Take off your hat--we're on holy ground!

And his clear, "Amen" reinforced the prayer!

SEWER DEFICIT OR SURPLUS: TAKE YOUR CHOICE

According to recently completed computations by Doeren Mayhew and Company, Independence Township auditors, the township's sewer system fund could end up with either a \$7 million deficit or a \$9 million dollar surplus at the end of its financial schedule, depending on action by the township to con-

tinue or kill the controversial ad valorem sewer tax.

Addressing the township board, John Nantis of Doeren Mayhew, said his firm had to make "certain assumptions" (on future interest rates and system income), but that neither alternative, to eliminate the tax immediately or to continue it indefinitely would be the recommended course of action.

Instead, he proposed that the township consider a \$100,000 levy (as opposed to the

current \$200,000) to be extended for an unspecified number of years as "mere in line with the goal of getting down to zero at the end of (the township's financial) obligation."

Nantis also suggested that the projections be measured against "real" figures compiled in the townships annual audit; with improved accounting procedures to put the township in a better position to analyze the possibilities for future adjustment.

Township Trustee, William Vandermark, who had been outspoken in his criticism of previous township board decisions to levy the tax said, "I'm satisfied. Doeren Mayhew did a good job. But there are still a lot of questions that have to be answered."

Both Vandermark and his brother, former supervisor Robert, concurred with the recommendation for updated accounting, especially with a suggestion to separate out fund incomes for special assessments, tax, interest etc. which they said is the only way to accurately predict future fund balances.

CONDOMINIUMS "IN KEEPING" WITH INDEPENDENCE GROWTH PLANS

In a letter to developer, Hugh Garner, the Independence Township planner has indicated that plans for 100 condominiums on 25 acres at the South East corner of I-75 and Dixie Highway, would be in keeping with overall township development.

Garner had proposed the change in zoning required for the condos to the township board at their December 2 meeting and was instructed to submit site plans to the planning department and planning commission.

Planner Tod Kilroy said in his letter that the planning department would be inclined to look at a condominium development of moderate density as "more favorable than commercial for that area." Kilroy also requested more specific information about the proposal.

The parcel in question had been zoned for commercial development in a consent agreement set up in 1976 involving Garner's adjacent residential development, Deer Lake Farms.

AMENDMENTS WIN APPROVAL AFTER 9 MONTHS OF DISCUSSION

Acting with dispatch, the Independence Township Board passed into law after twenty minutes of discussion amendments to township ordinances which had been kicked around on the planning commission level for over nine months.

Among the amendments, some of which were mandated by changes in the state's zoning enabling acts, were the disputed height restrictions on structures and regulation of amusement park activity.

Although some board members expressed reluctance to approve amendments that had only been made available to them in finished form recently, Supervisor James Smith (former chairman of the planning commission) urged prompt action on the measures. Smith said Independence was as much as a year behind other townships in the state in acting on the revisions.

GOSCIKI CONVICTED OF SECOND DEGREE MURDER

Michael Goscki, the 17-year-old Walled Lake youth convicted of second-degree murder in the March 15 slaying of an Independence Township grocery store clerk, was sentenced to two to 30 years in jail by Circuit Judge William Beer.

Goscki also received a similar sentence, to run concurrently with the first sentence, for participating in an armed robbery earlier that evening.

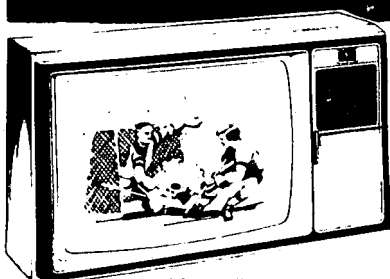
Darlene Ramsey, 21, was shot and killed during a robbery attempt of a Richardson Farm Dairy at 4474 Dixie Highway.

Christmas is Not Always a Happy Occasion

Christmas--a time of peace, rejoicing and merriment. When, it is said, the beasts in the field will bow to their knees in praise of the birth of a savior. When, in the midst of the bloodiest war men have ever waged, troops from both sides of the trenches laid down their arms and crossed lines to drink the cup

of fellowship.

It is a charming notion.

But for many people, the holidays mark the lowest point of existence. The season of joy is also the season of melancholy, depression and suicide. A time when the lonely feel lonelier, the unhappy miserable and the depressed despair.

Some studies suggest that the homicide, suicide and divorce rates would all be lower if we just skipped the holiday season completely.

Fred Bauman, Assistant Director at the Consortium for Human Development, doesn't think that is necessarily the case but he does admit, "Winter bums people out."

"It's a definite trend. And the holidays, with all their expectations, tend to aggravate the condition."

Bauman, who works out of an office on Sashabaw Road in Independence Township,

also admits that the level of depression and unhappiness locally may be worse this year because of economic conditions.

"There is the feeling that this won't be a good Christmas...that providers won't be

able to provide."

"We try to minimize that concentration on the negative...to get (people) to make some kind of positive commitment. But there isn't much we can do about the economy. I guess we have to leave that to Ronald Reagan."

All in all the holidays are boom time for the misery business.

Just ask Major Ron Lenon of the Pontiac Salvation Army.

"Christmas is sentiment," he says, "We all wish we could wake up on Christmas morning again and come down the stairs to see Mom and Dad sitting by a tree surrounded with presents."

But for those whom the Army deals with on a first hand basis, that family idyll has often been forgotten.

One of the regular functions of the Army is to visit nursing home patients in the Pontiac area a couple of times a year and at Christmas, when they distribute gifts.

It is a generous gesture and well received. But Lenon says it is also one of his volunteers most frustrating.

"Who are we fooling really?" he asks, "you know what we hear from these people? That they wish so-and-so would visit, people we don't even know, they say, 'If you see John, tell him to come and say hello.'"

"People look at old people in nursing homes as if they've always been old. It seems the most obvious thing in the world that they were once teenagers out running in the streets. But a family will put an aged parent in a home and think all their responsibilities are over."

Loneliness isn't the only ill the Army treats. Another part of their program is for those who have the will for a holiday celebration but not the way. The thousands of people across the country that are the vic-

tim of un-employment, eviction and catastrophe.

Ron Lenon has seen their numbers swell in recent months.

"The ones who are really hurting, are the ones that don't qualify for unemployment and TRA benefits. People who have had part time jobs that aren't there anymore when the economy gets this bad."

Lenon says his organization can help the really destitute, can provide temporary food and shelter and, at Christmas time, can try to alleviate some deprivation with a toy and canned goods campaign. But the real goal of the Salvation Army is to foster hope in the hopeless, faith in the faithless.

"It get's down to why we're doing all this...We want people to realize that God is interested in their problems. The most important thing is not to give them a meal or overnight lodging but to help them learn to face tomorrow."

Ironically, it is often faith that is hardest to maintain at Christmas. When sentiment asks us to believe but reality promises a cold January. Goodwill, if manifested only once a year.

Needless to say, in the Army hope springs eternal.

"I sometimes think Christmas is the cord that holds the free world together," says Major Lenon.

That may not be very much consolation to someone spending Christmas alone or destitute. But both Lenon and Fred Bauman agree, you have to emphasize the positive, even if there's not much of it.

In the words of Major Lenon, "You gotta have hope. Hope is a part of life. The other part's disappointment and that's what we're here for."

Lots of Ideas for Spending Independence CD Funds

The Independence Township Board sat down to make a "wish list" last Tuesday, December 16. The object in mind - what to do with \$120,000 in community development funds, money designated by the federal government for improvements in low and moderate income areas.

A wide range of suggestions were presented, from which the township plans to form a list of priorities for the January 6 meeting.

Among the suggestions most prominently discussed were:

1. Improvements on the fire station at Maybee and Pine Knob Roads, including an additional truck bay and living quarters.

2. Roadwork in the Sashabaw and Woodhull area and on Mann Road between Clintonville and Baldwin.

3. The purchase of a park, off Maybee the land for which the township has already made an offer on, and the installation of

facilities there.

4. An elevator for the Senior Citizens Center next to Clintonwood Park. And possible paving of the parking lot at the location.

5. Village President, Fontie Apmadoc, was also on hand to try to interest the board in considering the extension of a sidewalk from the village limits to the township library.

6. Apmadoc said too that the village intended to spend \$2,500 of its own community development funds on an M-15 road study. She requested the board participate in paying for the engineering fees.

All told, the total dollar figure for suggested improvements added up to something like three or four times as much money as is available. By January 6, the board hopes to decide on which projects and in what manner they wish to proceed.

3. Letter regarding the removal of political campaign signs will be sent to those candidates who have not removed their signs from Springfield Township. Also, the Township will investigate amendments to the Sign Ordinance to control such temporary signs.

4. Request by Mr. Curt Cumming to move a house from White Lake Township into Springfield Township was approved.

5. One appointment must be made to the Township Board of Review.

4. Action regarding adoption of the BOCA Fire Prevention Code was tabled until the January 7th Board meeting.

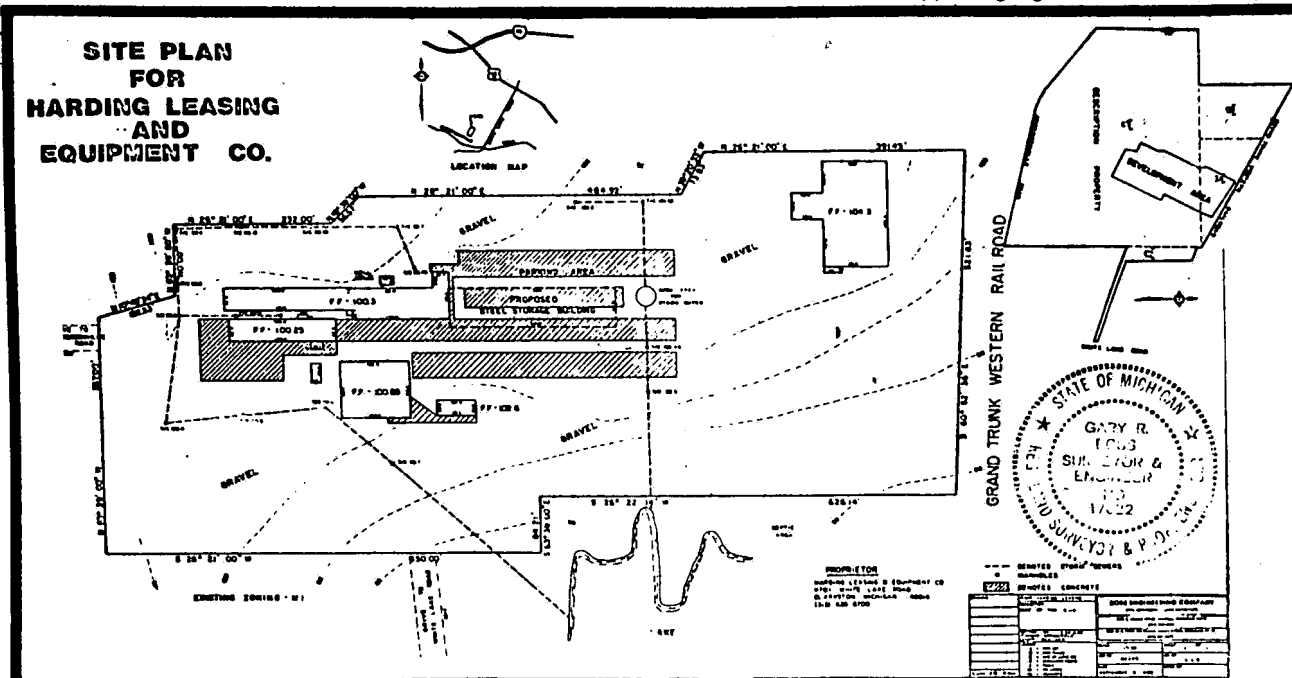

Scrappy Kettering, 3rd Quarter Blahs Defeat Wolves 64-61

Clarkston High School basketball coach, Gary Nustad, must be wondering why he didn't get a degree in psychology, especially in the treatment of split personalities.

The Wolfpack put on another Jeckyll and Hyde performance Friday night in losing to the Waterford Kettering Captains. One half of nearly flawless, controlled basketball and one of almost total offensive and defensive breakdown. Unfortunately, the Jeckyll half came when it counted most, in the third and fourth periods and the Wolves suffered their first league loss since early in 1979.

After setting tempo through the first two quarters and building a 27-22 halftime lead, the Wolves came out dazed and confused in the second, began to make poor shot selection and get into foul trouble and never quite turned things back around.

In fact, a casual observer might have thought that the teams had traded uniforms over the half. Kettering, who seemed game but clearly outmatched in the early going suddenly came alive, shutting down the Clarkston inside game and keeping the ball

On the night, the Captains shot 32 of 42 from the line, fully half of their point total. Including 13 of 14 by Dave Meyer, who seemed to be shooting fouls for most of the third quarter.

Both teams got their share of free shots in a game which started modestly enough but became nearly a donnybrook in the second half. No fewer than five technicals were called, among them two game techs on Clarkston's Ric Schebor for fighting.

Clarkston's high scorer was Scott McKoin with 19 mostly first half points. Craig Schnable also added 12. Kettering was led by Tom Lloyd, who collected 31 and seemed incapable of missing from anywhere inside the time line.
