ted at The Nickelodeon last Saturday.



Although we wouldn't want to pull you. away from the splendor of Spring outdoors, this is an exceptional week for indoor activities.


Graduates of Clarkston Junior High School will be getting together at the old school on Saturday to observe its golden an niversary. A feature story on that event also appears in this issue.

WHAT ABOUT EMBALMING?

There are varying laws and regulations about embalming throughout our country by state and even by some cities. They differ by customs, religious beliefs, usage and consumer demands.

Embalming is not usually required by law except under certain conditions. It is usually written into law if death was due∳to₂a*communicable disease or if final disposition has to be delayed too long or if the body is to be carried from one state to another.

The needs for such requirements are obvious. The advantages of embalming are three-fold: 1) It allows survivors time to make proper and unhurried funeral arrangements; 2) It permits relatives to come from afar for the funeral; and 3) Embalming preserves the body in a favorable appearance for the final viewings. In the case of a devastating illness or violent death, this third point becomes all the more important. While one can sometimes eliminate the embalming costs, the alternative solutions usually end up as more expensive and more harrowing.



Former Olympic Star, State Representative Frank Crowley Dies

Former Olympic runner and State Representative, Francis (Frank) Crowley died at his home in Clarkston on April 13.

Crowley, who died at the age of 70, after a bout with cancer and spinal problems that had confined him to a wheelchair since the early 1960's, owned a long list of accomplishments that were started in 1928 when he ran his first long distance race.

That was the start of a track career that took Crowley around the world. In 1930, while attending high school in Pennsylvania, he set a national high school mile record of 4:21. Two weeks later he did 4:16.

The highlight of his career, however, was making the United States Olympic team in

"I guess the Olympic trials at Stanford that year was my biggest claim to fame," said Crowley in an earlier interview. "I beat Glenn Cunningham and was No. 2 man on the U.S. team. In the games themselves, I finished seventh."

During The Depression, Crowley and his wife Billie lived in New York City, where he taught and coached at a parochial school. He later became a salesman for the Ballantine Brewing Company.

When World War II came, Crowley served as detachment commander in the 36th General Hospital Corps in North Africa and

After the War, Crowley and his family settled in Clarkston and opened his own beer distributorship. In 1964 he ran for and won a term as State Representative.

In the late 1970's, Crowley served as Assistant Sergeant of Arms for the Michigan State Legislature. When he fell ill, a joint citation from the legislature proclaimed Crowley as "a gentleman of incredible drive, persistance and accomplishment. He epitomizes the traits we most value in a person. He is accorded the highest tribute in recognition of all he has done to secure the commonweal."

Roads a Continuing Problem For Both County and Townships

The single greatest complaint by citizens at Independence Township's annual meeting on March 29 was about the condition of the roads. They figured for what they paid in taxes, they should be getting better roads. Township officials directed them to the Oakland County Road Commission (OCRC) for some answers.

The average citizen knows little about the OCRC beyond the huge orange trucks and graders seem from time to time in the area. He knows the primary roads are salted in the winter while some of the side roads are sanded. If he contracts for chloride in the summer, he can expect to see that truck four

times. Repair crews can be found patching blacktop roads or grading gravel roads. Once in a while he may find tall grass and weeds being cut at rural intersections or chemicals being sprayed to kill weeds creating greater

Beyond that, what does the road commission do? Who runs it? Who decides which road projects are approved and which ones are not? Where does the money come

from to operate the OCRC?

At the top of the administrative pyramid are the three road commissioners appointed by the county commissioners for part-time policy-making meetings weekly with OCRC management. They hire the full-time managing director and the county highway engineer, while County Executive Dan Murphy hires the eleven department heads with. the aid of the highway engineer.

The three commissioners are chairman Fred D. Houghten of Rochester, vicechairman John R. Gnau of Bloomfield Township and Richard V. Vogt of Berkley.

John L. Grubba of Southfield is the managing director and Paul Van Roekel of Waterford Township is the highway

engineer.

Five of the departments, referred to as departments. include legal, support secretary-clerk, finance, purchasing, and The remainder personnel. engineering, maintenance, traffic, permits, citizen services, and transportation planning and environment.

Dennis L. Pajot, public information officer for the OCRC, explained the road commission was separate from the rest of county government by legislative action. The state legislature passed an act allowing counties to establish road commissions if they wanted them and make them separate from the political part of government.

The OCRC is financed primarily by state collected gas and weight taxes amounting to about sixty percent of their budget. The amount received is determined by a statewide distribution formula, State money for the 1980 budget totals about \$22 million.

About \$5 million is anticipated by the matching-fund road projects between the OCRC and local government. One example of this is this year's planned paving of Holcomb Road between the Clarkston village limits and the I-75 overpass. The county and Independence Township will share the costs. By state law, Pajot stressed, the county cannot fund more than 50 percent of local road construction projects with state gas and weight taxes.

He also agreed with citizen complaints that many county roads are below standard, but Pajot blamed it on the state which, he said, too long treated Oakland as a rural county and funded it accordingly. Even with improvements in the funding formula, the county has been unable to catch up and a still greater percentage of state funds is

needed, according to Pajot.
The OCRC's 1980 budget totals \$35 million, \$22 million of that from the state. Of the total, about \$25 million goes for operating expenses not including construction, while the remaining \$10 million, including local matching funds, goes into the construction program. Salaries and wages for its 547 employees take 11.8 of the \$35 million budget while fringe benefits take an additional 3.5.

Oakland County does not do the actual road construction, their engineers design and inspect the road projects but the construction is done by private contractors who bid for the work. Pajot said there have been no new county-built roads in decades. Instead work has been limited to resurfacing,

widening and paving.

. The question of who decides what roads get repaired, resurfaced, graded or simply maintained is an important one to the citizens of North Oakland County. What factors those decisions are based on is of great concern to those in this less densely populated area with mainly gravel roads. Do areas with more people and more traffic get more money and more attention?

Pajot said the county highway engineer keeps a log in which he assesses the needs of the county's roads. A second factor is the money available, both federal and local.

In 1968, safety was established by the county commissioners number one priority in determining road work. One example Pajot gave was extensive shoulder widening in high hazard locations.

As some citizens may have feared, population density is a factor. In this case, the state tells the county that it will use population as a factor as well as mileage.

Thirty-four percent of state funds to local road commissions is based on population and miles of roads. A second aspect of state allocation Pajet called "urban fund

mileage", giving counties like Wayne and Oakland more money than a predominantly rural county. Cities, on the other hand, get their own state funds for road projects.

Of the funds coming to the county from the state, state law determines that 75 percent will be used on primary roads, 25 per-

cent on local roads.

To put this into other terms, local roads account for 61 percent of the county's total roads, but they only get 25 percent of the state money. Primary roads, on the other hand, only account for 39 percent of the county's roads, but they get three-quarters of the money. The county is monitored by the state to make sure the funds are distributed as required, Pajot said.

There are no county taxes paid directly to the road commission, nothing earmarked. A decision is made each year by the county commissioners to budget some money for the OCRC. Pajot said that has amounted to less than \$500,000 since 1971 but this is not property tax money, he said. That is preven-

ted by law.

Township property taxes may be used for funding road projects, however, and millage is another method of local financing.

Of the county's 23 townships, Pajot said four of them levy millage for roads. Bloomfield uses theirs for road maintenance only working with the county. Avon's also goes for maintenance but they do not work with the county. Commerce uses their miliage for road construction with matching county funds. Highland's new millage is for road construction working with the county.

Other townships, such as Independence and Springfield, must use general fund money or whatever federal funds may be

used for roads.

Pajot said the county is encouraging local governments to establish their own road millages or to put more money into roads from the general fund. A committee of super-

McLaughlin-Announces County Commission Candidacy





visors has been formed, headed by Springfield Supervisor Collin Walls, to study the situation.

Walls said the committee has reviewed the road situation and believes what the OCRC has been telling them. Alternate funding methods are definitely needed.

He said that Brandon and White Lake Townships will place a request for one road mill on the August ballot. Avon is considering increasing its millage to allow for construction also. Road millage is also being considered by Lyon, Orion and Springfield townships.

At Springfield's annual meeting response to the millage idea was not so much opposition to it as conviction that it wouldn't pass. Walls said it was up to the board first to justify the necessity and then to sell it to the citizens.

Even if the board decides to ask for the millage and the voters approve it, all township roads will not be blacktopped. Walls said maybe one or two where necessary but the bulk of the money would be used to maintain what was there already.

The township board realized a number of years ago that without local money set aside for road projects there would be few improvements made. General funds have been set aside since the 1978-79 budget combined with money left over from the previous year. There is now about \$80,000 in the road fund in addition to annual programs for graveling and tri-party projects already agreed to with the county.

The type of planning Springfield is engaged in is what Pajot would like to see more townships have. With current economic trends, state-allocated money has not begun to fall off, he said, but it has begun to level off. Gas and weight tax money is based on the number of gallons sold and the weight of the cars driven. Recently, the trend has been toward smaller cars and gasoline conservation.

Pajot feels the legislature will have to consider changing from number of gallons and tonnage as a basis for funding and replacing cost as the basis to offset this trend.

As financing becomes more of a problem. Paiot said many of the road projects now on the books will have to be scrapped. The number will have to decrease simply because less money from the state will be coupled with increasing construction costs with an additional problem of questionable federal funds.

In a recently-released three year plan, the OCRC estimates the costs of simply maintaining the county's roads will be \$14.3 million in 1981, \$15.5 million in 1982 and \$16.9 million in 1983.

At the same time they expect the total amount to be spent for construction to be \$19.4 million in 1981 declining to \$11.8 million in 1982 and \$7.7 in 1983.

Pajot reiterated the only answer is new sources of funding. One must be a new state formula and the other must be more local money of some sort.

HVA-They've Come A Long Way

by Kathy Rush

Resuscitators, hypodermic needles, pulse tachometers, intravenous fluid, tourniquets, leg splints and stretchers. All words that might make the average person's stomach do an uneasy flip. In the case of Holly Volunteer Ambulance (HVA) service these terms are as natural as baseball, hot dogs, apple pie and Chevrolet.

Beginning in 1969, HVA's equipment consisted of one ambulance - an old, refurbished Cadillac hearse, a one-room office at the Holly Police Station and several lawn chairs

used for seats.

HVA has come a long way since then. The construction of the nearly new building which is the result of dedicated personal time and effort on the part of the volunteers, reeks with efficiency. The station is outfitted with three modern, fully-equipped ambulances, sleeping quarters for both men and



women volunteers, kitchen facilities and a direct hotline to the Holly Police Station.

Not only is the equipment effectual but the attendants are extremely competent. Roger Gillespie, charter member and director of HVA says, "Preparation is becoming more and more complex. Requirements for an attendant presently are a certificate in Advanced First Aid and Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), which involves at least 60 hours training, or the more advanced Emergency Medical Training (EMT) certificate involving 128 additional hours.

At least 50% of the attendants at HVA have attained an EMT certificate and many of the others are waiting to take the exams given by the overburdened state department. Additionally, HVA has set up a fifteen hour program instructing attendants in how to handle the equipment, plus six to nine training sessions a year as a refresher course. "Because it is a continuous training situation," Gillespie said, "we have plenty of qualified instructors right here at HVA. There are twelve Advanced First Aid instructors, 14 CPR instructors and two instructor trainers."

Having responded to over 700 calls last year is confirmation that there is a need for HVA. "Every year the number of calls seems to increase," said Gillespie. "Our area covers

four townships; Holly, Springfield, Rose and Groveland," Although this forms an imaginary line, they will respond to any call. "Last week we had a call to north of Goodrich. We had not thought this to be our territory but this is not the name of the game. The object is to get help as fast as possible in a medical emergency, wherever it may

HVA also performs what they refer to as "first-aid runs". Gillesple explained, "These are services in which we respond to a call, yet do not transport the patient to the hospital because that is their preference." For example, "We delivered a baby whose mother did not wish to go to the hospital so there was no fee involved. We charge. nothing for these services because this is a benefit we like to give to the community since we are community supported.'

Having women attendants presents no problem with hoisting stretchers. "Training involves learning how to lift with the legs rather than the back," says Lois Merrill, secretary and attendant. "It's not a problem, although sometimes police officers at the scene sometimes think so."

A crew consists of three attendants on duty for a 24-hour shift. Should the first crew go on call, immediately Lois is on the phone

Independence Firefighters Push for Special Assessment District

Independence Township voters will have more than just a Presidential primary candidate to vote for on the May 20th ballot. A controversial special assessment district that if approved, would allow the township board to levy up to 10 mills for fire protection, has already been the topic of much discussion, despite the election being a month away.

Fire Chief Frank Ronk and nearly two dozen firefighters attended last week's board meeting to ask board members for support of the ballot proposal. When they met more opposition than support, it became a lively meeting with board members having to defend themselves against verbal attacks from Ronk and his frustrated cohorts.

A special assessment district, although new to Independence, is currently utilized in Avon and Brandon Townships. Its purpose is to allow the township board to levy up to 10 mills, (one mill is equal to approximately \$215,000) in this case for fire protection, without having to bring it to a vote of the people. Each year the township board would be required to levy the assessment. One year it could be 1 mill, the next year possibly 10 mills.

Chief Ronk claims the likelihood of 10 mills ever being levied is remote, however. He intends to ask for 1 more mill this year if the proposal is passed. The fire department presently operates on 2 mills.

In outlining his objections to the Board's unwillingness to support the proposal, Ronk said he has been after the Board to act on

the matter since September 1979.

In January he threatened to circulate petitions to get the proposal on the ballot. With no action forthcoming the firefighters began going door-to-door in March to collect the 955 signatures needed. They came close to collecting that number-so close the Board agreed to place the proposal on the May 20 ballot.

One of the ways Ronk expects to utilize the extra mill is for the purchase of the new equipment. Fire apparatus, some nearly a dozen years old, are on first response. One front line engine is nearly an antique, having been built in 1959.

Ronk would also like to initiate a building program, thus improving and adding to present stations.

"We are at best just holding our own now,"



Ronk added, "It's very frustrating to me as a department head to continue to butt heads with you guys." Everytime the fire department brings a proposal in front of you we get no support he said.

The special assessment district received

plenty of support from firefighters. Nell Ashley stated, "There seems to be plenty of support from the community (referring to the over 900 signatures. gathered). Ten mills means everyone here could put a pumper in their garage. All we want is one more mill!"

Neil Sage added, "I don't see you folks walking into the (fire) hall. I don't think you even know what we have down there." How can you make a decision without this basic information?

But board members were unwavered by the firefighters' logic.

Trustee Jerry Powell bluntly said, "I think (special assessment district) is a lousy idea. I won't support it."

"I think this proposal will fail," added Trustee William Vandermark. "I don't think it merits a place on the ballot. It avoids the intent of the Headlee amendment and it exposes the township to the possibility of a 10 mill levy.'

Trustee Rudy Lozano also voiced his disapproval. "I disagree from the standpoint that people want to have a little more to say about how their government spends money.'

"I don't think it's a good proposal," said Clerk Chris Rose. "There's nothing in the act that says the money must be used for fire."

Trustee Mike Thayer had a different opinion, however, "I will support the proposal the way it is because we got to get the money one way or the other.'

And Treasurer Fred Ritter objected too, suggesting, "We should go after something smaller for a definite period of time."


--The debate between firefighters and township board will likely not end here. The firefighters expect to campaign heavily for the proposal up until the May 20th election.

calling in a back-up crew. "We have rolled all three rigs within seven minutes. This is the way the people involved respond;" said Gillespie.

The volunteer attendants are from all walks of life. There are ministers, nurses, factory workers, retirees, housewives and students. A real mixture of people with one thing in common. the desire to serve their community in a meaningful way.

Until recently, the only money earned by the volunteers was \$5.00 per run. Now to offset the cost of the slacks, coats and time



proximately 50° an hour. "The only person here who truly draws a salary is the secretary," said Gillespie. "Obviously, it's not the money these people are here for. This organization is made up of an unselfish bunch of people who have donated much time and effort -- that's what really has kept this program going.

How many lives have been saved by the HVA service. I wouldn't even attempt to guess, Gillespie said. "I do know that if there was not an ambulance service in this area and people had to wait 15 or 20 minutes for one from Fenton, Waterford or Pontlac, there's a number of people who would not

have survived.


