Robert Tisch, that rough talking, lanky country boy drain commissioner from Shiawassee County is back striking fear into the hearts of many state politicans with a ballot proposal that would, if passed this November, cut property taxes in half.

In Clarkston and Davisburg, despite the election being a good five months away, Tisch is already on the minds of many.

Dick Jacobs, a spokesman for the Tisch group, was in town to tell local realtors why they should support the tax cut amendment. The Reminder was also there, and this edition includes Jacobs' comments and political philosophy.

Irene McCabe, a local realtor, has been pushing Tisch petitions for the last couple of months. You can't miss her office-it being plastered with Tisch signs.

And local politicans frequently mention Tisch in their conversations. Springfield Supervisor Collin Walls thinks the amendment is a "sure bet" come November, and he didn't hesitate to tell everybody at the last board meeting.

Walls may be right, considering the fact that an alternative plan like Richard

Headlee's winner in 1978, has yet to emerge. The Headlee Amendment was championed as the moderate alternative to the drastic Tisch cuts, and eventually swamped Tisch at the polls.

But Tisch has a long way to go and some mighty "big guns" to beat if it is expected to win this November. For one, Governor Milliken opposes it, and after what he did for George Bush, no one can underestimate the political clout Gentle Bill can wield.

Two, Tisch will have to have enough

money to combat the MEA, UAW and other politically active groups. At this time in 1978, remember everyone was also saying Tisch would be an easy winner. But after millions. of dollars worth of adverse publicity generated by the unions, Tisch didn't come

So, despite the obvious early popularity of Tisch, the tax cut amendment, like the presidential contest between Regan and Carter (or Kennedy) and Anderson is much too early to call. It will be interesting to watch the issue develop as we get closer to November.

Also in this week's Reminder is a list of candidates that filed for local offices.

In the Township of Springfield, where contaminated well water became a major issue only months ago, the incumbent clerk and both trustees have absolutely no opposition. No opposition in the primary and no opposition in the general election.

That, to me, is the height of political apathy and a very unhealthy situation. I'm not suggesting the three office holders are incapable (they are the opposite in my judgment) -- but rather that several people in Springfield should care enough to get invoived in the political process!

Dear Carolyn,

Why are there often strained relations between mother-in-law and daughter-in-law? I keep hearing, "My daughter-in-law doesn't like me." My daughter-in-law shows me no affection." What can a mother-in-law do?

This irrationality is often fed by a husband making a statement such as, "Nobody makes apple pie better than mom." This is picked up as a challenge by the insecure wife and translated into, "I'll show you!"

This is a difficult problem to deal with because many are unaware, of the insecurities felt and the ways these insecurities are expressed. I would recommend that you first try to assess the sources of the problem; what do you contribute, what does she contribute. Deal with your contribution first and make changes accor-

Sometime down the road you may want to try to talk to her in an attempt to move the relationship to better grounds. Remember, though, it takes two to improve things, you can't do it all by yourself.

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Roads, Library Millage on Springfield Ballot

The Springfield Township Board decided to place two local requests for millage on the August Primary Election ballot, at last Wednesday's board meeting.

The vote to place the issues on the ballot was split 3-2 with Treasurer Pat Kramer and Trustee William Whitley opposed.

A mill each for road improvements and library operation for 5 year periods will appear on the ballot.

But, it wasn't the benefactors, as much as

whether to request millage at this time, that received the most debate.

In recalling April's annual meeting, Supervisor Collin Walls noted, "I don't think there was anybody there that thought it (the millage) would pass."

Then he added, "If we do it at all, it should be in August because of Tisch (which is expected to be on the November ballot). I'll be very shocked if the Tisch Amendment doesn't pass."

From the audience, local insurance agent Harry Kirk; added in support of the August placement, "It doesn't make sense to do it a year from now when you have to spend \$2500 for a special election."

And Trustee Glen Vermilye said, "I think we should give the people at least the opportunity to advise us.'

Mrs. Kramer summed up her opposition by saying, "I don't think the (voters) take it that way. I think they think you are trying to get more money out of them."

Mill Pond Being Treated

Aquatic Nuisance Plant Control, Inc. has planned a three stage treatment of Clarkston Mill Pond for weed and algae control.

The first application on May 19th was primarily to restrict the growth of weeds.

According Richard Hinterman, president of company, the second application will take place between June 11 and the 14th. They will be applying Cutrine in a granular and liquid form. Cutrine is (water algaecide purifier) and is used to control floating algae and chara which is a weed form of algae. There is no danger associated with the

use of this chemical, therefore, no posting is required.

At the time of the second application, Hinterman will make a visual inspection to determine the effectiveness of the previously applied chemicals.


If there are weeds or problem areas that were missed on the first application, they will be back to spottreat the pond a third time.





Lots of Challengers File for Independence Board Positions

Independence Township Republican candidates will outnumber Democratic ones nearly three to one in the August primary election following last Tuesday's filing deadline.

Competing for the top spot on the township board are Democratic incumbent Supervisor Floyd H. Tower of 177 N. Main Street. He is being challenged by Planning Commission chairman James B. Smith, 8551 Allen Road, on the Republican ticket.

Democrat Frederick P. Ritter, 6593 Amy

Drive, the incumbent will vie with Carol D. Balzarini, 10270 Reese Road, a journalist, for the treasurer's job.

Incumbent Clerk Christopher L. Rose of 6767 Snowapple, now running as a Republican, will be challenged by another Republican Ralph A. Chambers of 6196 Paramus and Democrat Karen F. Herron of 6315 Maybee Road.

Running for four slots as trustees are seven Republicans and one Democrat. Incumbent Republican trustees are





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Dick Jacobs speaks to BISE

Tisch Supporter Tells Benefits of Tax Cut Amendment

Dick Jacobs is worried about our country. He's worried that our economic system is leaning towards socialism. He's worried about the never ending upward spiral of taxes.

Unlike others, however, Jacobs has decided to do more than worry. He joined forces with Robert Tisch's group, and is now one of the tax cut amendment's leading spokesmen.

Jacobs, from Grand Blanc, was at Spring Lake Country Club last week to lobby for the Tisch Amendment in front of the Brandon-Independence-Springfield Exchange (BISE), a group of realtors.

"You're going to get an opportunity to vote (on tax increases) -- this is the big thing. It will remove voter apathy. It will give people an opportunity to say something," said


In a nutshell, the Tisch Tax Cut Amendment would make a 50% cut in assessed valuation based on the 1978 S.E.V. tax bill; a 75% cut if one's income is between \$5000 and \$10,500; or no property tax whatsoever for those who have an income less that

The amendment also demands 60% approval by a vote of the public before any new tax is iniated; the exemption of anyone 62 or over from paying taxes to operate schools; the assurance that the State cannot alter the school aid formula or any other school aid formula to impair the mandated rights of school-aged children; and a mandatory law that the State must return 100% monies to local government.

The Tisch Amendment is expected to be on the November's General Election ballot. According to Jacobs they currently have 218,000 of the 290,000 validated signatures

needed by July 7.

"We have got a ways to go yet, but we're ahead of 1978," (when Tisch had a similar proposal placed on the ballot, but was defeated) said Jacobs. He also indicated the group was attempting to get 350,000 -- an adequate cushion, he said, to fend off anticipated challenges from the Michigan Education Association (MEA). Jacobs predicted the teachers would probably be the amendment's most vociferous opponents come November.

Jacobs said so far Tisch has received endorsements from only three Michigan senators - Fredricks, Welborn and Richard

Fessler of West Bloomfield.

"But many are waffling, sitting on the fence," he added. Many, said Jacobs, are waiting to see details of the Governor's plan, which is expected to increase the sales tax from 4 to 51/2 %.

Of State Budget Director Gerald Miller, Jacobs said, "I think he is an artist of deception." He seems to juggle figures around to fool people. They are talking about slashing the budget \$100 million one time, and then support a subway that will cost 10 times that, at another time.

One of the major reasons Jacobs jumped on the Tisch bandwagon was because of the positive results of Proposition 13 in Califor-

Historical Society Book Collection Grows

For the past 2 years, the Clarkston Community Historical Society has been building a collection of books and periodicals of special value to those interested in Michigan history, genealogy, architecture, preservation and antiques from Crafts and Cider

The collection, donated to the Independence Township Library has grown to over 30 volumes. Most recently, the society began to purchase books which would be invaluable to those repairing, restoring or reproducing 19th and early 20th century houses and gardens.

Examples:

"Recreating the Historic House Interior" by William Seale

"The Old House" - (a practical Time Life

home repair and improvement book) "Landscapes and Gardens for Historic Buildings - A handbook for reproducing and creating authentic landscape settings"

"The Old House Journal" - a monthly dedicated to restoration techniques for the antique house.

On order are several reprints of Victorian pattern books used by carpenters and builders to produce 19th Century architecnia. "California is experiencing a boom," wrote Jacobs in a regular editorial column he writes for the Grand Blanc newspaper. "Retail sales figures are up by 14%. Slashed property taxes have stimulated the housing market. Over 550,000 new jobs in the private sector were created."

"This sounds like the kind of medicine that Michigan's economy needs. The same thing could work in our state, if the Tisch Amendment passes. The money left in the hands

of the consumers could spur personal spending, which could create new jobs, and increase sales tax revenues, and decrease welfare costs and unemployment lines," continued Jacobs.

Jacobs told BISE, "Michigan is long overdue for a Tisch tax cut. California seems to be best in the Rose Bowl and best in tax cutting, and as usual Michigan taxpayers are a little late, and a dollar, well several dollars short."



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Clarkston Well Driller Sells Geothermal Heat Extractor

A & A Well Drilling of Clarkston recently became a sales agent TETCO the Geothermal Heat Extractor, a homé heating and cooling system that uses groundwater as its

source of energy.

Essentially, the Extractor works like a refrigerator. When a gallon of warm water is placed inside the refrigerator, the heat is removed from the water, dropping its temperature several degrees. The heat removed from the water is expelled into the kitchen. Likewise, the Extractor cools many gallons of water "expelling" the heat into the entire house.

Greg Cook, owner of A & A, said the advantage of the TETCO

Extractor free operates on energy -- well water. The only energy you pay for is the energy needed to run the system.

A & A is the first distributor of the geothermal extractor Oakland and County. Genesee However, according to Cook, in Ohio, units are being sold faster than they can be manufactured and some homeowners report a 70% reduction or more in heat costs.

Cook just installed a unit in his own home. "I got a 1500 square foot house and within 35-40 minutes, she's cooled it right off. The whole house, just not one room," he added.

Cook said it's wise to contact him now, if you are interested in information more about the unit. It takes at least 6-10 weeks to get because of the high demand, he claimed.

Springfield to Continue Dispatching with Holly

The Springfield Township Board voted to continue contracting for fire dispatch services from the Village of Holly, despite a \$2800 increase.

THE SPINAL COLUMN

The spinal column consists of 26 bones, called vertebrae. Each of these vertebra contain a hollow ring in the center, placed one upon another, forming a canal in which the spinal cord is housed.
