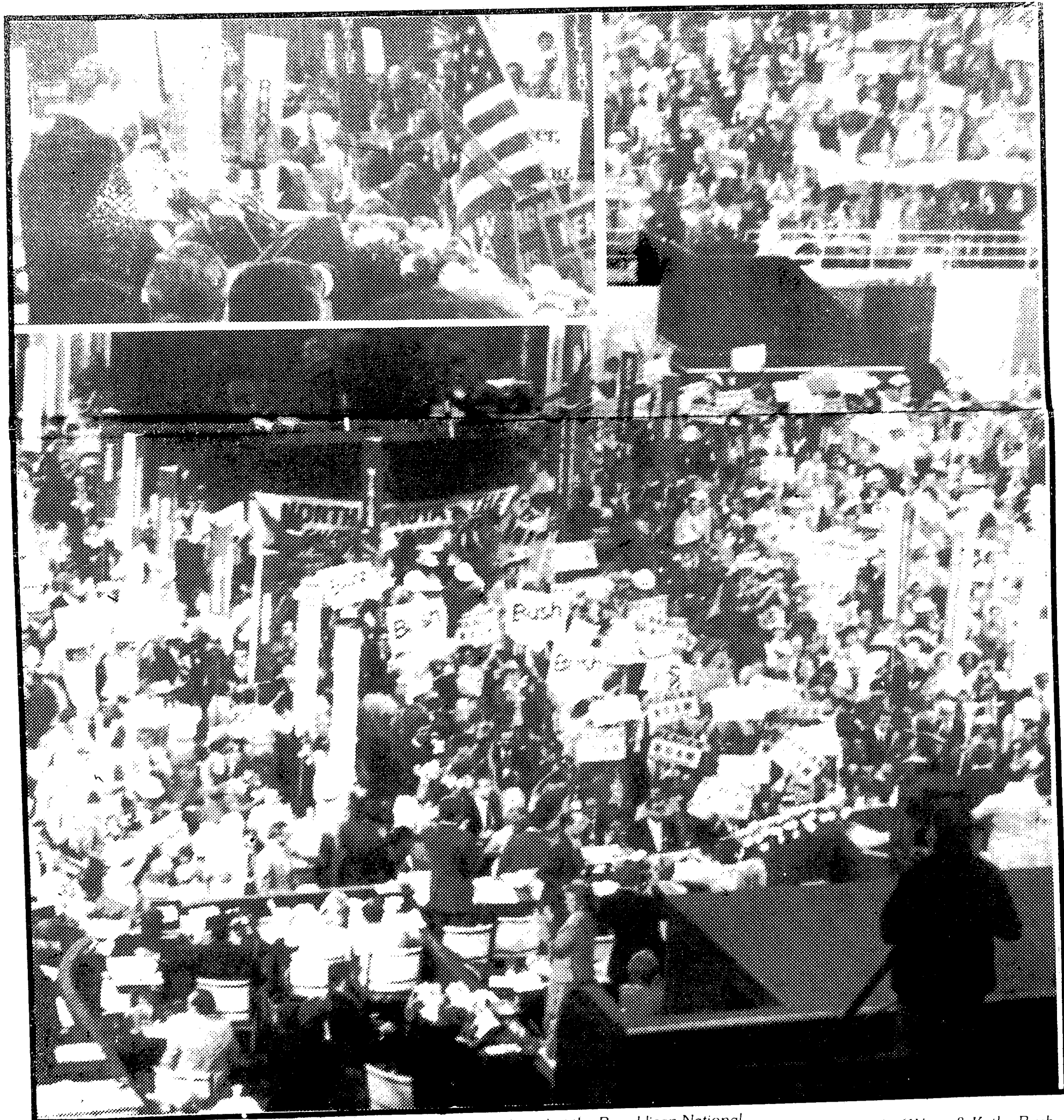

Independence Board, Senior Citizens Hassle

At last Tuesday's Independence Township Board meeting controversy arose over the Senior Citizen Constitution and By-Laws.

According to the old constitution, operating for the past three years, there were no provisions for non-residence dues and non-residents elected to the advisory board.

The township board members proposed an extra fee no higher than \$4.00 for non-resident members. Fred Ritter stated that "the township residents are paying dues and

taxes, while the non-residents are only paying dues."

Chairman of the Senior Citizen Advisory Board, Early Shwlie of Independence Township, said that only 10 percent of the members are non-residents and that it would be an "injustice by raising the dues at this time."

Trustee Jerry Powell made the statement that "non-residents pay extra fees for all other recreational facilities" and that they should in this case also.

The second problem with the by-laws is that non-residents are serving on the Advisory Board. Ritter stated that other advisory boards have a mandatory resident clause and this board shouldn't be any different. He said, "This was not to exclude

anyone but that residents should have the responsibility when spending township money."

According to Chairman Shwlie, the Advisory Board is presently 60% non-resident and the board wants to keep it as such. He claims the board "lacks the support of residents."

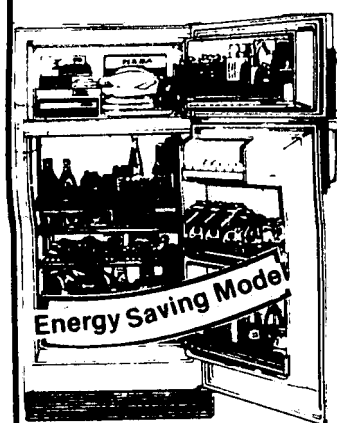
Ken Clair of Brandon Township, presently serving on the board, stated that the recent Senior Citizens Bulletin told Independence Township residents of the new proposals for the By-Laws and that the non-residents may be removed from office. The Bulletin called for a meeting to vote on the proposals, however only (3) Independence Township resident members came to vote.

One other displeased member is Gladys Clare of Brandon, said, "If we didn't care we wouldn't bother."

A motion was made by Mike Thayer, Trustee, to accept the new by-laws effective at this November election. Those non-members of the board who weren't up for re-election could finish their term and then be replaced by residents. The motion was denied by all board members but Thayer. A motion was passed to accept the proposed constitution and by-laws effective August 1st, 1980. The motion was carried.

It was also announced at the meeting that the Deer Lake concession stand was closed by the Oakland County Health Department. Alterations must be made with the sewer system, water supply and concession trailer. However, proper funding for these alterations is not available at this time and the concession stand will remain closed until further funding is available.

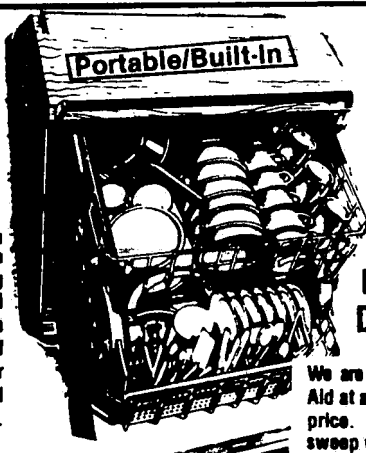

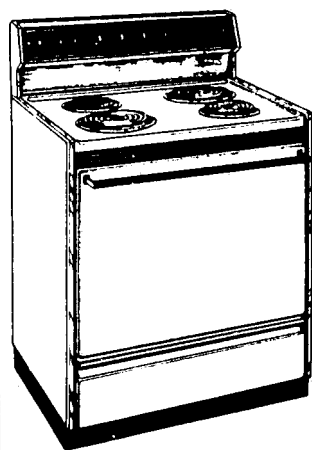

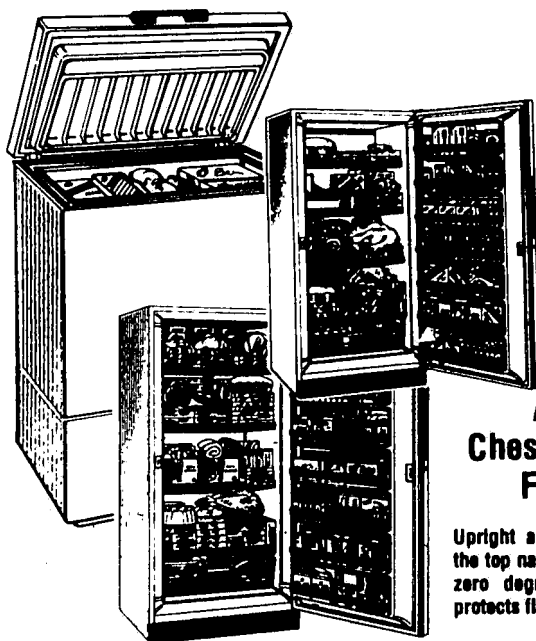

editor's note

The Republican Convention is now history but for many of us that attended in Detroit, it will hold lasting memories.

The Reminder was there in the persons of Mike Wilcox and Kathy Rush. Their photos of the glamorous spectacle can be found on Page 7.

Wilcox (that's me) spent two nights at the convention. By far the most exciting night of all, was Wednesday, when the drama was unfolding over who was to become the vice-presidential nominee.

As a reporter, Wilcox was in the thick of things that night, and kept a journal on what he saw and heard. Here's how it went Wednesday July 16th at the GOP Convention in Detroit from the eyes of a small town reporter viewing the biggest spectacle he had ever seen.

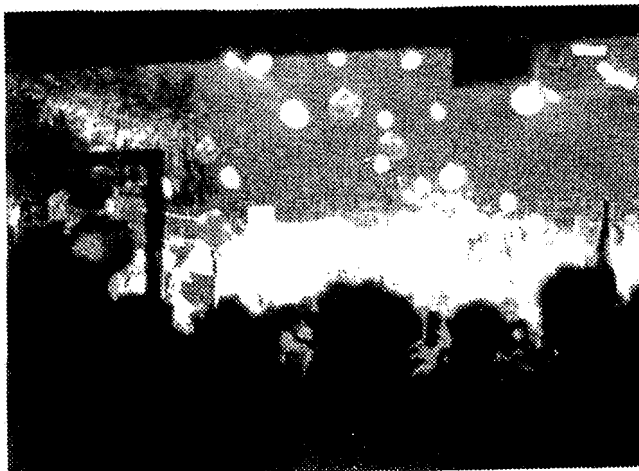
Detroit was alive! I could feel it as I parked my car in Cadillac Square and began walking the 10 locks to Hart Plaza. I passed a group of demonstrators. Calm, cool and very orderly they went about their business carrying placards protesting the Republican platform. The trolleys were running over capacity. The ride was not as long as, nor did it go up and down hills as those in San Francisco, but the people who rode Detroit's version were beaming with smiles just the same when they reached their destination.

Hart Plaza was buzzing with activity. Young dancers performed in unison with a symphony. Impromptu bluegrass and soul musicians played and sang before small groups on the sidewalks.

Inside Cobo Hall, every niche and corner was petitioned off for print and broadcast media. Convention organizers estimated 15,000 press people were in attendance, and every newspaper and radio and TV station had their own makeshift office. This was truly a media event - the three big TV networks alone had gobbled up most of the available limousines in the city - over 300. In contrast, Reagan's entourage had only access to two dozen limousines.

Walking through the narrow corridors of Cobo it wasn't difficult to pick out media celebrities. There was Andy Rooney of CBS's "60 Minutes", looking about 5'2" and as frazzled as a turnip. Highly acclaimed political critic Richard Reeves was running around looking very confused. And ABC reporter Sam Donaldson seemed to be very unhappy, probably because at the very same time CBS's Walter Cronkite was interviewing Gerald Ford about the vice-presidency.

On to Joe Louis Arena, where one could



not help instantly noticing the enormously tight security inside and out the huge complex. Guards with shotguns walked atop Cobo, while police boats cruised the Detroit River. Inside every third person seemed to be a security guard.

Just like on TV, no one seemed to pay much attention to the cadre of speakers, one after another condemning the Carter administration. After each speech, Republican National Chairman William Brock would admonish the delegates and media, threatening to clear the floor aisles and order everyone in their seats if people couldn't be more courteous.

The only time those threats seemed to work was when George Bush was introduced. He was cheered wildly, obviously the center of great affection.

Although the crowd was somewhat unruly, the convention itself was organized to near perfection. It was Reagan's show, and his forces had total command. No one dared exhibit a Bush or Anderson for President banner. No one dared disagree with his vice-presidential choice.

When it came time to demonstrate with balloons, banners, and noisemakers, on perfect cue, students and adults recruited from all parts of the country came rushing onto the convention floor to add to the hoopla and noise. With a signal of the hand, Reagan stopped the demonstration, and the demonstrators who had waited all week for this moment were escorted off the floor.

My big moment, or what I thought would be my big moment, came when I overheard an ABC camera crew discussing the possible arrival of Reagan to Joe Louis Arena that night. They expected Reagan to enter at about 11 p.m.-12 midnight in the general vicinity of where I was standing.

I decided to stick around in hopes of getting an up-close photo of the GOP's pres-

idential nominee. I waited awhile, and the Secret Service came and roped off an area for Reagan's limousine. There I was right up front in perfect position to snap a picture as dozens of photographers began to gather around me to get a glimpse of Reagan.

An hour passed. David Hartman of NBC was there. Bill Bonds of ABC had joined the gathering. More Secret Service agents came in and began standing in the roped off area. Someone announced that Reagan's motorcade was on its way from The Plaza Hotel.

The tension and excitement was mounting. People were pushing to get a closer look. A kid in the crowd popped a balloon, causing some Secret Service agents to reach for their guns. And there was I, in front of everyone, prepared to get the best photograph of Reagan.

And then another group of Secret Service agents came in. They announced Reagan had already entered the Arena from another entrance. You wouldn't believe the sighs and feelings of indignation. We had been tricked.

It definitely was Reagan's show and he was in total command.



By the way next week's segment of "Important Choices 1980" will feature interviews with Independence Township candidates with Primary Election opposition. Check it out. I'm sure it will be of value when you make your choice for clerk and trustee positions on the Township Board.

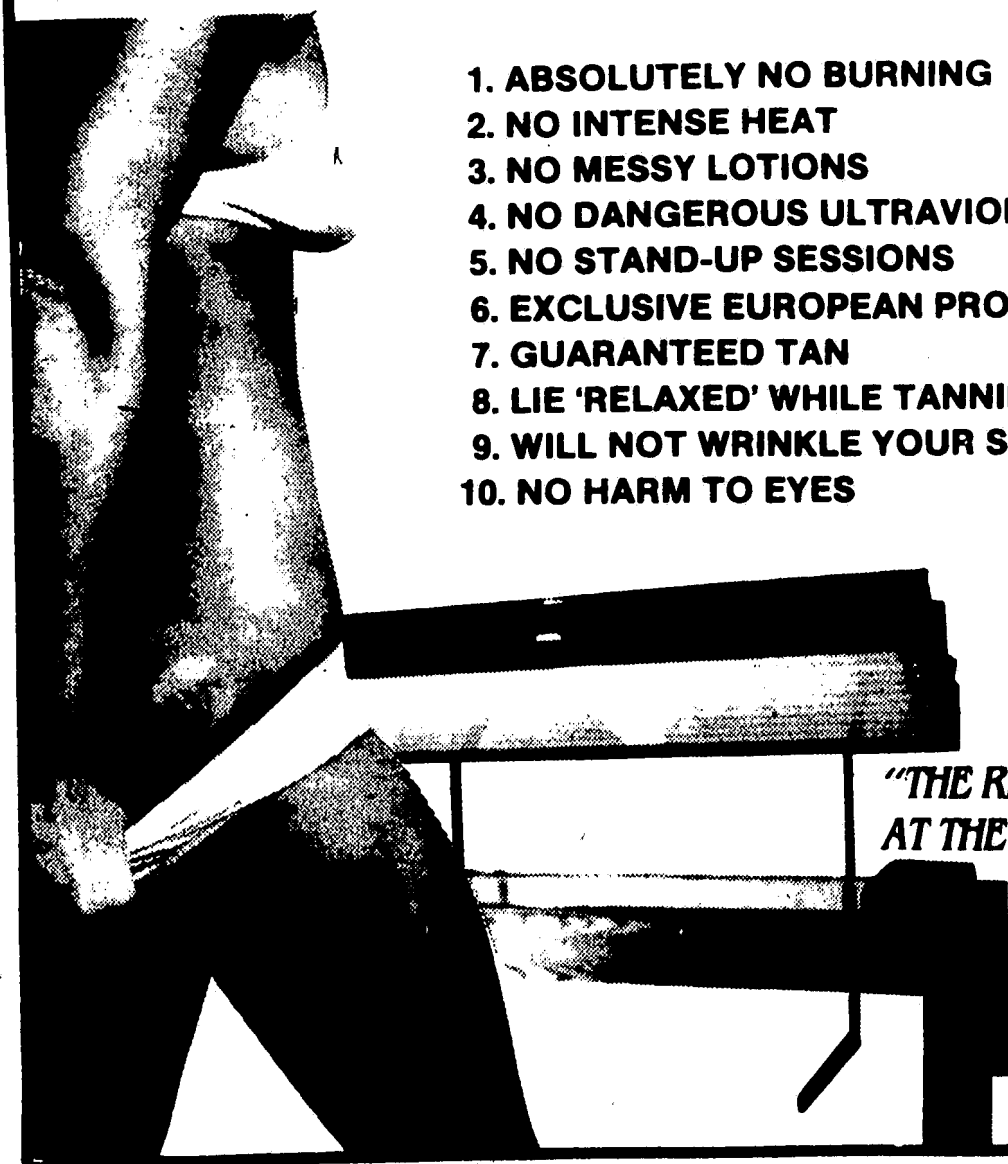

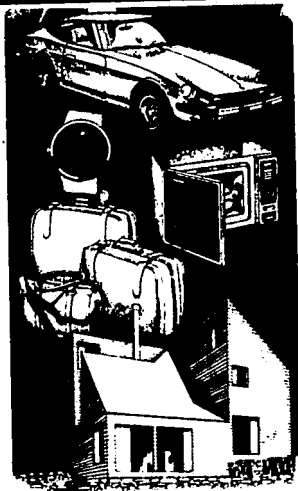

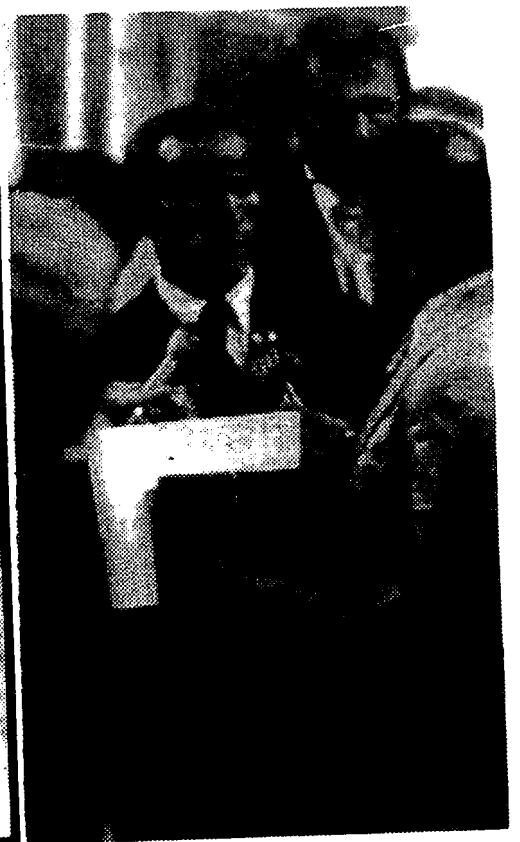

Springfield Residents Protest Closing of Crosby

The construction of the new recreation area, Indian Springs Metropark has been causing major consternation to some residents of Springfield Township, especially those people who reside on Crosby Lake Road. Officials of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority have petitioned Oakland County Road Commission for the immediate closing of a portion of Crosby Lake Road, thereby forcing an alternate route for those

residents living in that area.

The motive behind the park officials intention to close the road to through traffic is to create only one access to the park so as to eliminate the misuse of property, i.e., dumping, hunting, trespassing, etc. This also is the best routing for the park entrance because of the various environmental factors involved, according to park officials.

Those who have petitioned against the park argue that the closing of that portion of

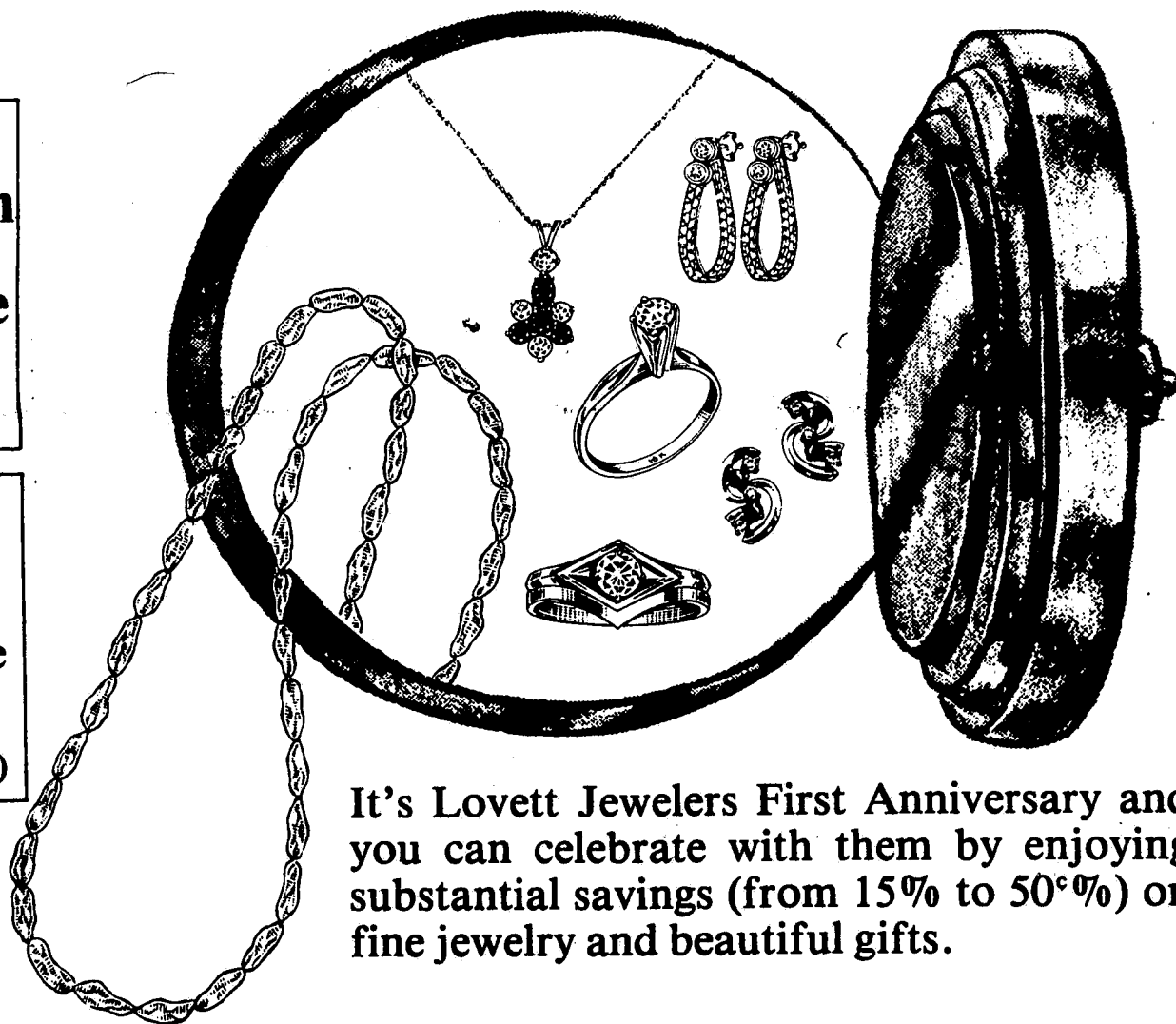
Crosby Lake Road would force them to use Cuthbert Road. This road, according to them is narrow and full of pot holes and many times impassable during the winter months. They are striving to have Cuthbert Road improved prior to the closing of any part of Crosby Lake Road.

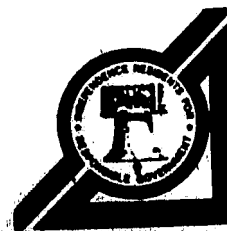

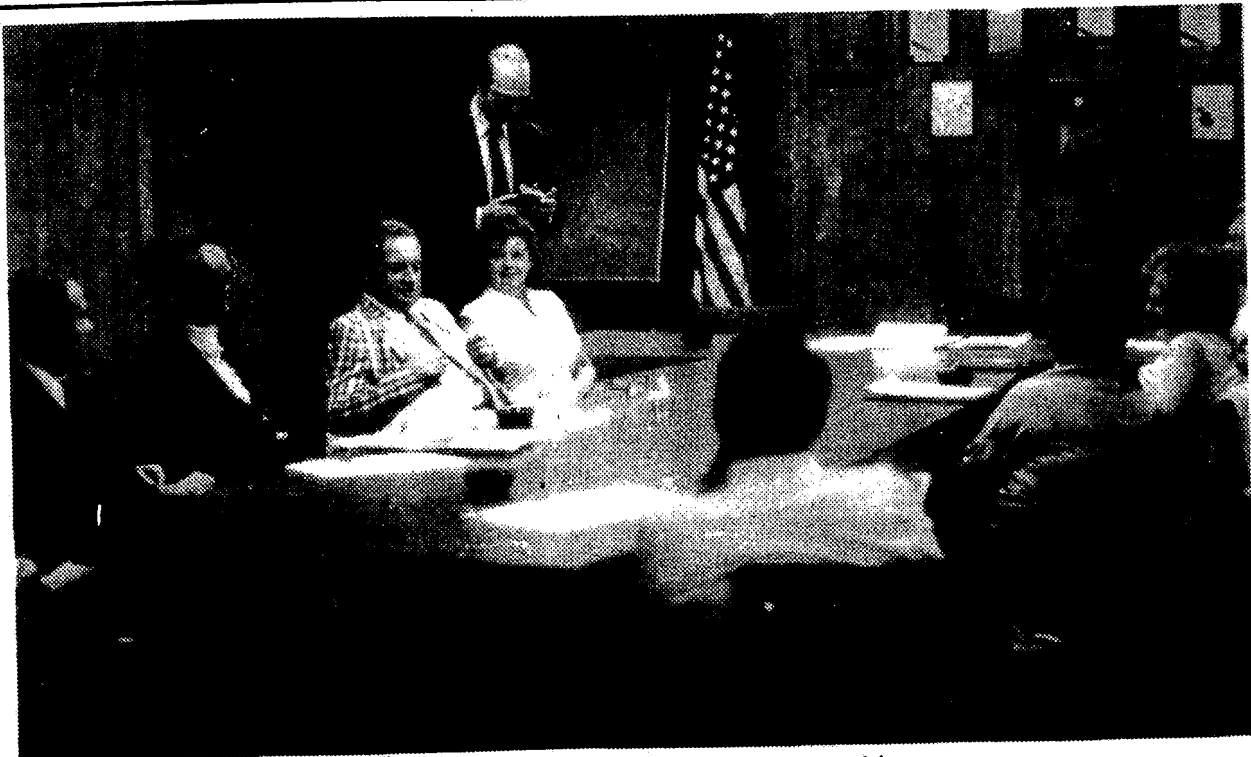

the case against the immediate closing of Crosby Lake Road was a group of Springfield Township residents - Lola Williams, Tom Helsey and Jo Newton, with a petition signed by 92 residents, William Dennis, a representative of the Clarkston Community Schools and Collin Walls, Springfield Township Supervisor.

Crosby Lake Road, according to Dennis, is presently used as a bus route for the school. Being forced to use Cuthbert Road would add 1200 miles per year to the bus route, but, more importantly is the concern for the condition of that road. He said, "There are parts of the road that are so narrow that the bus would be unable to pass oncoming vehicles."

Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls indicated that if Crosby Lake Road was closed without improving Cuthbert Road first, the fire and police protection effectiveness would be hindered. He, like many

others, feels that the key to the situation is fixing Cuthbert Road prior to the closing of Crosby Lake Road.

Although the indications are that the Oakland County Road Commission will decide in favor of the residents of Springfield, the final decision will be made by the board some time in August.

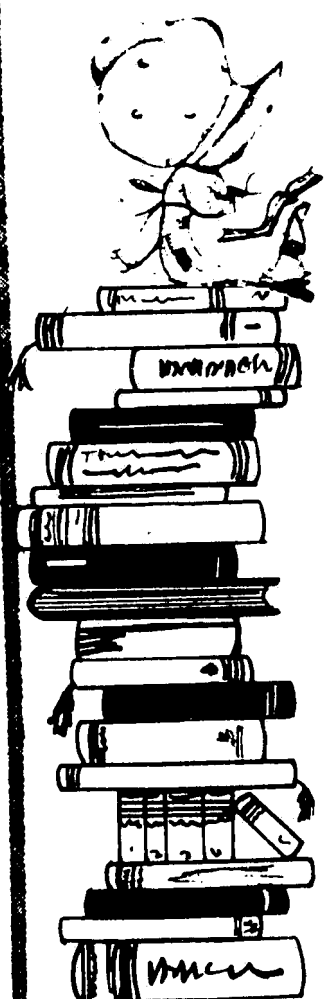

Two Businesswomen Find Success in Direct Mail

Kathy Anderson and Karen Ostrowe are making waves in a business that has been traditionally dominated by older males.

The two young businesswomen are owners of Postal-Ad, a somewhat unique direct mail cooperative that services most of Oakland and Wayne counties.

It's unique from the standpoint that Postal-

Ad in 1978 was the first to introduce local direct mail coupons in this area. It's also unique because owners Ms. Anderson, 24, and Ms. Ostrowe, 28, started from scratch with just a single solitary idea and have managed to parlay it into a dynamic business that expects to open offices in Houston within the year.

Ms. Anderson, despite her tender age, is a veteran in the printing business. She worked at Speedy Printing corporate offices before opening her own Speedy in 1976.

But after two years of experiencing the trials and tribulations of owning a printing business, Ms. Anderson noted, "I decided working around equipment wasn't exactly something I always wanted to do."

Ms. Ostrowe is a former teacher and salesperson of real estate, insurance and cosmetics. She also modeled for five years and won the title of Miss DSR.

The two met at an art fair in Harbor Springs. "We found we had so many things in common. We put our two heads together and decided we could work something out (as partners in business). We got back home, got together and have stayed together ever since," said Ms. Ostrowe.

When the two began their business in 1978 they had one phone and shared a tiny office. Now they have three offices, four phone lines and lots of sales and office help.

For her business acumen, Ms. Anderson was chosen as "Young Careerist" for 1980 by a local womens' organization. Ms. Ostrowe, was chosen to chair the committee that will select Ms. Anderson's successor in 1981.

In fact the two Postal-Ad owners are so wrapped up in their business activities they are organizing an organization that will help women in business.

Springfield-Oaks Offers Something for Everyone

Diversity in services and types of programs is the hallmark of Springfield Oaks County Park in Davisburg.

One side of Andersonville Road is the picturesque par-72, 18-hole golf course.

Across the road is the Youth Activities Center, a multi-purpose facility serving a wide range of groups for activities including dances, receptions, antique and art shows and large group picnics.

The Youth Activities Center is also the home of the annual Oakland County 4-H Fair and is available at no cost to recognized Oakland County youth groups.

The 6085-yard Springfield Oaks golf course has been praised as among the more appealing courses in Oakland County due to its natural setting.

"Friendly Fairways," a guide to municipal and semi-private golf courses in Michigan, points to Springfield Oaks' "stunning layout, elevated tees, lots of water and woods" as well as "well-kept fairways and large, slick greens."

Springfield Oaks is primarily a "cart course" because of the rolling terrain and elevated tees, according to Mike Thibodeau, chief of golf operations for the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission.

The course annually attracts some 37,000 golfers. This June the fifth annual Junior Golf Invitations drew some 180 youths who played the second leg of the two-day tournament at White Lake Oaks, another Oakland County Parks course located in White Lake Township.

In addition, a record 80 teams competed in the annual two-man Best Ball Tournament this spring at Springfield Oaks.

Improvements at the golf course this season included paving of the parking lot and cart paths.

In 1975, the challenging course opened for full 18-hole play. When donated to Oakland County in 1929 by the Manley Davis family, the course consisted of nine holes.

In the early 70's, the Oakland County Parks began rebuilding and sodding the course adding another nine holes. In 1972, a clubhouse was added which now provides a pro shop and banquet facilities.

According to Thibodeau, improvements for the next five years may include rebuilding of tees, construction of two sand traps along the number nine fairway and possibly the addition of protective screens on some tees.

The Youth Activities Center, dedicated in 1972, has become a center for youth and other organizations.

Boy Scout and Girl Scout groups meet there regularly as well as the Northwest Oakland County Council for the Arts.

The Youth Activities Center also serves as the Springfield Oaks Life Enrichment Center for adult foster care residents of north Oakland County. The facility provides day programming such as social skills, recreation, adult basic education, for the chronically mentally ill and mentally retarded.

This spring 50 acres were added to the park now totaling 107 acres. Site improvements for the 4-H Fair including water lines, auxiliary electricity, grading, sodding, landscaping and lighting were also initiated.

The Youth Activities Center consists of a 3200 square foot multi-purpose room for art shows, meetings and receptions. A larger 8400 square foot exhibit hall is used for dances, large exhibits and receptions and can seat 560 persons for a banquet or 1000 persons auditorium-style.

The Youth Activities Center also serves as home-base for the newly formed Oakland County Parks Clown Alley, a volunteer organization which offers workshops on clowning techniques, make-up and costuming. The group appears at various locations throughout the county including fairs, parades, medical facilities and shopping malls.

The need to bring RESPONSIBLE, ORDERLY, and EFFECTIVE government to Independence Township has brought together a group of dedicated local citizens who are endorsing seven candidates for election in the August 5th primary. We call our group "Independence Residents for Responsible Government", and our membership is from throughout the township.

We are concerned that the majority of the current township board has not acted responsibly to assure that the quality of life for which we all settled here will be protected from such incompatible development as gravel pits and high-rise zoning.
