She's a Modern Day Annie Oakley

Did you know the quaint little town of Davisburg is blessed with its own modern day version of Annie Oakley?

You remember her...the greatest woman rifle shot the world had ever produced during the 1890's. Associated with Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show at the turn of the century, Annie Oakley was the sensation of America and Europe because of her seeming inability to miss any known shot with a rifle.

Ila Hill, Clinic Manager for the offices of Dr. Good in Davisburg for the past nine years, is a marksman in her own right.

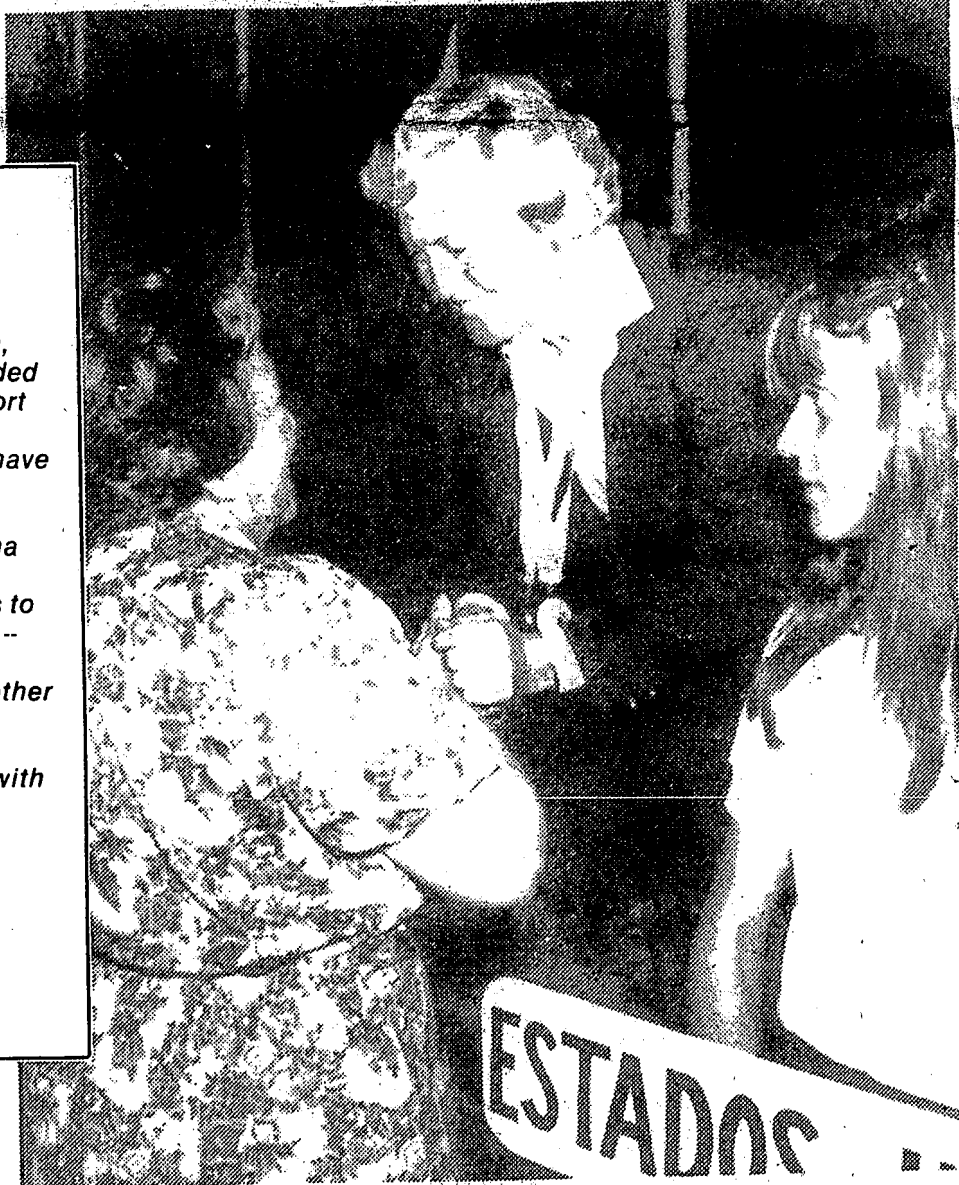
This sharpshooter has a list of accomplishments behind her that would put Annie Oakley to shame. Among them are:

- Winner of over 450 open and women's titles
 - Named to every Sports Afield All-American Women's first team since 1974 in American Skeet
 - Named to every Sports Afield All-American International Women's team since 1975.
 - Member of every United States International Shooting Team since 1973
 - While competing for a position on the United States International Women's Team, she won 6 Gold Metals and 3 Silver Medals in 9 attempts
 - First U.S. Woman to win an International Skeet Medal in World Competition
 - Gold Medalist at the Championship of the Americas, 1977, Mexico City
 - Silver Medalist at the World Championships, 1977, Antibes, France
 - 4-time Gold Medalist, Benito Juarez Championships, Mexico City
 - Named to the Michigan All-State Team every year since 1974
 - Holds the Ladies National Record for "High Over All" of 500 targets, with a score of 495/500
 - Holds the Ladies National International Record, with a score of 191/200
 - Third U.S. Woman ever to break 100/100 in the 410 guage, 1977.
- Ms. Hill's shooting career began as a result of her search to discover a pastime

Expert marksman, Ila Hill, has been awarded more medals in the sport of skeetshooting than Mark Spitz could ever have dreamed about.

Ms. Hill recently returned from Argentina where she picked off enough hurling targets to take two silver medals -- one for her individual performance and the other as part of the U.S. Women's Team.

That's her adorned with silver and receiving compliments on her superb performance.



that would help to vent tension brought on by holding down two jobs and going to nursing school in the evenings.

"One day," she explains, "I drove out to the Detroit Gun Club and simply tried it out. It was the first time I had ever shot a gun...period. And I did fairly well."

On that occasion, by coincidence, there were two former shooting champions taking

in some practice time. She proceeded to shoot with them and it was these two men who encouraged her to continue with it.

And that she did.

clinic, Ila admitted, "It brought a lot of discouragement at first, but after a considerable amount of time, training, and effort, I started to get lucky and win in competition."

She refers to it as luck -- most would call it skill.

Depending upon the type of competitive skeet shooting, American or International, each have their own set of regulations.

Ila simplifies these rules. "In my opinion, American skeet shooting, which is extremely popular in this country, is easier. The targets travel at a speed of 55 to 65 MPH and the gun can be held up and ready."

"International rules are much more demanding. The targets travel at approximately 120 SMP and the gun must be resting on your hip when you call for the target." Furthermore, when the sharpshooter does give the 'Pull' signal there may be up to a 3-second delay. That delay, she relates, can be a competitor's ruin. "It gives you just enough time to let your concentration wander."

Ms. Hill participated exclusively in

American skeet shooting for three or four years prior to taking on the more demanding International competition.

"I was competing in an American Championship in New York and a gentleman there, after seeing me shoot, persuaded me to try it out. I did and later he became my coach. I used to travel many weekends to Rochester, New York to train."

She returned just several weeks ago from Argentina where she participated in yet another shooting match. This time to walk away with a silver medal for her individual performance and also an additional silver medal for her participation with the U.S. Women's Team.

While she was away, on October 27, Ila was inducted into the Michigan Amateur Sports Hall of Fame. The plaque she was presented with, proudly rests on her desk at the Davisburg Medical Clinic.

The traveling this sport requires when you're as proficient as Ila Hill, is frequent and usually over long periods of time. Referring to Dr. Good, she said, "I'm for-

tunate enough to have a boss who understands my involvement with the sport." Dr. Good, incidentally, is also a competitive marksman in the American class.

Shooting is a sport I highly recommend to anyone, said Ms. Hill. Like everything it has risen in cost, yet, it can supply a common interest within a family, whether it's for purposes of recreation or competition.

Another advantage is the fact that skeet shooting teaches respect for the weapon. Ila, in International competition employs the use of a Remington 3200-12 gauge shotgun, while in the American class utilizes an interchangeable 4-barrel set Kreighoff.

At this time, how much more competitive shooting Ms. Hill plans to do is still up in the air, although she added smiling brightly, "I know it will always be a form of recreation for me."

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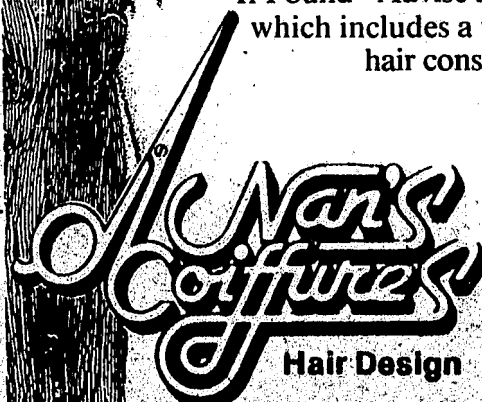
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Family Planning Offered

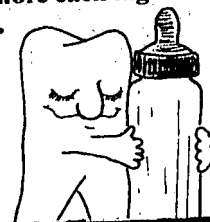
Dental Dialogue

BAN BEDTIME BOTTLE

Q. My baby won't go to sleep without a bedtime bottle of juice. Can this harm his teeth?

A. When your child falls asleep at night his saliva production decreases and along with it his ability to wash sugars from his mouth. This allows the liquid from the bottle to pool around the teeth, and the longer the liquid remains the greater the chance for decay. The result can be "nursing bottle mouth". The teeth can literally decay to the gums, become impossible to fill, and may have to be removed. Try diluting the juice with water, adding more each night until your child accepts plain water.

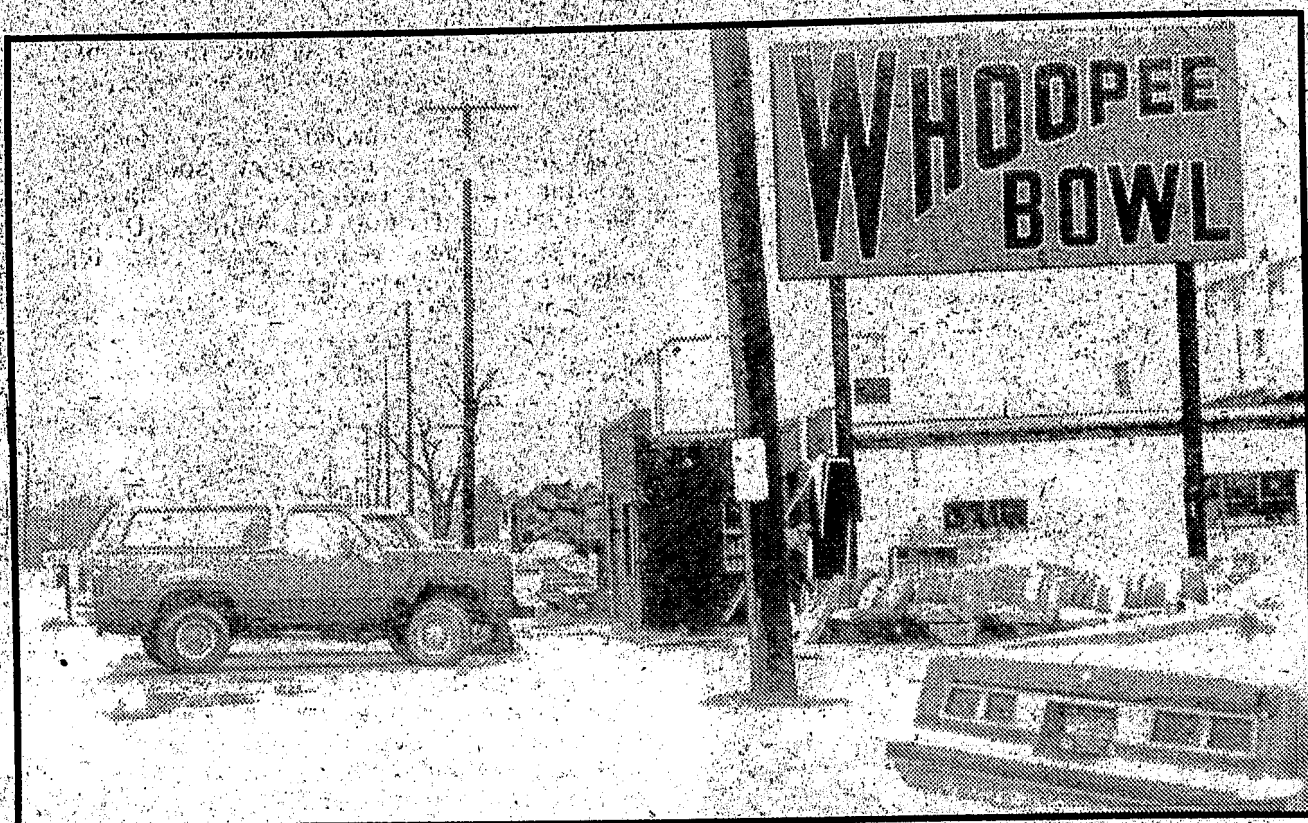


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Improvements on Tap for Whoopee Bowl



Building permits are being sought, site plan approvals negotiated and improvements are soon to be underway at the Whoopee Bowl -- THE landmark along the Dixie corridor.

It started out as a small block bait shop and has grown into the largest resale shop in the area. Booming business at Springfield Township's Whoopee Bowl now demands more expansion.

Building permits are being sought, site plans approvals negotiated and improvements will be underway.

Plans include enclosing and covering the backyard and building a large warehouse pole barn located at the north end of the property. Expansion will increase storage space and showroom space; always a problem at the Whoopee Bowl as people bring items for resale to them daily.

Owners Marguerite Wilder and Donna Marlowe and manager Don Hopson are anxious for the buildings to be started and

for improvements to be made. One of the biggest jobs is improving the parking lot. The site plan for a new parking lot would increase parking spaces to seventy-one and limit driveways to three. The Board of Appeals has waived plans for blacktopping the parking area for two years because of possible drainage problems.

"The property we're dealing with is very shallow," Hopson said. The parcel is about twenty acres but only about two of those acres are usable. The shallow lot has always been a problem for parking, making pulling in and out of the Whoopee Bowl a possibly hazardous situation. In the thirty-two years that business has been open only three traffic accidents have occurred in front of the Whoopee Bowl, and none of those were fatal. Proposed improvements on the parking lot

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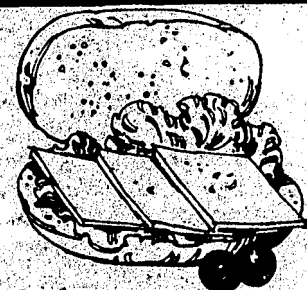

will improve driving conditions and convenience for the customers.

"We want the parking lot to be safe," said Mrs. Marlowe.

The site plan proposal must now be approved by Oakland County Road Commission.

To date, exterior improvements to the Bowl include closing the old entrance and putting in two new doors to ease up congestion inside the store. The entrance of the building has been paneled. Hopson plans to have the paneling extended around the sides of the building and to paint the buildings. All merchandise will be kept in the warehouse or in the showroom; merchandise will not be kept setting out in front of the buildings. The trailers on the north end of the

property will be removed to make room for the new building.

Inside, showcases and shelves have been rearranged to facilitate shopping.

Hopson expects to save money in the long run on all of the said improvements. "A lot of our merchandise is lost due to weather damage." Increased storage space would eliminate that problem.

Hopson has been working at the Whoopee Bowl for 30 years. He expects soon to be working with Orval Marlowe, son-in-law to Mrs. Wilder and wife to Mrs. Marlowe. Up until the last few years Hopson ran the business with Dale Wilder.

All of the improvements being made are something Mr. Wilder wanted to do for many years. Because of health and finances he

was unable to do so. Wilder died last July and his wife, Marguerite and daughter Donna are seeing to it that the improvements are made. Mrs. Marlowe calls Hopson, "very, very capable" as manager and as executioner of improvements.

Decent workers' compensation rates must be established or this state is likely to never see the prosperous days it once enjoyed when the automobile industry was king.

Currently Michigan's rates are the sixth highest of all states in the nation, and the highest among industrial states. Michigan businesses pay \$3.60 per \$100 of payroll compared to \$1.69 for Ohio, \$1.42 for Pennsylvania, and \$.41 for Indiana.

Thus you can see the economics to moving elsewhere. Because of workers' comp rates, Michigan has lost literally hundreds of businesses to more favorable business climates.

Our State Legislators have taken it upon themselves to ignore these dire realities, knowing full well that the UAW and a host of other powerful unions would raise their wrath if our workers' compensation laws were tampered with.

But lately, with the economic climate seemingly worse than it has ever been, Governor Milliken and others have decided to take another look at workers' comp. In fact, Milliken imposed a deadline on our Legislators to reform or else.

Well the Legislators haven't taken too kindly to the deadline. They've insisted they'd like to take a look, but in their own good time. They would also like to see what effect, if any, the small changes scheduled for this January, will have on the overall program.

We tend to agree with the Governor when he insists Michigan's business climate is unlikely to change until significant measures are taken to reform workers' comp.

As it stands right now, some people can make more collecting workers' comp than others can working fulltime. That's crazy. So is the fact that some attorneys use "runners" to encourage employees to file claims in many of our major plants.

It's time our Legislators gave the businessman a break. So often in our democratically controlled Legislature the unions' interest wins out. But in this case a win for the union now, might be a great blow to the workers it represents later, when their company decides to shut down and move to Ohio where business costs are more reasonable.

FRIEND OF THE COURT

Visitation is a Complicated Problem

This is one of a series of articles by Roland C. Fancher, assistant Friend of the Court for Oakland County, concerning the operations of that office. If you have questions regarding the functions of the Friend of the Court, address them to Mr. Fancher in care of this publication. Questions of general interest will be answered in later articles. Questions regarding individual cases should be submitted directly to the Office of the Friend of the Court.

Enforcement of visitation is a complicated problem. Although the Friend of the Court has been accused of neglecting the visitation orders of the Court, the office has become increasingly aware of the need to assist the non-custodial parent in this regard.

Child support orders are specific, e.g., \$25.00 per week per child. While the Court does order specific rights of visitation in some situations, most visitation orders are vague, e.g., "Reasonable rights of visitation." This type of order gives the parties a great deal of flexibility to make arrangements to their mutual convenience, but it is also more difficult to interpret.

Individual cases often require different visitation arrangements. No guidelines as to what is "reasonable" will work in every case. The work schedules of the parents and distance between their homes are examples of factors which must be considered. A "standard" interpretation of "reasonable rights of visitation" is either Saturday or Sunday away from the home of the custodial parent, plus one weekend per month (Friday night to Sunday) or alternating weekends, two weeks of summer vacation, and alternate holidays. In arranging visitation, the parties should discuss the issue to determine if agreement can be reached. Remember, visitation is for the benefit of the child(ren). Any personal ill feelings between parties must be put aside.

If agreement cannot be reached, contact the Friend of the Court Investigator assigned to your case. The investigator will contact

the other parent and attempt to resolve the problem. If agreement still cannot be reached, or if the custodial parent refuses to cooperate, the investigator can bring the matter to the attention of the staff attorney. The attorney will review the case and take appropriate action. This may consist of a conference between the parties or the scheduling of a court hearing where the custodial parent is required to explain to the Judge why the Court's visitation order is not being followed.

If you are being refused visitation, contact your attorney and/or the Friend of the Court for assistance. It is the proper place to direct your questions and concerns. Do not stop paying support. Support and visitation are separate issues. Your complaints regarding visitation will not be resolved if they are only raised when you are brought before the Court for nonpayment of support. Your failure to take positive action to secure your visitation rights may make your complaints appear insincere and will not excuse failure to comply with the support order. It will only aggravate an already difficult situation.

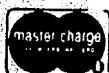

Dear Editor:

In late October, Consumers Power Company began a letters to the editor campaign which can only be described as a major act of deception. Those letters, which you may have seen, appear to be written by local residents who happen to be Consumers Power employees. Actually they were written by Consumers Power. In fact, identical letters have appeared in at least 36 newspapers, all leaving the impression that a local resident was dissatisfied with my position regarding construction of the Midland nuclear electric generating plant and attacking me for my legal efforts to prevent the continued sale of securities to finance the construction of that plant.

The Consumers Power letter argues that construction of the Midland plant creates jobs in Michigan; that it results in additional money being spent in the state; and that any and every construction project is good for the state's economy.

If one followed Consumers Power's "reasoning" to its logical conclusion, the solution to Michigan's economic and unemployment problems become simple -- state government, like Michigan's utilities, should embark on a multi-billion dollar construction program; and never mind that taxpayers or ratepayers who cannot afford it will ultimately have to pay for it, and never mind that taxes and rates will be pushed up so high that no business would want to locate or expand in Michigan.

The basic facts concerning Consumer Power's Midland nuclear plant construction program are as follows:

1. Consumers Power originally estimated that the Midland plant would be completed in 1974 at a cost of \$256 million. Consumers Power now estimates that the plant will be completed in 1983 at a cost of \$3.1 billion, nine years late and 12 times the original cost estimate.

2. If there are no further cost escalations, power from the Midland plant will cost 15 cents per kilowatt hour (kwh) delivered to customers, 2½ times as much as the present cost of electricity.

3. The Midland plant will add about \$600 million per year to Consumer Power's fixed costs, thereby increasing the electric rates

of Consumers' one million customers by an average of about \$600 per customer per year.

4. Consumers Power's rates to industrial customers are already 31 percent above the average of all Midwestern investor-owned utilities. In August, the manager of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber plant in Jackson, where Consumers Power is headquartered, publicly stated that Consumers Power's electric rates were 28 percent high than the average paid by the other seven Goodyear plants throughout the United States, and that if these costs, and others, could not be reduced, the Jackson plant might have to close at a loss of 1500 jobs.

5. Consumers Power already has one large nuclear generating plant, the Palisades plant at South Haven. This plant has the worst operating record of any nuclear generating plant in the United States, except the Three-Mile Island plants in Pennsylvania that experienced the celebrated accident. The Palisades plant has operated less than 40 percent of the time during its nine-year life. In November, 1979, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) levied a fine of \$450,000 upon Consumers for safety violations at the Palisades plant, the highest such fine in U.S. history. Thus, Consumers Power has demonstrated that it is incapable of constructing and operating a nuclear generating plant in a safe and satisfactory manner.

During the past three years, scores of nuclear generating plant construction projects have been cancelled or indefinitely deferred throughout the United States, due to runaway costs and lack of need for the plants.

In conclusion, the letter-writing campaign of Consumers Power Company makes it clear that the utility's management views the Midland nuclear construction project as a "make work" program, with its ratepayers playing Santa Claus by providing the billions of dollars necessary to carry it on. Unfortunately, Santa Claus is really you and me and the other citizens and businesses in Consumers Power's territory.

Davisburg of Old Highlighted at Crafts Fest

On Saturday, December 5, the First Annual Davisburg Christmas Craft Fest will be held at the Springfield-Oaks Activities Center.

Hosted by the Davisburg Scotties, a branch of the MSU extension service, the Craft Fest is designed to bring back the flavor of the 19th-century to the mundane modernity of Christmas.

Beginning at 9 a.m. the Scotties will be serving breakfast, and refreshments and meals will be available from start to finish. Live musical programs will be featured hourly. Drawings for door prizes are scheduled to the hour.

The Craft Fest has also led to the creation of Residents' Guide to Springfield Township. The 32-page booklet will be available at a booth manned by township board members.

The Fest starts at 10 a.m. and runs through 5 p.m. The Springfield-Oaks Activities Center is located at 12451 Andersonville Road, one mile South of Davisburg.

"We're watching the plants," Craft said. "We'll wait and see."

After talking to a 70-year-old South Dakota man who was relieved from his arthritic pain two weeks after taking the water, Thomas decided to take the water over to one of his neighbors who suffered from arthritis to try.

Thomas made it clear that the water has not been approved for internal consumption by the FDS. However, the water has been tested by Ames, McCann and Yamasaki laboratories and has been found to contain no harmful effects. It was classified as non-

SCAMP Program Raises \$56,000 This Year

The annual meeting of the North Oakland SCAMP Funding Corporation was held recently at Addison Oaks County Park combining a champagne reception, luncheon, puppet presentation, and slides of the 1981 camping season. SCAMP is the summer camping program for handicapped children.

This year for the first time the entire program was financed by fundraising and tuition. There were no state or federal funds or local grants used because there were none available, according to program director Jim Butzine. He expects this trend to continue for the next three to four years.

In round number the cost of the SCAMP program this year was \$56,000, \$42,000 was realized from the October Walkathon, the major fundraiser, and other smaller projects. The difference was made up through tuition paid by the participating SCAMPers.

This year the number of SCAMPers was just short of 200 coming mainly from the Clarkston-Waterford area; the minimum age limit is now two and a half. The staff numbered 100 including 35 volunteers. This year

also saw the largest group of physically impaired SCAMPers ever, Butzine said, and the demand for services is increasing each year.

Although the summer program is based at Sashabaw Junior High School, the kids also use the facilities at Independence Oaks for swimming and camping. SCAMP offers the opportunity for some children to simply play in the sand for the first time. For others, it's their first opportunity to sleep away from home, and outdoors, at that! Other activities include arts and crafts, sing-alongs, the Skatemobile from the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Department and the annual Rotary picnic.

The Funding Corporation is headed by president Lewis Wint with Eric Reickel as vice-president and Martha Wheeler as treasurer. Serving on the board of directors are Greg Seaman, Bob Brumback, Jack Junt, Bunny Newmarch, and Jan Seifert.

Because there are no supplementary funds anticipated for the next few years and the group will have to rely on fundraising to keep the seven-year-old program going, and ideas for fundraising or contributions will be gratefully accepted.

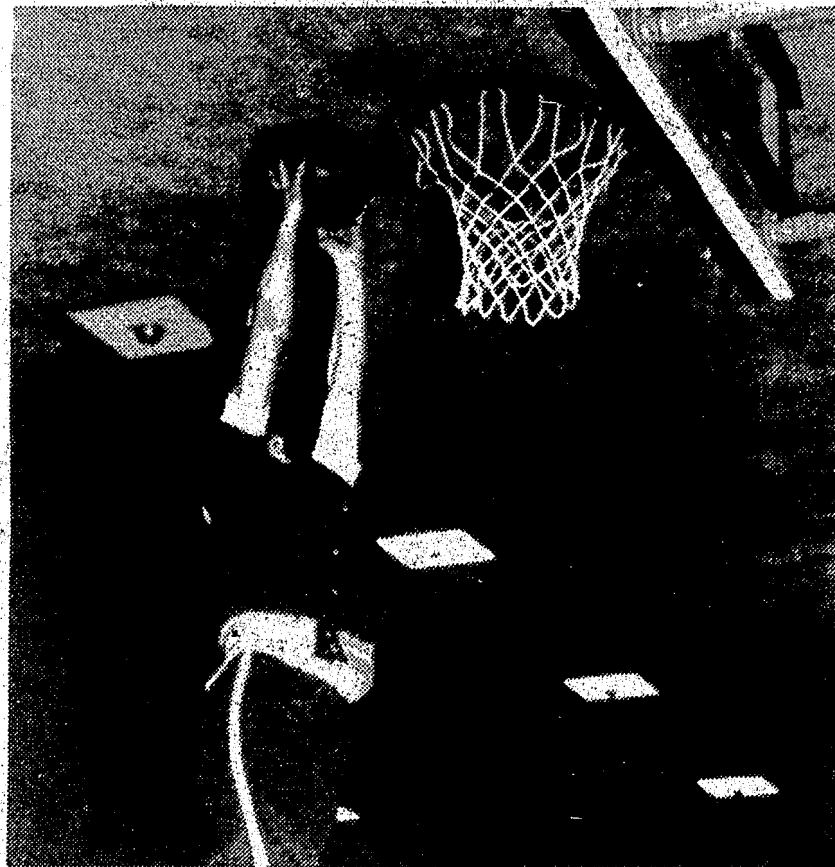
