



To say drunk driving is not a major problem is like saying Michigan's economy is the best it's ever been.

Three out of five traffic fatalities that have occurred in Independence and Springfield Townships this year are related to alcohol. That statistic is right in line with the county

average. The Oakland County Sheriff's Department reports through October 1, 1982, 22 out of 27 fatal traffic accidents involved drinking drivers. In 1981, 44 fatal traffic accidents were recorded and in 29 of them the driver had been drinking.

Let's take a look at those five Clarkston area fatalities.

1. Despite a relatively hard winter, no fatalities were recorded. However, two occurred in late spring.

The first took the life of Robert Brand, Jr., 19, of 7171 Chapelview, Clarkston. Brand and a friend, Daniel Alder of 4863 Lore, Waterford, had left a party and were traveling at a high rate of speed down Clarkston Road at 4:15 a.m. on the night of May 8. Brand was killed when his car took the curve at Flemmings Lake Road too fast and ran off the road, striking a tree.

Alder was taken to a hospital in critical condition. An autopsy showed Brand had an alcohol count of .16. The accident is being prosecuted.

2. Alice Steffens of Pontiac was killed when the car she was driving swerved across the center lane and struck another car at about 12:30 a.m. on May 19. The accident occurred on Sashabaw Road near Pine Knob Road. Steffens, 29, had been drinking with tests showing .13 alcohol content. The driver of the second car, James Harner, 20, of 4503 Ivy Court, Clarkston, was not injured seriously.


3. Donald Sylvester, 19, of 5075 Westview, Clarkston was injured at 6 a.m. on June 26, when the car he was driving northbound on I-75 left the roadway and struck a cement





Well, typically, they're not. So then we must carefully rearrange assets in a way that will assure we achieve those objectives. And once that's done, you must be conscious of the fact that either the law and/or your objectives may change which means the plan should be reviewed annually.

Task Force Recommends 3-Lane M-15

The road to success in determining the best possible means of improving the M-15 corridor in Independence Township has proven to be more arduous than expected. The on-going process of review, concerning the M-15 corridor began after a Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) announcement of intent to construct a five lane highway in response to safety considerations.

Both the Township Board and the Village Council had difficulty in accepting the five lane proposal as the preferable alternative for M-15 development. Although reasonably assured of the need for some type of improvement the five lane concept was not considered as being compatible with Clarkston's rural and historic atmosphere.

The differences in preference and intent were made known to MDOT and eventually a task force was appointed by the Board (March 1981) to seek and explore other available options.

MDOT however remained firm in their favoritism of five lanes and might have proceeded with construction had the Township Board not recognized and put into effect a very important option they held: the matter of a drainage system.

Within the MDOT M-15 Proposal was an expectation of drainage improvement to be made by Independence Township at a rate of 35 per cent of the total expenditure in con-Junction with 20 per cent from Oakland County and the remaining 45 per cent to be covered by the State.

MDOT's position of "no drain, no road" enabled the township to stall construction by refusing to participate in drainage fund

acquisition. For the last year, the M-15 task force has quietly gone about the business of examining other suggested alternatives. Early on, the task force recognized the need for outside professionalism to aide and recommend without a pre-determined bias, as cost responsibilities to the Township were already anticipated to fall between 300,000 and 600,000 dollars.


The firm of Bennett, Ringrose, Wolsfeld, Jarvis, Gardner Inc., BRW, out of Minnesota was retained and representatives from MDOT were asked to participate in hopes of insuring the acceptance and feasability of any plan formulated and supported by the Task Force, the Township, and the Village Council.

At the October 12 Township Board meeting the task force chairman, Lew Wint, placed before the board the result of a years study of the issue. Actually presenting the intended plan and lay-outs was Dick Wolsfeld of BRW.

The preferred plan of a three lane system utilizing right-hand turn lanes and consolidated driveways was explained in detail with slide presentations and examination of criteria used in reaching the final decision.

The plan has the approval of the Township Board, Village Council and the Historical Society but not the complete reassurance of



The District Traffic Engineer from MDOT was present as well as representative MDOT persons who had aided the task force in their study, still, the authority needed to verify or comment on the acceptance of the plan by MDOT was not available. The MDOT position, officially, is still one that favors a five lane adaption. However, the three lane plan was met with some interest and at least a hint of optimism at the plans possibility of success with MDOT programming.

Anxious to get some type of commitment from both sides, Township Supervisor James Smith, proposed a motion that the Board send a resolution of intent, indicating to MDOT the township's desire to pursue a study and construction of the proposed site improvement as recommended by the task force, recognizing the unknown element of cost feasibility and agreement of ownerbusiness interests with the plan.

Board Trustee Larry Kozma and Treasurer Fred Ritter opposed the motion citing premature analysis of cost and business reaction as their main reasons for doing so. Clerk Chris Rose voted in favor of the motion but would have preferred delaying sending it due to concern that the absence of full board attendance culminating in a two to three

And if the statistics we have presented mean anything, that's the way it should be. It's happened time and again, where innocent people have been killed because someone was driving home after having too much to drink, and swerved into the wrong lane crashing head-on into an on-coming car.

Everyone has had too much to drink at one time or another in their lives. Smart persons, however, recognize when they are at that point, and have a spouse or friend drive them

Driving should be left to those that have keen and sharp senses. If you've had too much to drink, don't drive. You may be saving yourself from a huge fine and license suspension, but more importantly, you may be saving someone else's life. Think about it.

It was Sunday. Since we'd been keeping an eye on the market for awhile, provoked by the drop in Interest rates, we decided to look

at some houses. Once out on the road, it seemed to us half the houses around had realtor or 'by owner' signs sprouting from the front yard.

We found one in our travels that looked interesting. It was a big boxy thing with a bay window, mostly brick, yard with a healthy growth of weeds, weeds even overcoming the once-asphalted driveway.

The house had the look of abandonment. Boarded windows, peeling paint. Yet the houses around it, the few that were finished and lived in, were obviously fairly new, and

Right next door to the orphaned house was a cement block foundation, almost obscured by weeds, looking more like archeological digs than somebody's potential

We got out of the car and walked up to the home. house. Despite an untended look, the place had an almost regal bearing, sort of like royalty that had fallen on hard times.

We looked through the bay, right into the kitchen. It looked spare and uninviting, with builder's whitewash on the walls we could see, and there were no appliances.

We picked our way to the back, through stubble and brush. The ground dipped there, sharply, and we found ourselves looking at a boarded up doorwall leading into the basement. The back and side yard was heavily treed, part of a woods that had been thinned, but not ravaged.

The next evening, with realtor in tow (or was it he who had us in tow?) we went back to the house for a look at the inside.

We should've preserved our naive illusions. This was not royalty.

The builder, and we took pains to find out who it was, had created not a regal manor, but a bum of a house, a skid row, a slum that never even got the chance to get that way through the respectable process of aging. This house had its own built-in tack.

Seam tape ridged the walls, blatant, undisguised, as if the drywaller had



deliberately sabotaged his or her own work. There was a golfball-sized hole where a doorknob had punctured a wall. A loosely taped patch, about 2 x 5, sagged on the dining room ceiling, covering a leak. Linoleum curled away from the kitchen walls, looking more like wallpaper than flooring, so flimsy was it. In other rooms, a quarter inch gap separated carpeting from trim molding.

It seems the bank has relieved the builder of this house and is now more or less stuck with it. So the price is about half what other houses in the area are selling for. Even so, the house could probably be gotten for less. The realtor says banks are more flexible than people when it comes to bargaining. Banks don't like to own houses, he says.

Perhaps justice has ground this builder under its wheels, financially speaking, and he won't be building any more Jekyl and Hyde houses like the one we saw. But I wonder how thorough the system is, how effective, when ordinances and codes allow such a house in the first place.


I am writing to urge your readers to support the Police Millage Proposal on Independence Township's November 2, 1982 election

With these funds we can increase the number of deputies we now contract for, from Oakland County, from six (6) to eleven (11) or twelve (12). This will mean the residents could expect much better patrol coverage, quicker responses to problem calls, and perhaps a crime prevention program, without cutting other township services.

Until now we have been living on "borrowed time". National averages show that a municipal police department should have one officer for each 1,000 persons in the population. Even with these additional funds, if the millage is passed, we would still only have about half of the 21 officers suggested under these averages.

I would ask all citizens to realize that although times are tough we need to provide adequate police coverage for our community. Please vote yes on the local police millage proposal on the November 2, 1982 ballot. Remember, your vote does count.


Hazelton wasn't there to attend mass, but rather play Bingo, one of his favorite pasttimes in his later years.


"He would win big, because he would play twelve cards at a time," said Mrs. Keasey.

Springfield Hears Facade Alternative

by Mike Wilcox

Springfield Township board members heard a report from their engineers, Mosher-Kapelczak last Wednesday that offered an alternative to an Oakland County plan that for facade improvements called Davisburg.

Township Supervisor Collin Walls had asked the engineers to evaluate the county plan after it had drawn fire from Davisburg business owners because it would require too much money and not enough parking in their estimation.

The county plan, which was done free of charge, was presented to the township in 1981.

According to Ray Cousineau of Mosher-Kapelczak, the county plan put an emphasis on beautification with lots of pretty landscaping and wide sidewalks constructed on both sides of Davisburg Road in downtown

The plan also required parallel parking, and according to Cousineau, downtown businesspeople preferred angle parking.

"Parking takes a second priority in the county plan," said Cousineau.

Cousineau said there are currently 45 parking spaces available in downtown Davisburg with a potential need of 167 spaces in the future. The county plan called for only 37 parking spaces.

Mosher-Kapelczak plan calls for angle parking and 77 total spaces. Many of these spaces would be located behind the Township Hall, where the engineers propose to expand the present parking area that currently holds twelve cars.

In explaining why he commissioned the alternate study, Walls said, "I vought a visual improvement was warranted, but with all do respect, the county went overboard. The trees and landscaping would be beautiful, but it doesn't generate traffic.'

In other business the board received good news from the Feds. Federal funding that Springfield had requested to blacktop Davisburg Road had been approved.

"We were advised our chances of getting

the funds were slim and none. It came through however," said Walls in making the announcement.

The Feds will pay 75 percent of the cost to blacktop one mile of Davisburg Road east of Dixie Highway. The Township will be responsible for the other 25 percent, an estimated \$100,000.

The money will come from a special road fund that was estimated by the township five years ago and currently has over \$200,000 in

Davisburg Road was chosen to receive the funds because of its high traffic count. It is estimated that over 1500 cars travel the road daily. That's nearly twice as many as the count on Andersonville Road, which has been paved for several years.

The Board also moved to table the construction of a barrier-free ramp for the entrance of the Township Hall to comply with Federal guidelines. The Feds require barrier free access to any hearings that involves the possible use of Federal funds.

Walls said he had received estimates on the construction of a ramp. He figured it would cost in the neighborhood of \$7500.

Trustee William Whitley suggested procuring a portable ramp for such hearings.

In explaining why the Township should act fairly soon on the matter Walls said if we don't, it may result in the loss of Federal Revenue Sharing funds.

He also lamented, "One wheelchair has been in here in six years. I think in a lot of cases, we (government) have gone overboard."

On a motion by Clerk Calvin Walters, the matter was tabled.

How 3-Lane M-15 **Recommendation Came About**

In the Independence Township attempt to survey the alternatives to the M-15 plans offered by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) an appointed task force sought the aide of an engineering firm from Minnesota by the name of BRW. (Bennett, Ringrose, Wolsfeld, Jarvis, Gardner, Inc.)

In the presentation of BRW's recommendations, Dick Wolsfeld, the "W" in BRW, gave board members and citizens attending the meeting an interesting look into the ways and means of making certain observations and correlating them into scientific data.

It was interesting to find that M-15 is not being used as a short cut-off between Dixle Highway and 1-75 and that peak traffic hours do not fall in the customary work force rush hours.

Instead, studies indicate that traffic on Mconsists of business commercial destinations and resident use. Peak hours average 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Various techniques were used to obtain data that when correlated averaged the overall traffic conditions.

Members of the task force were asked to rate, numerically, in terms of priority, categories such as roadway capacity (future and present), safety traffic circulation,

existing parking, land acquisition, capital cost, drainage, maintenance, commercial development, historical district impact, and relationship of old M-15 to the new addition.

Having done this they were then asked how each of these categories responded to chosen alternatives of: present M-15 with a no-build option, three lane with center left turn option; four lane with inside lane serving left turn; and five lane (MDOT) with center lane serving turns.

The evaluations were summarized and then detailed until a numerical distinction became visible signaling the suggested alternative.

The numerical ratings of the various plans' were considered along with the data gathered by Township Boy Scouts and resident volunteers who stood along the M-15 corridor at various points and recorded the license plates of passing cars in order to tabulate and determine the destination of vehicles and traffic flow.





I think that it is significant to note that the eight who sponsored it all come from areas that tend to be rural. Also, virtually all of the sponsors had experience in local government before being elected to the House of

Representatives.

The frequency of recall elections tends to be highest in rural areas with small jurisdictions -- townships, villages, small cities and small school districts. Unquestionably, efforts to recall are very expensive and act as a particularly harsh burden on these small jurisdictions. Recall is an expensive process even if an election is never held, because many hours must be spent verifying signatures on petitions.

I earnestly hope your newspaper will urge readers to vote "yes" on Proposal A in the November general election.

Voter approval of Proposal A would permit the Michigan Legislature to reform the constitutionally-provided privilege of legislative immunity and restrict its application to ensure state legislators must obey the same laws everyone else does.

It is very important Michigan voters understand that approval of Proposal A would lead to reform and increased legislative accountability. This proposal is similar to one that was defeated in the 1980 election. Studies indicate that proposal failed because many voters mistakenly thought it would give legislators more, not less, immunity from civil prosecution. This is not correct! It is essential voters know a revision of the legislative immunity privilege would be another important step in achieving legislative accountability.

Legislative immunity, as provided in the State Constitution, was originally intended to protect lawmarkers from frivolous lawsuits and harassment arising from their actions as legislators. Two major changes have occurred since the 1963 State Constitution was adopted, however, that substantiate the need to reform the application of legislative immunity. First, the legislature is no longer a part-time body. It now meets practically all year and, as a result, legislators are virtually immune all year from civil offenses and prosecution. Secondly, the decriminalization of many minor infractions indirectly extended legislative immunity to include even traffic violations such as speeding and illegal turns.

We need to close the loopholes that now permit the potential abuse of the legislative
