## Joseph Lowery Dies At Oak Hill Home

Joseph Lowery, 83 years of age, succumbed at his farm home at Oak Hill at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, following an illness of six months.

He was born in Ireland, November 13, 1848 and was brought to Genesee County, New York, at the age of three. He moved to Michigan in December, 1867, and has always been in the farming industry. He was married to Ada Church at Oak Hill March 21, 1873, and the couple have lived in that community ever since.

Joseph Lowery was well-known in the vicinity and held the public office of Justice for twelve years. He was a member of the Independence Grange for fifty years, and was affiliated with the Knights of Maccabees. He has always been an active worker and never had missed a town meeting. Thus last spring, in spite of his illness, he voted.

He is survived by the widow and three children. They are Floyd, of Oak Hill, Ben, of Pontiac, and Mrs. John Beardsley of Detroit. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Fannie Hill of Millington, Pa., Mrs. Elizabeth McNeil, of Detroit, three brothers, James, of Watersville, Washington, William, of Pullman, Washington, and Samuel of Greenville, South Carolina, nine grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2:30 at the home, with burial in Lakeview Cemetery. Rev. H. A. Huey of the Baptist Church will officiate.

The honor is awarded on an entirely scholastic basis. Grades for the first three and one-half years of the high school work are averaged. Betty has an all-A record with the exception of two B's. Her average is 96.59. Gladys carried an all-A record with but five B marks. Her average is 95.83. Both girls have taken all the required work for graduation and for entrance to any college or university. Betty transferred to the Clarkston High from Royal Oak at the end of her freshman year and since her entrance to this school, she has had a perfect all-A record.

Both girls have been active in extra-curricular work. Gladys has gone into the study of music and has served well and faithfully on the basketball team, while Betty has been Editor-in-chief of the Blue and White Flash, has been president of the student council and a member of the basketball team. Both were substitute teachers during the recent illness of Mrs. Beardslee.

Announcement of the honor students was made at assembly of the high school Monday morning. Superintendent D. M. Winn addressed the students and highly praised the two girls for their splendid work. He stated that they were two of the three best students he has had in the school in the past seven years. He also added that they are both among the eight best students ever-graduated from the school.

Each will have a part in the Senior Class Day exercises which will be held June 23. The Salutatorian's speech by Gladys Gundry will be the opening speech of welcome. Betty's Valedictorian speech will be the closing speech at the class night.






alum blue and the magnesium sulphate pale pink.
