Violence Times Two The Hockeys - A Study in Courage



Nineteen-Year-Old Monica Hockey - In the words of her mother, "Just getting started with life."

Attorney General William French Smith said, during the course of his senate confirmation hearings, that in 1981 one out of every three American homes would be victimized by some kind of violent crime. Maybe. He would have had to multiply that figure by six to reach the 1979 level set by the Edward J. Hockey family of Clarkston.

What happened to the Hockeys is nothing short of incredible and, worse, incredibly senseless.

On March 2 their son, Perry, was involved in a still obscure altercation at the Wildwood Inn in Ortonville. He received a blow to the head, which fractured his skull and left him in a coma for eight months. Six months after Perry was assaulted the Hockey's daughter Monica was brutally beaten and murdered.

It is impossible for any statistic to convey the effect those events have had on their lives. It is impossible even to understand how they have survived.

"God's grace," is Shirley Hockey's simple answer.

Edward Hockey says, "What can you do? The only alternative is suicide or revenge. And don't think I didn't want revenge; I just

understood the penalty."

The Hockey's fate is extraordinary, tragic and unbelievable. But what is really disturbing about it is the very normal circumstances from which it arose.

The Hockeys were, before the events of 1979, a manifestly average American family. Edward Hockey has lived in Clarkston all his life, first as a farmer and then as a truck driver. Shirley Hockey grew up in Pontiac and moved to Clarkston when she was married. The Hockey's three children grew up in a home where "the family was so close you couldn't believe it," says Mrs. Hockey. She is proud of the way she brought up her family.

The mother of three children held a full time job where, according to her husband, "She did all the dirty work while the kid they hired just last week stood around and smoked cigarettes." Her children were loved.

Shirley Hockey doesn't work anymore. She spends her days visiting Perry Hockey at the Oakland County Medical Center where he has been since he was released from the hospital. It is a different sort of life.

Perry is, a full two years after he was injured, unable to walk, tend to his needs or remember his father's name if he hasn't said it in the last few hours.

The 27-year-old who held a full time job, was married with a daughter of three and

Navarre Receives Avon License



Navarre is the owner/operator of two local construction firms, J. Navarre-Smith and Associates, Inc. and J. Navarre Contracting.





It's hard to believe that one family could be subjected to as much grief as the Hockeys, the subject of this week's cover story.

Daughter Monica Hockey was brutally murdered (one of the most heinous crimes in North Oakland County ever) only months after her brother was badly beaten up. To this day Perry remains incapacitated, possibly hospitalized for life, maybe never to regain many of his vital functions.

When reporter Dawson Bell paid a visit to the Hockey's home in Independence Township, he didn't know what to expect. One might think the Hockeys to be terribly bitter and not at all willing to talk about the unfortunate circumstances that created terrible turmoil in their average American lives.

But, Bell found the Hockeys, mother and father, to be incredibly resilient people. They are bitter to a degree -- but are channeling that bitterness to a cause that they feel is very worthwhile. The cause is capital punishment, and they are actively seeking its restoration in Michigan.

And Bell also found the Hockeys willing to talk, to share their tragedy and trauma.

You won't want to miss this story. The tragedy, as told by Bell, will send shivers down your spine. On the other hand, the resilience shown by the Hockeys will at the very least, earn your admiration.



Q. It may be a silly question but I've always wondered how a dentist keeps his dental mirror from fogging when examining my mouth?

There are sprays and liquids available that help keep the mirror clear, but the simplest way is to warm the mirror to body temperature by holding it against the patient's cheek.

CAN A MONUMENT OR MARKER BE MATCHED TO A VERY OLD ONE?

Yes, any kind of marker or monument can be matched reasonably well regardless of the age of the original one. This is one of the personal services available from our funeral home.

The usual manner of matching an existing monument or marker is to make a rubbing of the original. By placing rubbing paper, similar to carbon paper, on the stone the lettering and any decorative patterns are transferred by the rubbing process. This provides the pattern from which the matching piece can be made. Hand carving and other features can be duplicated, too.

After the pattern is taken, the measurements, height and other specifics are noted and used to match the original.

We advise that before this procedure is begun you contact the cemetery to be sure you can install the type of monument or marker you have in mind.

The story of a modern day Romeo and Juliet will be presented for Clarkston area theatregoers over the next two weeks as the high school drama department presents West Side Story.



Armed Springfield Man Gives Up at Home

A heavily armed Springfield Township man defused a potentially explosive confrontation with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department last Thursday when he voluntarily surrendered to police.

James Earl Chevalier, of 8616 Crosby Lake Road, was arraigned Friday afternoon in 52nd District Court and charged with two counts of assault with intent to commit murder and two counts of possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony following his arrest 17 hours after police were first called to the scene.

Sheriff's deputies said they were summoned to the home at 8:08 p.m. Wednesday by the man's wife who had fled the house and called police saying she had been beaten by her husband.

Police reported that when they arrived at the house on Wednesday to talk to Chevalier he refused to let them in and pointed a gun at Deputy Thomas Quisenberry.

Police left the home and returned Thursday in force and with warrants for Chevalier's arrest. Chevalier again refused to come out but after deputies talked to him for ten minutes he surrendered. Police confiscated a rifle and a handgun.

Chevalier was released on \$100,000 bond by Judge Gerald McNally. A preliminary examination is scheduled for 9 a.m. May 13.

Off-Duty Deputy Makes Parking Lot Arrest

A 28-year-old Holly man was arrested on two outstanding warrants by an off-duty Oakland County Sheriff's Department officer last Thursday afternoon following a brief scuffle in the parking lot at McDonald's restaurant on Dixie Highway in Clarkston.

The man, identified as Dennis Eugene Martin, of 14329 Linden Road in Holly, was wanted on two bench warrants for breaking and entering and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

He was recognized by off-duty sheriff's deputy A.D. Schultz at the counter in the restaurant. Schultz identified himself and told Martin he was under arrest. But while the deputy attempted to call in for assistance, Martin jumped over the counter and fled into the parking lot.

Deputy Schultz pursued and wrestled Martin to the ground. When assistance did arrive Martin was again placed under arrest and taken to the Oakland County Jail.

He has now also been charged with resisting a police officer.

Judge Orders Terriers to be Put to Death

52nd District Court Judge Gerald McNally last Thursday ordered the destruction of two pit bull terriers responsible for an attack on a seven year old Springfield Township girl April 21.

Steve Secatch, 8612 West Ellis Road, father of the girl, had requested the dogs be destroyed following the attack which sent Stacey Secatch to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital in Pontiac with wounds from over 50 dog bites.

In testimony before Judge McNally at Thursday's show cause hearing, Secatch described how he had rescued his daughter from the yard of Willard Turk, 10227 King Road, where Stacey and another girl had been playing.

Secatch said he removed Stacey from the fenced-in yard and was returning home to summon an ambulance when one of the dogs leapt the fence and resumed the attack.

Mr. Turk was in Florida on April 21 but was present at the hearing to contest the destruction of the dogs.







Gravel Mining Application Remains Unresolved

A decision on the application by the Edward C. Levy Company for gravel mining in Independence Township remains in limbo with both the company and the State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) offering little indication of when the matter will be resolved.

Brad Wilkins, of the DNR Land Resources Programs Division, who conducted a field survey of the proposed mining area on April 23, said action on the application has been held up at the company's request while local zoning questions are addressed.

But attorney for the Levy Company, Norman Hyman, said last week that he does not anticipate any further official action on the township level until the DNR acts on the application submitted under the Inland Lakes and Streams Act (P.A. 346).

The company is seeking approval for its plan to mine sand and gravel and create a lake on 494 acres west of Sashabaw Road and north of Clarkston Road. The total aggregate proposed for removal from the site comes to nearly 13 million tons. The lake that would be created by the mining would cover over 190 acres.

At a public hearing held in January Hyman contended the impact of the mining on wetlands in the area and the Clinton River which lies adjacent to the mining site would be minimal.

Hyman holds to that contention. "I still

believe we've got a development plan that's environmentally sound," he said last Friday.

Neither would he say that the company was ready, at this point, to modify its proposal, despite evidence the DNR was unlikely to approve it in its present form.

Both Wilkens and David Hayward, chief of the lands, lakes and streams section of the DNR which oversees 346 applications, have both indicated that the application as presented is unacceptable.

And, although Hyman would not say the Levy Company was prepared to compromise at this point, he did leave the door open for revision of the plan.

"I can't evaluate any specific compromise

right now, because I don't have one in front of me," he said. "All I can say is that any development has to make economic sense. If the DNR comes to us and says, 'We want you to do A, B, and C' and we can accommodate them, we will. But we haven't gotten to that

point yet."

Action was to have been taken within 90 days after the hearing. But Hayward had said, even before the DNR began its investigation, that he expected it to take longer.

Walters Lake Village?

Sunnybeach Considers Secession

by Dawson Bell

The spring newsletter to members of the Sunnybeach Property Owners' Association went out last week with a customary lack of fanfare. Most of the information contained in it concerned the spring clean-up day, swimming and boating classes and the usual "deaf ears" plea to pay annual dues.

But attached to the newsletter, is a questionnaire, which inconspicuously asks -- Are you interested in pursuing the creation of a village in the Walters Lakes area?

The village question brings before the residents of the subdivisions on both sides of Walters Lake in northeast Independence Township once again an issue which has been kicked around and largely ignored for most of the fifty years or so since development there began to get serious.

And it is, in a sense, merely one more way of asking those residents if they are interested in mounting some kind of concerted

effort to address the problems which have afflicted Walters Lake to varying degrees over most of those fifty years.

The subdivisions around Walters Lake, Sunnybeach I and II, Thendara Park and John E. Busko represent one of the most densely populated areas in the township. President of the Sunnybeach Association, John Lutz, estimates there are about 300 families in his association, and another 300-400 in Thendara and John Busko. All are concentrated within a radius of about a mile around 80

acre Walters Lake.

Yet over the years as more and more people moved in and as they continue to make Walters Lake something of a city in the middle of the country, the role of government and government services in the area has held steady and, in some instances, declined.

Chief among the problems which face the area are the condition of the roads; they are, in a word, terrible.

Lutz says this most recent initiative to investigate village incorporation is largely devised to "figure out some way to fix the roads." Lutz admits it won't be easy.

The three subdivisions around Walters Lake are largely served by private roads, installed in the heyday of laissez faire development and laid out largely on a bulldozer's path of least resistance.

Last summer in Thendara a few days of rain turned one of the major arteries serving the subdivision into a miniature Grand Canyon and it was only through extensive pleading with local authorities that repairs were eventually effected.

Despite the woeful condition of the roads and assorted other problems which Lutz and some of his neighbors feel are related to the lack of an association with any real power the move to do something about it except complain has never generated much support.

Six years ago a proposal with some of the same intentions, to form a Sunnybeach Summer Resort Association, was resoundingly defeated by a vote of almost four to one. More people turned out for the vote than the combined number of those who have attended association meetings since.

The resort idea was even less formal than the village concept, but would allow the association to levy mandatory dues from its members. Today the twenty dollar per year dues are voluntary and Lutz says that last year they were paid by only sixty members. In the previous year 90 members paid and Lutz thinks the drop off may be due to a raise in the rates from \$10 to \$20.

Needless to say not very much can be done to improve roads with that kind of income. And the level of interest demonstrated by the number of dues payers must be discouraging.

But Lutz thinks the association needs to at least talk about what direction they are taking. He thinks some improvement program might be sold if residents could be

convinced their property values would benefit.

Incorporation would not come easy. Petitions must be signed and delivered to the State Boundary Commission, a public hearing held, a charter commission elected and finally, in a process that usually takes years, a vote held of all the electors within the proposed boundaries.

All of that takes time, and considerable effort. And it is time and effort that could be entirely wasted if the interest isn't there.

Right now, the interest, if present at all, is not exactly dynamic. A few of the residents in the area, when asked about their feelings on the question of incorporation, said, first, they didn't even know about it, and second, that it just sounded like another way to raise taxes.

According to the executive secretary for



Monica was buried in the wrong place and had to be disinterred. The cemetery on Maybee Road where she lies was vandalized two weeks ago and Shirley Hockey is afraid her daughter's headstone will be destroyed.

One would think the Hockeys had had enough, that they would turn their backs on

Clarkston and move to California or Istanbul. But Edward Hockey says only, "Where could we go? You can't get away from it."

It, for the Hockeys, is the wreckage of American society. A society that could allow such a thing to happen to their children and, as if to rub salt in the wounds, treat the offense and the offender as matters of little consequence.

Shirley Hockey wants to know what is wrong with a world that will pay a half million dollars for the memoirs of the "Son of Sam" but not a thin dime for the therapy she thinks her son desperately needs.

Ed Hockey wants to know why his tax money is being used "to keep those guys (Johnson and Coyle) warm in the winter."

"Perry was so badly beaten they had to remove part of his skull when the brain star-







ted to swell," says his mother.

"And that kid (Perry's assailant) never spent five minutes in jail," her husband puts in.

Mrs. Hockey thinks we "have to come back to some kind of moral standards."

Ed Hockey is more specific, "We need to get tough with criminals: I supported capital punishment long before all of this happened."

Perry was injured after a fight broke out at the Wildwood, apparently over a pool game, which carried over into the parking lot. The witnesses to the incident had all been drinking and no one is quite sure how Perry became involved at all. But one thing is certain, the Hockey's son will never be able to give his own account. Ed and Shirley Hockey only wish he could.

The circumstances surround Monica's beating are equally hazy. But, at the least, more conclusive. Monica is dead and Kyle Johnson and Jeffrey Coyle are both serving life terms in prison.

How their daughter became entangled with Coyle and Johnson in the first place is something the Hockeys don't like to think

about.

Kyle Johnson was a parolee from Jackson State Prison and Jeffrey Coyle an escapee from a Pontiac half-way house at the time of the murder. Shirley Hockey thinks that if Coyle had been in jail for the full length of his sentence her daughter might still be alive.

The ifs for the Hockeys are overwhelming. If Perry had not gone to Ortonville...if Monica had gone, as she said she was, to Flint to see a friend...if they had only found some safe, quiet place, like Clarkston, to raise their children.

Monica was nineteen years old when she died. As her mother says, "just getting ready to start her life." Perry, who still has his, will never be a "fishin' buddy" for his father anymore.

"I went to war with five brothers," says Edward Hockey, "and nothing as bad as this happened to any of them."





George Krull: Dentist Educator

Children and parents are instructed in the formula for tooth decay - and taught how to dismantle it.

There are a chain of three elements required for decay to take place he says. And to keep it from taking place one has to remove one of those elements from the chain.

The first is the teeth. Removing them is no solution. The second is bacteria in the mouth and Krull says there isn't very much that can be done about it either. The third, however, is fermentable carbohydrates, that is, sugar. And sugar can be controlled or removed from the arena with a minimum of effort.

The easiest way is to keep it out altogether, but not very practical since almost everything Americans eat has some kind of sugar in it. The more realistic approach is to cleanse the mouth of the fermentable carbohydrate before it begins to work on the teeth.

Krull, who has been practicing in Clarkston for a year and a half but only last week opened up his own office in the Clarkston Professional Plaza, is a specialist in the dental problems of children.

He spent two years doing post graduate work in pediatric dentistry at Indiana University before coming to Michigan. He even spent twenty months teaching the subject at the University of Detroit before deciding to go into practice for himself.



George Krull is waging a war on childhood cavities. Not uncommon for a pediatric dentist. But unlike some of his fellows, Krull is intent less on the war in the trenches and its battery of drills and anesthetic than he is on the "peace without a price" system of preventive dentistry.

Krull says he is happy enough spending his time with children who have fallen prey to decay and cavities, but that he is much happier and so too are his patients when things never get to that stage.

"There is really no reason for a kid to have decay in 1981," he says. "About 95 percent of decay is preventable and all dental hygiene can be controlled."

"The best and least expensive dentistry I can provide is preventive dentistry."

Preventive dentistry starts early according to Krull, as early as the teeth are in the mouth. The notion that baby teeth fall out anyway and therefore aren't very important is a notion he would like to dispell.

"Baby teeth provide a foundation for the adult teeth, they are crucial to the formation of the jaw. It's like laying a foundation for a house," he says.

Krull's approach to preventing those primary teeth from deteriorating is to make trips to his office not just a treatment but an education.

Public Safety Task Force Named

Independence Township supervisor James Smith has on several occasions stated his intention of addressing community needs and problems through the vehicle of citizen task forces. He says they are the most expedient and effective way for local governments to procure professional consultation at minimal cost to the taxpayer.

And at a recent township board meeting he put the task force concept into action once again by appointing a six-member citizen group on public safety.

The latest appointments have been charged with an investigation of police and emergency medical service now available in the township and what future changes in service, if any, may be needed.

Smith says police contracting with the Oakland County sheriff's department is expected to cost the township close to \$1 million by 1982 and a periodic review of the services received from such a large chunk of the township budget is required from "prudent administrative management."

The task force will also look into present and future needs in emergency medical service, now provided by the township fire department.

Smith has asked the task force to examine, among other things, the possibility of creating a public safety department and the benefits of supplementing police protection with a local volunteer or para-professional unit.

Independence township residents appointed to the task force on public safety include two area physicians, Dr. James A. O'Neill and Dr. Rockwood W. Bullard, Mr. Eldon Aderholt, deputy director of public safety in Bloomfield Hills, Mr. James W. Armstrong,

corporate director for safety and protection services at the Bendix Corporation, Mr. Gary Stonerock, former Independence Township Supervisor and president of Stonerock Aerial Survey, Ltd., and Mr. Roy Heusler, a retired civil engineer and member of the supervisor's roads task force.





Springfield to Discuss Park Plans at May 11 Public Hearing

Construction plans for the proposed Holcomb Road Park in Springfield Township have been held up pending discussion at the Parks and Recreation Commission's May 11 meeting after some public opposition to the park surfaced in recent weeks.

Steve Dice of the commission said, "We want our next regular meeting to serve as second chance (for public input), because evidently some people didn't know about it before."

The park property, which lies east of Bridge Lake Road on the north side of Holcomb Road, was recently leased by the township from the Clarkston Community Schools.

Dice said the park has been included in the Parks and Recreation Commission budget for some time, but that this year was targeted for the first construction.

The present plans call for three baseball/softball fields, picnic areas, play areas and basketball and tennis courts. The work slated for this year, however, included only one or two of the ballfields, some of the play area and road and parking lot construc-

tion, all in the area closest to Holcomb Road.

The Parks and Recreation Commission has allotted \$5,000 of its \$30,000 budget for 1981-82 to the Holcomb Road park construction. Further improvements are expected to be paid for in part with state and federal funding. Dice said the total development was likely to cost around \$40,000.

He said the commission wanted to reopen the Holcomb park discussion because of concerns neighboring residents had expressed over the increase in traffic and activity the park would create.

Dice is not convinced changes are needed in the plan but that the commission would welcome any suggestions. He said the Holcomb Road Park was intended to be a "neighborhood park" and that the feelings of its closest neighbors would be crucial in any decision.

The May 11 meeting of the Springfield Township Parks and Recreation Commission will be held at the Town Hall, 650 Broadway, Davisburg, at 8 p.m. Written comments may also be submitted to the township offices, to the attention of Parks and Recreation.

the State Boundary Commission, James Hyde, there isn't any definite reason why property taxes should go up under village government.

But, he said, "If they have specific problems they want to solve, no matter what they do it's going to take money to solve them." And for the village to take the initiative in solving the road problem the roads would have to be deeded over to their jurisdiction. Hyde said that would mean the loss of some local control.

But Lutz, for one, doesn't think that is an insurmountable problem. The roads aren't private anyway, he says, except in the sense that no one takes care of them; they get used by whomever feels like it.

Another route Lutz says may be worth examining is the creation of a special assessment district to maintain roads. One problem with that concept is the need, if service is to be maintained following improvement, to bring the roads up to county standards. In their present condition, that would mean virtually starting from scratch.

Lutz is concerned about other association matters too, like the regulation of two beaches they maintain on the lake and lake usage and pollution. Those concerns, he thinks, might be better addressed by a village.

But like the question of road maintenance, any effort to improve the lake itself will take cooperation, not just from members of a single association but to be really effective, from all three.

Lutz feels the sense of community required for anything to happen may be growing as more people, some of them used to urban governmental services, move into the area and begin to wonder why they

aren't getting them here.

It is interesting to contrast that attitude with a longtime resident like John Tisch who thinks the newcomers should show the same kind of "rugged individualism" he has in 35 years of living on Walters Lake.

"There are no problems we have here that couldn't be solved with a good association," he says.

"The same thing is happening now that has always happened. People move out here because they like living on a lake and after they get here they start to wonder about the schools and the roads and the police."

Tisch, too, remembers when the service problems were not so difficult to address. He says when Floyd Andrus was township supervisor the people around Walters Lake

got up in arms about their roads until Andrus was convinced to put a "special assessment" of three dollars on the tax rolls and buy a used county gravel truck. He hired his brother-in-law to drive it and Tisch says it was the best service they've ever had.

"If Jim Smith (current Independence Supervisor) would add ten dollars on our taxes and buy one truck and hire one man he would win more votes than he'd know what to do with," says John Tisch.

The prospects of that happening, however, are slim.

Perhaps equally slim are the chances of the Walter Lake Village concept ever getting off the ground. The ingredients of dissatisfaction may be there, but the willingness to do something about it, and pay for it, may not.

And while they are not the residents of Sunnybeach, Thendara and John Busko seem likely to remain, in the words of one homeowner, "Clarkston's poor cousins".






