














### Archbishop Szoka Dedicates New St. Daniels Church

Work went on down to the wire to have St. Daniels new church ready for last Sunday's Dedication Mass. Builders were waiting on wood for trim on the doors, registers had to be installed and the chandeliers connected. Parishioners were busy vacuuming the pews and dusting the pulpit. All the while, Father Charles Cushing actively oversaw the developments, confident the church would be ready for Saturday's mass.

Church construction began last year in October after dreams of a new church since 1978. The church, Father Cushing explained, "combines both the traditional and the contemporary converged into a functional building of beauty and dignity.

Above the 721-seat auditorium is a salvation history motiff; depicting biblical history in stained glass, from the sacrifice of Isaac by Abraham all the way around the auditorium to the infinity circle. Stained glass images of Joseph and Mary decorate each side of the altar.

The narthex is glassed off from the auditorium, cutting down the noise level inside the church and providing a nice point of social gathering after services.

Because the pews are cushioned Father Cushing expects to need to "raise a little caine to keep people awake in these pews."

Saturday's Mass consecrated the church to be used solely for liturgical rites. Arch Bishop Edmund B. Szoka performed the Mass.

"We have a fine spirit at this parish," Father Cushing said. In November for three Saturdays in a row, 75-100 parishioners volunteered their services to lay sod at the church-quite a turn out. The parishioners' enthusiasm for getting the final clean-up done by Saturday was impressive.

Rosemary Smith, Holcomb Road, and parishioner for 11 years, described her efforts as "very exciting. It's been a good experience working with everyone. It's been a real honor."

Oscar Chapaton, general contractor, looked pleased as things took shape. "We had an extreme winter last year and lost considerable time. We've had to put on extra men to have it completed by Saturday."

St. Daniels is the twenty-third Catholic Church Chapaton has built and as usual he will attend the Dedication Mass.

The mission built in 1964 has been used as a temporary church since 1969. As the congreation grew so did the need for a new church. The old building will still be used as a social hall for special dinners and bazaars and will provide catechism classrooms. St. Daniel's already has an active religious program coordinated by Sister John Marie and Mrs. Diana Trechette.

Sister John Marie stopped vacuuming long enough to say she was glad it's "shaping up







### NOTICE OF RIGHT TO REFERENDUM ON BECOMING A **CHARTER TOWNSHIP**

Official certification has been received from the Michigan Secretary of State indicating that the Township of Springfield has attained a population of 5,000 or more and the Township Board has the right to exercise one of three options concerning status as a charter Township under the provisions of Act 359, Public Acts of 1947, as amended:

1. Adopt by majority vote a resolution opposed to incorporation as a charter township.

2. Adopt by majority vote a resolution of intent to ap-

prove incorporation as a charter township. 3. Adopt by majority vote a resolution to the electorate at the next regular or special Township election the question of incorporation as a charter

In the event option 2 is adopted by the Township Board, the citizens of the Township have the right to file "Right to Referendum Petition." This petition must be filed within the 60 days which must lapse between passage of a resolution of intent to incorporate and final passage of the resolution to incorporate as a charter township.

The petition will follow, in general form the nominating petition form as prescribed in the Michigan Election Law, and in the heading will indicate "disagreement of intent to incorporate as a charter township." The petition must be signed by not less that ten percent (10%) of the registered voters of the Township based on the vote cast for all candidates for supervisor at the last election at which a supervisor was elec-

If the petition is successful, the question of incorporation will be placed on the ballot at the next general lownship or special lownship election. J. Calvin Wälters

Bob and I bowed our heads and closed our eyes when Toby surprised us by speaking. We looked up as he repeated clearly, with the widest, most beautiful grin, "Take off your hat!" (Bob still had his cap on after coming from the shop.)

We laughed with tears in our eyes as I then began to pray with a smiling sense of God's presence that He gave us all through this wonderful, dying man. Toby had said so eloquently, with those few words and that wonderful grin:

I'm still your Dad

This is really important

And there's always joy in God's presence Take off your hat -- we're on holy ground! And his clear, "Amen" reinforced the

prayer! That's the same as the message of Christmas, offered every day, and always, but with renewed power in the Christ, Immanuel, "God-is-with-us."

### GO ROUND

"Getting and spending, we lay waste our powers. Little we see in Nature that is ours." William Wordsworth

With prior planning, people who have retired from their lifelong job can avoid the bleak materialism suggested by Wordswor-

th's lines. But achieving that goal may mean a little less spending and a little more saving now for the retirement years ahead.

Statistics indicate that people are living longer and that the years after retirement can be full and rewarding.

One important factor in enjoying those years ahead is financial security, and for most it is not too soon to begin to look ahead to how that security can be created. Beginning in January, we will have a new opportunity to plan for our retirement in addition to our regular savings and Social Security.

What is this new opportunity? It is called an Individual Retirement Account or IRA. For many of us not covered by a qualified pension plan, IRA's have been our ticket to financial security. But effective January 1,

1982, government statistics indicate that approximately 48 million individuals will qualify for an IRA who previously did not meet the guidelines. The new guidelines are the result and are part of the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. Those consumers currently having an IRA will find the law providing them with even greater opportunities for retirement planning.

What do you need to know to take advantage of this new retirement planning opportunity?

First, remember that an IRA is a taxsheltered plan which will provide you with income once you retire. Since it is a taxsheltered plan, you do not have to pay taxes on the principal or interest accumulating in your account until you begin to make withdrawals.

Second, you qualify for an IRA if you have earned income. Because of changes in the regulatory laws governing IRA's, you may still open an IRA even if you are covered by a qualified pension plan.

Third, if both husband and wife work and earn income, an IRA can be set up for either party individually. Or, a working spouse can contribute to an IRA set up for a non-working spouse under an account frequently referred to as a "spousal" IRA.

Fourth, once you open an IRA, you have complete control over the account. And you determine how much it will grow. Deposits can be made periodically or in a lump sum. Although withdrawals can be made, there is a substantial interest penalty for early withdrawals prior to age 591/2 and the amount of the withdrawal is subject to tax penalties. The only exception to this rule is for someone who is permanently disabled. In this case, monies can be withdrawn without interest penalties.

Fifth, an IRA cannot be used as collateral for a loan or be garnisheed by a creditor during the time your contributions are being accumulated. To do so would eliminate the account's tax-free status.

Your IRA deposits are protected against loss up to \$100,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Sixth, you may deposit 100 percent of your earned income up to \$2,000 each year (\$2.250 for a spousal IRA) into an IRA. Deposits can be made according to your own time schedule, be it weekly, monthly, quarterly, or in one lump sum. In addition, you can continue to contribute to your IRA and still qualify for a tax deduction up until the date in which you file your income tax return. Depending on your tax bracket this can mean significant tax savings. And all of your earnings on the account are tax-exempt until the time of withdrawal.

Seventh, to allow greater investment flexibility, you are now able to transfer or shift your current investment to any one of several different kinds of high-yield savings plans. Therefore, if you are covered under a pension plan by your present employer and you decide to change jobs, you can withdraw those funds when you leave and place them into your own IRA. It is important to know that this "rollover" contribution must be deposited into an IRA within 60 days of the withdrawal to avoid penalities.

Eighth, withdrawals may begin after age 591/2 (unless you are disabled), but must be made no later than the close of the tax year in which you reach 701/2 years of age. If withdrawals are not made by this age, a 50 percent excise tax penalty will be imposed on the amount which does not meet the withdrawal requirements of minimum that year.

You do not have to be retired to begin withdrawing from your IRA. Withdrawals, just like deposits, can be made according to your own time schedule as long as you meet the minimum per-year withdrawal amount

When you do begin to make withdrawals, the total amount taken out must be considered additional income for that year, and is subject to income tax. The benefit, however, of waiting until you retire to begin making your withdrawals is that you taxable income should be lower than during your

working years. If you should pass away prior to making all of your withdrawals from your IRA, the amount remaining will go to your designated

# Media Presentation Highlights School Meeting

by Carol Balzarini

Clarkston Schools Board of Education members were brought up to date on the district's five year old elementary media program with a slide presentation prepared by media specialists Katherine Wlodarcik, Susan Kott and Linda Spannaus.

Since September, 1976, libraries in the district's six elementary schools have gone

from supply closet quarters in some cases, to full-fledged media centers, from one book and one class visit per week to daily individual visits with a different book per visit,

Greater use of these centers has resulted from a number of things. Audio visual equipment has been added which the students are taught to use and care for. Media aides have been added which keep the libraries operating full time. Records, puppets, and magazines have been added to the customary books. Students are taught library skills and assistance has been provided by parent and upper elementary student volunteers.

Computers, Wlodarcik reported, are currently in use at Bailey Lake Elementary and will be next year at Andersonville. The computer program was implemented with the assistance of Oakland Schools. Districtwide there are 27 computers, but the elementary ones have been purchased by the

schools' PTA/PTO's.

Just last month a reading contest began for fourth and fifth graders called the "Battle of the Books Tournament." Children are encouraged to sign up in the media center and to read as many books as possible from the tournament list. They are instructed to write a contest question for each book they read to submit when they return that book. The contest will end in March with a competition the following month to determine a district win-

In other board action Kathleen O'Donnell was hired as the new Director of Community Education beginning January 1, at a starting salary equal to the first step of the elementary pay scale. Mrs. O'Donnell currently holds a similar position with the Cass City Public Schools where she developed and implemented its community education program.

The schools' program will have offerings for both children and adults taking over many of the non-recreation programs now of-

fered by the Independence Township Recreation Department. That department will maintain only its recreation programs,

All contract negotiations have completed for the fiscal year, according to school negotiatior Conrad Bruce, with a one-year agreement reached with head custodians. The contract for the ten employees is retroactive to June 30, when the old one expired and parallels the general custodial agreement reached last month with one difference. This dental plan was put in with the administrators' because of the rates, the new plan is a cost-saving measure. The contract includes a seven percent increase and better life insurance at a minimal increase, Bruce reported.

Tenure was granted to Bonnie Crowson who teaches the dental assisting program at Oakland Vocational Northwest Education Center. Mrs. Crowson thanked board members telling them it took her eleven years to accomplish and that much of the credit went to her dentist husband for his support. She is now working on her master's in administration at Michigan State Univer-

sity. Teacher/Athletic director Paul Tungate reproted to the board his plan to develop a self-sustaining athletic program for the district within four years. After being directed by Superintendent Milford Mason to do

some "creative thinking", Tungate said he met a number of athletic directors in the county before developing his proposal.

Tungate is seeking authority to create a sustaining fund for athletics. In a period of four years he expects board support to decline while an increase of support comes through this fund. The ultimate goal is to use only the interest of this endowment fund to maintain the athletic program.

Tungate also proposed a committee of community people plus one board member to control investments of the fund, selling season athletic tickets in the spring when interest was highest, three seasonal kickoff dinners, and a pledge campaign similar to the one for new lights for the athletic field. His initial venture into fund-raising, a recent pancake supper, was reportedly a great success.

Board members suggested he submit his proposal in writing before they took any action.

**Association** Clarkston Education

president Al Bartlett suggested to board members that a greater effort be made to improve communications between employer and employee and between employees themselves. His goals were to create positive attitudes and to alleviate miscon-

Bartlett admitted he had no vehicle for accomplishing this as yet, but said his suggestions came as a result of discoveries made during Pontiac's recent intensive millage campaign. Too many people both with the schools as well as outside them were truly uninformed or misinformed, he

said.


Although no action was taken, board members were presented with information concerning a lawsuit proposed by the Romulus Superintendent of Schools William Bedell. The suit is an attempt to challenge the present means of school funding. Clarkston's participation would cost the district \$6,350, or \$1 per student.

Board members also received a request from the West Bloomfield School District asking for a resolution requesting the Michigan State Legislature to mandate twice-yearly tax collections. If enacted this law would eliminate the need for districts to borrow money before the December tax collections are turned over to them.


This year the Clarkston Schools borrowed two and a half million dollars and paid \$148,000 in interest. With a twice-yearly tax collection the district could have saved an estimated \$110,000 that could have been used for educational programs, Mason said.






### Fire Guts Independence Home
