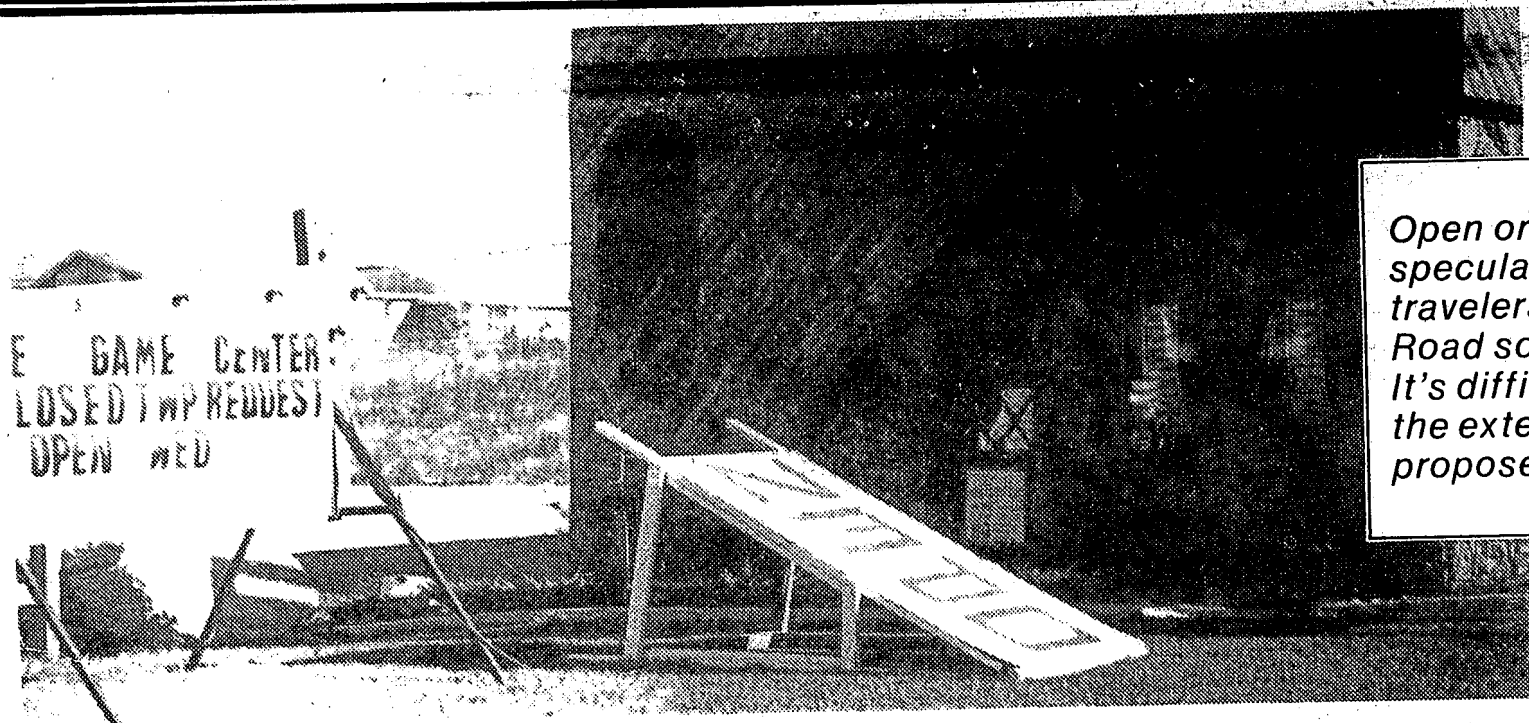

Video Arcades: Progress or Potential Threat?

Do video arcades constitute a potential threat to Clarkston or are they a legitimate business venture?

Are they a "hang out" for drug pushers and users bringing an undesirable element to the community or are they patronized by true connoisseurs of the art (?) of electronic games?

Are they a source of improved tax base for the township or will the cost of patrolling and supervising more than offset the increased revenue?

These questions are at the heart of the issues in the controversy surrounding the establishment of a proposed video game room to be located at 5800 Ortonville Road, in Independence Township.

Following an unsuccessful attempt to get permission to open his game room in the lower level of the Max Brook building at 29 South Main Street in Clarkston, Robert Warrington set his sites on this location about a mile south of the village.

However, upon opening Tuesday, Novem-

ber 3rd, Warrington, after learning that a court injunction was in process, voluntarily closed his doors only three days later on Friday, November 6th. Independence Township had appeared before Oakland County Circuit Court Judge, Francis X. O'Brien to request a restraining order that would have temporarily closed the business doors until the court could make a decision in the case.

The township's major protest to the arcade is that it was opened without approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals and that it violates township zoning ordinances.

Warrington is challenging the fact that zoning ordinances require that arcades be operated only in an enclosed mall, of which Independence Township has none.

In an attempt to reach a verdict, both parties appeared in Judge O'Brien's courtroom Tuesday, November 10th to present their cases. Further testimony will be offered by Warrington and township officials when they square off once again in a continuation of the hearing sometime this week.

Warrington says, "I'm not trying to hassle

them (Independence Township). I just want to proceed with opening a business that I'm entitled to." He adds that their actions have shown them to be biased in all areas.

Warrington says he'll conform to the "un-constitutional" temporary closing order, although, will continue his controversial quest to bring "Missile Command" and "Pac-Man", among other games to Independence Township.

The proposed game room is located in a building adjacent to the Clarkston True Value Hardware. Both buildings are owned by Warrington's brother Louis and up until late last month the intended arcade was leased to Rod Beckett who operated a beauty salon, "Rod's House of Style".

"I opened the Game Room not independently but as a secondary business to the hardware store and have not violated any zoning ordinances. There are at least a dozen other businesses within the township that have video game rooms but were not

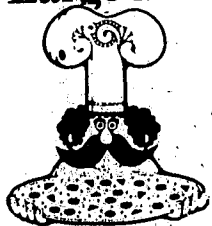

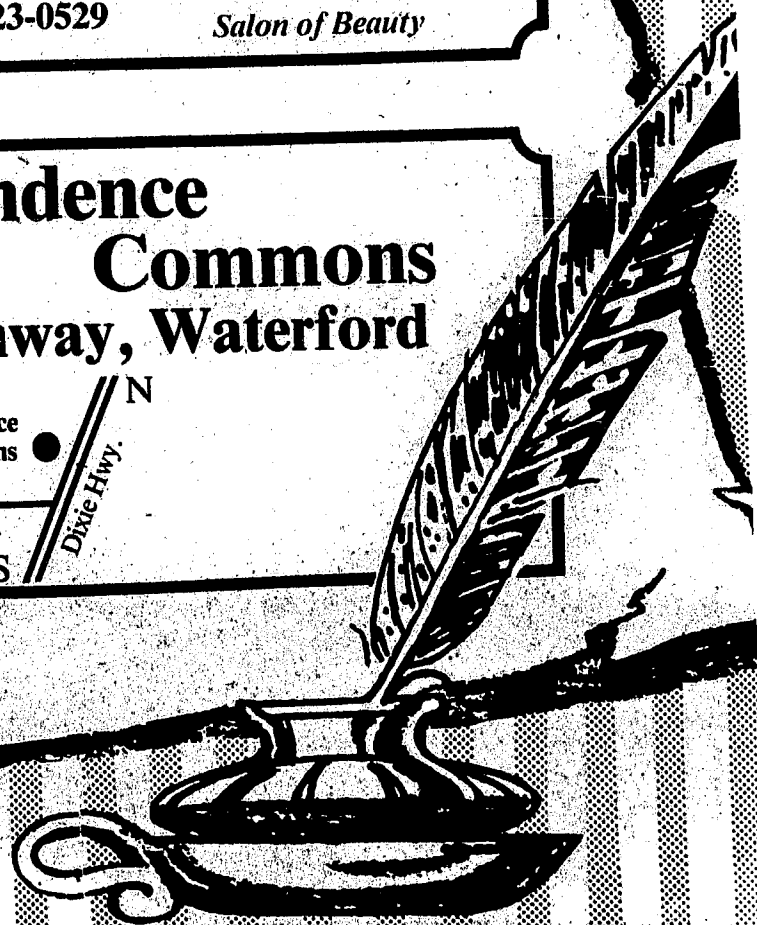

required to have township approval," said Warrington. Among them are, Deer Lake Racquet Club, Howes Lanes, Little Ceasars and Food Town.

Independence Township Attorney Richard Campbell argues that the other businesses that do have video games are recreational. The games have been allowed because they are related to the business in operation, he says.

Warrington asks, "Why does selling pizzas or groceries have more in relation to video games than my own selling of nuts and bolts?"

Other items of controversy upon which Judge O'Brien will base his decision will be:

- The township's argument that a new door was installed between the adjoining structures without acquiring a building permit, to which Warrington replies, "Yes, there was a new door installed, however, the opening has been there since the building's existence. A permit is not required to install simply a new door."

- Township Building Director, Kenneth Delbridge's contention that there was also no electrical permit issued for the game room's wiring, and Warrington's insistence that there has been no additional wiring installed in the building.

- To the township's claim that the business has no interior "Exit" signs, Warrington answers that the "Exit" signs are on order, but "why do they just now require these signs when the building has been in existence for twenty years?"

Inside Warrington's Game Room a sign reads; "No smoking, drinking or loitering". These rules, he says, have been and will be strictly enforced. "The three days I was open, I had only one complaint about the rules and that was from a middle-aged woman... not

from a teenager like the township would like everyone to believe."

"I think this is a good business to be in -- there's nothing wrong with it. My game room will be well-managed and cause no problems for any business or individual in the area," he concluded.

Attorney, Richard Campbell says, the township's argument is not so much that the arcade will not be operated properly but rather that "it is not in keeping with the terms of the zoning ordinance in Independence Township."

"People keep asking, 'What harm will it do to have an arcade?' You can answer that with, what harm does it do to drive down Dixie Highway at 80 miles per hour? It may not cause any harm but it's still breaking the law," he explained.

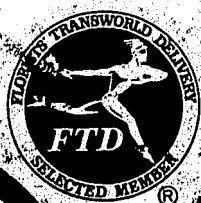

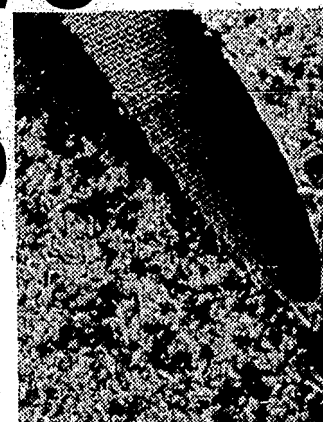

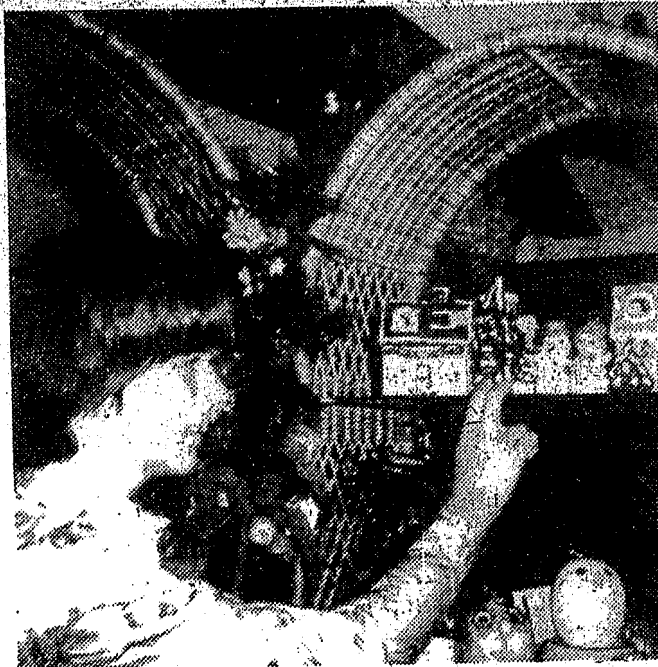
Hay Fever at OU

SUGAR AND PLAQUE STRIKE BACK

Q. Can some types of food cause decay?

A. Sugar contained in some foods is a primary cause of tooth decay, but the combination of sugar and plaque is deadly. Plaque plus sugar equals acid which eats away at tooth enamel. The first twenty minutes after eating sugary food is when the greatest damage occurs, and the longer the sugar remains in the mouth the more likely decay. Some of the worst offenders are candy, cookies, ice cream, jams, and soft drinks. Good substitutes are, cheese, nuts, sunflower seeds, and fruit juices.

SHOULD TEACHERS TALK ABOUT DEATH?

Once children enter kindergarten, they spend as much time learning from their teacher as they do learning from their parents. Teachers play a large part in shaping their pupils' attitudes toward death and toward many other subjects.

Children often are anxious about death. If a teacher refuses to discuss it, the taboo is reinforced. If, on the other hand, the teacher makes unrealistic explanations of death, studies have shown that children can become even more anxious. School Board Adopts Amended Budget, Target Goals for 1981-82 School Year

The Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education adopted an amended 1981-82 operating budget at its November meeting, the result of the stipulations of the Uniform Budgeting Act which took effect this year. Governmental bodies are now required by law to make adjustments in the amount of money spent or received if there are major changes.

The original budget, for K-12 education

plus the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center as approved in June, was \$15,098,290. The amended total is \$15,205,885. Major changes occurred in loss of pupils and gains in interest rates in the anticipated revenue column with an overall loss of nearly \$18,000. Adjusted expenditures, on the other hand, are up about \$100,000 with the most significant amount found in employee benefits. Insurance costs this year are up some 40 percent.

Business manager Stan Darling said later that nearly \$200,000 was lost in state aid when the fourth Friday count set the enrollment at 93 pupils fewer than anticipated. The state contribution this year per student is \$1938.28, including the three new mills approved by the voters in June. Still to come is an additional anticipated executive order cut in December amounting to 3/16 of one percent which may sound insignificant but translates into \$23,132 lost to the district.

This year's state aid formula is \$50.55 x 31.2221 mills plus \$360 to achieve the total money allotted per pupil in the district. The millage reflects the Headlee rollback; without it the district's multiplier would have been 33.33. Every pupil in every school district receiving state aid, the so-called "in formula" districts, is guaranteed \$360 no matter what millage is levied.

In other board action, members voted to adopt a series of target goals for the present school year. These goals will be studied by committees made up of administrators and/or board members with reports due either in June or one year from now.

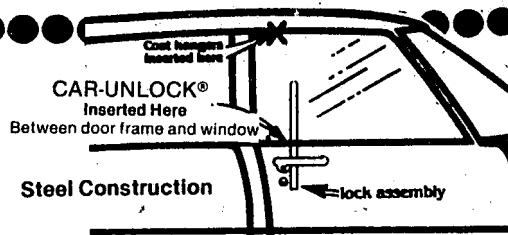
First on the list is a goal to study and develop long range recommendations to aid

in planning for the future of the school district. Included under that heading is fiscal planning, looking at expenditures, where they are now, where they will be given what the district knows at this time.

For example, projections can be made on the future cost of natural gas. Estimates are also possible for such things as text books, fringe benefits for employees, the state equalized valuation, and the Headlee rollback. Revenue, on the other hand, is the most difficult to predict. But, according to Superintendent Milford Mason, similar projections made five years ago proved to be remarkably accurate.

Second on the list is enrollment projections. Mason felt the present decline was likely to continue through 1990 but the possibility remained that an upswing in the economy could increase the "in migration" enough to offset the declining birth rate.

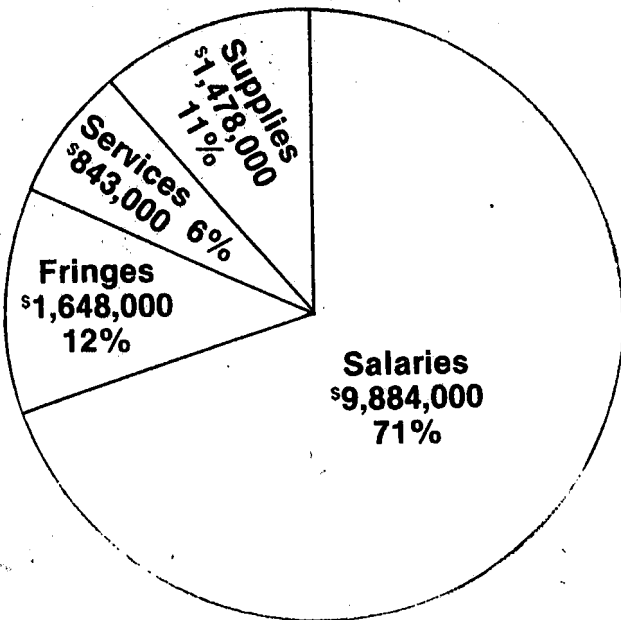

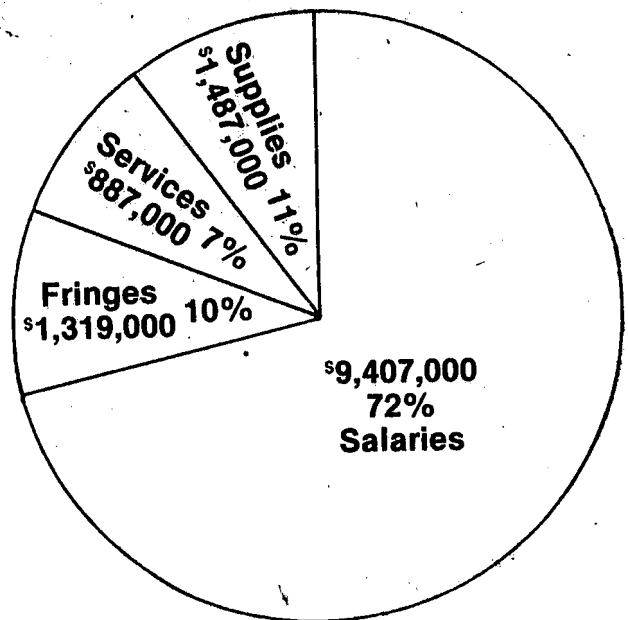

demographics have been worked out. A determination of how to use the schools must be made and which buildings, if any, might have to be closed. Should the economic situation become extreme, Mason said, changes may even have to be made in grade organization in the district.

The fourth item under long-range studies is regional services. What programs can be shared with other districts to reduce costs? This year the Clarkston district is sharing a food service program with the Lake Orion schools. Other possibilities include transportation and unique class offerings primarily at the advanced level.

A second goal is to set up a committee to study a comprehensive communications plan for the district. Mason said new systems were being proposed by Michigan educator, the committee would investigate them. He didn't know which direction they would take but said the district needed a plan it could function with. It may even be a

"market approach," selling the schools as a product much like any other product.

Goal three is to develop a systematic plan to interpret and implement effective education. Mason said this translated as "humanistic" education as opposed to cognitive education, the learning process.

The final goal is to design and implement a coordinated program for the use of microcomputers in grades K-12. Presently there are 27 such computers in the school system. Mason said he wants an orderly approach to their use, they should be the means to a good education and not the focus. Most of the computers in use are in the secondary level although there are some in the elementaries. He wants an orderly transition in the usage of this new technology in education.

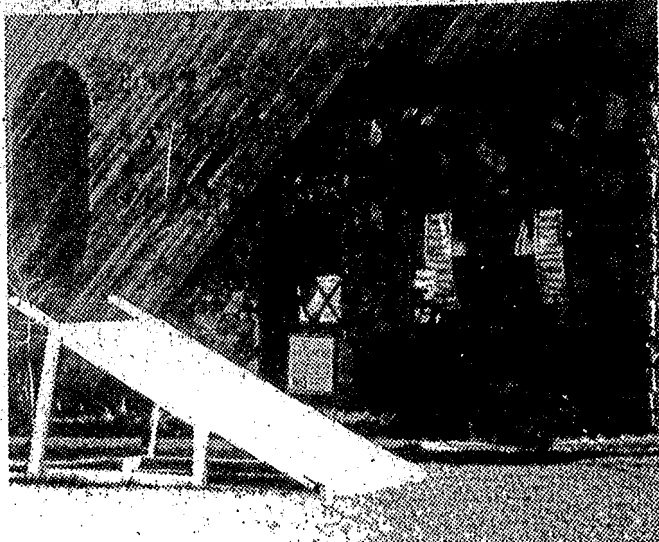

Is It Really Necessary to Totally Ban Video Arcades?



The video game craze has finally made its way to the Clarkston area, much to the chagrin of "city fathers" who would like to see their community remain a bastion of sanctity.

The craze is lead by Robert Warrington, a pleasant, unassuming fellow, who has tried to set up an arcade in downtown Clarkston and failed; and now has had his latest location shut down by a judge until he and Independence Township settle things in court.

Some of the worst fears of our "city fathers" -- drugs, drinking, loitering, noise, etc. -- could materialize if the arcade wasn't operated in a responsible manner. It's happened elsewhere.

And no one can argue with our township and village officials on the principle that his area is special, and undesirable businesses ought to be kept further than a stone's throw away.

But, on the other hand, we have a responsibility to the youth of this community. A responsibility that consistently seems to be ignored. Over the years, we've heard time and again, our youth bemoan the lack of entertainment possibilities close by. An arcade, for the most part, would be patronized by the younger generation.

By banning arcades, and both the Independence Township and Village of Clarkston ordinances, virtually do just that, we will not succeed in shielding our young people from the decadence we wish them to avoid. One only has to walk through the Village Park one hot summer's night to find those unavoidable vices.

Then too, arcades are a dime a dozen. Go 10 miles in most any direction, and chances are you will have passed an arcade. It would make more sense to locate an arcade close to home where our youth could have the benefits of local supervision.

A video game arcade, properly managed and properly supervised would not be a "black eye" on this community. It could in fact be an entertainment center where both young and old congregate to have good clean fun.

The key, however, is proper management and supervision. Our township and village officials must be selective. On the other hand, they can't say "no" to everybody. Arcades, as we see it, are here to stay. It would behoove our officials to recognize that fact and try to arrange our ordinances so that proper control is necessary; but not such that it would be impossible for anyone to operate an arcade here.

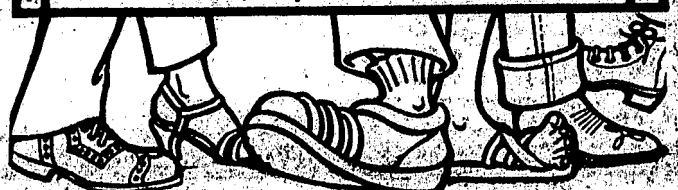

FRIEND OF THE COURT

This is one of a series of articles by Roland C. Fancher, Assistant Friend of the Court for Oakland County, concerning the operations of that office. If you have questions regarding the functions of the Friend of the Court, address them to Mr. Fancher in care of this publication. Questions of general interest will be answered in later articles. Questions concerning individual cases should be submitted directly to the Oakland County Friend of the Court.

As indicated in the previous articles in this series, the Oakland County Friend of the Court is responsible for about 41,000 cases and about 50 million dollars annually in child support payments. This staggering volume presents many problems. One serious problem is communication between individual parties and that staff attorney assigned to that particular case.

Learning how to communicate with the Oakland County Friend of the Court will greatly relieve the frustration you experience in dealing with the office. Your understanding of the ways of contacting the staff attorney will also assist the attorney in determining what course of action is in the best interests of the minor children.

The best method of contacting the staff attorney or any other staff member is by mail. When writing to the Friend of the Court, include your name, address, and case number. Since cases are filed by the father's name, be sure to identify the male party, particularly when different surnames are involved. Providing a phone number where you can be reached during business hours is also helpful. Please be patient in waiting for a reply. The volume of mail received is overwhelming. The attorney or staff member involved will reply, or take other action as is necessary.

Telephone communications are discouraged for purposes other than setting up appointments. The staff member answering your call has no means of verifying that you are who you claim to be, and will not give out privileged information or discuss your case. Confidentiality rules over convenience.

In addition, a telephone call does not become a permanent part of your file. It is

not available for later reference. A written letter or statement is always available to refresh a memory or clarify an issue at a later date.

For these reasons, staff attorneys generally will not discuss cases with parties who call to speak with them. In addition to the reasons above, the attorney's time is extremely limited. Each staff attorney handles about 2,900 cases and in most instances is simply unavailable when you call. If you wish to discuss your case with the attorney, make an appointment. This will enable the attorney to specifically reserve a time for your individual case and problem.

Whoopee Bowl Parking Area to get Black-Top, Possibly Guard Rails

Coming around the corner on Dixie Highway just south of Davisburg Road has long been potentially dangerous as cars haphazardly pull in and out of the Whoopee Bowl parking lot. This will soon change as the Springfield Township Board at Wednesday night's board meeting approved a new site plan for the Whoopee Bowl parking area, subject to variances from the Zoning Board of Appeals.

The site plan, as revised October 21, 1981, includes three strategically located driveways and a black-topped parking area. A mutual request will be sent to the Road Commission for the installation of guard rails in front of the Whoopee Bowl. The guard rails will prevent traffic from veering out onto Dixie Highway at random.

Several revised site plans were drawn up and discussed at length at the board meeting.

The board also passed a resolution offering service and support to the Village of Holly as they go ahead with plans to build senior citizen housing. Even though the senior citizen housing facility would be located in Holly, it would be of value and service to surrounding communities, a concern of Springfield Township for some time. The Township is supporting Holly in spirit now with the option for financial support at a later date.

Application for an adult foster care home was received at the meeting. The Macomb-Oakland Regional Center will hold an informational meeting at the home, located on Big Lake Road, to allow the neighbors to meet the applicant, her family, and the foster

care resident. The township will notify all property owners within 1500 feet of the home through the newspaper.

At the next board meeting on December 9 a public hearing will be held to discuss the establishment of a commercial redevelopment district for the Davisburg area. The district status would allow individual commercial property owners to apply for real estate tax credits for improvements thus providing incentives for sprucing up downtown Davisburg.

Property taxes not paid by the February 14 deadline usually have a 4 percent penalty added to the tax. The board agreed to waive the penalty for senior citizens who have applied for Homestead Property Tax Credit but have not received it by February 14th.

public hearing, to amend ordinances that will essentially make it impossible to open a game room in the business district.

Provided this new zoning ordinance amendment receives little resistance in a public hearing to be held in the near future, it will prohibit video arcades from being located within 500 feet of a residence or a business establishment that serves alcoholic beverages.

"Basically," said Gary Symons, Clarkston Village Council Trustee, "the amendment will not allow an arcade to be operated in the business district."

Not subject to public hearing though are two additional amendments concerning

mechanical devices that the council officials have already adopted, in case an applicant should receive a Zoning Board of Appeals variance to open a game room establishment.

There are: first, operating license fees for video arcades are to be raised to \$1000 to maintain 25 games, double the former \$500 fee. Also, \$500 for each additional 25 games will be required, and second, anyone operating an arcade will have to provide security guards during business hours. This last amendment, according to Symons, is not a mandatory requirement but rather implemented at the council's discretion should the situation warrant it.
