


# Former Pastor Finds Success as Author of Several Books

He spent twenty-two years of his life devoting time and energy to the ministry. Four years ago, with experience and inspiration on his side he became a full-time writer. His name is Roger Campbell, former pastor for the Waterford Community Church.

Though never enrolled in a class, writing is a natural talent of Campbell's. "What actually got me started," he explained was "a subject of concern to one of the young people of our church. Thinking many other people might be curious, I did research, wrote an article and submitted it to a magazine." Shortly afterwards Campbell received an acceptance letter -- a letter than altered his lifestyle.

The books Campbell has authored are a potpourri of topics that sweep from subjects dealing with different facets of Christianity, weight control and criminal restitution. Although the books are dissimilar in subject, they do have a common theme; discovering a solution, through Bible study, to the problems faced in life.



"Justice Through Restitution-Making Criminals Pay", written by Campbell has gained the attentions of State Representative Claude Trim and sufficiently influenced him to introduce a resolution to the legislature following the guidelines of Campbell's work. The book takes the position that it's a "terrible waste of taxpayers money to imprison lawbreakers who are not violent; that instead these people should in some way pay back the victims against whom these crimes have been committed."

In his research Campbell found that "it costs about \$25,000 a year to keep an individual in prison. This does not make sense when the crime was only maybe a \$200 robbery. It's a terrible fine for the taxpayers to have to pay. Also, with a program of restitution, repeat crime is only 10 percent as compared to 50 percent without it.

Of his latest effort entitled, "Weight! A Better Way To Lose", Campbell said, "I believe the Bible contains the principles to solve every problem in life. I had been in the ministry nearly twenty years before I realized





This week The Reminder's Kathy Rush and Mike Wilcox present the results of an extensive researching effort involving Michigan Bell Telephone and its many unhappy customers in Davisburg and Holly.

The story unfolds on Page 7.
The unfortunate aspect of this entire fiasco, however, is that most of its probably could have been avoided with a better public relations effort from Bell.

The story is familiar. Bell the giant conglomerate, ignores the complaints and cries of several citizens from tiny Holly and Davisburg. The citizens get mad and are now trying to slay Goliath.

It's happened before to Bell. Other communities have taken them before the Public Service Commission, but only one, a small community on the Western side of the State, has won. So despite Holly's angry warnings, Bell is relatively sure of themselves.

But why even fight it out in front of the PSC. A great deal of resistance exists because of the discontinuance of Wide Area Local Service (WALS) in 1977. Bell claims that was replaced with the optional and bet-

ter Circle Calling System.


Unfortunately few people know about Circle and Bell has not made a big effort in publicizing it.

Then too, Bell has got to consider Holly's unique geographical relationship, being situated halfway between Flint and Pontiac, and not being able to call either without a toll

But most of all, the complainees make a big deal about the lack of concern Bell employees exhibit when they register a complaint. Customers have told us of countless times they've called and received the runaround. To Bell's credit, The Reminder did not experience that problem. They were most cordial with us. But, then we're a newspaper. A better job of public relations and handling customer's complaints would go a long way in helping smooth out the problems that exist now.







a sizeable segment of my congregation was struggling with a serious problem that seemed unrelated to Bible truth. Alcoholics could be made sober. Drug addicts could be delivered. Prostitutes made pure. But the overweight appeared to be omitted from divine assistance. The more I thought about that the more sure I was that it could not be true."

"As I studied the Scriptures that I felt might be related to the emotional and physical needs of the overweight person, I became convinced that the Christian lifestyle set forth in the Bible would, over a period of time, solve the dieter's dilemna. We therefore offered a weight-loss class in church: this book is a result of the success of that class.'

Almost daily, letters arrive at the Campbell household ordering his weight loss book

and/or tapes that were recently developed for class use. Along with orders are a flood of letters that praise the book and thank him for

Marsha Faull, of Texas wrote saying, "The tapes are so good to play while I do my work, and such an uplift. Thank you and I sincerely

appreciate your ministry." From Mt. Clemens, Michigan, Diane Wilson wrote, "I am so glad God inspired you to write it. In fourteen weeks we have two people who have lost over fifty pounds each, as a class we are over the eight hundred pound mark."





# Davisburg Fragmentation Hurts Community Says Howarth

How would you like to live in a community where you cannot call your child's school without paying a toll; where you cannot call any hospital or nursing home toll free; where you cannot reach any major department store, or the state police, or your local churches or ministers in your local dialing area?

"It's totally lacking in logic...Michigan Bell suggests we make our telephone calls either early in the morning, or late at night to cut down on long distance calling costs. Now isn't that a helpful suggestion? We run a business here with normal 9 to 5 business hours," says the disgruntled Nancy Howarth, Certified Legal Assistant to Davisburg attorney and husband Leonard Howarth.

Nancy, along with countless others, has been waging a battle since 1972 against the Michigan Bell Telephone Company and the Michigan Public Service Commission which regulates Michigan Bell in Lansing. After eight years the results of their efforts have

been disappointing....

The problem facing Holly-Davisburg residents is summed up by Nancy Howarth in this way. "Although lumped into the Flint directory with 13 other Genesee County communities, Holly is the only exchange listed there that does not have toll-free service to Flint." Holly subscribers can only call 634 and 629 (Fenton) numbers toll-free for a calling area of approximately 15,000 numbers. It was pointed out that Fenton subscribers have access to approximately 250,000 toll-free phone numbers, at a much lower monthly charge.

"Davisburg is further fragmented," Howarth continued, "because the Davisburg area includes telephones in the 625 (Clarkston) and 887 (Milford) directories. Davisburg community services, including the Springfield Township Hall, Fire Department and Library, as well as some business people have found it necessary to install 625 telephones in addition to the 634 line to better serve the area. This is an expense that most residential

customers cannot justify."

"We did enjoy a service called Wide Area Local Service for the period of December, 1968 through April 1977, which enabled us to call 28 local cities at a reduced rate. The Michigan Public Service Commission ruling replaced this system with something called circle calling," explained Howarth. Though this system was supposed to reduce phone bills, Howarth claimed that neither she, nor anyone she knew, had enjoyed a lower phone bill as a result of this system.

Residents are now hoping to institute a system called Extended Area Service which would divide the Holly area into two sections attaching the northern end of the area to the Flint phone service. The southern area, including Davisburg, would connect with the Pontiac area phone service. "The loss of revenue that Michigan Bell would incur, not the lack of technology is the reason for determent of Extended Area Service," added Howarth with an air of discontentment.

"I'm the person that will go out of my way to get change for a quarter to make a call on a pay phone."



# Studley Leads Holly Opposition

"This time I've got the ire of the people...if I could just continue to keep them upset," says Roger Studley, Holly Party Shoppe owner and township trustee. Studley is also leader of an organization trying to get Extended Area Service (EAS) for Bell Telephone customers in the 634 exchange.

### Bell Officials Insist EAS Not Practical

Jack Souder, General Rate Planning Supervisor and Len Singer, News Relations Supervisor, both of Michigan Bell, say to give the Holly Area (including Springfield 634 exchanges) Extended Area Service (EAS) would be too costly for both the company and the average phone user.

To the company, said Souder, it would cost at least 1.3 million dollars to give Holly and Davisburg exchanges extended service

to Flint and Pontiac.

But in addition to that, Holly residents would be jumped from the second lowest rate group in the state to one of the highest, increasing rates by an average of a \$1.35 a month. Souder explained that the rate groups are based on the number of telephones in an exchange. Holly currently has a mere 5400 phones, thus qualifying them for the lower rate.

Then too, said Souder, "We try to keep our Holly toll rates low. In many cases they are the lowest in the United States, For an example, in any one of the neighboring exchanges, they can make a one minute call for ten cent." On weekends, he added, the cost for the first minute is only four cents.

In reiterating his company's opposition to EAS for Holly, Souder said that decision was based partly on research and surveys Bell has conducted in the area for the past four

Each of the surveys, claimed Souder, pointed to one steady pattern. The number of people calling to Flint and Pontiac didn't warrant the need for EAS.

Bell's latest survey of Holly people calling to Pontiac shows on the average, a Holly family calls the Pontiac exchange 5.1 times a



month at an extra cost of \$1.55. However, 45 percent of the customers never call that exchange in a month's period. 40 percent don't call Flint, either.

Souder points out, though, that Bell realizes the community has undergone many changes since the exchange boundaries were set in the late 1940's. At that time it seemed natural to lump Holly and Fenton together. Now, said Souder, if boundaries were to be changed, Bell might think dif-

Rather than EAS, Souder suggested customers that make a lot of calls outside the exchange should consider the Circle Calling Service or the Foreign Exchange Ser-

Circle Calling offers a 30 percent discount off of normal rates for calls within 30 miles except during weekday mornings. The

charge is only a \$1.07 a month.

Circle Calling replaced the ill-fated experimental Wide Area Local Service (WALS) that was operated in Holly and other test areas in the state from 1968-77. It was illfated because it was not self-supporting. Circle is optional, thus pays for itself.

But many Holly and Davisburg phone users remember WALS rather fondly and resented its discontinuance. Souder said Bell realizes that, but feels Circle Calling is a better option, although probably not enough people know of its existence.

The second option, Foreign Exchange, would allow a phone user to hook-up a


private line to another exchange. But the cost is 90° a mile for the line plus the cost of hardware. Souder estimates a person with a Holly exchange would pay \$34 extra plus \$6 for local service, too. Still, for customers. who make dozens of toll calls a month to a single exchange, Souder suggests this would be a viable option.

nothing is ever done to improve the situation," Studley added. "I've written letters to Governor Milliken, State Senator Kammer, State Representative Trim and countless letters to Michigan Bell Itself. Public officials can take time to dedicate buildings and so forth but they cannot look into why this system does not work. It's not that our officials have not been notified of our situation. They just don't seem to care."

Michigan Bell argues that EAS would not benefit the majority of the residents in the 634 exchange. Michigan Bell statistics show 40 percent of the people do not make calls to Flint. However, Studley maintains that the reason for this is because people can call Flint using a public pay phone and talk as long as they want for 20°, whereas, if they use a home phone they must pay by the minute.

According to Studley in 1976 he was approached by Bell officials who informed him that if he would donate the use of a portion of his land where his party store is located, it would enable Holly residents to call Flint toll-free. Studley gave his consent and the

"highest level of switchgear" was installed.

After four years, Flint is still a long-distance call from Holly. Studiey believes that the switchgear need only be reprogramed, but says Michigan Bell claims there must be added trunk lines - a cost of over \$300,000.

Studley believes that there is a contradiction in the statements of Michigan Bell, 1. That the majority of residents would not benefit from EAS, and 2. That there must be added trunk lines to accommodate the extra service required from the installation of EAS.

#### Imposition?

"Community of interest," a phrase used by

have made the township and village special assessment districts for fire department funds. This plan would have taken the fire department out of the general budget and tax rates set annually by the township board, up to a maximum of 10 mills. The plan was defeated though, by an unexpected vote count of 1,361-641 in the township and 172-70 in Clarkston. The Headlee and Tisch amendments were ascribable to the fire department's efforts in changing the funding plan. They feared the fire budget would become as easily tax limited as non-essential services. The new proposal would have protected the fire funds from such action.

## Police Levy Continued in Springfield

Voters in Springfield Township renewed the assessment of one mill for police protection in Tuesday's election. The five year levy was passed by a 365-176 vote count; more than a 2-1 margin. Springfield along with Holly and Rose Townships signed a two-year contract with Oakland County Sheriff's Department in which all three townships will share two deputies. Springfield will pay \$23,496 during the first year, and \$25,152 for the second. Springfield Township also agreed to having an additional deputy solely patrol the township. This will cost the township \$35,232 as compared to the \$53,000 they paid last year for two deputies.
