

Five Seek School Board Seat

Clarkston School district voters will be going to the polls June 14 to vote for one member of the Clarkston Board of Education. Five candidates are competing for the 4-year seat, and four of them responded to a Reminder questionnaire sent to them a couple of weeks ago.

What follows is a brief biographical sketch of each candidate and his/her views as gleaned from information supplied to the Reminder by each candidate.

Mary Jane Chaustowich, 11060 Clark Road, Davisburg. Age 45. Husband Frank. Children Frank Jr., 12, and Mark, 10. BA Wayne State University. MS equivalent from Wayne State also. Employed with J.L. Hudson Co., United Airlines and teacher 7 years at Detroit's Cass Technical High School.

Mrs. Chaustowich has been a resident of Clarkston for 13 years. She is currently secretary of the Clarkston Community School Board, and a member of Clarkston area Youth Assistance, Clarkston Community Women's Club, and the Clarkston Junior High Volunteer program. She was formerly a member of the Independence Township Library Board, the Andersonville School PTO Board, and the Citizens Advisory Committee for Clarkston Schools.

Mrs. Chaustowich says, "The Clarkston schools have long put emphasis on good, basic education. I agree with this concept. If these were ideal times, there certainly are additions which could enhance curriculum. For instance, more classes in science, math, computer language, programming and art plus elementary physical education would benefit the district.

However, reality dictates that we cut back rather than expand and the trick is how to cut without destroying what we have. I believe consolidation is better than elimination. If we can continue to trim the periphery rather than cut into the core of our curriculum or eliminate whole programs, we will survive the economic crisis basically intact.

Additional funds would certainly be welcome; however, I cannot believe this is the time to ask the voters for more millage. It

Board Listens to Taxpayers at Millage Rate Hearing Board Treasurer Mary Jane

The Clarkston Schools Board of Education took testimony from several concerned taxpayers last Monday during a required public hearing to set the millage rate for 1982.

The hearing, a new procedure local government bodies must adhere to, is required when, in this case, the school board wishes to levy more millage than Act 5 allows.

Act 5 would allow Clarkston Schools to levy 28.4729 mills in 1982. That's compared to 31.2221 levied in 1981, 31-5525 the Headlee rollback would allow and 33.3300 mills that are authorized by the voters to levy.

Superintendent Milford Mason in explaining the complex formulas used to compute the Act 5 and Headlee rollbacks, said the district would end up with a deficit of \$880,154 if the Act 5 levy were allowed to stand.

He suggested the board set its rate at the Headlee figure, which would give the district \$107,000 in additional revenue over last year. Board President Janet Thomas seemed to support the suggestion. She had harsh words for the state legislature, which she felt was passing the buck.

'Since the State has started to use K-12 education to balance the budget, all they have done is say here...you explain it to the public.' said Mrs. Thomas.

Chaustowich agreed. "We are more or less forced to carry the can for the State," she said. "People must realize we are not asking more millage per se. We are levying an amount."

But trustee Dr. Stephen Werner did not see it that way. "That's misleading. I have a problem with going to 31.5525. I'm not sure it's proper to do it."

Although attendance at the hearing was sparse compared to regular board meetings, those that offered testimony were sometimes critical of past board actions.

"I think the School Board was very remiss in not cutting more off the top," said Leonard Cotter. "We are not the smartest people in the world out here, but we don't like to be taken. I think we've been given the fast shuffle."

Bob Dougherty said he couldn't go along with any millage increase. "I just went back to work after being laidoff for four months. I can't afford more taxes. What is the school doing anyway? They layoff teachers and hire Dan Fife to coach basketball."

And Ronald Galley asked, "Is there anything back there hiding in the bushes?" in reference to last year's vote to give central office administrators a raise immediately after a three mill increase had received voter approval.

Jeanne Molzon suggested the millage rate should remain the same as 1981, 31.22.

"I think it is awfully important that you consider how the public views this," said Mrs. Molzon. "I would personally like 31.55, but i don't think the people would be behind it.'

According to law the School


Board can't set the millage rate until seven days after the public hearing. The testimony heard Monday will be discussed and taken into consideration when the board makes its decision later in the month.

I have a definite interest in the progress and the future of our school system. We should keep the same basic values and not take away from all the children for the sake of a few.


I believe we have too many central administrators. I feel the monies should be spent where it will do the most good - in the classsroom.



I suppose during these times we should feel compassion for our fellow man. It is indeed difficult to experience the loss of a business, or worse yet, realizing you have to file bankruptcy. In this awful Michigan business climate, bankruptcy is becoming an every day thing.

Somehow, however, I can't force myself to feel sorry for the big firm that goes broke -- the Grinnel's, the Braniffs, the Wickes Co. There are several major firms that have filed Chapter 11 in the last couple of months in an effort to reorganize and delay payment.

And delay payment they do. Some businesses stay hidden under the Chapter 11 umbrella for several years, all the while turning a tidy profit, without having to pay up their back bills.

No one can fault the relatively new Chapter 11's original intent -- which was to help businesses try to turn their operations around before filing bankruptcy. Unfortunately, many businesses are now using it as a means to hide from the bill collector.

The Reminder, like other small

businesses, has had a number of its clients file Chapter 11. It's disheartening and disappointing to hear that the economy has claimed another friend...that is until you're requested by the government to pay back everything that supposed friend paid you before he went bankrupt.

Another quirk in the new bankruptcy law requires businesses who were paid for services rendered to pay back any payments they received just prior to the bankruptcy filing. Imagine finally collecting over \$2000 from a delinquent account, only to learn a couple of weeks later they have filed bankruptcy and you are required to pay all the money back.

One friend and fellow publisher had the guts to do what many of us have wanted to try. A national firm had filed bankruptcy on him and he was determined to find a way to get back the thousands they owed.

Thus he went to the furniture store, picked out several pieces, and told the store manager to charge it. Of course my friend had no intention of paying for it. When 60

and then 90 days rolled around, he began to get threatening phone calls and nasty letters about the overdue bill. He has maintained his position, however, even though the issue is now in court. He figures, and I agree, he shouldn't have to pay because the furniture company owes him more money than the furniture he bought is worth.




"We plan to run the unique taper production line every Saturday," commented Barbara. "Parents can bring their children and show them how bicycle chains and rollerskate wheels combine to produce







Cascadden figures the over 3.000 square food home should have a heating and cooling bill of approximately \$520 a year... With gas prices expecting to rise 400 percent by 1990, it's not too difficult to imagine the savings involved.


The energy house features an envelope design. According to Cascadden, "By working a solarium facing due south, air is heated by the sun and convection moves up to the insulated attic and down the hollow north wall to the basement, and then back under the solarium to repeat the process over again."

A carrier water-to-air heat pump is also used to provde heat when necessary. The heat pump which generates heat from well water is the primary source of heating. It is backed up by a gas forced air furnace that would be used when outside temperatures drop below 10 degrees.

One of the features Detroit Edison added was an interruptable air conditioner system. With this system Edison can save homeowners 50 percent on their electric bills if they allow the utility to shut off their air conditioner for twenty minutes at a time during peak energy consumption periods.

Other energy features include:

- *Earth sheltering on the north side.
- *No windows on the north side.
- *Triple glazing on the east and west sides.
- *Solar hot water heater that comes with an approximate \$2000 tax credit.
- *Extra insulation R50 ceilings, R-30 East and West walls and R38 in North wall.


- *A security lighting system developed by Detroit Edison.
- Outside air intakes in fireplaces.
- *Weather-out, an interior storm that stops infiltration and has an extreme R value.

The \$239,000 home is more than just an energy home, however. Cascadden has attempted to include the best amenities and craftsmanship available.

Take, for instance, the master bedroom.

A big grand opening splash is being planned for June 30. By that time all the odds and ends will be completed and the house will be in tip top condition for inspection by the general public.



The team continues in the state tournament next Saturday at Memorial Field in Royal Oak.


Thinclads Notch Best Ever Score in County Meet


Another school record was broken by the mile relay of Kelley Craig, Sandy Craig, Kris Tisch and Beamer with a time of 4:13.27.
