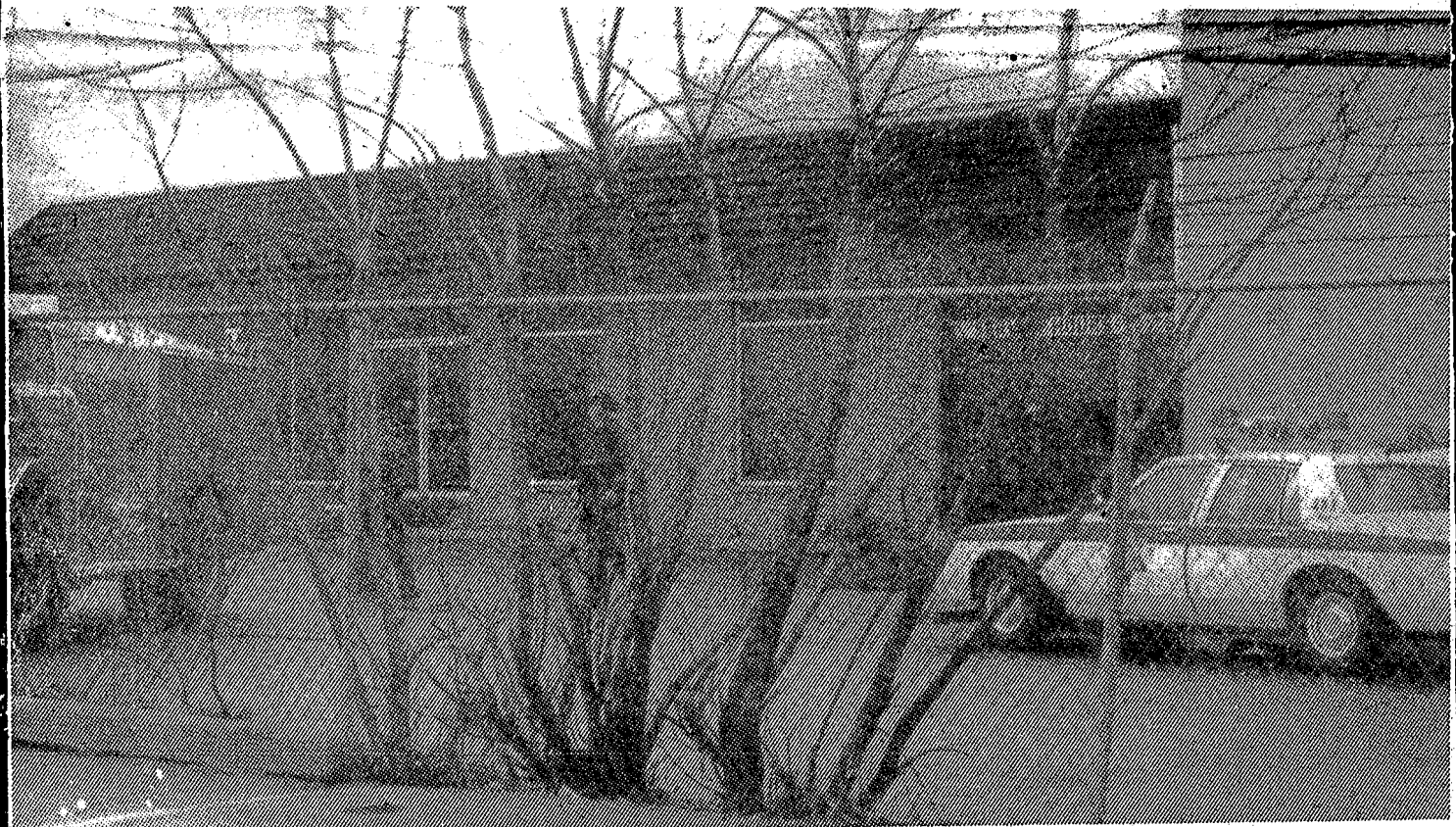

Safe Crackers Bust Up Two Clarkston Businesses

Two Clarkston area businesses were hit by burglars last weekend. A fire was started and a safe tampered with at Rademacher Chevrolet. Across the street, a large sum of money was stolen from Howe's Lanes.

Deputies responded to the Rademacher alarm at 8:40 a.m. Saturday morning. Instead of finding a suspect, they found a fire in one of the offices.

"It appears that somebody was trying to get into the safe," said Tom Rademacher, owner of the Dixie Highway dealership. "When they tried to torch the safe they burned out the office and made a mess."

The burglar or burglars gained entrance through a window in the rear of the auto shop. No money was taken and damage was limited to fire and smoke damage.

A day later, Michigan State Police were called to Howe's Lanes. The bowling alley had been burglarized between 4 a.m. - 10 a.m. Easter morning.

The intruders had pried open a door to gain entry. A prying tool was used to break open a safe, from which a large sum of money was taken.

"At this time we do not have a suspect, but safe jobs are normally done by somebody that knows something about safes," said State Trooper Dan Thomas.

He added, "Their purpose was to open the safe. Nothing else was disturbed in the place."

Students Participate in State Bowl

Two teams of 5th and 6th grade students from the Clarkston Academically Talented Program has been invited to participate in the fourth annual Future Problem Solving State Bowl. Kristen Martin and Kristine Fromm from Bailey Lake School, Rachel Woody and Tami Haines from North Sashabaw School, Kellee Duty, Peggy Agar, Leanne Stevens, Ross Rosenthal and Ben Huffman from Clarkston Elementary School and their coach, Mrs. Joette Kunse, will meet in Ann Arbor at the University of Michigan on April 16, to compete against 31 other teams from all over Michigan.

The State Bowl is the culmination of a year long program where students are taught to creatively seek, attack, and solve problems related to projections into the future. More than 3,000 Michigan students worked on three practice problems which were critiqued by trained evaluators. Based on the third

practice problem, 20 percent of Michigan teams from each of three grade divisions (4-6, 7-9, 10-12) have been invited to participate in the State Bowl. While teams know the general topic of this year's Bowl, the impact of computers on finances, they will not know the specific nature of the problem they will attempt to solve until the Bowl begins.

Solutions will be evaluated on clearly established criteria, and the top four teams from each division will receive trophies. Winning teams will also be invited to represent Michigan at the National Future Problem Solving Bowl, coming up May 30-June 2 at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. In the past four years, Michigan students have won five separate national championships at the National Bowl. 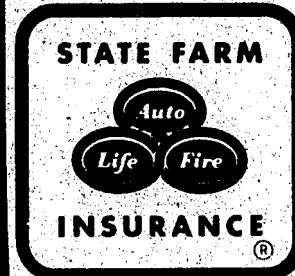

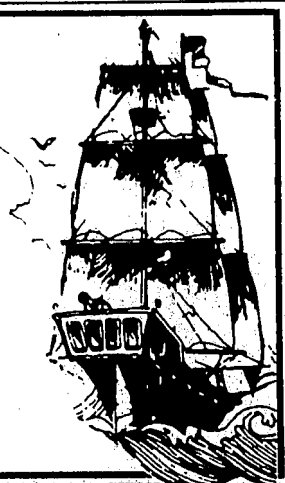

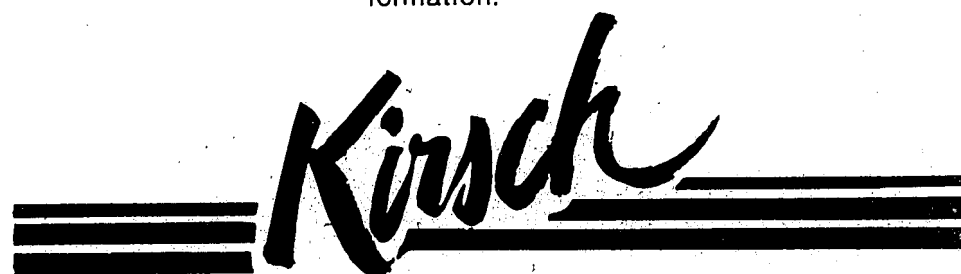

The Factfinder's Report - What it Says

"The Clarkston Community Schools and the Clarkston Education Association have been involved in negotiations concerning the level of wages to be paid to the members of the Association by the school system.

The Board seeks a freeze on wages and step increases. The Association wishes a 7.5% wage increase and the retention of the step increases. The parties were unable to resolve the matter in contention and appealed to the Michigan Employment Relations Commission for the designation of a Factfinder.

William Haver, of Ann Arbor, Michigan, was designated by the Commission as its Factfinder and Agent to conduct a factfinding hearing, and to issue a report with recommendations, with respect to the matters in disagreement."

The factfinder was, "asked to make recommendations concerning salary increases for 1982-83, increments for those who have traditionally received such payments, and hourly pay adjustments for a relatively, small number of employees involved in summer school, adult education and summer workshops."

A Factfinder's role is not one of mediation or arbitration. Factfinders are to offer their "best judgment as to what is reasonable and equitable in light of the facts presented to him by both parties."

"A hearing to begin the factfinding process took place on Friday, January 7, 1983.

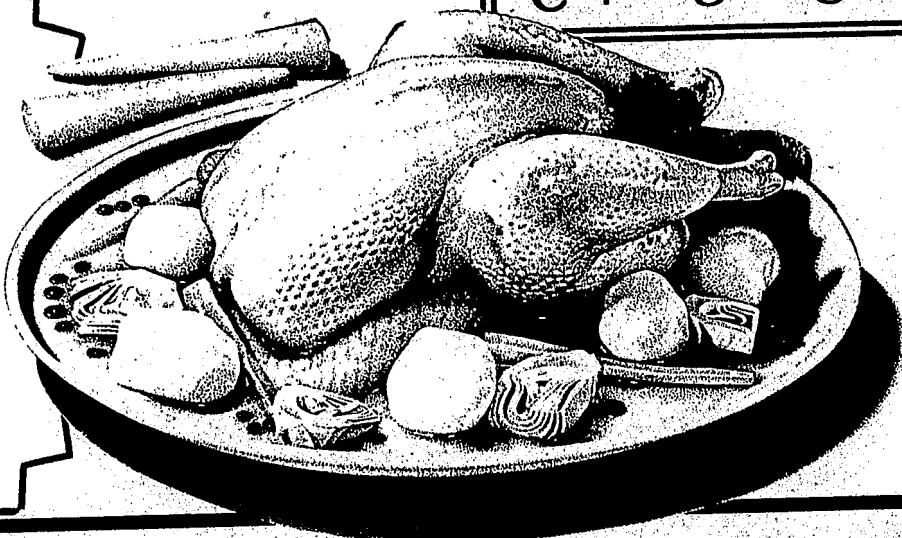

LETTERS**Huge Salary Hikes are Ludicrous**

Two important decisions are usually decided at annual meetings--the budget and the salaries of the elected township board. In most cases, the budget has become so complex, the average citizen is unable to comprehend the figures thrown in front of him at the annual meeting. But the other decision--what to pay elected officials--is fairly simple.

So, I was lead to believe, anyway. I guess I was under the impression that the economy and employment situation in this area kind of dictated what we would pay our elected officials. Very few of us have been treated to substantial raises in this last couple of years. In fact, most of us, have been asked to hold the line, and some of us have to take concessions.

Not our township boards. Both Independence and Springfield officials were subjected to raises that ranged from 5% to 30% last week, as generous electors in attendance at the annual meetings let it be known that they felt their elected leaders were underpaid.

In Springfield, after a 5% raise had been granted to Supervisor Collin Walls, former Springfield supervisor, Claude Trim asked that the issue be reopened so that Walls could get a 15% raise. With only a few objections, the electors in attendance agreed.

I'm not at all suggesting that Collin Walls is not worth \$25,000. I am, however, insinuating that I was quite surprised that voters did not exercise a bit more caution before agreeing to a 15% raise. This comes on the heels of a raise granted at last year's annual township meeting. This comes on the heels of one of the area's worst year's, economically, and employment-wise.

In Independence, trustees were granted a near 30% increase. Electors claimed that they were grossly underpaid and deserving of far more money than they earned. I agree, but so are school board members, and other people that hold part-time positions on boards. Our trustees knew what they would be paid before they were elected. I presume they sought the job to offer public service,

and did not expect to get paid what they were worth.

Electors, in my opinion, would have been wise to settle on a small increase more in tune with the economy and unemployment situation in the area, rather than the generous raises granted.

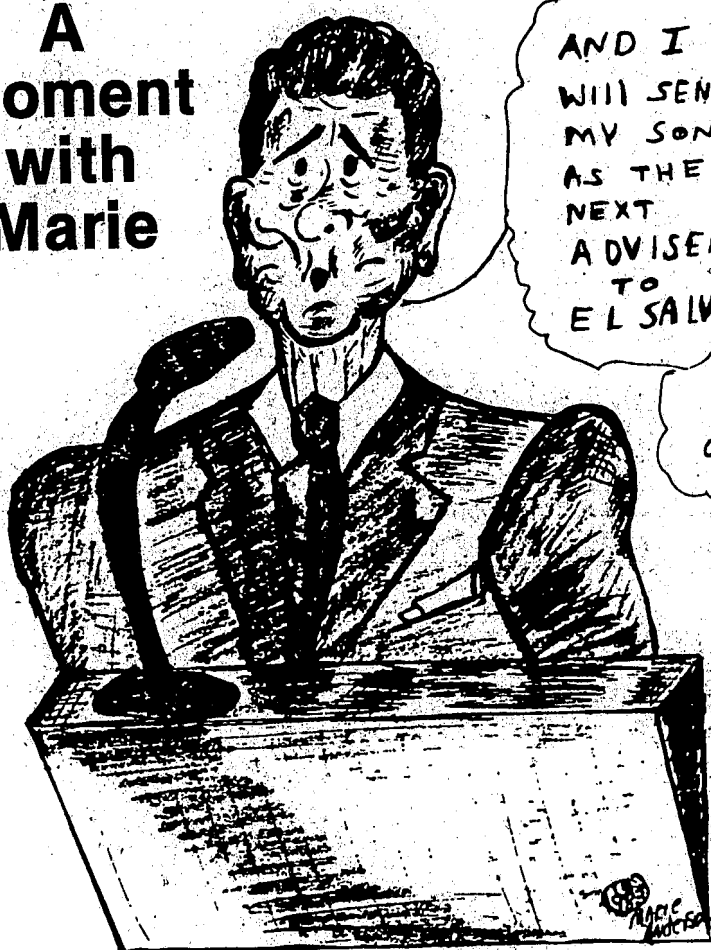

In addition the Factfinder was provided with Post-Hearing Briefs, which contained both parties comments and any updating of information, that might have been for-

mulated and/or gathered after the January 7 Hearing.

It was the School District's proposal that; salaries should be frozen at 1981-82 levels and that such a freeze should apply also to increments."

It was the Board's position that while the School District, at this particular moment, has a favorable fund balance, it should not be penalized for careful and conservative administration, which is responsible for not being in a deficit condition.

The Board also pointed out the troubled state economy, declining enrollment and the adverse consequences of the unusually deep and continuing Michigan recession, as factors creating substantially adverse effects upon the amount of State aid being received by districts.

"The CEA, representing the teachers, is seeking a 7.5% increase and, in addition, the usual increments. Increments CEA states, are not considered salary raises, and it cites the conclusions of other fact finders on this specific, narrow issue."

CEA minimized the "doom and gloom" projections of the Board by asking that the impending income tax, was well as the upcoming collection of summer taxes be recognized for the fiscal advantages they will be providing to the district.

In summary: "The School District, as the Hearing, in its Exhibits, and in its Post-Hearing Brief, related to the Factfinder that it is conservatively managed and fiscally responsible. As a result, it has a nominal general fund equity of about \$1,750,000 and, at the same time, has been able to accommodate to a decrease in enrollment, increased costs, and a substantial reduction of State aid.

This responsible management has led it to a cost containment and cost reduction program which has made it possible to

reduce the number of teachers by 40 positions, a smaller noninstructional staff by 27 persons, and five fewer administrative employees."

The Association questions the wisdom of further reducing the number of teachers when the District has a fund equity balance in excess of \$1,177,000 dollars

Examining as objectively as he can the relevant Exhibits, the Factfinder has reached the conclusion that the case presented on behalf of the School Board does, in fact, take account of every conceivable financial adversity that may develop. The actual circumstances are more likely to be less serious than depicted.

Quite apart from that, however, the Factfinder has no reluctance whatsoever in recommending that the step increase, which is based on longevity, should not be frozen. It is invariably received, even when there is no change made in the salary schedule. There may be exceptions to this rule, but they are relatively few. "Step progressions" are expected. They are meant to reflect the additional experience of the teacher and the "value added" aspect of his or her performance. It should not be considered an increase. It is, in fact, an entitlement due to longevity. Since 1970 factfinders have almost consistently held the views expressed in the preceding sentences.

Consequently, it is this Factfinder's **Recommendation No. 1** that the step increment should clearly be provided for the 1982-83 school year.

The issue is not clear when it comes to the Association's request for a 7.5% salary increase. The Factfinder is not unimpressed by the appraisal of the financial and economic condition and outlook, outlined by the Board's advocate. The Factfinder's long experience as an economist in dealing with economic change simply cannot accept all of the dire forecasts which the advocate portrays. The Factfinder does not have to accept the more optimistic forecasts made by the Association. He is certain, however, that with the present general fund equity of more than \$1,750,000, with the very real prospect of a whopping income tax boost, and a slowly but hopefully improving economy, there is justification for some improvement in the salary schedule for the Clarkston teachers.

Any improvement contributes almost immediately to teacher morale, "productivity"

and general performance. The financial situation is simply too tight to justify recommending a 7.5% increase as the Association requests. Examining average increases already granted in 25 Oakland County units, whose agreements were settled at the time of this Hearing, they exceeded 5%. Taking into consideration the special difficulties which face Clarkston, the Factfinder concludes that a nominal increase would be both reasonable and equitable.

It is the Factfinder's Recommendation No. 2 that the proposal of the School District that teachers' salaries be frozen should be rejected and that a 3.5% increase be provided in the 1982-83 school year.

With respect the hourly rates for adult education, summer school and workshops, in the Factfinder's opinion a 50 cent increase per hour, sought by the Association, is not unreasonable and he strongly recommends its acceptance as Recommendation No. 3.

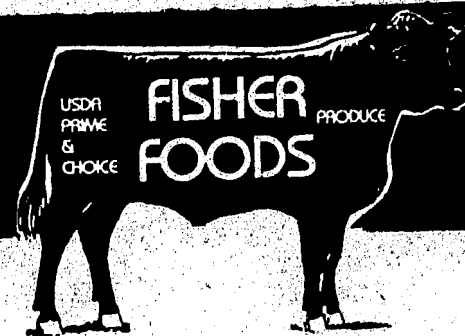

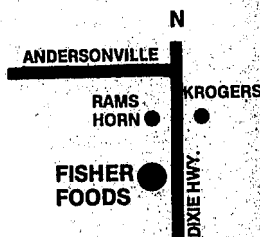

Independence Budget Features "Freezes"

Independence Township has adopted as the next fiscal budget, all department and special revenue funds, at the same revenue and expenditure levels as last year. In effect, freezing the budget.

The move was suggested by Supervisor James Smith, to offset a decline in township budget revenue due to state denied funding. Smith feels that no significant increases can occur without state funds and that 1982-83 net funding will temporarily allow for modifications that will cover certain revenue adjustments that occurred in 1983-84 budget appropriations.

Smith sees a need to go department by department, possibly setting up contingency allowances for necessitated up-dates. Examples would be the Fire and Sewer Departments who are not dependant on state funds, but rely on voter approved special millages.

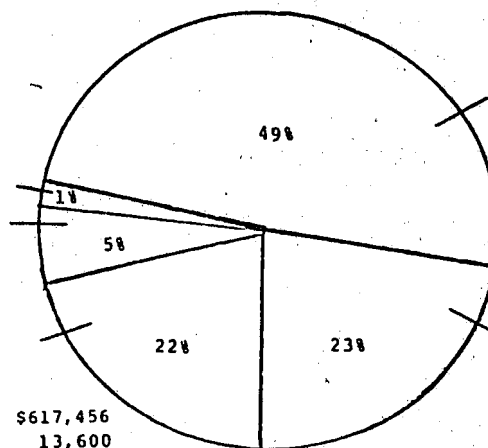
Treasurer Fred Ritter and Trustee Larry Kozma had difficulty agreeing with Smith and fellow board members, as to the inclusion of the Fire and Sewer Departments in the freeze at all.



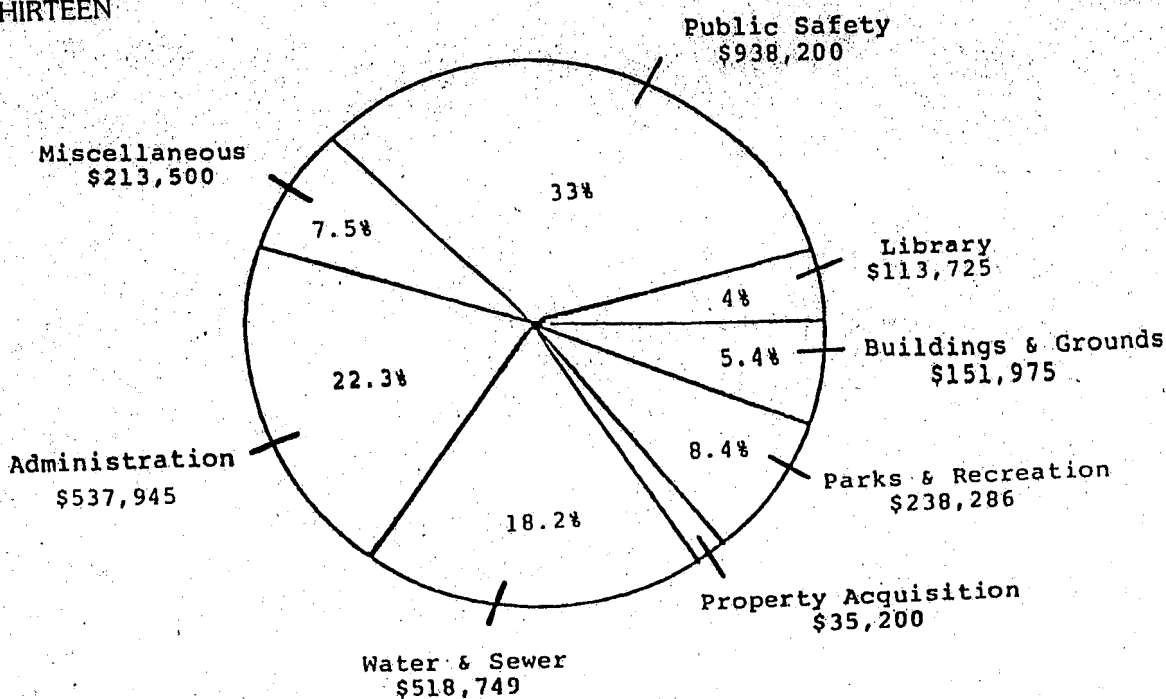

ship Board is a new bill in Congress that proposes to eliminate the potential of non-profit and governmental agents to withdraw from the social security fund.

The board has passed a resolution to withdraw affected township employees from the fund. Attitudes and opinions of the affected employees will be ascertained before allowing the withdrawal to become effective.

The Social Security System requires that a two-year interval between notice of withdrawal and the effective withdrawal date must occur, according to Smith.

The Board has until February of 1985 to recall the resolution, should employees decide to remain within the system.

The resolution was opposed by Trustee Kozma only, who wanted more assurance that the February 1985 effective date was reliable.

Independence Township will spend \$23,310 to prepare a brand new wetlands map for the township.

The engineering firm of Hubble, Roth, and Clark, will perform the township service utilizing Oakland County air photos of the township, along with, on-site verification.

Supervisor James Smith gave these three basic reasons for the map up-date: No. 1. The township has a definite need for wetlands maps, to aide in township development; No. 2. The wetlands maps and the information supplied by them will aide in interpretation of Federal Flood Plain Insurance maps. Because of the maps' informational value and application to matters concerning flood

plain and drainage programs, 40 percent of map costs are directly recoverable through the master drainage plan, which is state subsidized; No. 3. The maps will also supply valuable information to aid township actions regarding the Levy Company's proposed gravel operations.

Tom Beale, engineer for Hubble, Roth and Clark, said on-site evaluation will begin when a good Spring rain showers us with a solid four inches of rain. It is then that water runoff and accumulation can begin to be observed.

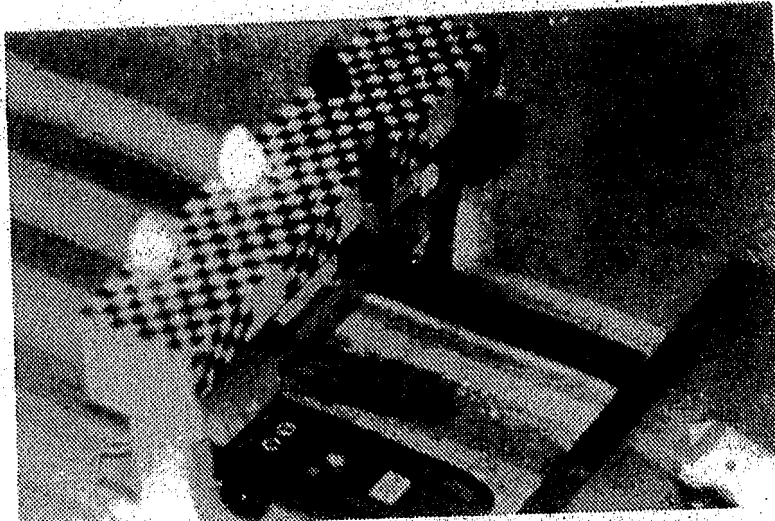

Clarkston's Teare Wins U.S. Paddleball Title

Carla Teare, of Clarkston, captured the women's open singles paddleball crown by downing three time national title-holder Caprice Behner of Illinois.

Teare was seeded number two for the competition after winning the state title this year. She usually plays out of the Flint YMCA, and has been participating in paddleball tournaments for four years, having taken up the sport about seven or eight years ago.

Last year, Teare placed third in the state competition and after losing to former national champion Behner in the national semi-finals, also had to settle for third place in the nation.

Although Teare competes in several tournaments each year, the travel to contests is basically confined to Michigan. "Michigan is where the mainstays, the regular players are from," Teare said. Nearly all the players are in Michigan, so while there are competitors from other states, the national tournament is almost always held in this state. The sport was even founded in Ann Arbor at the University of Michigan, Teare said.

The 1973 Brandon High School graduate also plays softball ("I coach fast-pitch, but I play soft-pitch."), tennis and racquetball. She says she "enjoys most activities," but her main interests are in paddleball and coaching. Teare is now entering her third year as varsity softball coach for Clarkston High School, and had coached junior varsity

basketball and softball, and track in the past.

Teare, who possesses a bachelor of science degree in physical education and coaching from Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, has been very successful with her varsity team. Two years ago, the team won both the districts and regionals and made their way into the state semi-finals before losing. The team followed that up with an 18-6 record last year, although they lost in the district's first round to eventual district champion Waterford Township. Both years, Teare coached the team to a second place league finish.

She taught for three years at Clarkston High School, and worked as a student teacher in physical education and health at Brandon High School during the 1978-79 school year. She was laid off by Clarkston Schools this year but added that the extra time gave her

"more time to practice," and probably contributed to her success in this year's state and national tournaments.

Teare resides in Clarkston with her husband Steve, a computer analyst for Michigan Bell and is the daughter of Pappen and Sue Ann Thomas of Ortonville.
