# Alcohol Major Cause of Traffic Deaths

To say drunk driving is not a major problem is like saying Michigan's economy is the best it's ever been.

Three out of five traffic fatalities that have occurred in Independence and Springfield Townships this year are related to alcohol. That statistic is right in line with the county average.

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department reports through October 1, 1982, 22 out of 27 fatal traffic accidents involved drinking drivers. In 1981, 44 fatal traffic accidents were recorded and in 29 of them the driver had been drinking.

Let's take a look at those five Clarkston area fatalities.

1. Despite a relatively hard winter, no fatalities were recorded. However, two occurred in late spring.

The first took the life of Robert Brand, Jr., 19, of 7171 Chapelview, Clarkston. Brand and a friend, Daniel Alder of 4863 Lore, Waterford, had left a party and were traveling at a high rate of speed down Clarkston Road at 4:15 a.m. on the night of May 8. Brand was killed when his car took the curve at Flemings Lake Road too fast and ran off the road, striking a tree.

Alder was taken to a hospital in critical condition. An autopsy showed Brand had an alcohol count of .16. The accident is being prosecuted.

2. Alice Steffens of Pontiac was killed when the car she was driving swerved across the center lane and struck another car at about 12:30 a.m. on May 19. The accident occurred on Sashabaw Road near Pine Knob Road. Steffens, 29, had been drinking with tests showing .13 alcohol content. The driver of the second car, James Harner, 20, of 4503 Ivy Court, Clarkston, was not injured seriously.

3. Donald Sylvester, 19, of 5075 Westview, Clarkston was injured at 6 a.m. on June 26, when the car he was driving northbound on I-75 left the roadway and struck a cement

## FINANCIAL PLANNING FOR THE 80's

So, by now, if you've been reading this column you should be able to see that there is a systematic and thorough approach to Financial Planning. Before I begin answering your questions, however, I will spend the next few weeks identifying with you the main disciplines of complete Financial Planning. And we'll start with Estate Planning.

Estate Planning begins with the recognition that there are many different types of property in any given estate. The key categories would be: a) **personal property** (including cash and paper investments), b) **real estate** (home, vacation cabin, rental property, business building), c) **business interest** (for those who own or are partners in a business), d) **benefits** (those from work as well as those from the government), e) **insurances** (life, disability, accident, health). Once you sort out in your mind the different types of property in your estate, the next step is to get a handle on your objectives. And here you should be looking at the short as well as the long run. This is the most difficult part of the planning process for a lot of people. And the reason for that is that while some people don't have any idea what their objectives are, others have been nurturing objectives that are absolutely inconsistent with reality. Here is where a good financial planner will earn this keep by either helping you crystallize your objectives, or by challenging those that may not be realistic. Now, once good, solid objectives have been identified for the family, estate or business (if there is a business in the family), the next step is to determine if the resources of the estate are properly arranged to achieve the objectives. Well, typically, they're not. So then we must carefully rearrange assets in a way that will assure we achieve those objectives. And once that's done, you must be conscious of the fact that either the law and/or your objectives may change which means the plan should be reviewed annually.

As a result, survivors are left psychologically bewildered; the fact of death has not yet "sunk in".

Another advantage of the full-service funeral is that it involves the family to a great extent in preparation; psychologists tell us that specific actions are sometimes the best therapy for grief.

These paints are "intumescent"; that is, they puff up in the presence of heat and form a layer of insulating foam that will not burn, even at 1,000 degrees or more. This also protects the surface underneath from getting very hot; often it protects that surface from catching fire at all.

The fire-retardant paints have been available for years for use in hospitals, schools, and other public places. They would be effective in private homes, too, safety experts agree, especially where halls and stairways provide the only exit.

Not only flames, but smoke, will be minimized with the intumescent paints, at least in the fire's early stages.

Under the improved formulation, most intumescent paints have a latex base and come in flat and gloss finishes. They can be tinted any pastel color and applied like ordinary paint. Cost is perhaps 10 to 20 percent over ordinary paints. Look for the Underwriters Laboratory label.

# Task Force Recommends 3-Lane M-15

The road to success in determining the best possible means of improving the M-15 corridor in Independence Township has proven to be more arduous than expected. The on-going process of review, concerning the M-15 corridor began after a Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) announcement of intent to construct a five lane highway in response to safety considerations.

Both the Township Board and the Village Council had difficulty in accepting the five lane proposal as the preferable alternative for M-15 development. Although reasonably assured of the need for some type of improvement the five lane concept was not considered as being compatible with Clarkston's rural and historic atmosphere.

The differences in preference and intent were made known to MDOT and eventually a

task force was appointed by the Board (March 1981) to seek and explore other available options.

MDOT however remained firm in their favoritism of five lanes and might have proceeded with construction had the Township Board not recognized and put into effect a very important option they held: the matter of a drainage system.

Within the MDOT M-15 Proposal was an expectation of drainage improvement to be made by Independence Township at a rate of 35 per cent of the total expenditure in conjunction with 20 per cent from Oakland County and the remaining 45 per cent to be covered by the State.

MDOT's position of "no drain, no road" enabled the township to stall construction by refusing to participate in drainage fund acquisition.

For the last year, the M-15 task force has quietly gone about the business of

examining other suggested alternatives. Early on, the task force recognized the need for outside professionalism to aide and recommend without a pre-determined bias, as cost responsibilities to the Township were already anticipated to fall between 300,000 and 600,000 dollars.

The firm of Bennett, Ringrose, Wolsfeld, Jarvis, Gardner Inc., BRW, out of Minneapolis, Minnesota was retained and representatives from MDOT were asked to participate in hopes of insuring the acceptance and feasibility of any plan formulated and supported by the Task Force, the Township, and the Village Council.

At the October 12 Township Board meeting the task force chairman, Lew Wint, placed before the board the result of a years study of the issue. Actually presenting the intended plan and lay-outs was Dick Wolsfeld of BRW.

The preferred plan of a three lane system utilizing right-hand turn lanes and consolidated driveways was explained in detail with slide presentations and examination of criteria used in reaching the final decision.

The plan has the approval of the Township Board, Village Council and the Historical Society but not the complete reassurance of

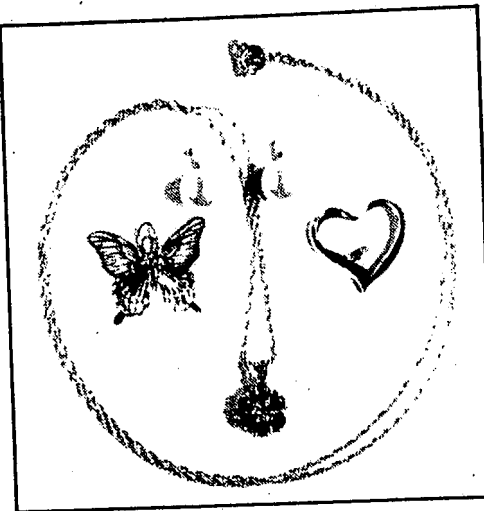

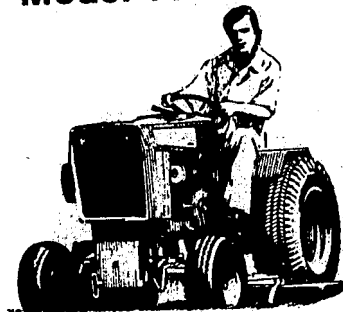

acceptance from MDOT.

The District Traffic Engineer from MDOT was present as well as representative MDOT persons who had aided the task force in their study, still, the authority needed to verify or comment on the acceptance of the plan by MDOT was not available. The MDOT position, officially, is still one that favors a five lane adaption. However, the three lane plan was met with some interest and at least a hint of optimism at the plans possibility of success with MDOT programming.

Anxious to get some type of commitment from both sides, Township Supervisor James Smith, proposed a motion that the Board send a resolution of intent, indicating to MDOT the township's desire to pursue a study and construction of the proposed site improvement as recommended by the task force, recognizing the unknown element of cost feasibility and agreement of owner-business interests with the plan.

Board Trustee Larry Kozma and Treasurer Fred Ritter opposed the motion citing premature analysis of cost and business reaction as their main reasons for doing so. Clerk Chris Rose voted in favor of the motion but would have preferred delaying sending it due to concern that the absence of full board attendance culminating in a two to three

majority vote on the motion would send a rather weak signal to MDOT.

Smith urged the motion forward stating that he had reason to believe that the M-15 was "budget consideration for the MDOT 1983-84 budget and that it would lose that priority position if the township did not show some action soon."

Smith's view that when a completion date of five to eight years is a probable estimate, early action must be considered. He encouraged support of his motion which was passed with Trustee Don Travis, Rose and

Smith providing the necessary majority.

Where everything stands now is a day to day, month to month, year to year guess. The M-15 story has setting, plot, main and supportive characters, conflict and mystique. All that is missing is the ending which when it finally does come could be a 'novel' approach to the M-15 drama.

The terrible consequences of drinking excessively and then driving are worth taking a second and third look at. The statistics presented in this week's **Reminder** indicate that nearly 75 percent of all fatal traffic accidents are linked to a drinking driver.

That figure is staggering. 75 percent. One of the very few good deeds coming out of this year's State Legislative session, was a package of bills that have stiffened the penalties for drunk driving. Someone caught drunk on Michigan highways from here on in is going to have severe penalties to pay.

And if the statistics we have presented mean anything, that's the way it should be. It's happened time and again, where innocent people have been killed because someone was driving home after having too much to drink, and swerved into the wrong lane crashing head-on into an on-coming car.

Everyone has had too much to drink at one time or another in their lives. Smart persons, however, recognize when they are at that point, and have a spouse or friend drive them home.

Driving should be left to those that have keen and sharp senses. If you've had too much to drink, don't drive. You may be saving yourself from a huge fine and license suspension, but more importantly, you may be saving someone else's life. Think about it.

In a political year when campaign rhetoric all sounds the same, it's refreshing to hear from a politician that has some offbeat ideas.

E. Leonard Howarth, Davisburg's rather eccentric attorney, turned State Senate candidate, has more than his share of off-beat ideas.

We looked through the bay, right into the kitchen. It looked spare and uninviting, with builder's whitewash on the walls we could see, and there were no appliances.

We picked our way to the back, through stubble and brush. The ground dipped there, sharply, and we found ourselves looking at a boarded up doorway leading into the basement. The back and side yard was heavily treed, part of a woods that had been thinned, but not ravaged.

The next evening, with realtor in tow (or was it he who had us in tow?) we went back to the house for a look at the inside.

We should've preserved our naive illusions. This was not royalty.

The builder, and we took pains to find out who it was, had created not a regal manor, but a bum of a house, a skid row, a slum that never even got the chance to get that way through the respectable process of aging. This house had its own built-in tack.

Seam tape ridged the walls, blatant, undisguised, as if the drywaller had

deliberately sabotaged his or her own work. There was a golfball-sized hole where a doorknob had punctured a wall. A loosely taped patch, about 2 x 5, sagged on the dining room ceiling, covering a leak. Linoleum curled away from the kitchen walls, looking more like wallpaper than flooring, so flimsy was it. In other rooms, a quarter inch gap separated carpeting from trim molding.

It seems the bank has relieved the builder of this house and is now more or less stuck with it. So the price is about half what other houses in the area are selling for. Even so, the house could probably be gotten for less. The realtor says banks are more flexible than people when it comes to bargaining. Banks don't like to own houses, he says.

Perhaps justice has ground this builder under its wheels, financially speaking, and he won't be building any more Jekyll and Hyde houses like the one we saw. But I wonder how thorough the system is, how effective, when ordinances and codes allow such a house in the first place.

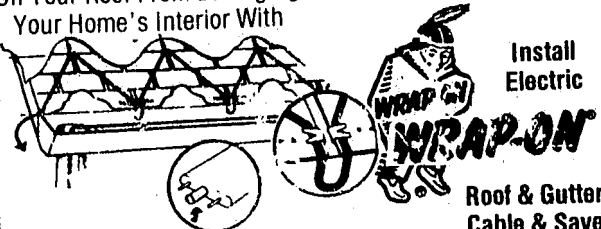
What a good time.

shingle mills and lumbered in the woods for several years. The shingle mills made shingles of cedar and other woods for the buildings in Kingston.

From Kingston, he moved to Auburn Heights. He has lived in his own home there for the past 50 years until he was moved to Hickey's Rest Home in Clarkston four months ago.

When he moved to Auburn Heights he landed a job with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. He was a police officer for ten years under Sheriff Frank Schram in the 1930's. Until he was 90, Hazelton worked for Pontiac Township as a cemetery caretaker. To this day, he can take people to some of the cemeteries and tell exactly where most every one is buried.

Apparently longevity is a family trait. Hazelton's grandmother lived until she was 106.

Hazelton claims to have no special diet. He doesn't smoke or drink, and never has. Up until about 70 years of age he walked up to 15 miles a day.

Although he claims to be a great hunter and fisherman, Gladys Keasey recalls, "He would never get a deer because he would not sit down or sit still long enough."

However, she added, "He could out walk any of us. He had a pace that was extremely fast."

Great-great-granddaughter Susan Grant remembers going fishing with him. "He

would always say be quiet because the fish could hear you."

Before he suffered a stroke, which impaired his speech a couple of years ago, Hazelton could be found with friend Gladys Lovett every Tuesday and Thursday at a Catholic Church in Auburn Heights.

Hazelton wasn't there to attend mass, but rather play Bingo, one of his favorite past-times in his later years.

"He would win big, because he would play twelve cards at a time," said Mrs. Keasey.

When Hazelton turned 102, his family had a big birthday party in his honor. Unexpectedly, the hit of the part was Hazelton himself. During a quiet moment, the birthday boy burst forth the chorus from an old tune that no one present had ever heard before. But by the end of the party they all were singing, and no one was enjoying it anymore than Hazelton.

# Springfield Hears Facade Alternative

Springfield Township board members heard a report from their engineers, Mosher-Kapelczak last Wednesday that offered an alternative to an Oakland County plan that called for facade improvements in Davisburg.

Township Supervisor Collin Walls had asked the engineers to evaluate the county plan after it had drawn fire from Davisburg business owners because it would require too much money and not enough parking in their estimation.

The county plan, which was done free of charge, was presented to the township in 1981.

According to Ray Cousineau of Mosher-Kapelczak, the county plan put an emphasis on beautification with lots of pretty landscaping and wide sidewalks constructed on both sides of Davisburg Road in downtown Davisburg.

The plan also required parallel parking, and according to Cousineau, downtown businesspeople preferred angle parking.

"Parking takes a second priority in the county plan," said Cousineau.

Cousineau said there are currently 45 parking spaces available in downtown Davisburg with a potential need of 167 spaces in the future. The county plan called for only 37 parking spaces.

Mosher-Kapelczak plan calls for angle parking and 77 total spaces. Many of these spaces would be located behind the Township Hall, where the engineers propose to expand the present parking area that currently holds twelve cars.

In explaining why he commissioned the alternate study, Walls said, "I thought a visual improvement was warranted, but with all do respect, the county went overboard. The trees and landscaping would be beautiful, but it doesn't generate traffic."

In other business the board received good news from the Feds. Federal funding that Springfield had requested to blacktop Davisburg Road had been approved.

"We were advised our chances of getting

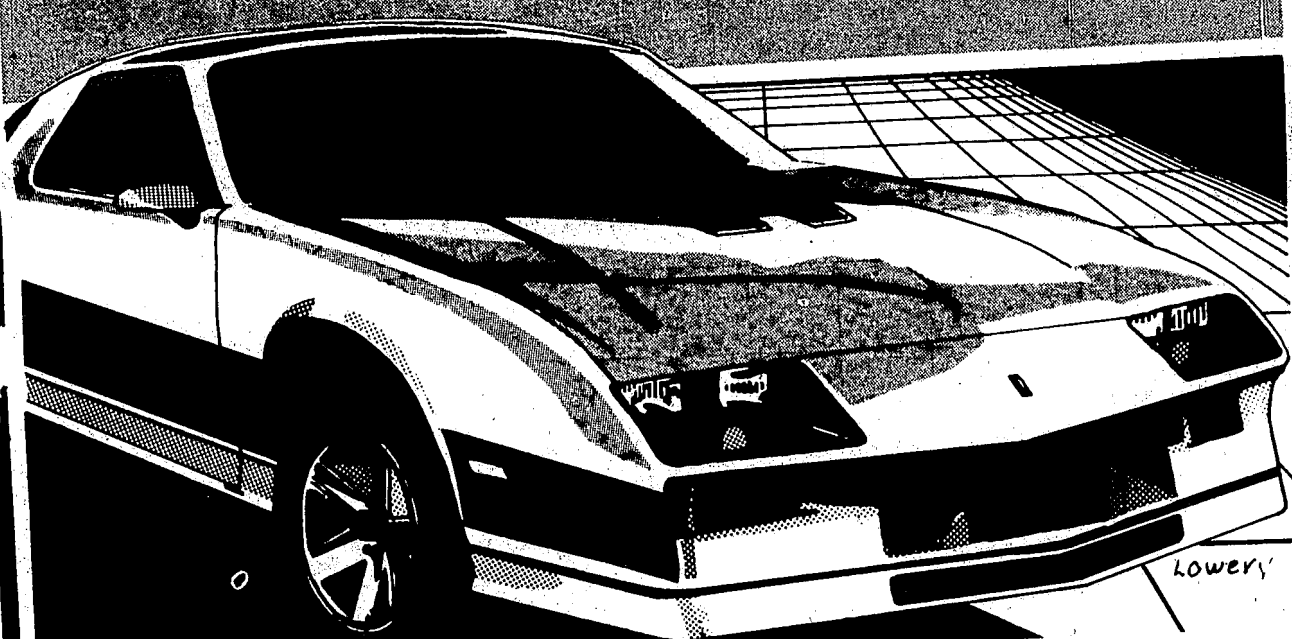

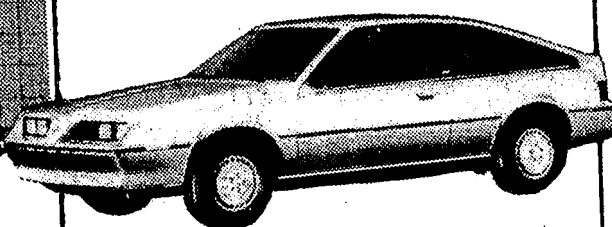

the funds were slim and none. It came through however," said Walls in making the announcement.

The Feds will pay 75 percent of the cost to blacktop one mile of Davisburg Road east of Dixie Highway. The Township will be responsible for the other 25 percent, an estimated \$100,000.

The money will come from a special road fund that was estimated by the township five years ago and currently has over \$200,000 in it.

Davisburg Road was chosen to receive the funds because of its high traffic count. It is estimated that over 1500 cars travel the road daily. That's nearly twice as many as the count on Andersonville Road, which has been paved for several years.

The Board also moved to table the construction of a barrier-free ramp for the entrance of the Township Hall to comply with Federal guidelines. The Feds require barrier free access to any hearings that involves the possible use of Federal funds.

Walls said he had received estimates on the construction of a ramp. He figured it would cost in the neighborhood of \$7500.

Trustee William Whitley suggested procuring a portable ramp for such hearings.

In explaining why the Township should act fairly soon on the matter Walls said if we don't, it may result in the loss of Federal Revenue Sharing funds.

He also lamented, "One wheelchair has been in here in six years. I think in a lot of cases, we (government) have gone overboard."

On a motion by Clerk Calvin Walters, the matter was tabled.

## How 3-Lane M-15 Recommendation Came About

In the Independence Township attempt to survey the alternatives to the M-15 plans offered by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) an appointed task force sought the aid of an engineering firm from Minnesota by the name of BRW. (Bennett, Ringrose, Wolsfeld, Jarvis, Gardner, Inc.)

In the presentation of BRW's recommendations, Dick Wolsfeld, the "W" in BRW, gave board members and citizens attending the meeting an interesting look into the ways and means of making certain observations and correlating them into scientific data.

It was interesting to find that M-15 is not being used as a short cut-off between Dixie Highway and I-75 and that peak traffic hours do not fall in the customary work force rush hours.

Instead, studies indicate that traffic on M-15 consists of business commercial destinations and resident use. Peak hours average 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Various techniques were used to obtain data that when correlated averaged the overall traffic conditions.

Members of the task force were asked to rate, numerically, in terms of priority, categories such as roadway capacity (future and present), safety traffic circulation,

existing parking, land acquisition, capital cost, drainage, maintenance, commercial development, historical district impact, and relationship of old M-15 to the new addition.

Having done this they were then asked how each of these categories responded to chosen alternatives of: present M-15 with a no-build option; three lane with center left turn option; four lane with inside lane serving left turn; and five lane (MDOT) with center lane serving turns.

The evaluations were summarized and then detailed until a numerical distinction became visible signaling the suggested alternative.

The numerical ratings of the various plans were considered along with the data gathered by Township Boy Scouts and resident volunteers who stood along the M-15 corridor at various points and recorded the license plates of passing cars in order to tabulate and determine the destination of vehicles and traffic flow.

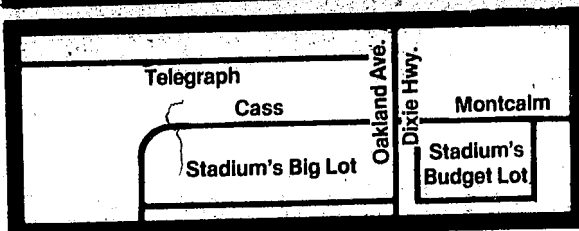
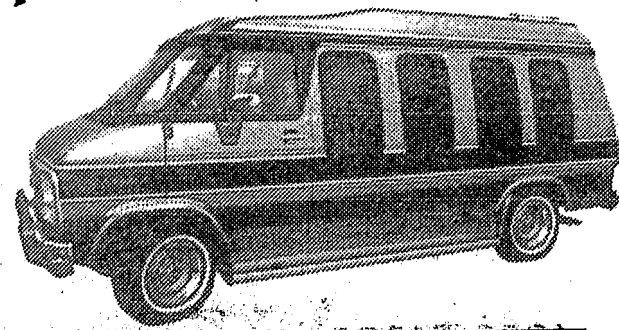

Dear Editor,

A recent article and letter to the editor in this paper have alleged that I have cosponsored a bill (House Bill 5930) to make it difficult for citizens to undertake recall of an elected official because I am "afriad of the people".

Nothing could be further from the truth. The fact of the matter is that eight representatives (four Democrats and four Republicans) introduced HB 5930 with the idea of forcing discussion on Michigan law

governing recall. As introduced, HB 5930 would require the person filing the recall petition to make a deposit equal to 50 percent of the estimated cost of conducting a recall election as estimated by the filing official. After the election the deposit would be refunded to the person who made it.

I think that it is significant to note that the eight who sponsored it all come from areas that tend to be rural. Also, virtually all of the sponsors had experience in local government before being elected to the House of Representatives.

The frequency of recall elections tends to be highest in rural areas with small jurisdictions -- townships, villages, small cities and small school districts. Unquestionably, efforts to recall are very expensive and act as a particularly harsh burden on these small jurisdictions. Recall is an expensive process even if an election is never held, because many hours must be spent verifying signatures on petitions.

In my years in the Michigan House, I have

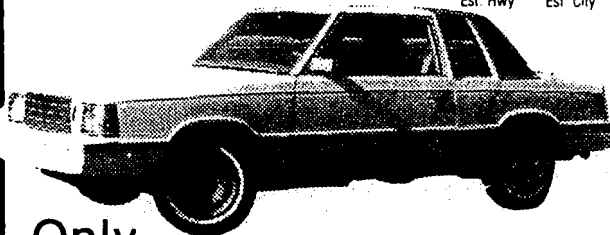

learned that one way to force an issue is to introduce a bill -- especially one that radically alters existing law. I agreed to cosponsor HB 5930 solely to force discussion of our recall law. Local officials complain bitterly that something must be done, as recall is now the first choice of citizens in some areas when in fact it should be used only as a last resort -- when all else has failed.

I believe that enacting a 50 percent deposit requirement for recall is wrong. However, it certainly has elicited the discussion which was its purpose all along.

The previous letter to the editor also implied that the Legislature was not working "full-time". The hours spent in session on the House floor represent only a small portion of the average legislator's work load. Many more hours are spent in committee work. (I currently chair the House Committee on Mental Health and sit on four other committees.) By far the most time is spent in meeting with people -- constituents, lobbyists, bureaucrats and staff to prepare for work in committee meetings and on the floor. It is not uncommon for legislators to spend six or more hours a week on the job, including weekends and evenings and attendance at meetings here in the 61st District. To say that a legislator only works when in session on the House floor reveals a poor understanding of the job and its requirements.

I hope that I have clarified my intention in cosponsoring House Bill 5930. Having completed almost four terms in the Michigan House and having served in local government before that, I can assure you that I'm not afraid of the people who have entrusted so much to me. I cherish that trust.

Dear Editor:

I earnestly hope your newspaper will urge readers to vote "yes" on Proposal A in the November general election.

Voter approval of Proposal A would permit the Michigan Legislature to reform the constitutionally-provided privilege of legislative immunity and restrict its application to ensure state legislators must obey the same laws everyone else does.

It is very important Michigan voters understand that approval of Proposal A would lead to reform and increased legislative accountability. This proposal is similar to one that was defeated in the 1980 election. Studies indicate that proposal failed because many voters mistakenly thought it would give legislators more, not less, immunity from civil prosecution. This is not correct! It is essential voters know a revision of the legislative immunity privilege would be another important step in achieving legislative accountability.

Legislative immunity, as provided in the State Constitution, was originally intended to protect lawmakers from frivolous lawsuits and harassment arising from their actions as legislators. Two major changes have occurred since the 1963 State Constitution was adopted, however, that substantiate the need to reform the application of legislative immunity. First, the legislature is no longer a part-time body. It now meets practically all year and, as a result, legislators are virtually immune all year from civil offenses and prosecution. Secondly, the decriminalization of many minor infractions indirectly extended legislative immunity to include even traffic violations such as speeding and illegal turns.

We need to close the loopholes that now permit the potential abuse of the legislative immunity privilege.

We need to vote "yes" on Proposal A.

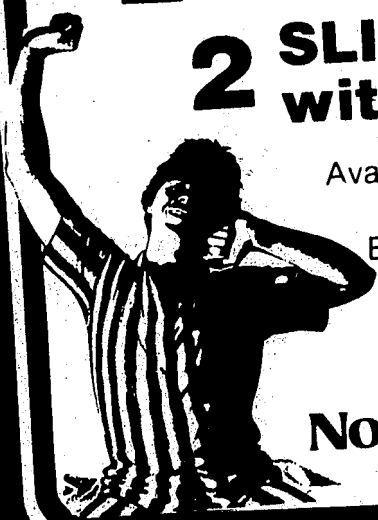
Also like most little girls Katie's dreams included a far-away place. Her place was Africa and she reached that destination before she acquired her crown.

International, near the completion of her sophomore year and tour South Africa, predominately Zimbabwe Region, then known as Rhodesia. She accepted, leaving school to spend three years traveling and singing with the group.

The music was Contemporary Gospel, the message was 'sharing', and the expenses were up to each of the persons traveling with the group. Katie never felt it was right to burden her parents with those additional expenses and though they were supportive, Katie worked to earn or raise her needed expenses.

Returning to Michigan in late 1979, she entered and won the Jackson County Rose Queen 1980 Pageant, gaining \$1,000 in scholarship funds.

Of the experience that brought her to the attention of the Youth For Christ group, she feels she gained invaluable experience, traveling and being self-sufficient, that has helped her in her duties as Miss Michigan and will continue to enhance her own feelings about herself and her capabilities.

Finally, returning again to Michigan, Katie decided to go back to school and complete her education. She obtained further scholarships by becoming Miss Heart of Michigan, Spring Arbor and finally Miss Michigan, 1982.

Her duties as Miss Michigan include appearances at civic functions, schools, churches, fairs and etc. as a representative of the people of her state.

Katie does receive the use of a car during her reign as well as a clothing allowance and various other prizes but most importantly she is granted \$5000 in scholarship funding and that she says is the foremost thrust of the Miss America Pageant.

When asked to reflect on her year thus far, Katie refers to her opportunity as a "once in a life-time chance," in which she tries to view

## **IT'S CALLED PROPOSAL D**

### **Proposal D Would**

#### **1. Raise utility rates.**

Its most damaging provision prohibits Michigan's utilities from recovering legitimate operating expenses in a timely manner. The average delay — from 14 months to 2 years — would force utility companies to borrow at high interest rates just to continue to operate. This additional interest could add up to more than \$150 million by 1984 — all of which would be included in costs to customers.
