Cutbacks Could Cause Local Police Protection Pinch

A recent shakeup in the administration of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department under Johannes F. Spreen has begun to filter down locally and may affect the level of police services provided by the county in Independence and Springfield Townships.

Spreen has been under pressure from the County Board of Commissioners to curtail his budget, especially in the area of overtime. And in letters addressed to Independence Supervisor James B. Smith and to Springfield Supervisor Collin W. Walls June 1, the sheriff said, "My department is under a mandate to not utilize any more road patrol overtime for (your) respective townships."

The effect of that order, Spreen indicated, would mean the end to services provided to the townships which contract with the department above the limits of the contract.

Independence presently contracts six sheriff's deputies, two each on three shifts. Springfield employs one and two-thirds deputies, one on one shift and two deputies that are shared with Rose and Holly Townships on two others.

The contracts call for a 40-hour week, or 5 days per week, from each full-time deputy, with contracted allowances for sick time and leave. But they do not specify coverage for the remaining two days.

Undersheriff Robert Nyovich said flatly, "If the only way we can fill those empty shifts is with overtime then we won't be able to do it."

Asked if this would mean a perceptibly lower level of police protection in the area, however, the undersheriff was hesitant to conjecture.

He said the Sheriff's Department does have a force of 46 officers assigned to supportive services. Those deputies can still be used, within prescribed limits, for service to contracting townships.

"Certain supportive services will be available," he said. But those 46 officers he said were for utilization all over the county and could not be reserved solely to supplement township coverage.

The only guaranteed service Independence and Springfield could count on, Nyovich said, was that provided for in the contracts.



Nyovich predicted the cutbacks would have no immediate effect on either township. But he did say a manpower crunch might be forthcoming.

One of the possible sources of that crunch, according to County Commissioner Charles Whitlock, is a pending court decision on the staffing at the Oakland County Jail.

Whitlock said he thought Spreen had "overdramatized" the effects of the order to curtail overtime, but that if the county came under court order to increase the manpower at the jail it might result in cuts in other areas.

He also suggested a review of the Sheriff's Department overall staffing recently initiated by the commissioners would help to pinpoint areas in need of adjustment.

But, "It won't be as drastic as Spreen says," according to Whitlock.

The whole question of police services, and whose paying for how much has prompted Independence Supervisor Smith to step up his examination of public safety.

Smith has formed a citizen task force to study the issue and had been in negotiations with Sheriff Spreen to augment Independence

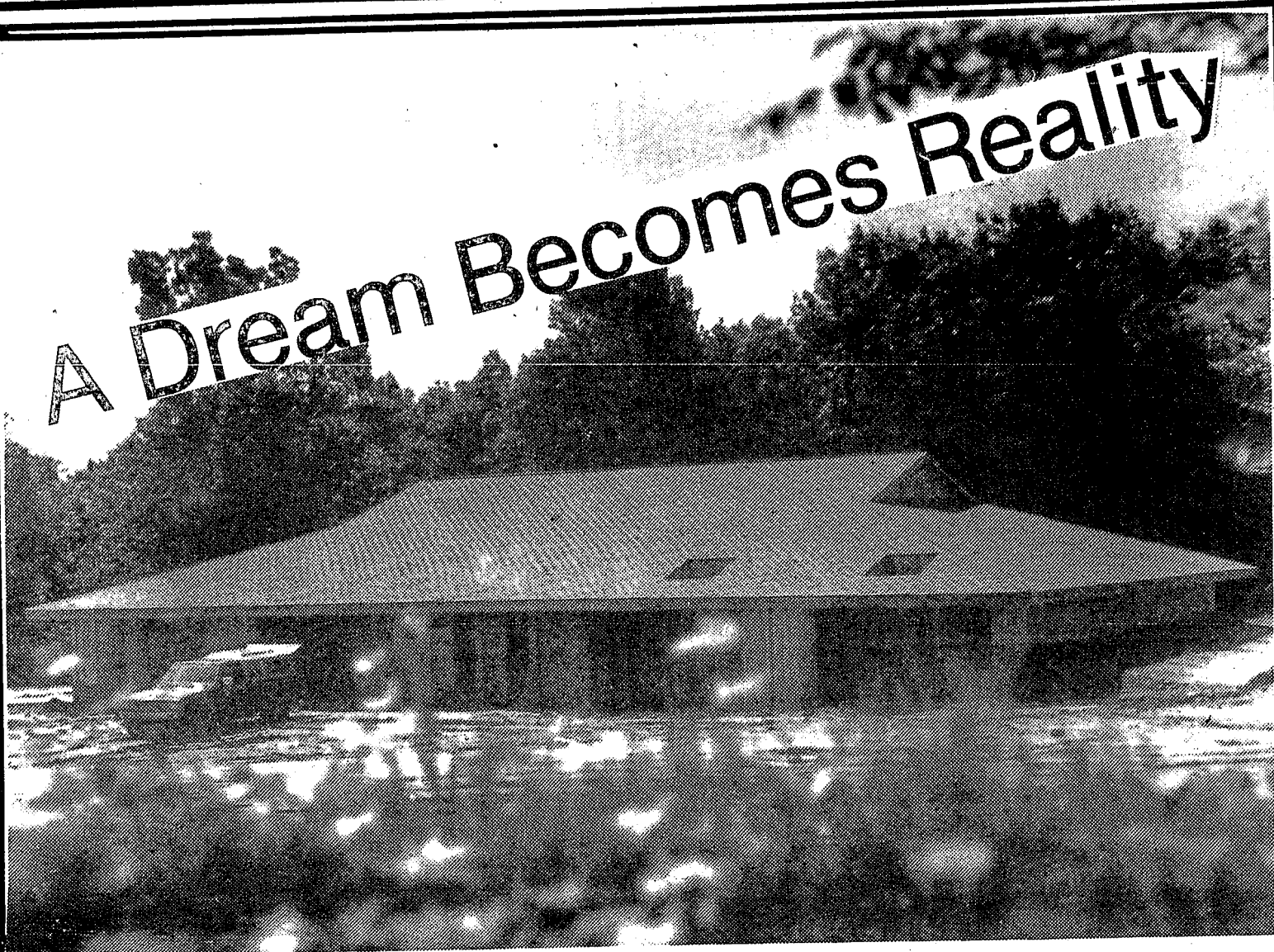

The entire office is staffed by highly skilled, highly trained professionals who make it their job to offer the patient the most superior care available.

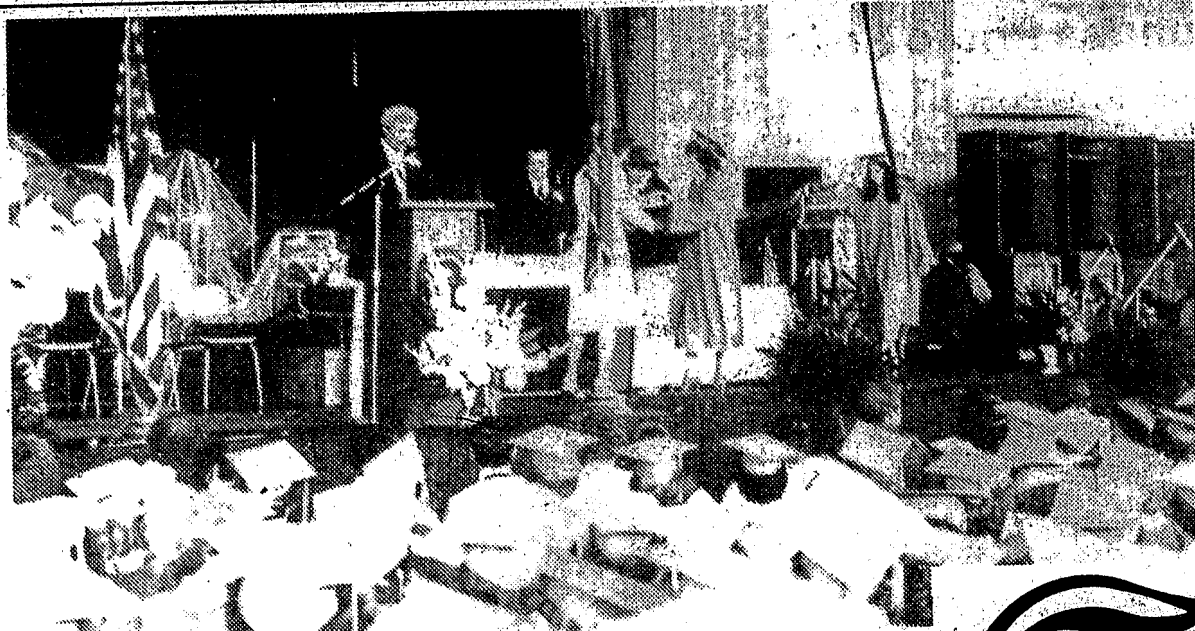

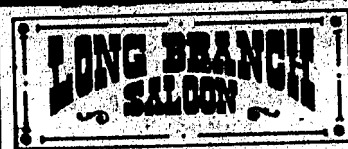

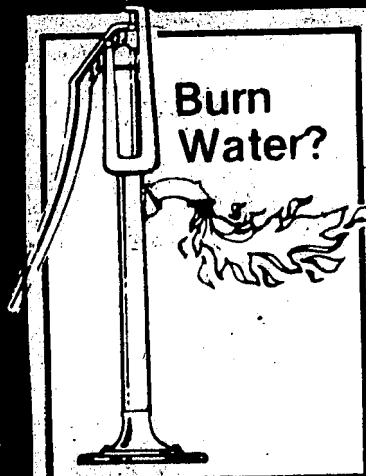

Immediately following at 5 p.m. the Grunyons, a 17-member Detroit businessmen's group, will perform a concert in Christ Church Guild Hall.

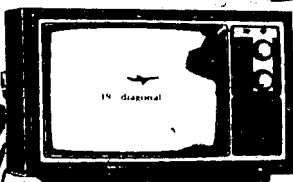

DYING TEETH CAN BE SAVED

Q. What is a root canal treatment?

A. It is a treatment used when the nerve of a tooth dies. The dentist removes the infected tissue from the pulp or nerve chamber of the tooth and replaces it with a non-irritating material. Most infected or abscessed teeth can be saved this way. The only alternative treatment is extraction. Not a very good alternative. Dentists who specialize in this area of dentistry are called endodontists.

ce police services with additional road patrol.

Despite the message from the county on overtime, Smith thinks it may be possible to implement that program. "It is obvious," he said, "that our long term interests can't be served with only two deputies (per shift)."

He said, too, the question of overtime cannot be addressed strictly on the basis of contracted services. "The county has a basic responsibility for protection of its citizens regardless of the contract."

Smith said the county's role in local law enforcement was "certainly changing". And one of the changes was the increase in cost to local units.

"I would hate to see a situation crop up where we couldn't afford county protection," he said.

Independence scuttled its own department and contracted with the county in February of 1980. At that time one full-time deputy cost the township \$32,448. On April 1 of this year the cost for one deputy was raised to \$37,716.

But even at that figure the county's Department of Management and Budget estimates the "real" cost, and subsequent subsidy from the county's general fund, is at least \$2,000 per man higher.

Hence the argument could and has been made that all of the county's taxpayers are helping to support police protection in the contracted municipalities. And, in conjunction with staffing problems at the jail and elsewhere, it seems likely the pressure to provide locally contracted services only up to the limits of the contract and to charge full fare for those services will continue.

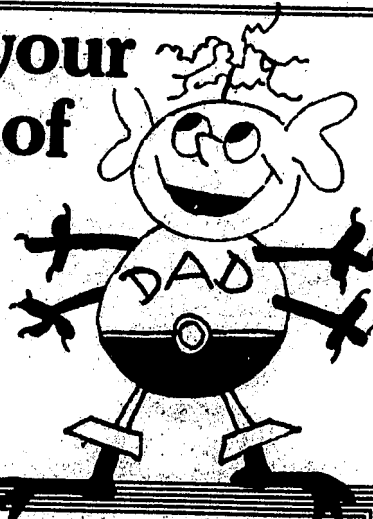

letters Spreen Tells Patterson to Mind His Own Business

Dear Editor:

In reference to an article in the Daily Tribune dated May 28, 1981, wherein Brooks Patterson, Oakland County's self-proclaimed expert on everything, stated that I was "caught flat footed as usual" with the overcrowding and understaffing problem in my jail, I would

like to make the following comments.

I think that it is about time that Mr. Patterson restricts himself to making statements that have first been verified to check their veracity and completeness. The overcrowding and understaffing problem which the Oakland County Jail faces has been of utmost concern to me almost from the time that I first took office in 1973. I have enclosed

as separate attachments for the review of the editors, and hopefully for some form of attention, no less than 17 different pieces of correspondence dealing with the overcrowding and understaffing conditions which my Department and myself have been faced with.

In addition to the correspondence which I refer to, I think it should be pointed out that there have been approximately nine studies dealing with the manpower and facilities at the Oakland County Jail. They include studies of the Michigan Department of Corrections, the National Institute of Corrections, the Oakland County Personnel Department, a panel of Oakland County Commissioners, a staff study by my Department and a study by Sheriff Irons, up to and including the present Jail Study Committee.

I would like to at this time praise the many fine, dedicated and professional men and women who work at the Oakland County Jail for their fine performance in light of the severe understaffing and overcrowding they face. There is much talk about prisoners' rights - what about rights of officers on the right side of the bars?

I have consistently advised the County Executive and the Commissioners that this problem is reaching a critical stage and something must be done immediately. Either myself or my representative has been attending the latest Jail Study Committee meetings, which up to this point in time has been looking at the total criminal justice system in Oakland County, but has in my opinion not addressed the understaffing and resultant overtime problem which must be addressed, and is moving at a pace which could create severe problems for the men and women of this Department.

I think that it's time for Brooks Patterson to stop making irresponsible statements dealing with the corrections system, of which he doesn't have the slightest idea about, both jail and prison, and tend to his duties as Prosecutor. By putting his nose into it he tends to exacerbate already existing problems - which he may have done by meeting with prison guards from Jackson in Ann Arbor three days before the riots!

Growing Congregation Beckons

Walters on the Move, Despite School Board Retirement

Last Monday, the Reverend Robert Walters, doffed one educational cap. The following Sunday he donned another.

The coincidence of those two events, his retirement from the Clarkston Board of Education and the receipt of a Doctor of

Ministry from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago, should surprise no one.

Bob Walters is the kind of man to whom the traditional notion of retirement is anathema.

"I think this idea of retiring to play golf is silly," he says. "There are just too many things to do."

It should be pointed out that what Bob Walters does, despite the fact that his name has appeared in the newspaper most often as a member of the school board, is minister to the congregation at Clarkston's Calvary Lutheran Church.

That is one reason why he is leaving the board; the congregation is growing and with it his responsibilities.

But before he mentions the growth of Calvary Lutheran, he says, "Eight years (Walter's tenure on the board) is just a good long time...to achieve what I set out to achieve as a member of the school board."

What he has achieved, is perhaps not as tangible as he would have liked. The Clarkston educational system, he says, still falls far short of its potential.

But intangibly, philosophically, he is satisfied.

"When I first came here I thought the educational philosophy was not progressive...there was more concern with saving dollars than with providing children the best possible education."

"Clarkston had no libraries in the elementary schools, no gymnasiums, no multi-purpose rooms...and to a certain extent we had a rubber stamp board of education."

Eight years later Clarkston's elementary schools still have no multi-purpose rooms

and no gymnasiums. But they do have libraries and, thanks to the recently successful millage, librarians to operate them.

And, although the administrative-board relationship remains uncommonly amicable, the boards on which Bob Walters has served bore little resemblance to rubber stamps.

Walters himself bucked superintendent Milford Mason on the rate of millage request the board proposed for June 8. Mason had suggested 2.3 mills would be most palatable to the voters. Walters fought for, and won, an increase rate closer to what he felt the schools really needed.

He doesn't think the new millage will solve the district's problems by any means; but it

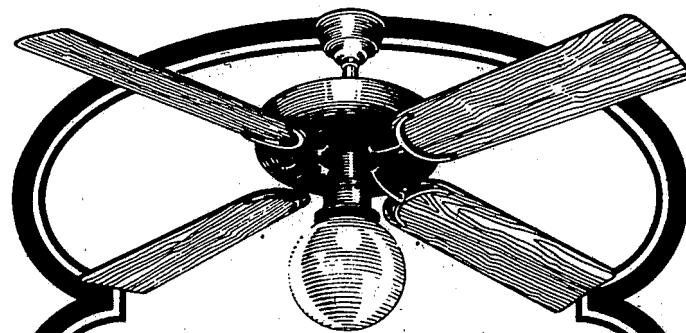

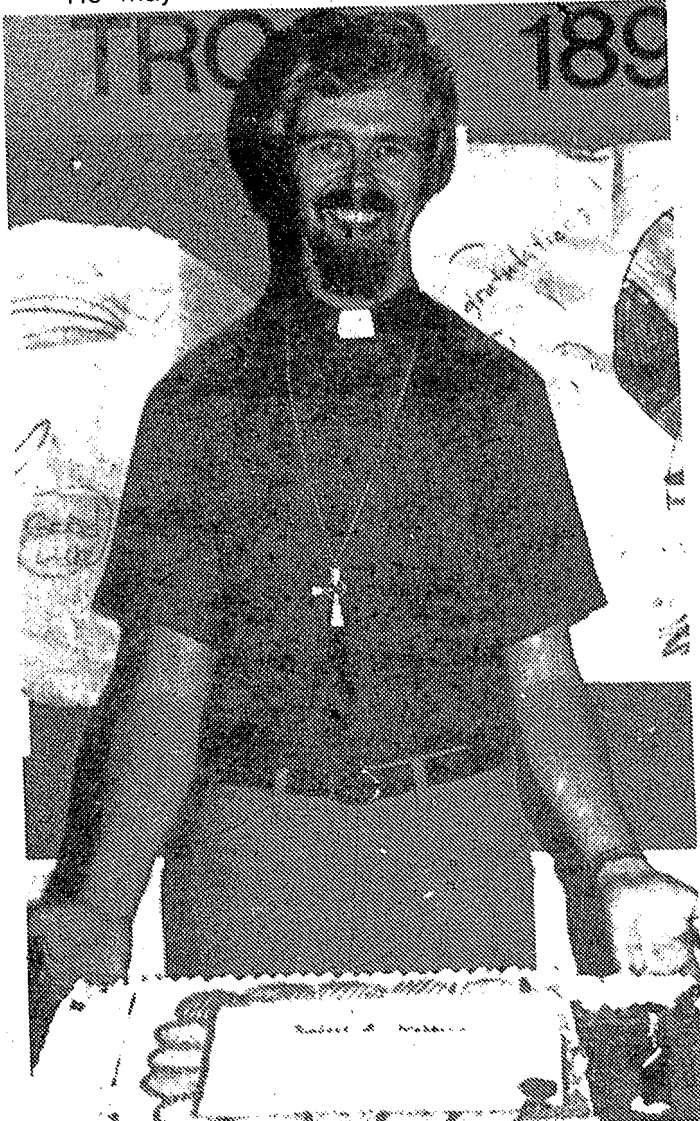

The primary goal of CURE is to ensure a basic education for young people by promoting fair funding for school districts. Their short term goals include a meeting with the governor to promote K-12 educational interests, preventing "panic" legislation in response to the defeat of Proposal A, asking for a supplemental K-12 education appropriation, and protecting against any executive for legislative cuts.

Equitable support of education, particularly for students in the "in-formula" districts, will be the long term focus for citizen action. CURE

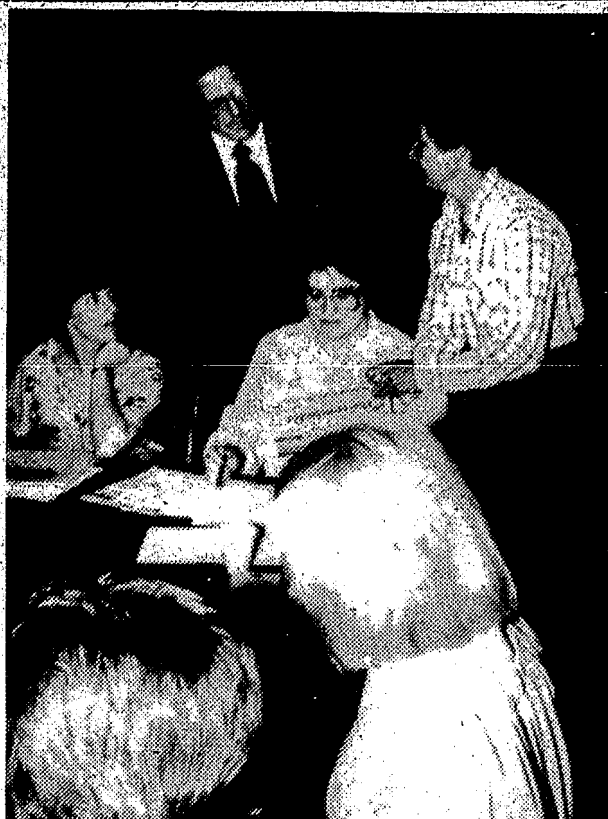
believes that only with parent concern, action, support and follow-through over a period of time can any legislative solutions be reached.

Independence Receives Bids for Traffic Study

Two engineering firms appeared before the Independence Township Board last Tuesday to present proposals for an M-15 traffic study the township is considering for development. No action was taken.

BRW, Inc. of Minneapolis and Applied Environmental Research of Ann Arbor presented the board with brief outlines of their possible approaches to the formation of alternative solutions for the traffic and drainage problems that have beset M-15 south of the Village of Clarkston.

The township had approved the concept of an alternative study at a Federal Revenue Sharing hearing in March.

The ostensible purpose of the study is to equip the township with bonafide engineering data to counter State Department of Transportation (DOT) plans for the highway that are perceived as potentially damaging to the best interests of the township.

The most often cited objection to the plan currently being considered by DOT is the proposed expansion of the highway to five lanes from Dixie Highway to Paramus Drive.

That proposal, it has been suggested, would create excessive pressure for further widening of the sections of M-15 through and south of the village that are predominantly residential.

The board did not award the contract for the study last Tuesday for several reasons, according to Township Clerk Chris Rose; two board members, Dan Travis and Dale Stuart, were not present for the meeting, the bids

from the two firms were widely divergent, and the intentions of the DOT are not clearly understood.

Rose said he felt State plans should be spelled out, and DOT willingness to accommodate local input established, before the project receives funding.

The cost of the proposed study could become an issue in itself. Initial estimates, between \$10,000 and \$14,000, appear to have been low. BRW said the price could go as high as \$23,000, depending on how long the study took to complete.

The township has more than \$20,000 in planning and management funds that could be used for an M-15 study, according to Rose. But he said he would be reluctant to spend all of it on a single project.

Smith Autopsy Results Pending

The investigation into the death of Jack Harley Smith, Jr., 26, of 6985 Tucson, Independence Township, continued this week with state police detectives having all but ruled out foul play.

Smith's body was discovered Monday, June 8, in a field west of Dixie Highway in the area of the old Waterford Hill Golf Course.

Detective Richard Chartier said the cause of death was undetermined, pending the results of an autopsy performed on June 10.

He said Smith's body evidenced no overt signs of foul play and that blood work from the autopsy should establish whether or not drugs or alcohol were involved in the young man's death.

The autopsy was expected to be completed by mid-week.

Two Area Auto Fatalities

Two Independence Township men were killed in separate single car accidents last week, according to the Oakland County

Sheriff's Department.

The first at 4:55 p.m. Thursday, June 11th, occurred when a car driven by Dixon Ellis Lawrence II left Waldon Road in Clarkston and struck a tree.

The second accident took place at 1:55 a.m. on June 13 when a car traveling north on Clintonville Road in Independence Township left the road and rolled several times. A sixteen-year-old passenger in that car was killed and the driver and another passenger injured.

Names of the victims in the crash are being withheld by policy pending the outcome of an investigation into its cause.

Lighting Drive Near Goal

Having arrived within \$5,000 of their \$60,000 goal, the Clarkston Lighting Fund Committee, announced last week that light standards and fixtures for the new football field lighting system have been put on order.

The committee received a big boost recently when the Detroit Edison Corporation agreed to furnish poles and crossbars for the project at a substantially discounted rate. A committee spokesman said the savings on that purchase amount to nearly \$5,000.

In addition, the group has completed its light bulb sale with a net earning of \$8,000. Fundraisers and cash contributions now amount to over \$30,000 and, together with the donations of time and materials from area contractors and suppliers, the committee decided it was time to get on with the project.

Construction is expected to begin in the last week of June or the first week of July.

The lighting fund drive began in November when committee co-chairman, Eric Reickel, appeared before the school board with a request to undertake a community fund raising project to replace the lights at the high school football field. The old lights he said were so decrepit as to be almost worthless and, if not replaced, would mean the end to nighttime football, band and other activities at the school.

Ironically, having soared to the brink of a state championship on timely hitting and sure defense, the Wolves left those two

elements of their game at home last Tuesday.

Teare said after the game that she sensed her squad was tense in front of their biggest crowd of the season in the match held at Independence Township's Clintonwood Park.

Still the Wolves managed to hold hard hitting Eastern in check most of the way. And where Clarkston really fell short was at the plate, as the team which had scored forty runs in four prior district and regional games, could manage only one against a near side arm southpaw from Lansing.

Teare said she felt her team had faced several pitchers in the last few weeks that

were equal or superior to last Tuesday's.

Unfortunately, that feeling was not reflected in the final score. Clarkston finished the season at 19-9, advancing as far towards a State championship as any CHS team since Tim McCormick's basketball Wolves of a year and a half ago.
