

Springfield Opens New Fire Station

Springfield Township is about ready to hang out its "Open for Business" sign on the new fire station recently constructed at the corner of Dixie Highway and Rattalee Lake Road.

Equipment and office furniture was moved over to the station last Saturday and beginning this week trucks will be operating from it, said Springfield Fire Chief Marlin Hillman.

Hillman warned, however, "It won't be fully operational until we get some new firefighters trained."

The fire station, which cost taxpayers through a special millage, approximately \$140,000 will serve the northeast corner of the township. According to Hillman, more and more calls have been originating there in the past few years. He expects activity to increase more when a nearby industrial park is completed and Dixie Highway becomes


more populated in that area.

The fire station consists of three bays, offices and a large training room. Three additional bays can easily be constructed if expansion is some day necessary.

In addition a fire rescue unit and a new tanker were purchased with federal funds. The new equipment will be housed in the new fire station.

Hillman, who currently has 20 volunteer firefighters, most of whom operate out of the Davisburg Fire Station, said the department's most critical need right now is to train ten more firefighters for the new station.

He said applicants need to be residents of Springfield Township, residing near the Dixie/Rattalee Lake area, 21-45 years of age, and willing to undergo several hours of CPR, Red Cross and state training.





It's time, we, as a compassionate nation, became more enlightened about cancer and treated its victims with a greater degree of dignity and understanding.


After all, cancer strikes one out of every four Americans. Someday, you might be the one seeking help and understanding.


New England stuff, with a Taiwan label there somehwere - for those who are tacky enough to notice.

Independence Allows Salem to Mine Up to 4 More Years

Marathon negotiating sessions have ended in an agreement between Independence

Township and the Salem Gravel Pit, that will allow the gravel mining operation to continue doing business up to four more years.

The negotiated agreement allows Salem to continue mining operations for two years. If the company has complied with the terms of the agreement, they will be allowed to mine another year. A fourth year will be allowed if the company has not completed mining an estimated two million tons of gravel by the end of year three and all terms of the agreement continue to be met.

The township had threatened to shut down the operation if Salem did not come up with a reclamation plan suitable to the township. The lack of reclamation progress as well as complaints from ongoing nearby homeowners has made the gravel pit a subject of discussion at several board meetings.

In explaining some of the issues faced in negotiations with the Blount Co. of Alabama, owners of Salem, township attorney Gerald Fisher said, "The right of a property owner to work his land versus neighbors' rights" was a constant theme. Other issues discussed included reclamation and long litigation.

Provisions of the negotiated agreement

 Company-paid chloride dustproofing four times yearly from the Oakhill entrance of the plant to Sashabaw Road, as well as dustproofing on the premises.

•Installation of "No Right Turn" signs out of the entrance gate to cut down on trucks using Dartmouth Road.

 Installation of fencing trespassing signs around the gravel pit

 Company initiated petition to the county in an effort to get official "No Right Turn" signs at the gravel pit exit as well as tonnage limits for Dartmouth Road.

 Reduced hours of operation including 7 a.m.-5:30 p.m. for sales, 6 a.m.-10 p.m. for processing and stockpiling, 7 a.m.-7 p.m. for crane and front-end loader operations, and no Sunday operations period.

In addition a reclamation plan that should be more than 50 percent completed by December of 1983 was approved. Under the agreement, Blount will pay up to \$24,000 a year for township costs to monitor the ongoing reclamation.

A bond of \$650,000 was also agreed upon, and if the township decides Salem is not living up to their reclamation plan or other agreements, the bond may be cashed.

In explaining his company's position, Frank McFadden, counsel for Blount, said "They (township negotiating team) has been tough on us. We have tried to respond in a responsible way.'

He further indicated Blount would conform to the agreement no matter how much money or effort it would take. "We don't in-



On behalf of the Bailey Lake PTA, Tom Bills made a presentation and request for funds to construct a new drainage system for three Bailey Lake soccer fields. The soccer fields are currently being used by the township's Parks and Recreation Department as well as the school system. According to Bills the total cost of the project would be \$31,000, with the school system committing \$7000 towards it and the PTA making up the dif-

Board members objected to funding the proposal on two counts. One they didn't feel the township had the money to give and two they questioned whether it wasn't the school's responsibility to take care of improvements on their own property.

Speaking to the financial problem, Rose noted the township was facing severe budget problems. "As the screws get tighter





Volunteers are told to observe and report - but never to get involved with criminals. Some groups have radios to contact the police; others must stop to use a phone booth.

The Fiesta's "So Fine"

Springfield's Ingalls Sung 1958's Number 1 Tune

"So fine, so fine, my baby is so doggone fine" She sends chills up and down my spine."

Those lyrics sound familiar?

During a two week period back in 1958, "So Fine" was the number one song on the charts in the nation. It was sung by the Fiestas.

Lead singer of the Fiestas, Samuel Ingalls, now a resident of Springfield Township and an employee of K-mart Corporation, fondly recalls the years he and other group members toured the nation, playing to sold out audiences night after night.

Ingalls said the Fiestas got their start in Newark when a group of friends, including his brother Frank, became interested in music. "We were just a bunch of guys that walked up and down the streets of Newark carrying on," recalled Ingalls.

Finally they signed a recording contract with Old Town Recording Co. and began commuting back and forth from Newark to New York City.

"So Fine" was their first record release and vaulted the Fiestas to instant stardom. For fifty weeks out of the year, Universal Studios and Recording Co. kept the Fiestas on the road. They toured everywhere, including a six month stint in Florida.

The Fiestas opened shows for a lot of big names including the Isley Brothers, Jerry Butler, Count Basie, and Arthur Price.

But the biggest thrill, according to Ingalls, was playing a super gig at North Carolina University. Headlining the show were Ray Charles, B.B. King, the Drifters, and of course the Fiestas.

The young men from Newark found fame to be fun, but not lasting. Two years after

they signed their first recording contract, the Fiestas disbarded.


Ingalls explained, "Things got slow...I came to Detroit and got a job (at the Pine Knob Nursing Home - now known as Hamburger Mansion) and decided to stay. The others went to Memphis, cut a few songs, but they never did anything."

Ingalis claimed interest in him and the Fiestas has revived somewhat lately. A month ago he was interviewed on WDRQ radio and several radio stations are playing "So-Fine" occasionally as part of their oldie selections.

The interest couldn't have come at a better time for Ingalls who is planning a comeback. He's now playing his guitar, something he hadn't done since walking away from the Fiestas in 1961.

Jimmy Rollins, revived Ingalls' interest. The two are now getting together frequently to


Ingalls likens his music to "Sweet Soul." You wouldn't consider it fast music at all. It would be something Roberta Flack or Marvin Gaye would sing, said Ingalls.

"I would really like to try and make a comeback," said Ingalls. "Jimmy and I will do some songs and tape them, and then I will take them around to radio stations.'


After three tough games to start the week,




