

Dear Mr. Wilcox,

So with no trade-in allowance, increased price of the new vehicle and the new ceiling on auto loan interest rates "Ye old John Q citizen gets it again" right? And if we get lucky and can swing the minimum down payment on a new automobile, there are still the payments each month. There are many people who are finding it hard

to pay their heating bills, Edison, telephone, taxes (income, property, sales, etc.) and let's not forget the frills such as grocery and clothing bills. So let's tax the one thing that all the others depend upon, transportation. The poor and middle class would be the hardest hit by your proposal. Your idea is not original, many of our tax supported politicans have come up with the same solutions. A solution that would not deal fairly with the problem. I am not afraid of sacrifice or opposed to it. But I think sacrifice should be shared by all those who will eventually benefit from it.

I notice Mr. Wilcox that you refer to the United States oil needs as Mr. Carter's oil needs. I take exception to this opinion. Whatever Mr. Carter's politics and his rating as President may be, the oil needs are not Mr. Carter's alone. These oil needs are the responsibility of all Americans. I can except that responsibility can you?

I'm sure you are wondering if I have a solution to the economic and energy problems of our country. No sir I do not! And I'm not saying your solution is wrong either. What I'm trying to say is there are many other things to consider when coming up with a solution such as yours. Our country, in my opinion, is not economically or geographically the same as Europe.

Mr. Lee lococca of the Chrysler Corporation had an idea that may be worth consideration. He proposed a one year gas tax to be returned to the people in a \$1500.00 tax exemption for buying an American made automobile. Therefore helping reduce consumption and stimulate auto sales and the economy. By having a one year tax we could observe the results and if favorable, renew





### The Hockey Murder: A Close Look at the Trial

The trial of Kyle Johnson and Jeffrey Coyle began March 13 in Oakland County Circuit Court six months after they were arrested and charged with the Labor Day weekend murder of Monica Hockey.

In September following their arrest they were arraigned in 52nd District Court, a preliminary examination was held before Judge Gerald McNally, and they were bound over to Circuit Court on an open charge of murder.

In October they were arraigned in the higher court and returned to the county jail to await trial. At that time it was anticipated by County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson the trial would get underway some time in December or January. It was delayed until March 13.

In the intervening months, the case went through the "discovery" phase of the judicial process, according to defense attorneys. Court-appointed attorneys L. Robert Sterling and Howard Arnkoff were given the opportunity to look at all of the prosecutor's evidence as he assembled it. There are no courtroom surprises these days.

During that time the defendants were also given the opportunity to seek courtappointed medical assistance frequently used to determine if insanity is a possible plea. Apparently it was not in this case.

Two days prior to the start of the trial, jury selection began. Two juries were empaneled because some of the evidence to be presented would concern one defendant and not the other. This is not the first time two juries have sat at one trial.

When the trial began before Judge Farrell Roberts, Assistant Prosecutor Edward Sosnick made his opening statements to the Johnson jury. He told them he intended to prove through witnesses Kyle Johnson murdered 20-year old Monica Hockey in a "brutal, unfeeling and premeditated" manner. He outlined the events of that Labor Day weekend and told them what to expect from the various witnesses.

The Johnson jury was excused and the Coyle jury brought in. Moments passed, then the Johnson jury returned. Through a mixup, two of the Coyle jurors had sat in on Sosnick's opening statements meant for the Johnson jury alone. They were excused from duty on this trial.

The missing Johnson juror was brought in and Sosnick repeated his opening statements for her alone.

The Coyle jury reassembled, now with no alternate because of the mixup, and Sosnick went through his opening statements for the third time that morning.

When defendants Johnson and Coyle were in the courtroom, security was exceptionally tight with deputies guarding both the two men and the doors. Security was due to an altercation several days before when the pair apparently attacked another prisoner in the jail trying to establish, he claimed, possible insanity.

With delays, recesses, and other pauses in the proceedings, it's virtually impossible to cover a trial without covering the spectators as well. They can be as interesting, if not more so, than the trial itself.

Aside from the friends and relatives of the defendants, there were three middle-aged women one of whom was knitting, all of whom were chatting. One said her husband would be glad to know she had had such a nice day. Another said she really ought to be home stuffing cream puffs. Once they settled on a nice place to have lunch, they left when court recessed for lunch.

An elderly black man making notes on a scrap of paper said sitting in court was preferable to hanging around bars and pool halls and not nearly as lonely as staying home.

Also present were several law students, a journalism student working on an assignment, some apparent county employees and a few other people who were just plain curious.

Judge Roberts quickly ordered a delegation of high school students out of the courtroom and instructed deputies to not allow a disturbance of that kind again.

The remainder of the morning was devoted to having photographs admitted as evidence, Judge Roberts allowing black-and-whites but not colored. Defense attorneys objected to the latter as "inflammatory" and "more prejudicial than probatory."

Thursday afternoon and Friday Sosnick laid the groundwork for his case calling Dr. James Sillery, pathologist and chief medical examiner for Oakland County, Officer Richard Sesh of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department crime lab, and Charlotte Day of the Michigan State Police crime lab all presenting technical evidence.

So often courtroom proceedings are referred to as "drama", but in reality there is a theatrical quality about them. The jury is the audience, the judge is the director, and the attorneys, defendants and witnesses are

the actors.
Sosnick frequently checked his notes apparently to make sure nothing was left out, no step omitted, as he pieced his case together, much as an actor would refer to his script as the drama progressed.

The boxes containing items to be entered into the case as evidence could be likened to the various props needed during the course of a play. Detective Sergeant Heiligenthal make sure Sosnick had all of the items he needed in the proper order for the proper witness as the trial went on. Ultimately there was a total of 70 items.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hockey, the victim's parents, Dirk Feneley, former Independence Township policeman, Deputy Lawrence Liggett of the OCSD, and Stanley Golombeski all testified to the events of the weekend in question. Golombeski is the 70-year old Independence Township man who discovered Monica Hockey's body while bicycling near Clintonville- and Maybee

Four witnesses, including one defendant's own sister Diane Johnson, testified Monday and Tuesday implicating the pair in the murder. One key witness told the court Coyle had told him they were thinking of "doing" mass murders saying there was "nothing like it", and making reference to Charles Manson.

Tuesday also saw the defense make two unsuccessful attempts to have a mistrial declared by Judge Roberts, one on the grounds that a witness said he and the defendants had all talked about "doing time", the second because a juror had sent a note to the judge asking a question. In trials of this type no mention is allowed of the past record of the accused so as not to prejudice the jury.

The trial resumed Thursday, Wednesday being motion day in Circuit Court, with the testimony of Rex Egress, owner of Rex's Union 76 station in Clarkston. Egress had towed Monica Hockey's car to his station after it was discovered by a state trooper in the area known as the Double D Ranch. He was followed by Detective Sergeants Heiligenthal and Davis. The People versus Coyle rested at that point.

### Bulletin As We Were Going to Press:

Kyle Glen Johnson; 19, of Independence Township, was convicted of murdering Monica Hockey. The first-degree murder conviction carries a mandatory life sentence, Jeffrey Allan Coyle, 19, of Lake Orion, was also charged in the murder, but his jury was excused for the weekend before reaching a verdict.

Juries went out, then defendants, the lawyers and the judge leaving the rest to wonder what was up. When all returned except the jury, it was learned that Johnson wished to testify in Coyle's behalf.

He was warned that he would be crossexamined, that his testimony could even be used against him later and that he had the right to remain silent. The defense attorneys and the judge explained everything to him very carefully before he took the witness stand, related to the court the events of Labor Day weekend from his point of view and said that Coyle had nothing whatsoever to do with the murder of Monica Hockey.

Sosnick was visibly annoyed with the unexpected turn of events. Although the defense is entitled to the prosecutor's evidence and list of witnesses during the discovery phase of the case, the reverse is not true for the prosecution.

He became somewhat sarcastic with Johnson during cross-examination questioning him about lying and about certain discrepancies in his story. He seemed annoyed about Johnson's calm, matter-offact recitation of the crime itself.

Later that day, Coyle was called to the witness stand to give his version of that weekend. Using terms like "recall" instead of "remember", "high intoxicated", "instead of drunk", and "vehicle" instead of "car" made the 19-year old sound as though he might have been coached. He said Monica Hockey had been drinking a lot and had taken drugs contrary to expert testimony and said he never struck her.

A rebuttal witness told the jury once again that Johnson had said, "Want to know what we did last night...we killed Monica." He also said Coyle told him he had punched her and showed his red swollen knuckles.

Diane Johnson testified her brother had told her during a jail visit to say that Coyle had not been there and that he was trying to get him off. She echoed previous testimony about the statements implicating both, not one, in the murder.

The prosecution rested its case to go to the Coyle jury Friday morning and the Johnson jury Friday afternoon. As of press time, the fates of Johnson and Coyle were still in their hands.



### Look at the Plants, **But Please Don't Eat**

Little children are adventuresome. Just about anything they see is liable to be tested or eaten unless supervision is close. Parents spend a good part of their time instructing youngsters in the lesson: "Look, but don't eat." The lesson applies to so much around a home—medicines, cleaners, cosmetics, pesticides, living plants, and a long additional list.

Where living plants are concerned, the American Association of Nurserymen has compiled some statistics which should be reassuring to concerned parents. The data shows that, while the "look, but don't eat" rule must be emphasized, the danger to children from cultivated plants in and around the home is, at most, mini-

The AAN's information comes from the National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers, the federal office which compiles reports from the some 500 Poison Control centers throughout the nation. The most recent data from the Clearinghouse

to a hospital—for examination in the out-patient or emergency room or for admittance as patients. During the last year reported, 8% of all cases of

"ingestion" were hospitalized.
The last category reported by the National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers is fatalities. Each year some people die from ingesting a toxic substance. There were 100 poison deaths reported in 1976, the last year of record.

None of these resulted from the ingestion of living plants.

Children under age five accounted for 61% of all ingestions reported through the National Clearinghouse, but accounted for only 22% of the symptoms, and 20% of hospital visits resulting from suspected ingestion of poisonous substances.

Where the "plants" category is concerned, among children under five years of age slightly under 5% of ingestions were accompanied by symptoms; .4% required a hospital visit; no fatalities occurred.
