





Although it seems to be the merry-go-round that gets all the attention, Mr. and Mrs. Jon Abbott of Clarkston, have a house and garage full of various collector's items from autographs to calliopes.

The items are not the usual garage sale castaways, but rather unusual and often times quite expensive. Many of the items are hand carved animals that originated on merry-go-rounds throughout the world.

A large (nearly life size) Denzel lion peers loftily from a corner in the dining room. Mrs. Abbott claimed the Lion, which was built in 1910, came from Detroit's Edgewater Park.

Mrs. Abbott has many other animals scattered through the house. Animals, intricately hand carved by ancient masters like Charles Looff, Marcus Illions, Charles Carmel and the Philadelphia Toboggan Company.

In a couple of weeks, Mrs. Abbott expects to receive another piece from Atlanta. In the meantime she sold a rare Stein and Goldstein to make room.

How did the Abbotts ever get involved in collecting merry-go-round pieces?

Purely by chance. As Mrs. Abbott, tells it, she and her husband attended an arcade auction in Lapeer in 1973 because Jon was interested in looking at some equipment. As a lark, Mrs. Abbott began bidding on a piece. "I bought it and didn't have any idea what it was at the time," she said.

Thus the beginning of a time consuming hobby that has taken the Abbotts all over in search of rare pieces. "It's just like a wild goose chase," said Mrs. Abbott.

"We've really ran into stuff we don't expect...Such as the time we ran into a group of 42 Illions. The guy (seller) didn't know what they were. What a find!"

In 1975, the Abbotts decided to buy something more than just a merry-go-round piece. Instead they bought an entire merry-go-round.

Mrs. Abbott claims the reason they moved to Clarkston was they didn't have enough room in their Southfield yard to place a merry-go-round. Now, it's here, in Clarkston, full-sized and fully restored.

The Abbotts bought a 1912 Hershelt Spillman, bringing it home piece by piece in baskets. It was bought in 1975 from Northandawanda. New York and took an entire year to restore.

"It seemed like we would take one step forward and then three back," recalled Mrs. Abbott about the restoration process.


The finished product has a variety of animals including zebras, dogs, chickens, pigs and horses. And whenever the Abbotts operate the antique merry-goround, children from all over the neighborhood gather around to watch and ride.



Land Millage Question Added to Independence Special Ballot

The Independence Township Board unanimously approved the motion by Treasurer Fred Ritter to place a

request for three tenths (.3) of à mill for five years on the October 16 special election ballot. That millage would generate enough money to purchase 80 acres adjacent to Clintonwood Park on Clarkston Road.

Proof of financing is required before the township can initiate condemnation proceedings against the owner of the property, the Edward Levy Company which purchased it only last month.

It was Levy's plan to acquire some 500 acres in the area to operate a gravel mine that prompted Ritter's

That area includes the flood plain of the Clinton River and is also adjacent to Independence Oaks county park. The county and the state are working together in an attempt to acquire the balance of the land.

Approval of the millage proposal was not without some discussion on the board's part although those members present were generally in favor of it.

Trustee Rudy Lozano stated he was "utterly opposed" to governmental acquisition of property for the sake of acquiring property, but would support the proposal only to stop the gravel pit.

Opinions of citizens present supported the porposal mainly because they had seen the "devastation" on Stickney Road caused by that gravel pit.



Two Suspects Arraigned in Hockey Murder

Late Tuesday afternoon, September 4, two suspects were arraigned in 52nd District Court before Judge Gerald McNally. They were held without bond on an open charge of murder in the death of 20 year old Monica Hockey of Independence Township.

Arraigned were Kyle Glen Johnson of 4991 Clintonville Road and Jeffery Allen Coyle of Lake Orion. The suspects are both 19, unemployed, and have requested court-appointed attorneys.

Judge McNally set September 14, at 2 p.m. as the date for a preliminary examination to establish sufficient evidence of the crime to bind the pair over to Circuit Court for trial.

In a statement released by the office of Undersheriff Robert Nyovich of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, Johnson was identified as a parolee from Jackson prison, serving 18 months to 10 years for breaking and entering and 1-5 years for prison breaking. Coyle was listed as an escapee of a halfway house in **Pontiac**

The arrest followed a tip from an unidentified informant with credit given not only to Sheriff's Department personnel but also to the crime lab of the Michigan State Police for their assistance.



Two Hundred Springfield Residents Pack Center to Question Officials About Contaminated Wells

Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls scheduled a general information meeting last week prior to the regular meeting of the township board. It was an attempt to allay the fears and answer the questions of those residents living in the areas of dump sites found to contain toxic wastes and those whose wells have already been found to be contaminated.

To accommodate the anticipated crowd, the meeting was held at the Youth Activity Center at Springfield Oaks. Nearly 200 residents of Springfield, Rose and White Lake Townships packed the hall to hear representatives of the State Health Department of Natural Resources attempt to answer their questions.

Also in attendance were State Senator Kerry Kammer, State Representatives Claude Trim and Richard Fessler, and County Commissioner Robert Gorsline. Pat Cole, represented the newly-created Toxic Substance Control Commission.

One member of the DNR contingent, told those present the steps already taken by the agencies concerned with the problem were to be found in the newsletter published by the county health department. The newsletter will continue to be circulated for as long as necessary.

He said plans for disposal methods and costs of disposing of the barrels of contaminants were due Friday, September 7, and the DNR was still looking for a "suitable interim storage site" in the township.

The estimated cost for cleaning up the 800 barrels on the Shindler Road site alone was "guestimated" at \$200,000. The DNR repeatedly told those present cost was a major factor in how the situation was handled.

Dr. Robert Locey, director of the county health department, said the newsletter was an attempt to keep the public well-informed. he added the results of the first round of testing area wells were in and his department will meet with individuals about their test results.

Walls cautioned those present saying the meeting might be premature because not all of the answers were available and told them if anyone seemed to hesitate before answering it was because they may not know the

Ouestion: How do I know if my water is safe?

Answer: No one knows how far contamination had

They have started by sampling the wells closest to the dump sites with no firm data at this time. It may be necessary to expand the testing area, but the newsletter will keep them informed.

The wells closest to the sites will be tested first. Not all requests for testing will be honored. If some are considered too far away but people are anxious, they may consult a private testing lab.

Question: Why have the contaminants not been transferred to safer containers?

Answer: We are making arrangements now with contractors who do this sort of work. Money is a problem, there are no special funds available but they are working on it. "We can't spend money we don't

Later Senator Kammer assured citizens the money would be available either to be found in the DNR budget or by special appropriation. He pledged his support along with that of Trim and Fessler.

Kammer also said it was faster and easier to provide state funds for the cleanup than to take those responsible to court to force cleanup.

It was estimated it would take 2-3 weeks to remove the drums once someone was found to do the job and the money found to pay for the removal.

Question: Have the two elementary schools been tested, Andersonville and Davisburg? They are each close to a dump site.

Answer: They are outside the test areas. (After residents disagreed, however, and persisted, county

health department people agreed to test the water at the two schools.).

Ouestion: Do we qualify for emergency funds? Answer: That will be discussed at the September meeting of the Toxic Substance Control Commission.

Question: What about dairy contamination? There are several farms in the area.

Answer: The farms have not been sampled because the question has not come up before. It will be turned over to the Department of Agriculture.

Question: What about possible effects on Big Lake? Answer: Fish and surface water samples will be taken later. The main concern is with the groundwater for the time being.

Question: Are there alternate sources of water? Answer: The five-gallon containers presently used are the best method although not the most convenient. A tanker filled with water could be placed in the area but the water would have to be so heavily chlorinated it

would be undrinkable. Eventually, three suggestions are possible. Once the aquifer is investigated and the extent of the contamination is known, it may be just a deeper well will be required. Another possibility would be to extend an existing municipal water system. A third suggestion was a community water supply, a new well in a safe area close to the affected homes.

It was generally agreed it would take months to years to accomplish any of these.

In the meantime, putting anything in water conditioners in an attempt to purify the water was not recommended. It would be better to use alternate sources of water for the time being.

Question: What about property values, new homes and proposed new homes?

Answer: Walls was checking on tax assessments for this year but is finding it difficult to establish a rate for lowering assessments.

As far as new homes under construction were concerned, Walls said he didn't know as yet what to do about final occupancy permits. He didn't know if he could legally hold them up or hold up building permits either. He was explaining the situation to anyone who requested a building permit.

Question: Who is responsible for the situation and why was it not taken care of long ago?

Answer: There were no answers to "why" or "who." only that the DNR was in charge of the situation now. Legislative steps have been taken recently covering the disposal of toxic wastes, but no guarantee was made that this will not happen again despite legislation.

After three hours the meeting broke up and the people left. Some of their questions were answered, many were

The people are concerned over the degree of harmfulness of some of these substances on the human body. No one could agree on how much one substance could do and what the effects would be.

There is a general fear of unknown chemicals with unknown effects over unknown periods of time.

There seems to be no one to blame for the dumping, no one to blame for not following through on the cleanup order, no guarantee this won't happen again, and no timetable for getting back to normal.

Independence Earmarks Surplus for General Fund

The Independence Township Board has finally decided to spend about \$235,000 of surplus funds by not levying general fund millage next year.

The proposal by Clerk Chris Rose was not without opposition, however. Treasurer Fred Ritter sharply disagreed with Rose calling the proposal "financially irresponsible."

Ritter's agrument was based on an interpretation of the Headlee amendment passed last November. Ritter feared that if the township levied no general fund millage next year, the following year they would be levying a percentage of zero with the resulting figure being zero.

Rose did not agree with Ritter's interpretation, but said if it should prove to be correct, the board would just tell the citizens they had made a mistake and ask them to approve once more the 1.33 mills normally levied by the

Ritter's proposal to levy .9536 percent (the Headlee rollback formula) of the current 1.33 mills or 1.27 mills, for the general fund was defeated on a tie vote. Trustee Jerry Powell was absent.

A similar vote defeated Rose's first motion to levy no general fund millage. When the motion was reconsidered, Supervisor Floyd Tower broke the tie by supporting it.

The motion to levy no general fund millage next year was supported by Rose, Trustees Bill Vandermark and Rudy Lozano and Tower. it was opposed by Ritter and Trustee Mike Thayer.

The Headlee rollback formula was also applied to the police, fire and sewer millages. The fire levy will be 1.9072 mills and not the usual two mills. The police millage will be .9536 down from one mill, while the sewer levy will be reduced from 1.46 to .635. Surplus funds totalling \$100,000 has also been applied thus lowering the levy for sewers further.







Independence Tables Drain Issues Again

Two drain issues making their third appearances before the Independence Township Board were tabled to the satisfaction of citizens who oppose them although not to the satisfaction of the businessmen who favor them.


The M-15 drain issue, tabled from the July 17 meeting, is opposed by many people because it is tied to a proposed widening of that section of the road north of the Dixie Highway as far as Paramus to five lanes.

Village residents fear wider roads both north and south of the village limits will eventually lead to the same situation within the limits.

Council President Fontie ApMadoc asked the township board to once again delay any decisions on the drain until another public hearing scheduled by the State Department of Transportation can be held after the first of the year.

The results of the previous hearing had sent highway officials back to the drawing board to come up with a more popular proposal as far as protesting residents were concerned. They convinced highway people at that hearing there must be a better way than the one proposed.

DPW director George Anderson told the board

construction of the drain even if approved that night likely would not take place until next spring.

Howard Kieft of Kieft Engineering located on M-15 argued the drain and the road widening were two separate issues. He contended someone had to make the first move and it was time the township did. He told them the village was not part of the drain project in the first place.

Clerk Chis Rose told Kieft the two were a single issue because price alone tied them together, and that the township wanted to see the entire proposal before making any decision.

The initial estimate of drain costs given the township was \$650,000 of which the township would pay 35 percent. A revised estimate provided later was \$350,000. The township was told the second estimate was lower because the drain project had been combined with road widening.

Other objections came from residents of Hidden Lane who are unhappy over where the drain would empty into Dollar Lake.

After learning the county drain commission had refused to put any more money into engineering, Kieft volunteered to do it himself at no charge.

Once again, board opinion was divided with Trustee Rudy Lozano siding with the businessmen and urging approval of the drain project.

Treasurer Fred Ritter's motion to table the issue until after the Transportation Department's public hearing was approved on a 5-1 vote with only Lozano dissenting although Supervisor Floyd Tower was not entirely happy with the decision.

In the second event of people vs. drains, the people won again as the proposed HiWood drain was tabled to seek the township attorney's opinion.


The drain project proposed by developer Hugh Garner to alleviate water problems in his new Chestnut Hills subdivision on Maybee Road had been approved by the board when first presented some months ago.

The board's resolution and petition to the Oakland County Drain Commission was first rejected because it was not in the proper form. The second time it was sent back for "clarification."

That clarification would have the township assessed for the costs of the drain and not the developer because the county can only assess a governmental body. The township would then have to make its own arrangements with the developer who has stated his intentions of paying for the entire project. If reworded, the township would be responsible.

Hiwood residents who have opposed the project from the outset told the board, "We don't trust you." citing past experiences with the township, the county and the contractors who put the sewer lines through the subdivision last year.

Tower was unable to convince them the safeguards built into the agreement with Garner were sufficient to guarantee the township would not be responsible for payment should the developer default.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for (free meals and milk, or reduced-price meals). In addition, families not meeting these criteria' but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and diaster or casualty losses can apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the

principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space of signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free or reduced price meals and/or free milk if total far income include welfare payments, unemployment compensation and sub-pay benefits fall within the prescribed family income guidelines.


