

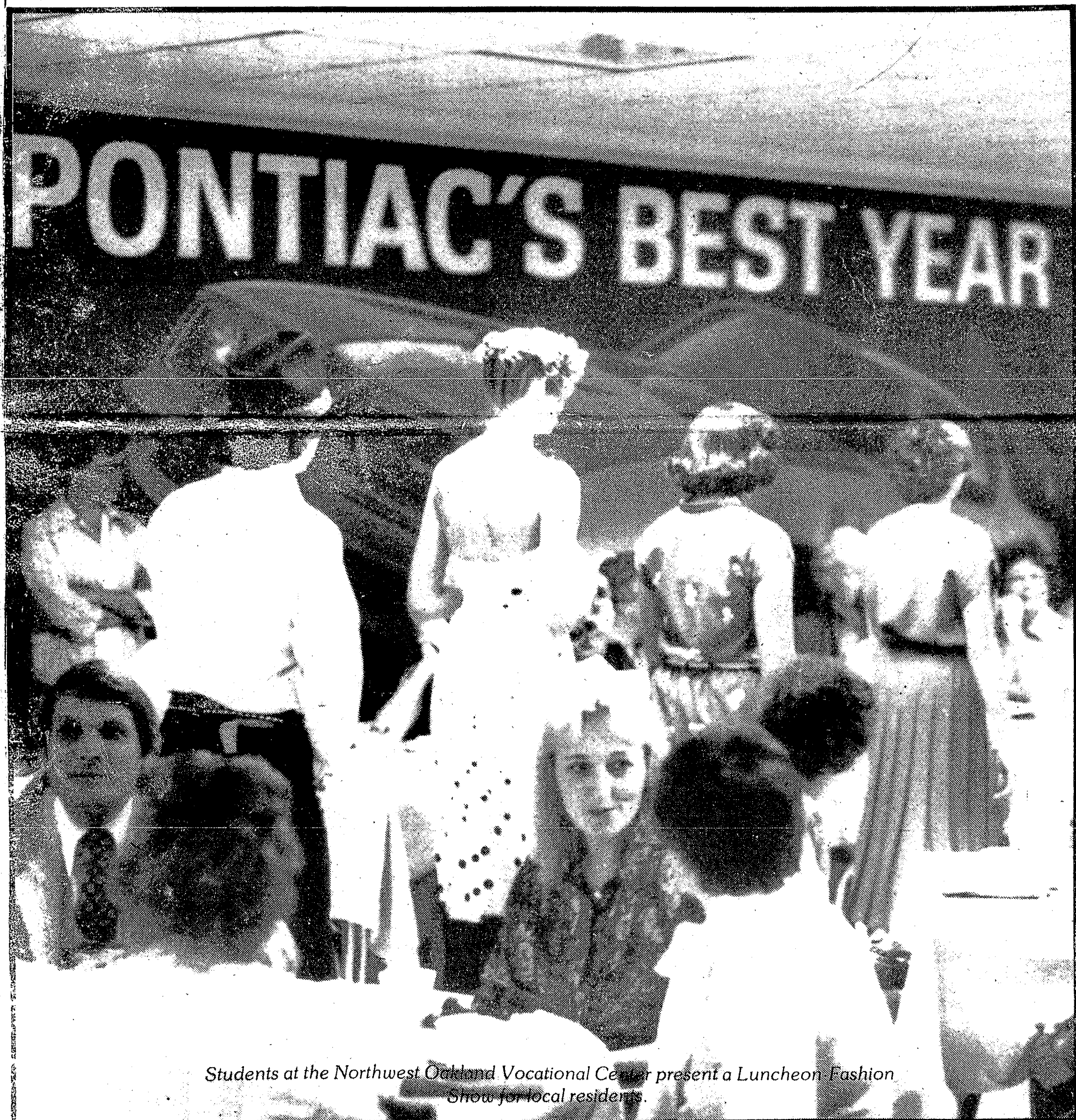

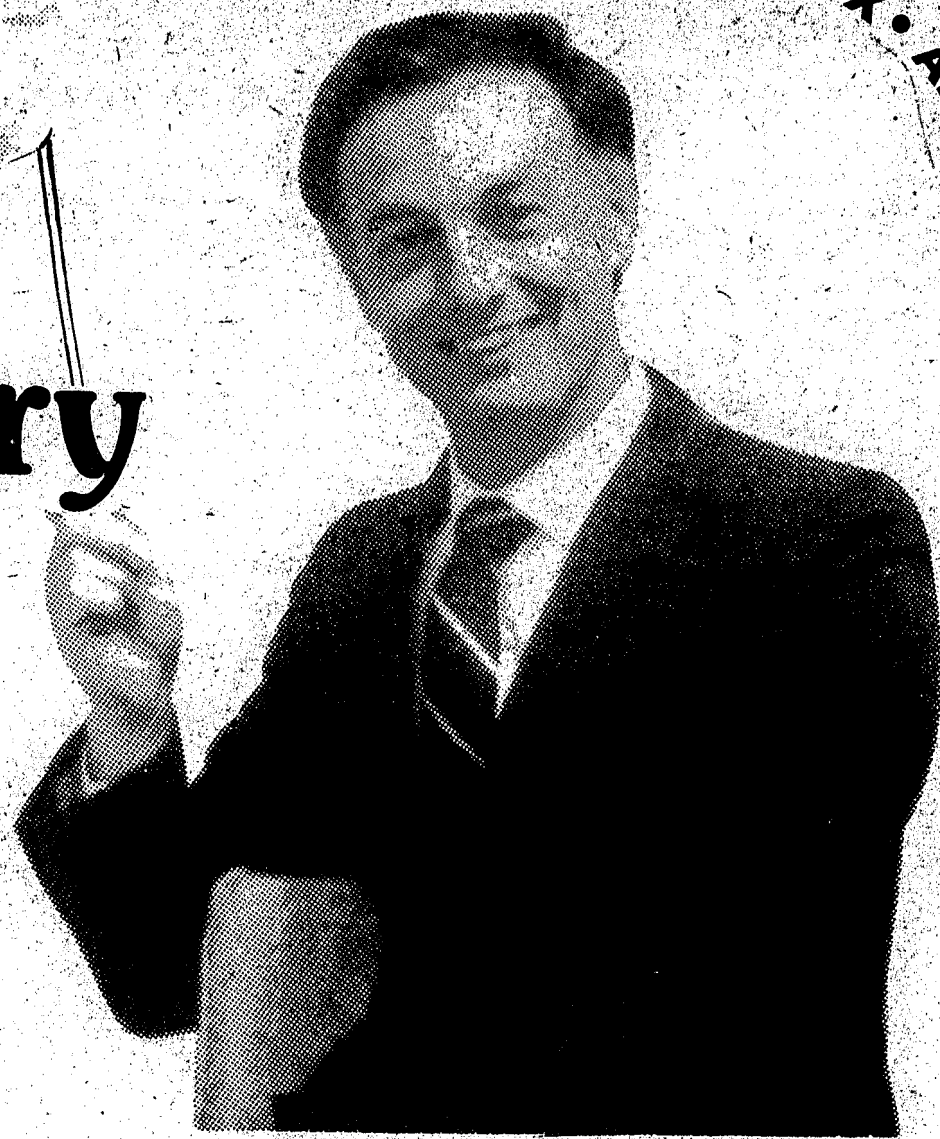

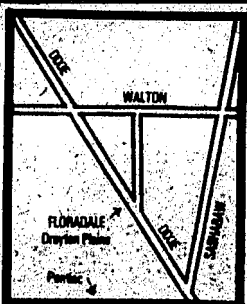

This article is the second in a two-part series on rape and serves as the end of the answer to the woman who wrote in on her experience of being raped. It will discuss the 1975 Criminal Sexual Conduct Act, some facts about rape, and resources available to the person who has been raped.

In abbreviated form, the 1975 Criminal Sexual Conduct Act reads:

1st Degree Conduct: Sexual Penetration of any body opening. This degree is considered a felony. If a person is under 13 or at least 13 but not older than 16, the act is automatically considered 1st degree and the case goes to criminal court. If the actor is a member of the household, it is incest and considered 1st degree.

2nd Degree Conduct: Sexual Contact. In this case, penetration does not have to occur. It includes the behaviors of fondling and starting the sexual act. It is a felony.

3rd Degree Conduct: Sexual Penetration of any body opening. Force or coercion is used. This is a felony.

4th Degree Conduct: Sexual Contact. Such behaviors as fondling, patting a person on the bottom, pinching a person on the bottom,

and stroking the leg are included under this degree. Force or coercion in the form of threats is used. A person could use 4th degree conduct to fight the problem of sexual harassment. 4th degree conduct is considered a misdemeanor.

Plea bargaining can be used in some instances, so that the actual incident could be listed under a lesser charge. If someone is convicted of a second offense, of either 1st, 2nd, or 3rd degree conduct, there is a mandatory sentence of a minimum of five years. Only 2 percent of the rape victims are 'crying wolf', contrary to myths that abound.

In talking with Adrienne Hatcher of the Oakland Crisis Center for Rape and Sexual Abuse, she said that a majority of rape cases are acquaintance and date rapes. She also stated that rape is an act of terror and aggression. Anger and rage fuel this behavior.

The Oakland Crisis Center for Rape and Sexual Abuse has just completed a Rape Sensitizing Pilot Training Program for all interested Oakland County Police Agencies. The center also offers one-to-one counseling by appointment, and a 24-hour hotline. The center can be reached by dialing: 332-HELP.

CHJ Class Drop Eggs from Plane

Looking up into the wild blue was an "eggi-sighting" experience at Independence Oaks County Park Monday, May 12.

220 eighth grade students in Holly Rupprecht's science classes at Clarkston Junior High competed to see if any could drop a raw egg, without breaking, from an airplane at 500 feet. (Yes, it IS possible if the egg is in a cleverly designed package.)

Rupprecht got the idea having seen the feat successfully achieved when she was a student at Midland High School.

Updating Gallileo's experiments with falling objects, the class project demonstrated the law of gravity as well as package design. Jello, water, popcorn -- anything can be used by the designer/experimenter.

Chuck Keegan, another Clarkston High School teacher, arranged the date and location with Ray Delasko, Independence Oaks park supervisor.

The plane containing the precious cargo was piloted by John Kirchgessner, assistant principal of Clarkston High School and Doug Pierson, assistant principal of Clarkston Junior High.

50 percent of the students competing were able to drop their eggs successfully. Winners for the best package design were Sally Degener, Molly Counts, Shari Santala, Cheryl Hodgson, Maria Redick and Patti Dufrin.

4 R's highlighted at Davisburg Open House

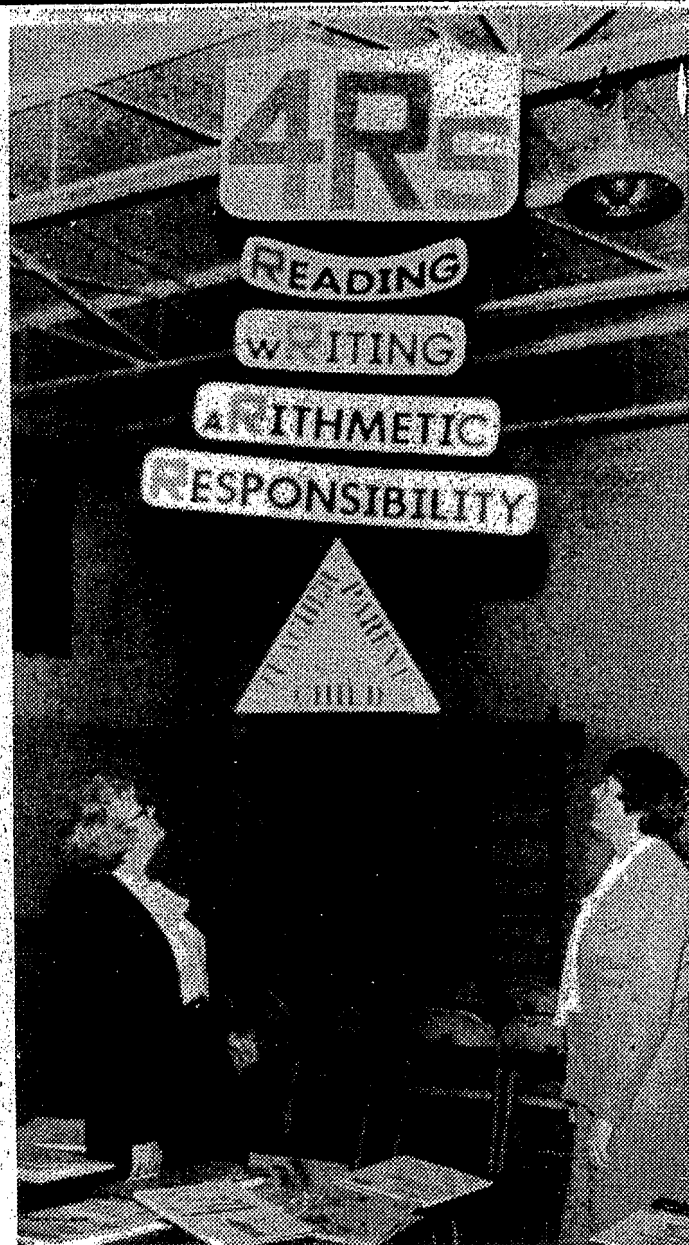
At their April 29, Open House the Davisburg Elementary School highlighted the "4 R's" - Reading, w'Riting, a'Rithmetic, and Responsibility.

Gas Stations Don't Expect Big Gas Hike

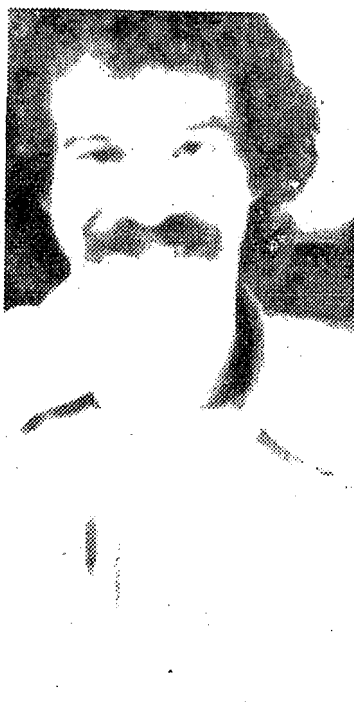

On Saturday, The Reminder visited local gas stations in regards to predicting the outlook on the price of

gasoline for the upcoming holiday weekend. The response went something like this:



Mike Roy, of Roy Brothers Standard Station at the corner of M-15 and Dixie Highway: "Undoubtedly the prices are going up because of the decrease in the volume of gas sold. The controversial tax is a way of compensating for this. Our prices now are \$1.33 for regular and \$1.34 for unleaded on the self-serve pumps and \$1.37 for regular and \$1.38 for unleaded on full service pumps."



Don Climansmith, owner/manager of the Village Total Station in Clarkston: "I believe our prices will not change. They will stay at \$1.21 for regular and \$1.26 for unleaded."



Rex Egres, owner's son at Union 76 on the corner of Maybee and Sashabaw Roads: "I think that the price of gas will be close to \$2.00 a gallon before the end of the year. Right now they're at \$1.36 for regular and \$1.38 for unleaded."



Jack Roy, owner of the Standard Station at Sashabaw and I-75: "It's difficult to predict if the prices will stay or go up. I really don't think they will change much. Regular is \$1.32 self-serve and \$1.34 full service and unleaded is \$1.36 self-serve and \$1.40 full service."



Ken Sockrider, attendant at the Boron Station on the corner of Maybee and Sashabaw Roads: "It will probably go up to around \$1.19 for regular and \$1.24 for unleaded. Those are just guesses though."

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

These Articles of Incorporation are signed and acknowledged by the incorporators for the purpose of forming an economic development corporation (The "Corporation") for the Township of Springfield, Michigan (the "Incorporating Unit") under the provisions of Act No. 338 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation is THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD.

ARTICLE II

The Corporation is organized pursuant to Act 338 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended, ("Act 338") to perform essential public purposes and functions of the Incorporating Unit. Its purposes will be to alleviate and prevent conditions of unemployment, to assist and retain local industries and commercial enterprises in order to strengthen and revitalize the economy of the Incorporating Unit and the State of Michigan, to provide means and methods for the encouragement and assistance of industrial and commercial enterprises in locating, purchasing, constructing, furnishing, equipping and expanding in the Incorporating Unit to encourage the location and expansion of commercial enterprises to more conveniently provide needed services and facilities to the Incorporating Unit and the residents thereof and to accomplish the foregoing to do the following:

a) To construct, acquire by gift or purchase, reconstruct, improve, maintain, repair, acquire the necessary lands for the site for "Projects" which term shall hereinafter mean the following: Land and existing or planned improvements suitable for use by any industrial or commercial enterprise or a replacement housing project incidental thereto, or a housing project constructed for the purpose of renting the units in the housing project at fair market value to persons who are 50 years of age or older, including all necessary buildings or structures suitable for the intended for or incidental to use as an industrial or commercial enterprise including a replacement housing project incidental thereto, and all necessary machinery, furnishings, and equipment necessary, suitable, intended for or incidental to a commercial, industrial, or residential use in connection with the buildings or structures.

b) To acquire by gift or purchase the necessary machinery, furnishings, and equipment for Projects.

c) To borrow money and issue its revenue bonds or revenue notes to finance part or all of the cost of the acquisition, purchase, construction, reconstruction, or improvement of Projects or any part thereof, the cost of the acquisition and improvement of the necessary sites therefore, the acquisition of machinery, furnishings, and equipment therefore, and the costs necessary or incidental to the borrowing of money and issuing of bonds or notes for such purpose.

d) To enter into leases, lease purchase agreements, or installment sales contracts with any person, firm, or corporation for the use or sale of Projects.

e) To mortgage Projects in favor of any lender of money to the corporation.

f) To sell and convey Projects or any part thereof for a price and at a time as the Corporation determines.

g) To lend, grant, transfer or convey funds, described in Section 27 of Act 338, as permitted by law, but subject to applicable restrictions affecting the use of these funds.

h) In general, and subject to such limitations and conditions as are or may be prescribed by law, to exercise such other powers which now are or hereafter may be conferred by law upon a corporation under the above statutes and for the above purposes.

Said corporation is organized upon a non-stock basis. The amount of assets which said corporation possesses is:

The Corporation will be financed from donations, gifts, grants and devises, either solicited or unsolicited, obtained from public authorities, individuals, corporations and other organizations, by earnings from its activities, borrowings and issuance of revenue bonds.

ARTICLE VII

A. The Board of Directors of the Corporation shall be appointed by the chief executive officer of the Incorporating Unit with the advice and consent of its legislative body. The Board of Directors shall consist of nine persons, not more than three of whom shall be an officer or employee of the Incorporating Unit. The term of office for directors shall be in accordance with Section 4(2) of Act No. 338. Provided, the Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Corporation shall notify in writing the chief executive officer of the Incorporating Unit of the Corporation's intention to commence preparation of a project plan and there shall be promptly appointed, in the same manner, to the Corporation's Board of Directors two additional directors representative of neighborhood residents or business interests likely to be affected by each such project proposed by the Corporation and whose term of office shall be consistent with the provisions of Section 4(2) of Act No. 338.

B. (1) The Board of Directors shall designate one of its members as Chairman, one of its members as Secretary, and a Treasurer who need not be a member of the Board of Directors, each to be designated for such term for a period of one (1) year. Such officers may succeed themselves in office.

(2) The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Board of Directors and may sign and execute all authorized bonds, contracts, checks and other obligations and execute interest coupons with his facsimile signature in the name of the Corporation when so authorized by the Board of Directors. He shall do and perform such other duties as may be fixed by the bylaws and from time to time assigned to him by the Board of Directors.

(3) The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors, and of all committees thereof in books provided for that purpose. He shall attend to the giving,

serving and receiving of all notices or process of or against the Corporation. He may sign with the Chairman in the name of the Corporation all bonds, contracts and other obligations authorized by the Board of Directors, and when so ordered, he shall affix the seal of the Corporation thereto. He shall have charge of all books and records which shall at all reasonable times be open to inspection and examination of the Board of Directors or any member thereof, and legislative body of the Incorporating Unit, and, in general, perform all the duties incident to his office. The Secretary shall preside at meetings of the Board of Directors in the absence of the Chairman.

(4) The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Corporation which may come into his hands or possession. When necessary or proper, he shall endorse in behalf of the Corporation for collection, checks, notes, and other obligations, and shall deposit them to the credit of the Corporation in a designated bank or depository. He shall sign all receipts and vouchers for payment made to the Corporation. He shall jointly with such other officer as may be designated by the Board of Directors sign all checks, promissory notes and other obligations of the Corporation when so ordered by the Board of Directors. He shall render a statement of his cash accounts when required by the Board of Directors. He shall enter regularly in the books of the Corporation to be kept by him for the purpose full and accurate accounts of all moneys received and paid by him on account of the Corporation, and shall, at all reasonable times exhibit his books and accounts to the Board of Directors or any member thereof when so required. He shall perform all acts incidental to the position of Treasurer fixed by the bylaws and as assigned to him from time to time by the Board of Directors. He shall be bonded for the faithful discharge of his duties as Treasurer, the bond to be of such character, form and in such amount as the Board of Directors may require.

ARTICLE VIII

The term of the corporate existence is perpetual.

ARTICLE IX

The regulation of the internal affairs of the Corporation, including the distribution of assets on dissolution or final liquidation is placed entirely with the Board of Directors or their successors, as provided in the Bylaws of this Corporation, subject, however, to the provisions of Act No. 338.

ARTICLE X

No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, trustee, officer or director of the Corporation, or any private individual (except that in case of private individuals reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation affecting one or more of its purposes), and no member, trustee, officer or director of the Corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets on dissolution of the corporation. Directors of the Corporation shall serve without salary, but may be reimbursed their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties, and may receive a per diem in an amount set by the legislative body of the Incorporating Unit. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in or intervene in (including the publication or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Upon the dissolution of the Corporation or the winding up of its affairs, all property and assets of the Corporation shall be distributed exclusively to the Incorporating Unit or its successor.

ARTICLE XI

The Board of Directors shall adopt a Corporate Seal.

ARTICLE XII

All meetings of the Board of Directors shall be public and notice of such meetings will be posted in the office of the Clerk of the Incorporating Unit once at least seventy-two hours prior to the date of such meeting and the Corporation shall comply with Act 267 of the Public Acts of 1976 relative to its meetings.

ARTICLE XIII

The Corporation shall at all times be deemed to be an agency of political subdivision of the Incorporating Unit. The books and records of the Corporation and of the Board of Directors Officers and agents thereof shall be open to inspection and audit by the Incorporating Unit at all reasonable times. The Corporation shall submit an annual report of its activities to the legislative body of the Incorporating Unit.

ARTICLE XIV

These Articles shall become effective and the Corporation shall exist upon and after the approval of said Articles by appropriate action of the legislative body of the Incorporating Unit and the publication of said Articles as provided in Article XVI hereof.

ARTICLE XV

Upon their appointment the Board of Directors shall convene, organize and by resolution adopt by-laws which may set forth the Corporation's rules and procedure and regulation of projects. Said by-laws shall be subject to the approval of the legislative body of the Incorporating Unit.

ARTICLE XVI

The Clerk of the Incorporating Unit shall in conformity with Section 31 of Act 338, cause the appropriate filing of these Articles and shall cause the Articles to be published in The Reminder, Clarkston, Michigan, a newspaper of general circulation within the Incorporating Unit which publication shall be accompanied by a statement that the right exists to question the incorporation in court as provided in Section 31 of Act 338.
