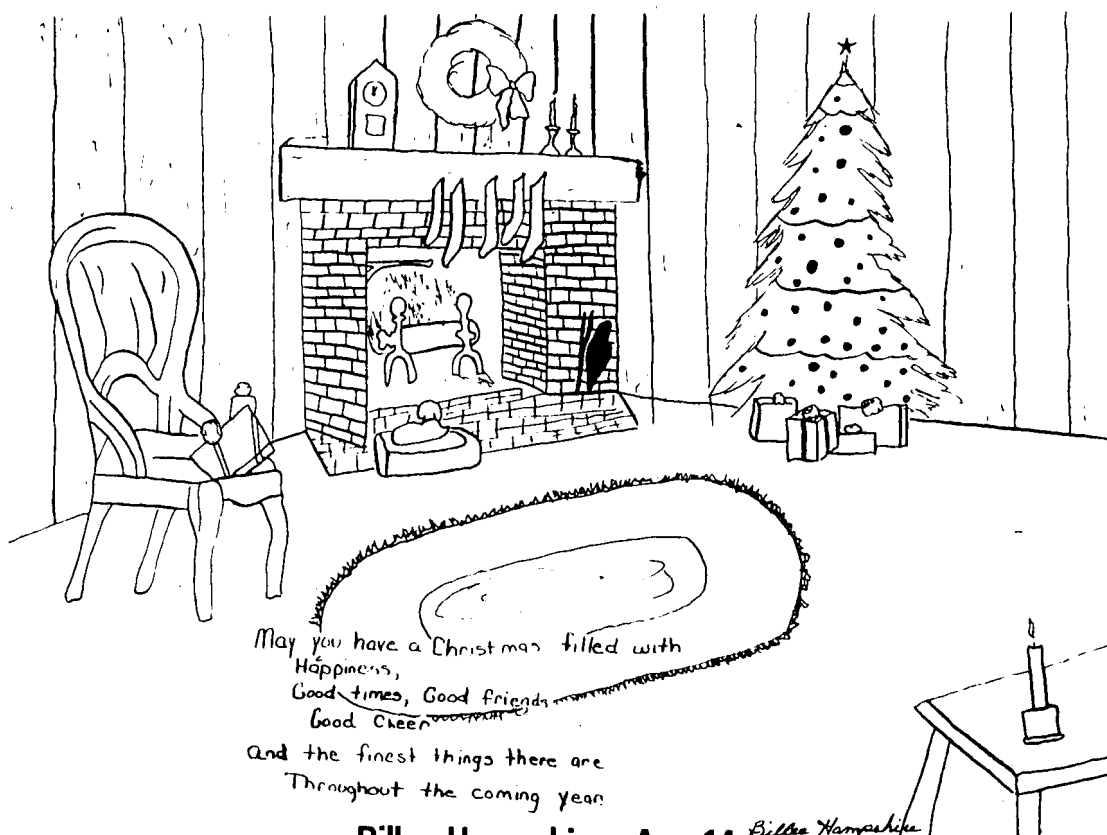

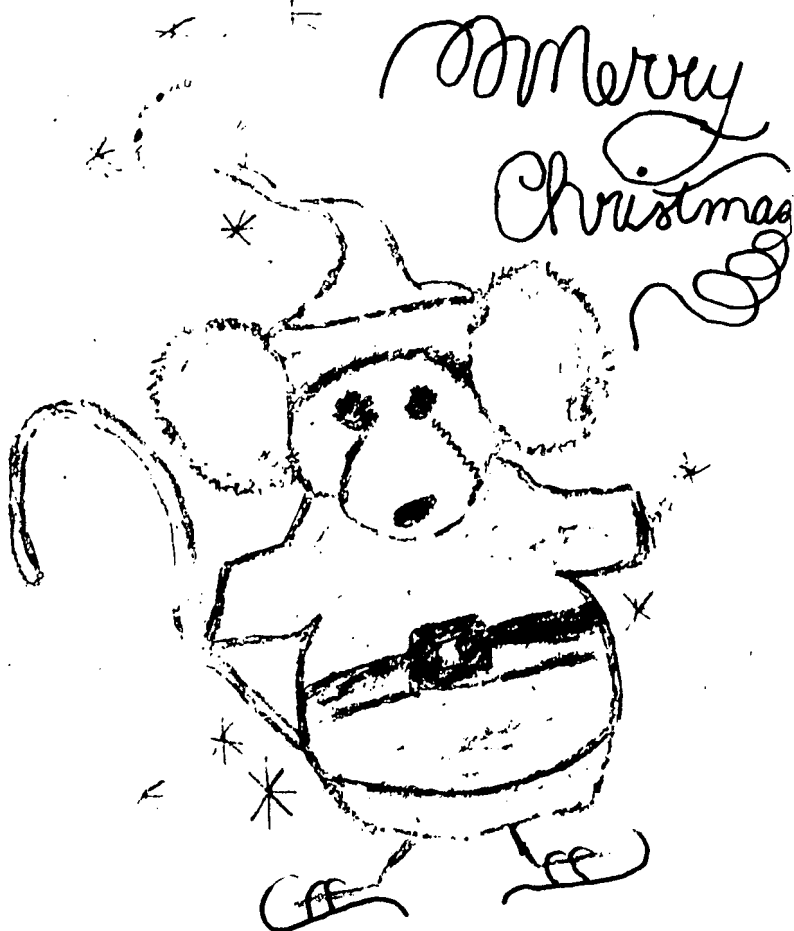

Many of our senior citizens, who are residents of 'rest' homes, or 'nursing' homes, face a bleak holiday season again this year. They have no one to take them 'home for the holidays', or even come to visit with them, maybe bringing one or two poinsettias with them, to cheer up the resident's room.

So, while everyone else in the family is gathered around the dining room table, eating their turkey and pumpkin pie, and after all of the eating's done, everyone visits with one another. And while a good time is being had by all, the old folks are spending their holiday visiting with each other, or the doctors and nurses, all the time wondering why their family never came to pick them up, as expected.

I'm not saying that nursing homes are completely unnecessary. They fill a need when it comes to people who can't be treated in their own, or their children's homes, or who need specialized or constant care. What I am saying is that these homes are used as 'dropping off' spots for relatives that have become too bothersome, or take up too much time to care for. THOUGHTS 'N THINGS

All native born Americans with normal hearing learn to speak English by listening to, and mimicing their parents. That makes the study of the language more difficult. It is very difficult to concentrate on the way that we do something once it has become automatic. The combination of concentration on the structure and the function makes one self-conscious, and suddenly, what was easy has become difficult. It is no wonder that many children rebel at studying something that they feel they have already mastered.

At this point, they need motivation if they are not to avoid as much training in skills as possible. It often helps, with reluctant students, to make them aware of the difficulties facing the people who developed language in the first place. The study of a small child who is learning to talk, and to communicate ideas, gives a pretty clear picture of what our early ancestors were up against! Of course, there are those who feel that we have carried our communications ability to a ridiculous extreme, and they are right. Once we learned to say what we meant, and meant what we said, we went a step further, and learned to "sell" with our language, and a warning was created in the form of "actions speak louder than words."

Even so, to compete in our society, one must be master of the same skills as those which have been mastered by our family, friends, and neighbors, if we are to be treated as equals.

Some children learn well when required to memorize and recite. In fact, the obedient child who accepts control easily, will excel under such conditions. On the other hand, a number of bright and creative children will balk at such boring routing. The best way to approach them, when dealing with their language, is to give them the job of creating a language, or recreating their own. When they run into the problems that led to our rules of

grammar in the first place, they will see the logic in them, and sense will come from confusion.

In learning to write well, one should attempt to be creative. The greatest advantage of learning to write at all is in the freedom to express one's own ideas and thoughts and feelings. Naturally, there should be no criticism of such writing.

In school, however, the teacher must have something to grade. That means that a child's experiments with language must be critized, and compared with others. It is no wonder that so many adults have learned to be self-conscious about writing anything beyond a grocery list! Children have such shaky egos generally, that they cannot "consider the source" of criticism. They prefer not to write, then have their innermost selves left open to criticism.

The solution then must be to present a number of prewritten thoughts to the children, and allow them to rewrite them, punctuate them, etc. There is not more boring exercise than that! It does make grading easier for the teacher, however, and the answer in the teacher's guide give some structure that promises an objective critic. Parents, however, can encourage children to express themselves in writing, and can compliment them for their efforts. It is the best possible method for encouraging the child to learn to write well, to think creatively, and express himself clearly. We enjoy doing that which we do well.

Function and structure should not be seperated when it comes to written expression. Children should be taught that each sentence and each paragraph on a page should make sense, even if they never move beyond the simple sentence that is just as simply punctuated.

Unfortunately, students think (too often) that the simple sentence is babyish, and they think that they must improve on it. Consider this -

I was dazzled by a boat immersed in deeply flowing waves; adrift on the blue deep, the sight was amazing to me.

I saw a ship. It was sailing into deep waves. They were covered with whitecaps. It was beautiful.

The second group of sentences require only that the writer know how to spell, have a simple vocabulary, know the proper verb forms (past, present, future, etc.) and that a complete sentence has a noun and a verb. As far as punctuation is concerned, knowing that a sentence begins with a capital letter and ends with a period is sufficient. There is only one rule that one must never forget. That is, that the reader should be considered first and foremost, or one's writing will never be read! Which way of writing did you prefer? Need I say that most of us prefer poetry that we can understand? The same is true of prose.

If your child can write sentences equal to "I saw a ship." etc., and can express an idea that simply, then the basics have been learned. Clear communication is possible, and the child should be congratulated.

If your child cannot express an idea to this degree, then the inability should be analyzed. Start with what the child can do, and work from there. Don't be surprised if the problem turns out to be simple confusion about learning too many things at once. It is not so difficult to clear up such confusion if a patient parent is on hand to help! How many words of "honey" must we listen to before we say "hogwash"! How many studies, probes, advisories, must the taxpayers be burdened with? How long before one takes the law into

their own hands?

Don't say answer them at the polls; Witness the 1968 Bond Issue passed to build new and improved roadside parks. Half went to Detroit City for Inner City Parks. Witness the .01¢ increase in sales tax from .03¢ to .04¢ in lieu of an income tax. What did we get? BOTH! How many times did we vote on daylight savings time before the legislature got their wish? Perhaps those who opposed it gave up or was the weather in their favor the third time around?

I would suggest that THEY don't want "citizen input". When meetings are well attended and citizen input is there it falls on deaf ears. I suggest what they really want is to justify their wages, (perhaps increase them) justify raising taxes, (perhaps required by law) or justify their PET PROJECT. (perhaps not in everyone's interest)

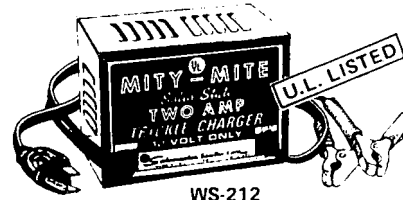

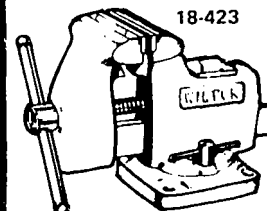

Christmas Around the World

Hanna Kerttula Looks Forward To First American Christmas

What does Christmas mean? What thoughts come to mind each year as December 25th draws near? Ask a number of people in any given area, and you'll get various answers. Ask the servicemen at a base overseas or aboard a ship, and you'll probably get similar responses...with the word "home" heading the list.

But what if you ask someone from another land? Some--an exchange student, perhaps, who will--for the first time--be spending Christmas far from her native shores. The question takes on an added dimension. What does Christmas mean at home...and what will Christmas mean HERE?

The exchange student we interviewed is Hanna Kerttula, age 18, from Laitila, Finland. For the current school year, she is making her home with the Guy Duffields of Drayton Plains. The Duffields have a son and daughter away at college, and another daughter, Barbara, 16, who attends high school with Hanna at Waterford Kettering.

Hanna describes Laitila as being a city of 9000 population located about 270 kilometers (168 miles) from Helsinki, Finland. (Most Americans are familiar with Helsinki as the site of the 1952 Olympics.) Finland is on a latitude with Alaska, and so is subject to the same long winter nights and delightfully long days in summer. "Finland is a little bit more than twice as big as Michigan," relates Hanna. "Population is 4 1/2

million--or 1/2 the population of Michigan. People travel by buses and trams in the city. There are good trains between cities. Inside the country, it is possible to travel by boat because there are so many lakes."

One of the main differences between life in Finland and life in the United States is the importance attached to the *sauna*. "In Finland, every house that is built has a sauna," states Hanna, comparing it on the level of a kitchen or bathroom here. They are also an integral part of even the Finnish summer cottage--as pictured in a book of vacation homes Hanna displayed. "Saunas are a way of life--hygienic, social tradition, recreational," she continued. "They are used by every citizen at least once a week." In addition to private saunas, there are public saunas--near pools and sports arenas."

It is important to understand the role of the sauna in family life as Hanna goes on in her own words to explain events leading up to and climaxing in the Finnish celebration of Christmas: "We fetch a pine tree--always live--from the forest on December 23rd. All work must be finished by noon on the 24th, as the National Peace is

declared on radio and in the market squares. All businesses close." At home, "we bring the tree in and set it up. The kids must then set the table and help Mother prepare for the meal. The Finnish put a high priority on fresh foods, especially bread, so this is quite a task. At 4:00 or 5:00 p.m., we start decorating the tree. Straw is used extensively in our tree ornaments and decorations, and bundles are put out for the birds. There are, also, wooden hand-carved ornaments in a natural finish and paper ornaments, ie, snowflakes."

Each member of the family then goes "to sauna", and it is while the children are there, Hanna confided, that *Joula Pukki*, Finland's jolly fat Father Christmas delivers his gifts.

The Christmas Family Dinner is finally served on the evening of December 24th, and it is veritable smorgasbord with an actual count of nine meats and fishes on the typical menu Hanna composed--including vegetable casseroles, rice porridge, salads, *joula pulla*

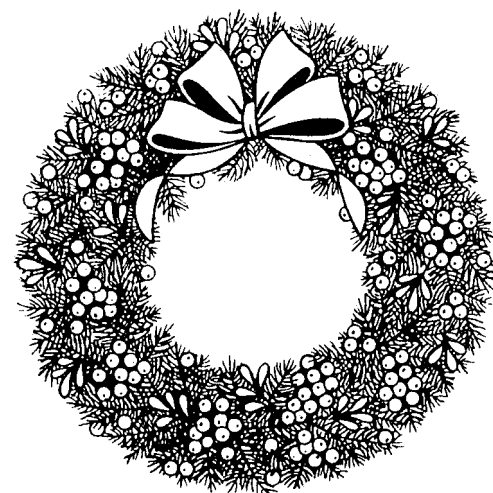

The first "foreigners" to come to this land brought bits and pieces of tradition with them, and adapted them to their new homeland. The original celebration of Christmas (on December 25th) was by order of Pope Liberius of Rome in 354 A.D., and was a religious holiday. The people of Rome already celebrated that date as the Feast of Saturn, a celebration in honor of the birthday of the sun. Christians honored Christ, instead of Saturn, as the Light of the World, so it may have seemed appropriate to designate that date as Christ's birthday, though scholars do not know the exact date of his birth.

At first, Christmas was celebrated as a religious holiday only, but gradually it became a symbol of happiness, and a time for merriment, as well as a religious observance. In fact, in England, Christmas became such a rowdy celebration during the Middle Ages, that the Puritans in England did away with the celebration of Christmas in 1643. Colonists in New England followed suit, even outlawing mince pie, but immigrants from many lands brought Christmas customs from many lands, and the American Christmas, as we know it today, is the outcome.

Christmas music, Christmas decorations, gifts, and foods seem to be part of many of the ancient observances, as well as our present ones, though the celebration day that we think of Christmas may vary from country to country. The "gift giver" that we think of as Santa Claus is known by other names, and dresses in different costumes, more in keeping with the countries visited, too. Of course, the gifts are always accepted happily, for the children understand the spirit in which they are given, so they are not fussy about dates and costumes like adults are!

In Great Britain, stockings are hung by the fireplace, in hopes that Father Christmas will come to fill them with Christmas treats. The traditional dinner there consisted of brawn, roast peacock, boar's head, and mutton pies. We are more aware of their plum pudding, which originated there. The delightful combination of currants or raisins, dried citrus fruits, beef suet, sugar, and spice has become a favorite in a number of American homes too.

The Wassail bowl is thought to be of English origin too, but King Henry VII borrowed that from Scandinavia in the late 1400's. It is a mixture of hot ale, spices and toasted apples. The word wassail means "be thou well," and was served as a Christmas greeting.

In France, children put their shoes on the doorstep on Christmas Eve, and wait for Le Petit Noel (the Christ child) to fill them with gifts. The French use mistletoe as a symbol of good luck. In America, it is used for kissing under! That too is good luck!

In Germany, some people have Christmas trees for every member of the family. Their trees are decorated with lights and ornaments made of marzipan. Marzipan is an almond candy that can be colored and shaped to look like food and toys (and can be bought already

prepared in our supermarkets.)

Many Germans make their own Christmas gifts. After everyone has gathered on Christmas Eve for the Bescherung (a Christmas tree lighting ceremony) the children receive their gifts. Though many people think that roast goose is a traditional English meal, it is in Germany that it is often served for the Christmas dinner.

In Switzerland, Christmas Eve has romantic overtones. Swiss young people visit nine fountains on their way to midnight church services on Christmas Eve. They take three sips of water from each, because according to legend, that assures them that their future husband or wife will be waiting on the doorstep of the church. The Swiss also believe that the animals talk at midnight on Christmas Eve, and that they kneel in honor of the Christ child.

In Italy, the people go without food the day before Christmas. In the evening they hold a ceremony around a miniature scene of Bethlehem, and then Christmas gifts are brought in and presented from a large crock called the Urn of Fate.

The Italian people traditionally reserve Christmas Day for religious ceremonies. La Befana, a kind of aged fairy queen comes down the chimney on the eve of Epiphany, on January 6th, with gifts for the children. She rings a bell to announce her visit. The Italian traditional Christmas food is Magi cakes which are small wafers. They are eaten with fried eels, chicken and pork.

In Spain, Christmas is a time for dancing. After midnight mass on Christmas Eve, the streets fill with people for the Christmas dance known as the Jota. The words and music for it have been handed down for hundreds of years.

In Sweden, Christmas begins on December 13, or St. Lucia Day. The children believe that elves help them with holiday tasks, and they thank them by leaving food on the table for them at night. Many Swedes enjoy fish as the main dish for their Christmas feast. They also enjoy a pudding made of rice and milk.

In Norway, the season starts on St. Thomas' Day, on December 21st. Norwegians bake cakes of St. Thomas on Christmas Eve. Another custom is ringing in Christmas. Church bells are rung throughout the country at 4 o'clock in the afternoon on Christmas Eve, as a symbol of welcoming Christmas. A Norwegian Christmas pudding contains an almond, and it is believed that the person who gets the portion with the almond in it will be the next to be married.

In Finland, as in Sweden, fish is apt to be on the Christmas menu. The people of all Scandinavian Countries give food to birds at Christmas too. Since all the seeds, nuts, and insects are covered with snow, people leave extra grain for the birds in their yards on Christmas Eve.

In Poland, as in Italy, Christmas Eve is a fast day, but a feast is held at nightfall in Poland. A vacant chair is left at the table for the Holy Child, and a few straws are scattered on the table to remind everyone of the stable where Christ was born. The Poles make small wafers, stamp them with figures of the Nativity, bake them, and have the Priest bless them. Then they exchange them in the same way that we exchange Christmas cards.

The customs vary from country to country. In Yugoslavia, children celebrate the second Sunday before Christmas as Mother's Day, and the first Sunday before Christmas as Father's day. Their parents give them gifts on these days.

The Serbs believe that they will have bad luck if the Christmas log burns out, so someone stands watch over it all night. They bake a Christmas cake with a silver coin in it, and the lucky finder will have good luck. They serve roast pig in honor of Bozhitch, an ancient sun god whose name now means Christmas.

In Czechoslovakia, a girl tells her fortune by putting a cherry twig in water on December 4, and if the twig blossoms before Christmas Eve, it supposedly means that she will marry during the new year.

In Mexico, Christmas season lasts from December 16 to January 6th. Their celebration is a religious one in memory of the night Jesus was born, and food is a part of it. The children get to break a colorful pinata with a stick. When it is broken, it scatters gifts and candy on the ground, and the children may have them.

In Mexico and other South American countries, where Christmas comes during a warm season, flowers are used to decorate. The poinsettia is in full bloom in Mexico at Christmastime.

Most children of South America believe that the wise men bring them Christmas gifts.

Christians in China and Japan observe Christmas customs that are similar to those in the United States. The Chinese call their Santa Claus Sheng Tan Lao Ren, which means Holy Birthday Old Man. The Japanese have adopted the American symbol of Christmas and call the bearer of their gifts Santa Claus.

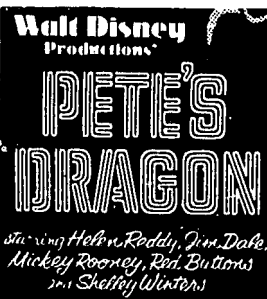

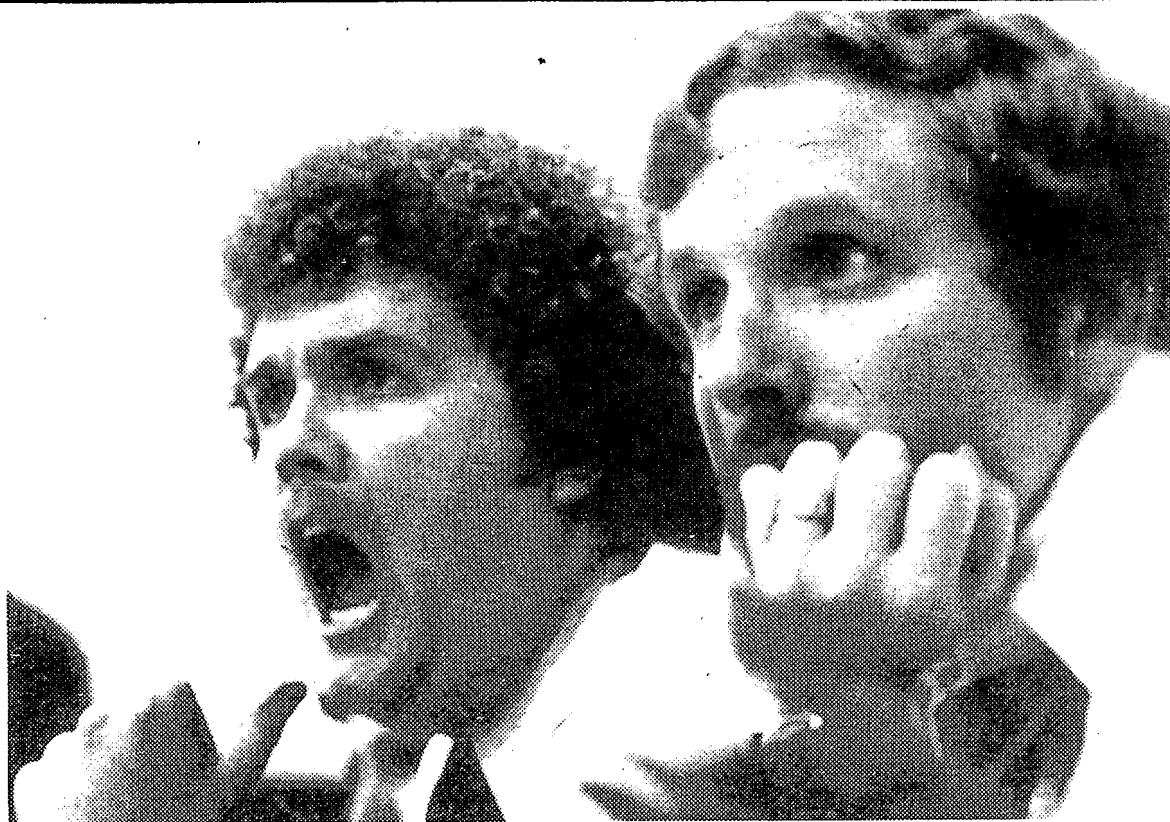
Varsity jumped out in front of West Bloomfield early in the first period and went on to win 77-56. Coach Nustad commented, "They played good team ball...they did well."

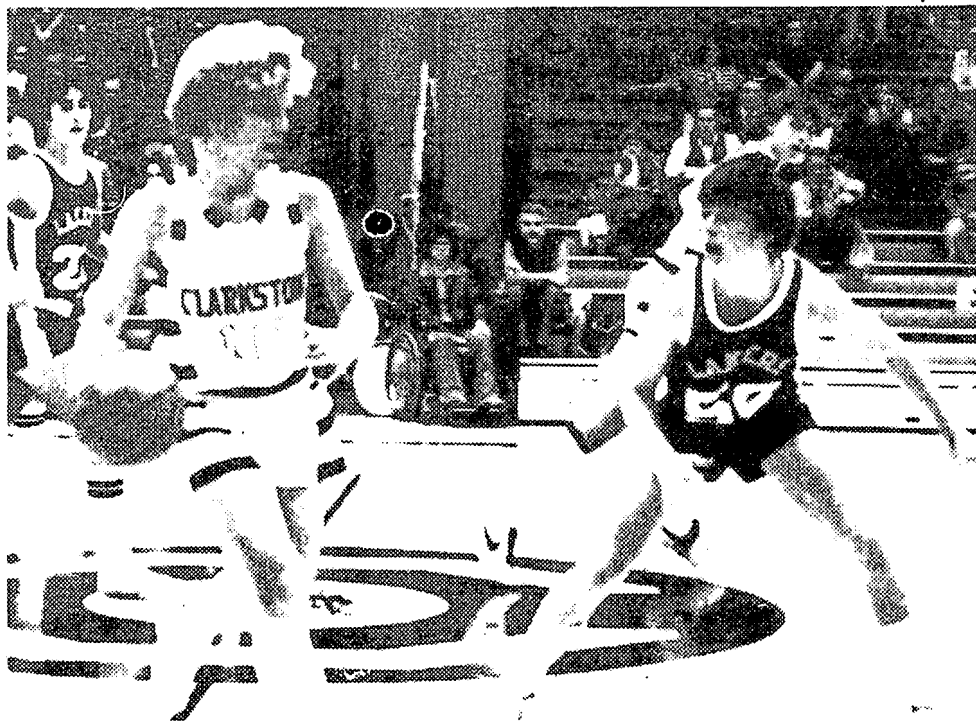
Said Nustad, "Tim's a super player, and I've enjoyed coaching him. He works hard, he's just a super, super player."

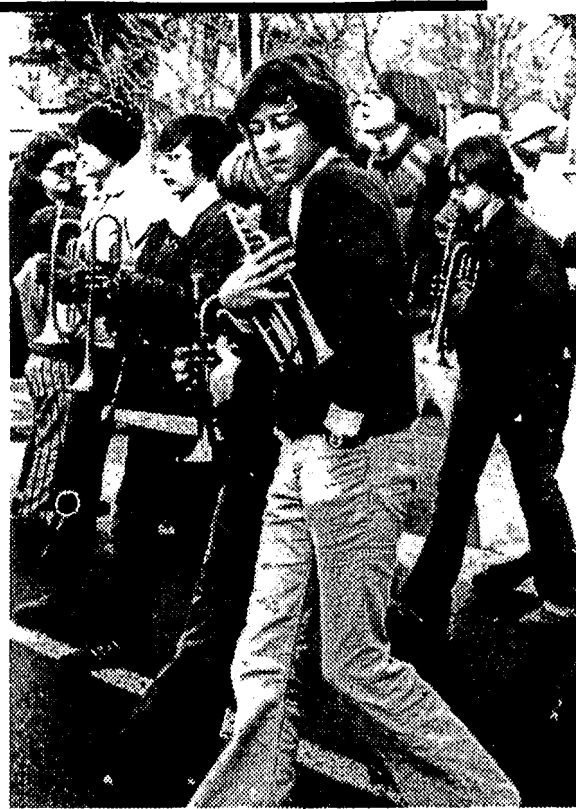

(sweet bread), other native dishes, cookies and nuts. Dishes are done, and the gifts are opened. By contrast to the many activities of December 24th, December 25th is a day of peace--with most families up before daybreak to attend church services at either of the state-supported churches; the Evangelical Lutheran or the Orthodox.

Hanna was asked: "What is the main difference between Christmas in Finland and the Christmas you are experiencing here?" Her reply: "There is no mass commercialization there. Hand-knitted and prepared gifts are popular for giving. You don't see all the lights."

Since "Youth for Understanding" believes in integrating exchange students into the host family's normal way of life, Christmas this year for Hanna will mean an artificial tree. However, many other aspects of the Christmas observance will be familiar--many of the tree ornaments, and some of the gifts, are handmade. There will be an abundance of holiday foods, including some Finnish dishes. A Christmas Eve Service at First Presbyterian Church, Pontiac, will replace the Finnish Christmas Eve Sauna.

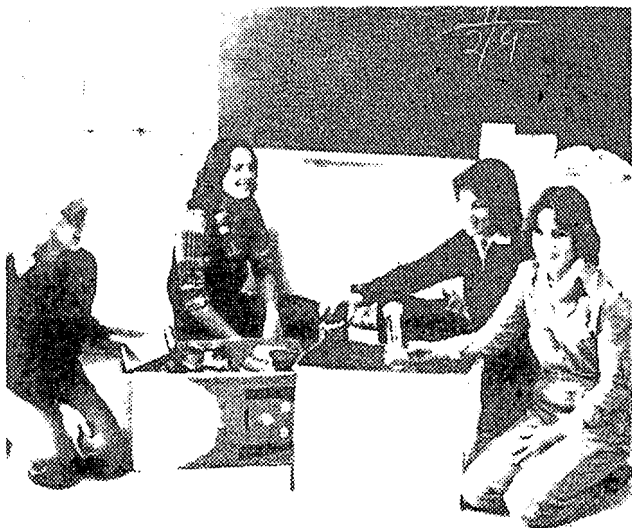

White Recalls First Toboggan Run

"I wanted to bring back happy thoughts for middle-aged people who rode that toboggan slide as children."

So stated Bob White, Sr., 85, who lives on Bridge Lake in Springfield Township. He, along with his wife, Camilla, ran the Bridge Lake Tearoom, and started the toboggan run to help stimulate winter business.

The run evolved into the first winter sports program operated in this part of the state. People from Detroit, Pontiac, Flint, Saginaw, Bay City, and the smaller cities and towns surrounding them, came to Springfield Township for the tobogganing. Mr. White saw to the outdoor part of the business, such as keeping the 2-800 foot toboggan tracks iced, while his wife ran the restaurant.

The toboggan slide operated from its opening in 1925 until the Depression helped close it up in 1934. The run, on which speeds of 60 m.p.h. could be attained, was 50 feet across on the top, and had 2-800 foot tracks which went down the hill, and then the toboggan continued its slide across Bridge Lake.

Mr. White, who still lives on Bridge Lake, recall these memories fondly, and hopes that he and his slide helped to create good memories for a number of other people.

Christmas Around the World

Christmas With a German Flavor

There are a variety of German traditions which vary from north to south and from east to west in both cooking and customs. But one that is most consistent is that of

cutting, not buying, a tree the day before Christmas.

Only spruce was used because of its pyramid shape and it had to be fresh because at one time only candles were used to light it. The fresh needles contained oils that would put out a flame before the needles would burn. The tradition of the tree-cutting continues whether candles are used or not.

As a child in Germany, Karen Ohrnberger said she was never allowed to see the tree until it was all decorated, it was locked away from the children. Now, however, her children help with the decorating which is very simple. Their ornaments are only handmade straw stars and angels, some bulbs, some gold tinsel if they can find it, and red candles which are traditional although unlit. The tree is more important to them than its decorations. This year it will remain up until January 6, the time of the Wise Men, a Protestant German tradition.

Christmas Eve is their time of celebration at home with the family. It is a time of peace and quiet, enjoying the tree and singing German carols. The oldest person present reads the Christmas story from the Bible. Only after this time of quiet are the gifts opened.

The Ohrnbergers enjoy many German pastries during


the holidays including Honiglebkuchen, or honey bread. Since all of their cookbooks are in German, and in metric measure too, this is a translation of that recipe.

HONIGLEBKUCHEN [honey bread]

1/4 lb. sugar
2 eggs
Container of whipped honey (found at most grocery stores)
5 oz. coarsely chopped almonds
1 lb. candied fruit
1 tsp. cinnamon
A pinch of clove ("tip of knife" in German)
2 T. rum
1 lb. flour (must be sifted)
1 tsp. baking soda
Whip eggs and sugar until foamy. Add spices, fruit and rum, part of the flour, and baking soda. Warm whipped honey until runny and cool, add almonds. Combine both bowls and add enough flour so mixture can be spread on a well-buttered cookie sheet with a knife. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes. Cut in squares while hot. Brush on a glaze of lemon juice and confectioner's sugar. Must be stored in an airtight container to keep soft.

Christmas With a Swedish Flavor

The Karlstroms are one Swedish family who have kept many of the old traditions of the Christmas holidays both in their foods and their decorations.

Maryann Karlstrom assembles a wooden tree and hangs apples, straw ornaments, and a special Swedish cookie called Pepparkakor from its stick branches. The tree itself is supported by four Swedish horses. Many other hand-carved and hand-painted horses are used as holiday decorations. Pepparkakor is difficult to make and Maryann relies on her mother-in-law, who is also head of the Detroit Swedish Council, to make them.

In one particular tradition in Sweden, a special kind of straw is put out for the birds on Christmas Eve and at no other time. It is their special Christmas. Straw plays an important part in much of their holiday decorations probably because it was such an available material in poorer countries at one time and the tradition continues although economic conditions may have changed.

The Karlstroms traditionally have Swedish herring at Christmas time. The fish is cleaned in a special way and then pickled and served on Swedish hardtack. Other Swedish treats are Spritz, a cookie, and Glogg, a drink the Karlstroms make whenever they have a Christmas party.

SPRITZ

1 lb. butter
2 C. sugar
4 egg yolks
2 T. cream or canned milk
5 C. flour
1 tsp. almond extract (Maryann likes more)
Cream the butter and sugar, add egg yolks, cream and almond extract. Fold in flour. Put dough in cookie press. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Maryann only uses the press with the five-pointed star, the original Swedish design.

SWEDISH GLOGG

2 quarts of claret wine
2 quarts of brandy (or pure grain alcohol in proportion)
1/2 to 1 quart of port wine (according to taste)
10 cardamum seeds
3-4 whole cinnamon sticks
15-30 whole cloves
Peeling of half an orange
2 lbs. of sugar (lump or granulated, according to taste)
Almonds and raisins


Combine liquid ingredients in kettle, add all others except sugar. Break open cardamum seeds. Heat slowly, stirring, but do not boil. Longer heating enhances the flavor.

Sugar can be added in two ways. Granulated sugar may be added slowly stirring constantly until desired sweetness is reached. Or a steel grill may be placed over the kettle, lump sugar placed on it. Light the brew with a match and ladle burning liquid over the sugar. The burning sugar will drip into the Glogg.

Glogg is ready to drink immediately. It can also be stored for any length of time and reheated.

Almonds and raisins may be added to the kettle in the beginning or served in side dishes to be added later. Skål!

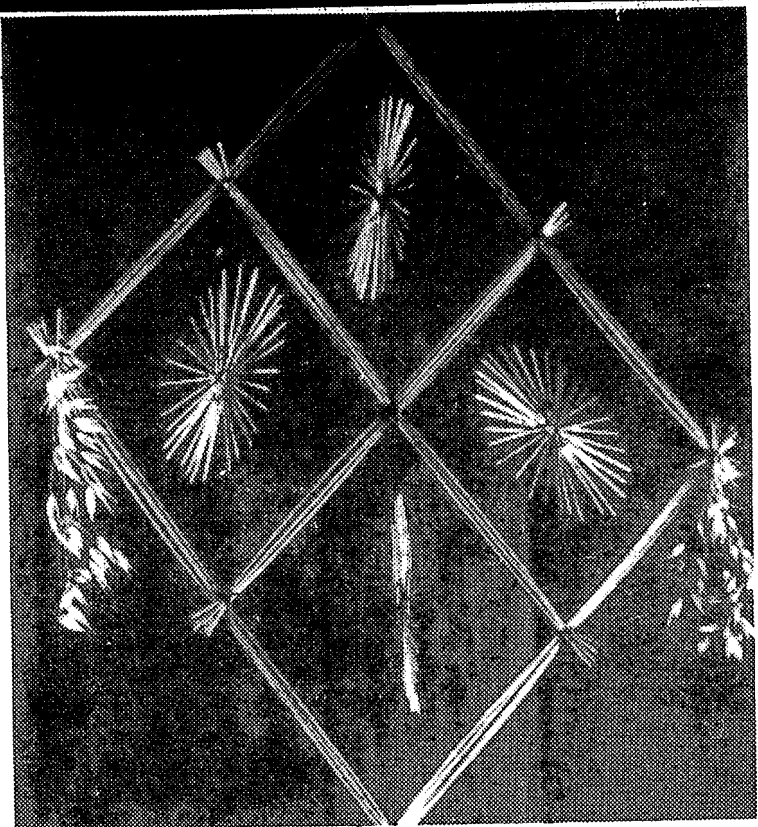

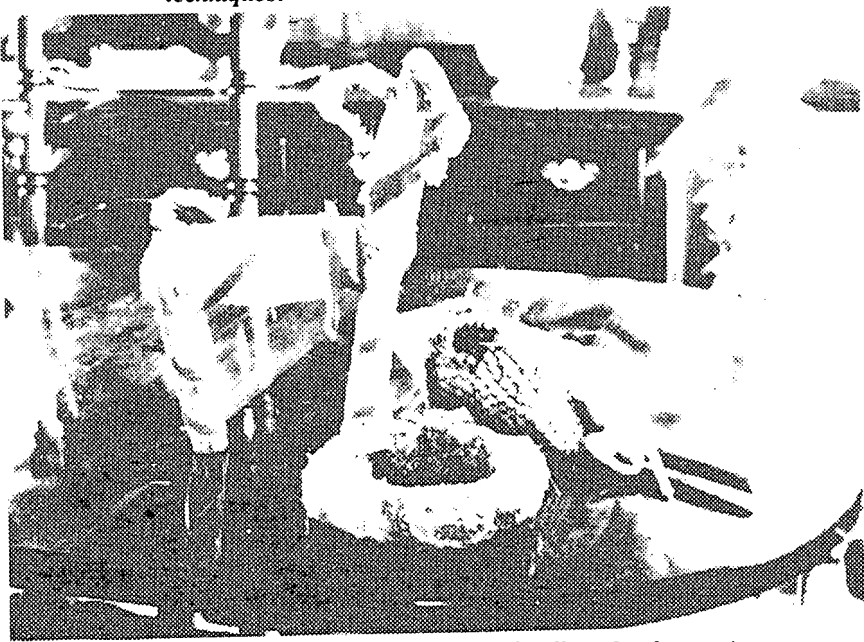

The traditional Greek holiday begins with midnight church services on Christmas Eve at St. George's Orthodox Church in Bloomfield Hills. The congregation joins in the singing of the traditional carols at the end of the service.

Another tradition is the celebration of a nameday or feastday for every person bearing the name of Chris or Christine. They usually host an open house with friends and relatives dropping in to toast their good health. Helen Antos remembers, as a child in Pontiac where the Greek community was more centralized, visiting five or six houses on Christmas Day with her parents to wish the host or hostess a long life.

Also on Christmas Day, Greek families gather for dinner which concludes with bowls of fresh fruit, an assortment of Greek pastries, and sweet bread. This sweet bread is also baked for Easter and New Year's but is decorated differently for each holiday. At Easter red eggs adorn the bread, at Christmas walnuts are used and at New Year's almonds and whole cloves.

The New Year's bread is called Vasilopita and is customarily prepared for New Year's Eve. A silver coin is inserted in each loaf which is cut at midnight into as many pieces as there are members of the family. The one who finds the lucky coin is said to have good fortune in the new year. Helen Antos has shared her recipe for Vasilopita with Reminder readers.

VASILOPITA [sweet bread]

Dissolve two pkgs. yeast in 1/2 C. warm water
Add: 1/2 lb. melted butter
2 1/4 C. lukewarm milk
1 1/4 C. sugar
1 T. salt
1 tsp. anise flavoring
1 tsp. vanilla
4 beaten eggs

Then add half of 10 cups of flour and mix until smooth. Add remaining flour one cup at a time until you can handle the dough. Place on floured surface and knead, adding flour if necessary until dough is elastic and no

longer sticky. Cover and let rise in bowl in a warm place until double in size. Punch down and let rise again. After second rise, shape into braids and let rise in greased pans until double again. Brush top with beaten egg yolk, sprinkle with sesame seeds and appropriate holiday decorations. Bake in 350 degrees for 35 or 40 minutes. If you are making this bread for New Year's remember to insert the coins when shaping loaves. After removing from oven, brush tops with melted butter and honey. Yield: five loaves.

Garner Applies for Permission to Dredge Deer Lake Channel

Independence Township has been notified by the state Department of Natural Resources that an application has been submitted by Winchester Real Estate, LTD. to dredge a channel between Deer Lake and Dark Lake in Hugh Garner's Deer Lake Farms development.

The dredging and deepening would be done in an existing stream connecting the two lakes. Proposed plans show the present watercourse varying from one to two feet in depth and two to three feet in width. After dredging it would be some 16-20 feet wide and four feet deep.

In addition to the township, copies of the application have been sent to various agencies concerned with this type of operation: Oakland Soil Conservation District, Fisheries and Wildlife divisions and public health department, among others.

Twenty days from November 28 will be allowed for reply to this application. If no written requests are filed with the DNR by then, the application may be granted without a public hearing. The DNR has stressed that whether or not a permit is issued or a public hearing is granted will be based on an evaluation of all relevant factors including the effect of the proposed work on the public trust or interest, including navigation, fish and wildlife, pollution, and the general public interest. Any objections must be factual and specific and fully describe the reasons upon which any objection is founded.

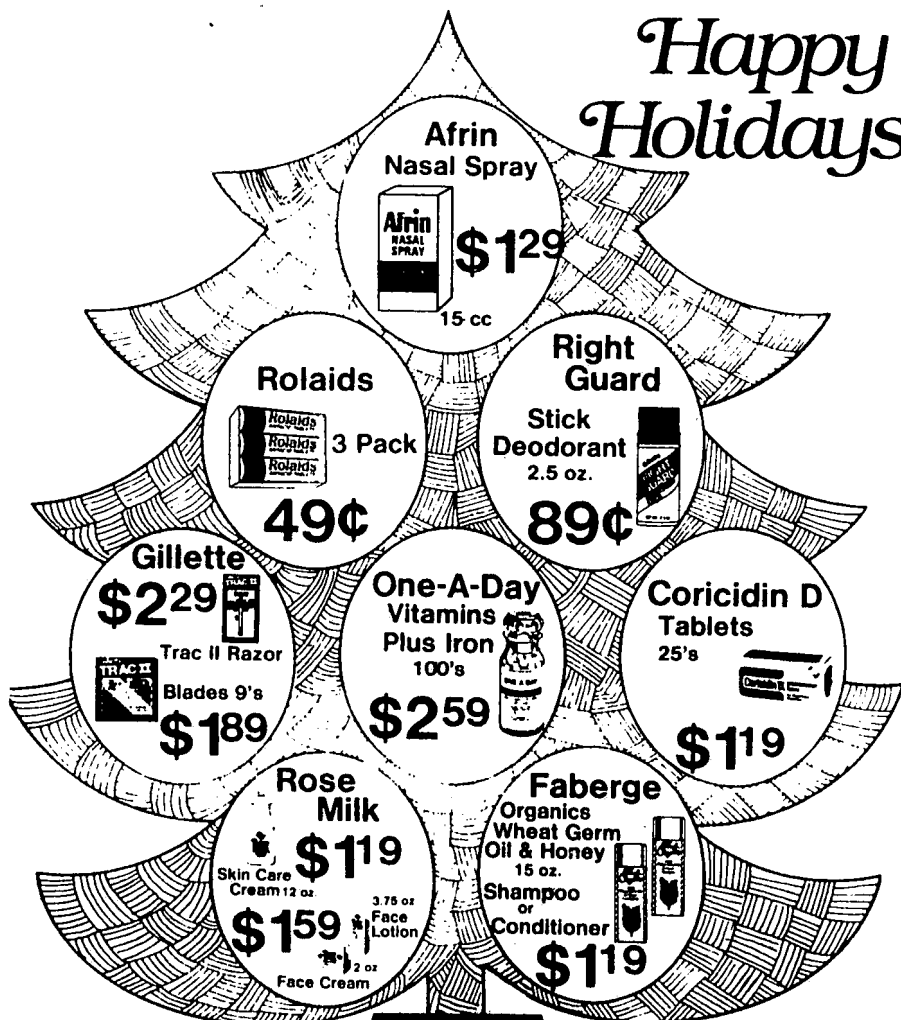

Dip 'N Strip

Almost everyone has at least one piece of antique furniture. Perhaps it is an old desk sitting in the garage with tools in the drawers, or an old "spare" bed Aunt Ethel gave you for your daughter. All of these fantastic pieces of antiquity can be restored

to their original beauty at "Dip 'N' Strip."

After being stripped to the bare wood, the piece is then hand sanded until perfectly smooth. It is then stained either natural or woodtone.

A varnish is applied, usually satin, then the piece is rubbed out and waxed.

If a customer just wants something stripped, it usually takes one week. A complete refinishing job takes about one month.

Blain recommends taking off as much glass and hardware as possible before taking furniture into Dip 'N' Strip.

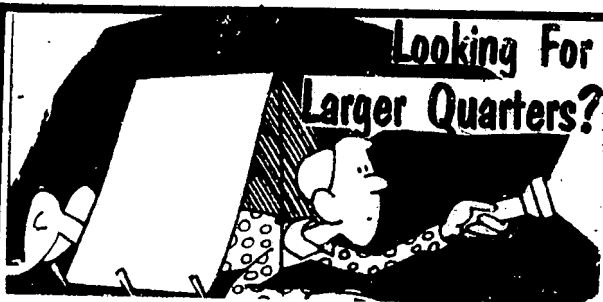
Blain also indicated that modern furniture won't refinish well, older furniture was made to refinish and last.

Although Dip 'N' Strip moved into a brand new building last July, one feels as though they are walking into the past upon entering.

A glorious master clock from an 1800's schoolhouse stands along the beautifully paneled wall that came from a Detroit mansion.

Know-it-All Grow-it All

Joel Roberts Poinsett, who was the first U.S. Minister to Mexico, brought back the first poinsettia in 1829. Little did he know that this plant would become the traditional Christmas plant for years and years to come.

At first it was thought to be a new species of a new genus. Later, it was found to be a member of the genus Euphorbia which now has over 1,000 species in the family.

Unlike most Euphorbias, which originate in either South or West Africa, the Poinsettia is native to Mexico. All parts of the poinsettia, like all Euphorbias, have a poisonous, milky latex which can burn the skin and eyes, and can be fatal if taken internally.

The true "flowers" are not the colored leaves, but the tiny greenish yellow nubs found in the center of the bracts. The poinsettia comes in a variety of colors of red, white, or pink either variegated or plain. Some of the newer varieties even have marbled foliage. One of the

nicest things about the poinsettia is that the flowers generally last between 5 and 10 weeks. Most florists poinsettias are 12 to 18" tall, but they can grow over 5' tall. Just ask anyone who has been to Florida and, even without the flowers they make attractive houseplants.

Poinsettias do best with four hours of sun (south window) a day, but they will also do nicely in two or three hours (east or west window). Unlike some houseplants that need high humidity, poinsettias do nicely in the average home with 40 to 50 % humidity. They prefer 55 to 65 degree temperatures at night and 72 degrees during the day. The soil should be allowed to dry slightly between thorough waterings. They are sensitive to drafts and overwatering, both of which will cause the leaves to drop.

The latter part of March the plant should be cut back to about 6" tall to encourage branching. At this time a regular fertilizing program should begin and continue every 2 weeks until September.

In June take 2" cuttings and allow the sap to dry a few hours. The cutting then can be rooted by placing them in rooting medium deep enough so they stand alone. Place the pots in small plastic bags and poke several pin holes

in the bag. Place in a warm non-sunny location. Roots should form in 2 or 3 weeks. Remove from bag. When cuttings are about 6 weeks old, repot into larger containers.

Have you ever wondered why your poinsettia failed to bloom again? It's because of photoperiodism, the response of certain plants to day and night lengths. The poinsettia is a short day plant which means it needs shorter days and longer nights. To be exact, it needs 40 days and 14 hour nights to bloom. If placed in darkness around October 1 from 8 p.m. until 10 a.m. you will be rewarded with colorful "flowers" by Thanksgiving time for many years to come.
