CEA, Board Clash Over Expired Contract

The reason that prompted over 100 teachers to attend last week's Clarkston Board of Education meeting? The lack of a teachers' contract since August of 1982.

"The attitude of many Clarkston people has been characterized by patience, continuing cooperation with you folks (the Board), 'business as usual' in educating the children of this district," stated Miss Jan Modesitt.

"You, the Board, cannot speak poverty

with me," continued the high school math teacher. "You have money if you want to have it."

"If you want a quality product you cannot cut corners. You must be willing to finance that product and what is that product? The Individual Student," said Modesitt.

"The most important facet, I feel, in educating that student is me, the teacher. You, the people of Clarkston, have very fine and dedicated teachers but you can only bleed these teachers so long and expect them to continue in a cooperative and unquestionable manner. The ball is in your hands now I suggest you put it into play!" was Miss Modesitt's advise to the board before they adjourned to executive session.

The Board earlier that evening consented to take a look at the factfinders' recommendation and adjourned after the regular meeting to discuss it.

It was near the beginning of this year that William Haber, Professor of Economics at the University of Michigan, was asked to give

a factfinding report and recommendation under the regulation and procedures of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission in the matter of negotiations between Clarkston Community Schools and Clarkston Education Association.

The Board is seeking a freeze on wages while the Education Association wishes a 7.5 percent salary increase and the retention of step increases. The factfinders' report recommended a 3.5 percent salary increase for one year.

The Education Association Negotiations Team had reluctantly, but unanimously accepted the report. The Association also asked that the board do the same as a means for a final resolution for the 1982-83 Master agreement.

Superintendent Milford Mason pointed out a "gross error" in the factfinders' report concerning the district's fund equity by \$572,250. The report stated that the district's fund equity at the end of 1981-1982 year was \$1,750,000; the correct figures should have been \$1,177,750. A figure that both parties agreed on.

"It's frustrating to go to all that work and have the decision based on such a gross error," stated Mason.

After agreeing to an executive session, the Board stated that it wasn't very likely to come to a decision that evening.

Clarkston Education Association President Al Bartlett commented, "We have waited, we have waited, and we have waited. We believe it is imperative that a decision is made tonight. The staff has worked long, it has worked hard for this school district and it is certainly deserving of that consideration."

"I would just ask this Board in this deliberation to consider the many things this

staff has done time and time again for this district and the children of this district..."

"I think the Clarkston Education Association has waited long enough. We seriously recommend to you tonight that you come back with a decision. We will wait!"

Forty-five minutes later, the board gave the association this decision: "The board is requesting a series of revised projections so they can reconvene negotiations."

The teachers were not happy.

Also during the meeting, the Board gave its okay for the district to attempt to obtain a loan in the sum of \$1,920,000.

Business Manager William Jackson notified the board that the district would be unable to make the May payroll because of no State Aid payment. In his presentation to the Board, Jackson stated that it was likely that State Aid payments would not be forthcoming until September and by then the district would have an approximate \$1,919,922 deficit.

"Even with the adoption of the Blanchard Fiscal Recovery Program, the state will be unable to return to an on-time payment schedule until October 1984. Local governments, school districts, colleges and universities do not plan on receiving complete payment from the state until the end of the fiscal year," quoted Jackson from the Michigan Tax Information Council.

Tim Banfield Crowned Spelling Champ

There were some awfully tough words to get by in Clarkston's Spelling Contest, but Tim Banfield, a sixth grader from Andersonville Elementary held on to win the District Title.

The 386th word that captured the title for Tim was logistician (a specialist in logistics; a military science).

Neck and neck with Tim, from word number 254 to word number 385, was runner-up Steve Doolittle from North Sashabaw.

The two became final competitors when Kelly Miller from Pine Knob had a problem with the 254th word. Other students who made it to the finals were Traci Hallett of Andersonville Elementary and Jenny Miles from North Sashabaw.

Students throughout the district participated in spelling bee activities since early February. Finalists from each elementary were determined by February 18th, allowing them the month interim before final competition, to study.

Words selected for use in the contest are those compiled by the Detroit News when they sponsored their regional Spelling Bees.

The News discontinued their program three years ago, at which time, Clarkston acquired the News' old word lists to use in the districts continuation of the spelling contest activity.

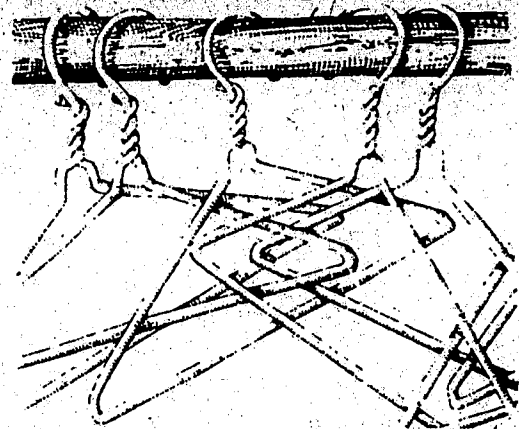
This year, all elementary school champions will be afforded the opportunity to compete again in a contest being sponsored, for the first time, by Lawrence Institute of Technology.

Initially, entered into the contest, were 25 student (6 boys and 19 girls). The program consists of 6 alternates also, of which 4 were boys and 2 were girls.

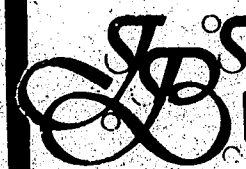

Waterford Millage Renewal Ought to be Approved

The Waterford School District is struggling. They face enormous problems in trying to balance their budget -- problems that have been created by State irresponsibility rather than local misuse of funds. They face a declining enrollment that means schools must be closed -- schools that are near and dear to the hearts of many students and parents.

Those problems however, will not get any better if school district voters fail to pass the two millage issues before them on March 28. And that would spell "bad news" for new superintendent Dr. Alton-Cowan, who took over the helm of the school district after the decision was made to hold the millage election.

It is **The Reminder's** feeling that Dr. Cowan ought to be given a chance to show the district voters what he can do. Only by approving the two millage issues will he be given a fair chance.

In addition, neither of the millage issues represent a tax increase. The first proposition, which calls for the renewal of 1.25 mills is simply what it says -- a renewal of a tax Waterford voters have paid for several years.

The second proposal, which is listed on the ballot as increase is actually a transfer of 1.4 mills from the debt retirement fund to the operating fund. It again represents a tax that Waterford voters have paid for several years.

There are certainly many disenchanted citizens and groups of people that disapprove with some of the actions of the present School Board. Many are dissatisfied with the way the closing of Waterford Township High School was handled. Others, think the Schools spend their money frivolously, and have too many administrators at the top.

But, now is not the time to voice your complaints. Save those complaints for the annual school election when board members

are up for election. Or voice them at the twice monthly school board meetings. Those are the times and places at which your objectives can be accomplished.

A "no" vote now, only means that our kids will suffer. Educational programs, that have been slashed to the "bone" with previous cuts may be eliminated entirely if these two issues fail to pass. And those kind of cuts really won't effect the School Board or the top administrators all that much. Instead they will devastate the educational opportunities our children ought to have.

Don't let that happen. Approve the two millage issues on March 28.

Irene is sixty-one, so if you subtract fifty-eight-and-half from 1983, you can figure she got polio around 1925, before the Iron Lung. When Irene moves from bed to chair or wheelchair, she must pull the left leg with her, like so much thick rope.

Recently, she underwent a corneal transplant, wears an extended-wear contact lens, and her eyes are bright behind the thick lenses of her glasses.

Irene says everybody thinks she's a school teacher. Does she look like a school teacher, she wonders. Her face has a pleasantly weathered look. She looks more like a favorite aunt than a school teacher.

For three weeks, when Irene first came down with polio, her mother and father took turns pushing their own breath into her, artificially respirating her until the tiny lungs could fill on their own.

At four, Irene was swaddled in a hard cast from head to toe, medicine's naive attempt to "keep the muscles from shrivelling up."

Her wide blue eyes crinkle and she laughs out loud at a memory:

"One day I got mad at my mother, and threatened to run away."

Irene knows how to laugh. She ventures out into the world with easy grace, going here and wide, travelling whenever the mood strikes. Many of her friends are smart, bookish people, curious about the world.

So is Irene.

One time, she says (not a little pride sneaking in), she ran into Doug Fraser at a gathering. "How are you, Irene?" he asked. She is amazed that he remembered her, even her name from an earlier brief encounter.

Irene likes Pavarotti and she needlepoints like crazy, whipping out tiny angels, rocking horses, stars. She uses them for ornaments, gives them to friends, like so much stardust, blessing them from her view of the world, a high one, a bright one.

Six finished ornaments this day. She gives them to a friend, visiting from Alaska.

Alaska. Land of the midnight sun, an appropriate destination.

Indeed. Reminds me of Irene.

Oakland to Sound Tornado Sirens March 24

Governor James J. Blanchard has designated March 20-26 as "Michigan Tornado Safety Week." As part of Oakland County's effort to make the citizens aware of tornado safety and to test Oakland County's emergency operations, the following activities are planned for Thursday, March 24, at 1:30 p.m.

The Oakland County Division of Emergency Medical Services and Disaster Control will sound the Oakland County Tornado Siren Warning System at 1:30 p.m. on March 24.

Oakland County's Tornado Siren Warning program is a centrally activated system designed to alert the citizens of a tornado warning.

A single, steady, three-minute siren tone signal is a tornado warning. This warning means that a funnel cloud has been sighted in the area.

The 125 sirens in the system will be activated at the E.M.S. and Disaster Control offices located in the lower level of the Law Enforcement Complex, 1201 North

Telegraph Rd., Pontiac.

In conjunction with the siren test, there will be an Emergency Operation's Center exercise. The Emergency Operations Center is the primary point for communications and coordination operations of emergency management forces to respond and recover from disasters or emergency situations. All persons involved with staffing the E.O.C. have been requested to report to their assignment stations.

The E.O.C. exercise purpose is to familiarize the County Department Heads and Division Managers, elected officials, utilities, volunteer organizations, and others, with their roles and responsibilities associated with their E.O.C. position.

The E.O.C. is located in the lower level of the Law Enforcement Complex.

CURE Meets with Martha

Representatives from C.U.R.E. group (Citizens United to Restore Education) traveled to Lansing where they met with Lieutenant Governor, Martha Griffiths.

Jean Molzon, a member of C.U.R.E., said the group found Griffiths to be an extremely personable individual, who seemed open to

the information supplied by C.U.R.E.

General feeling, concerning the objective success of the trip; to inform and bring awareness of individual district problems; was one of fair success.

Griffiths was viewed, by some, as having a more state and fiscal oriented view of educational problems. C.U.R.E. members were pleased to have the opportunity to personalize the state view of education, by presenting particular problem areas of several state districts.

According to Molzon, Griffiths seemed genuinely interested in pursuing the various interests and concerns expressed by the district representatives and accepted documented information for further study.

Griffiths elaborated on state funding issues, confirming the dismal placement education will hold in expected cuts.

August, state aide payments to districts, Griffiths said, will never come and further payments will come only if the Governor's tax proposals are accepted.

The state, Griffiths added, could not afford to expand its fiscal responsibilities at this time, based on present revenue. Griffiths, in fact, said June's state payrolls cannot be met without the passage of the tax package.

Griffiths suggested that most of the schools financial troubles were the result of the Reagan Administration's policy and the policies of the Federal Government's Education divisions.

C.U.R.E. members also met with other groups where they rallied on Capitol Hill.

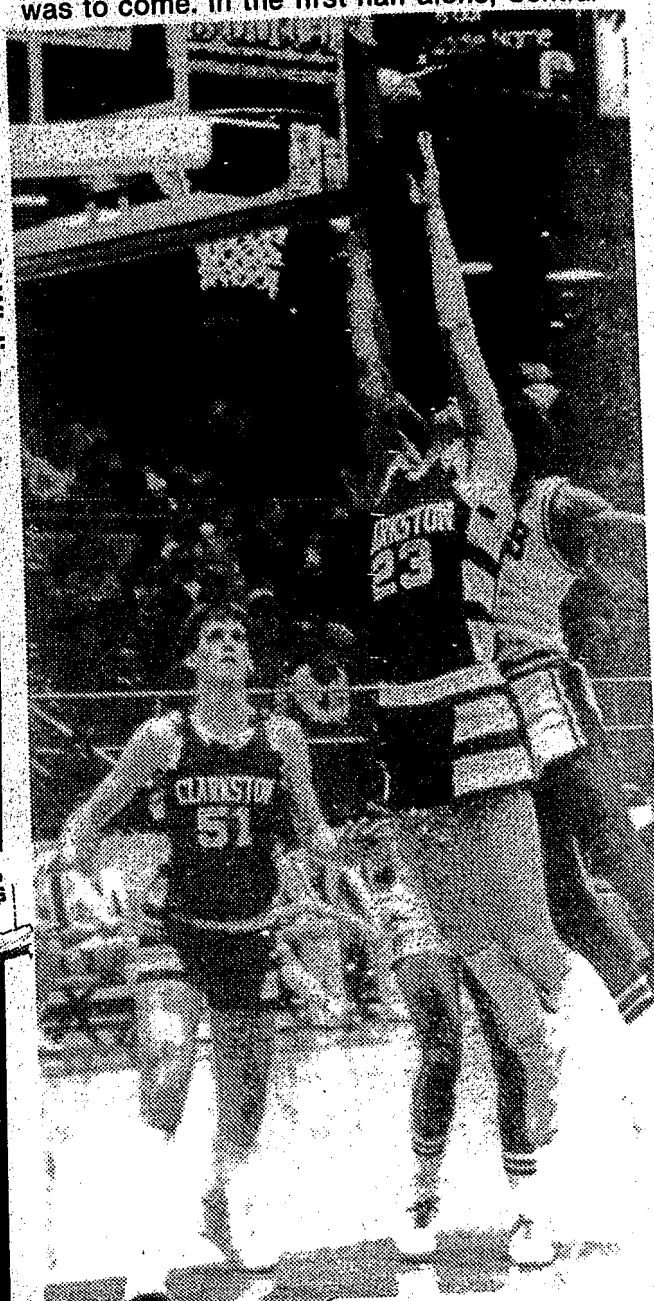

Independence City? It Could Happen

In July of 1981, Township Clerk Chris Rose, suggested to fellow board members that they investigate, more completely, the specifics of chartered or incorporated communities.

Rose says, he has basically the same reasoning today, as he did then, in support of his suggestion. That reasoning calls for a much closer look at the process of becoming a city or village and what it actually could entail to implement such a change in Independence.

Rose would like to see the board gradually progress in gathering related information, ascertaining what the actual comparables are. This, Rose adds, could prevent costly mistakes later, should the township find itself in a crisis situation such as threatened annexation.

Those board members reached for comment, were in basic agreement with Rose's concern; each recognizing the complexity of the issue and the need to become familiarized with it.

Supervisor James Smith, said there hasn't been enough board evaluation of the aspects of chartered or incorporated governing systems to allow for a subjective opinion.

Smith would like to see board attention given to the matter, in the not too distant future, but feels that present economic conditions will deter that option for awhile.

The fact that cities provide services and services cost money, is one reason Smith doubts that cityhood will be the residents choice for some time to come. The financial picture is just too uncertain.

Board Trustee's Larry Kozma, Dale Stuart, and Bill Vandermark would like to study the issue more closely than previously has been done, opting for the advantage of familiarity should an occasion arise that demands affirmative and efficient action.

Kozma sees definite advantages in city or village systems simply because they have more use of their federal and state tax dollars than unchartered townships, like Independence.

But, Kozma also is skeptical of increased services and cost. The charter, he feels, would have to detail specific limitations before being accepted. People don't want more taxes.

Vandermark, like Smith, sees no pressing need to rush into a discussion of any major system changes, but would definitely like to see it pursued by the board.

Board members were quick to point out the problem of meeting the needs of the Village of Clarkston, for it would be difficult and cost prohibitive for the two areas to remain separated.

Jim Hyde, from the State Boundary

Commission states that the average millage for city operation/general fund falls between 5-10 mills. Cities may levy up to 20 mills under state statute unless restricted by charter language.

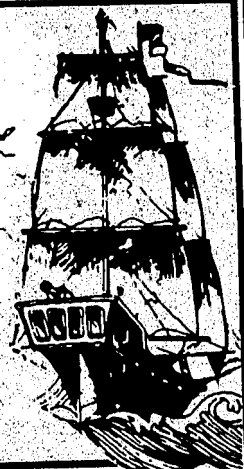

Cityhood has Advantages, Disadvantages

Should Independence Township become Independence City, or perhaps, the City of Clarkston? You say, you haven't given it much thought? Well, some area residents have and a few of our neighboring communities are already on their way to becoming cities.

Today, in fact, many villages and townships are moving to incorporate as a city. Why? There are many reasons; supplied by individual community need and ranging from, a desire to broaden tax revenues, to a need to prevent the annexation of territory by another community.

Cityhood can offer a panacea for many of the ills suffered by growing communities that wish to preserve their independence. It can increase the communities availability to federal and state funding for roads and other improvements; and yet allow it a more secure and independent system of government.

Voters in the Village of Oxford, just last weekend, turned down a petition for cityhood.

Avon Township and Lake Orion Township are both actively looking at the feasibility of cityhood as a means of avoiding annexation of some of their territory.

Annexation is legal and does allow a larger government body, to incorporate, within its boundaries, the territory of neighboring communities. Unchartered townships, such as Independence, are especially susceptible to annexation.

Recognizing certain obvious benefits of cityhood, one might wonder why there aren't less townships and villages and more cities, than presently accounted for. The reasons denying incorporation as a city are as

numerous and individual as reasons for embracing it.

Many persons, within a community contemplating becoming a city, react negatively from a basically, emotional sense. Mention the word city and thoughts of skyscraper horizons, concrete, lights, crowded housing, heavy industry and pollution come to mind. Few envision rolling acreage, trees, quaint residential areas and modified business communities, and yet, that 'rural' description is quickly becoming a new 'city' image.

Other community fears are based on a desire, by the populace, to limit government size, although becoming a city does not necessarily have to mean governmental expansion. The charter that establishes a community as a city, can be highly individualized, limiting not only the size and the type of government level but also the tax base and services supplied.

There are several options available, in choosing the type of governmental system, to be utilized in city management.

The commission plan usually provides for the election of 5 to 7 commissioners who serve as members of the City Council. Each member usually accepts responsibility for a particular part of city administration.

Few cities adopt a straight commission form of government, because it does not separate policy and administrative functions of government.

In most cities, boards or commissions composed of lay citizens, are appointed either to serve in an advisory capacity or to accept responsibility for certain parts of the administration; most commonly, Public Works, Public Safety, Parks, Library, City Planning and Zoning.

In some cases, these boards or com-

missions may appoint, promote, and remove administrative officials and employees. These boards and commissions hold regular meetings, report to the City Council, and can

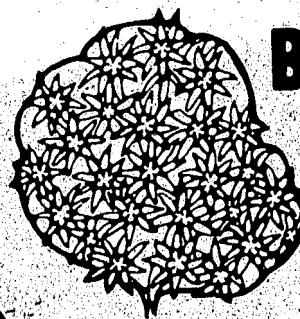

be restricted and regulated by charter.
The council-manager plan provides for the appointment, by an elected or appointed council, of a professional chief ad-

ministrator, who is permitted to appoint and remove administrative officials and employees. This plan usually provides for an elected mayor whose main function is to keep in touch with the community and to explain policies and plans of the council. Referred to as a 'weak-mayor type' of city government, the council-manager plan leaves administration to the professional administrator.

The strong-mayor type of government, includes elected council members, but in this form the mayor has the power to appoint and remove administrative officials, without being as responsible for those actions to the Council or council-appointed boards.

All functions of the City are outlined and operated within charter guidelines. The charter is granted or approved by the state and can be quite specific in detailing the wishes of the community as to its preferred system and restrictions of government.

As a city, a community must provide for many of their own services although they need not be self-initiated but can be contracted from outside sources.

Some of the services supplied by a city, for its residents are: Police, Fire, Sanitation Building and Planning, Department of Public Works, Roads (state, county and city) Parks and Recreation.

Many townships and villages already supply or contract for these services. Independence Township lacks a road maintenance and construction department, but those can be contracted from the county. As a city, weight and gas tax can be collected from the state in greater proportion than a township can.

Within cityhood, all roads, even private may be incorporated and maintained by higher fund levels.

Increases in state revenue sharing funds and community block grants are also realized by townships and villages that become a city. Cities also provide their own assessing and collection of taxes, further increasing their growth control.

Wheeler, Palulian Appointed to Independence EDC

Martha Wheeler has been reappointed to a six year term as a member of the Independence Economic Development Corporation.

Tim Palulian was added as a new member recommended by Treasurer Fred Ritter. He was placed in committee by a 4-3 vote. Ritter, Travis, Kozma, and Stuart voted approval while Smith, Rose, and Vandermark cast no votes.

Appointment to the committee is made by the Township Board.

The E.D.C. membership consists of eleven individuals representative of commercial, residential, industrial, and banking interest within the community.

The purpose of the E.D.C. is to afford business interests the opportunity to finance, at rates tax exempt, and lower than most financial institutions.

The members of E.D.C. screen and determine which applicants will be approved. E.D.C. criteria examines three main objectives; will the applicant retain or generate jobs; will the applicant broaden the tax base; and will the applicant be a good community employer?

Correction

It was reported in the March 10, 1983 Reminder that chloriding costs would be subsidized by Independence Township at 17 cents per foot. The figure was incorrect. The township will reimburse 14 cents, to residents, of the 34 cents per foot county charge.

Independence Adopts Speed Ordinance

The procedure of amending Independence Township's new Speed Exhibition Ordinance took nearly three hours to resolve at the March 14th Independence Township Board meeting.

Discussions began with, less than optimistic, comments from Township Attorney Gerald Fisher regarding the satisfaction of Waterford Hill Race Track officials and neighboring track residents, with the ordinance. Both parties have been at opposite ends of agreement during committee discussions outlining the new sound and operational race track ordinance.

Residents, near the track, have complained for years about the excessive noise, debris, and overnight campers that the race track creates.

Track officials complain that technical means for sufficiently muffling the race cars to meet resident proposed sound levels does not exist. Track officials also claim construction of a sound reducing land berm is cost prohibitive at this time.

The Township Board has worked diligently with the two groups, to iron out an agreeable compromise, in the form of an ordinance.

Supervisor Jim Smith and Trustee Larry Kozma were the first board members to get their feet wet in proposing amendments to the ordinance. Both were concerned with defining sound testing methods and determining violation procedures. Discussion, however, ultimately settled on the language use in the ordinance.

Trustee Dale Stuart continued the detailed review, drawing board attention to several sections of the ordinance that dealt with the enforcement of ordinance provisions; particularly in relation to their strength and weakness.

Kozma protested the Board's decision to allow overnight campers on the track property.

Stuart proposed that they be allowed to camp overnight, with strictly enforced noise curfews, to protect the privacy of neighboring residents and their property. Stuart

also proposed that proper sanitation facilities be made available by track owners, adding that in his opinion an added element of security is present when the people are there to secure their own properties.

Trustee Dan Travis, who has abstained from participating in matters relative to the ordinance, due to a lifetime membership in the Sportsman's Club that owns the property; did speak up regarding camping.

Travis stated that both the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts utilize the grounds for camping as do participants of various events that take place on the grounds.

The amendment allowing campers, with Stuart's provisions, was passed.

Kozma pressed hard for a reduction in allowable decibels, but his fellow board members remained firm. Track related decibel levels would remain projected at: 75 weekend maximum with an added allowance of 15 decibels for 1983; 75 with an additional 10 decibels for 1984; and 75 with an additional 5 decibels for 1985. Resulting in, 90 decibels for 1983; 85 decibels for 1984; and 80 decibels for 1985.
