Members Re-elected for School Board

Earl Walter, Lee M. Clark, to Serve on Board for Three More Years

At one of the largest annual school meetings held in the community, one hundred and fifty voters signified their choice Monday evening, July 11, and unanimously re-elected both Earl Walter and Lee-M. Clark for the coming three-year term for the school board of District Number 3, Fractional Independence and Springfield Townships. The offices are that of two trustees, and Earl Walter will continue to serve as secretary, and Lee M. Clark as treasurer of the board,

L. R. McFarland, president of the board, opened the meeting with a call to order and asked for the secretary's report. Earl Walter read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which weer accepted as read. The treasurer's report was then given by Mr. Clark and accepted as given. The president then gave a brief outline of what the board does and what its plans are, and stressed the fact that the year just closed had been a fine one, with an efficient faculty and with no disciplinarian problems. He discussed the matter of outside tuition and the necessity for having and keeping fine activities to attract outside tuition students and thus, lighten the task of our local faxpayers. Mr. McFarland briefly traced over the figures of the last year, which will be fully given in the annual report to be published soon, and emphasized the fact that. the teachers had received a 20 per cent cut last year, and that they were also willing to take another cut of 10 per cent this year, or the last month's service free, if conditions remain as

they are. The president appointed A: B. Wompole and Cramer Judd as tellers, and George D. King swore them in. Nominations for the office of first trustee were called for and Earl Walter was nominated to succeed himself. Nomination supported. Dr. C. J. Sutherland was nominated, but refused the nomination. A unanimous vote was cast for Earl Walter. Before allowing the vote to be cast, Mr. Walter expressed his principles which he stated he would follow if elected, and if he accepted the position. They included three main points: First, that he was in favor of the best possible school at the lowest possible cost; second, that he was in favor of athletics, and that in the case of the local school, they had paid for their own way; and lastly, that the super-

intendent and the board worked torether and that the board up superintendent in decisions and vice versa. Second nominations were called for to fill the vacancy of the place of trustee now held by Lee M. Clark. Lee Clark was nominated to succeed himsclf, and the nomination supported. Casper Warden was nominated, but declined the nomination. Mr. Clark was unanimously elected by acclamation. This is the fourteenth year that a member of the Clark family serves. on the board, and is the thirteenth year that Mr. Earl Walter has served. There was a call for other business and an invitation extended to citizens of the community to attend board meetings, which are held the second Tuesday of every month at the school.

A guide was furnished to conduct the party on its inspection tour. One hour and a half were utilized for the tour, and several reported so many interesting things that it is impossible to enumerate all of them. Among those which everyone enjoyed are the following:

1. Edison's old laboratory. It is set up just as it existed in Menlo Park, New erJsey, even to such insignificant details as the grass sod, trees, sidewalks, distance between three buildings, etc. It is entirely isolated and is surrounded by a fence. It was moved to its present location in 1929.

2. The famous John Bennett clock. This clock was brought from England and weighs 16 ton. It is made up of four individual clocks, each of which chimes at the quarter, half, three-quarter and hour mark.

3. The Court House. This is the first court house of Logan County, Illinois, the old home of Lincoln. It is made of solid black walnut and is put together with screws. An interesting feature is that there is a fire in the old stone fireplace that was started by Herbert Hoover in 1929 and has never been allowed to go out. 4. The "Old Clinton Tavern." The

Old Clinton Tavern, the first between Detroit and Chicago, exists as it did years ago.

5. Little Industries. There are shops, a blacksmith shop, a cooper shop and an old shoe shop that are standing as they did in the olden days. It is planned that eventually there will be little businesses going on in these shops just as in the old days.

6. The Chapel. This chapel is the "Martha-Mary" chapel, named for the two mothers of Mrs. Henry Ford and Henry Ford. It is made of bricks that were taken from the old birthplace of Mrs. Ford." Everything in the chapel is snow white.

Springsteen in Sheriff's Race

Waterford Center ... Clarkston Home News

Annual School Meeting Persistent Investigator Has Good Record in Politics

Frank E. Springsteen, of Royal Oak, today announced his candidacy or sheriff on the Remocratic ticket. He was born in Detroit and has lived in Royal Oak nearly all his life. He was educated in public schools and the Detroit Buşiness University. He was supervisor of Royal Oak seven years and is now a city commissioner of

that city. He has been a farmer, railroad man and dairyman. Mr. Springsteen built and operated the Royal Oak Creamery for several years. He was conductor on the first Detroit-Pontiae Interurban car which ran into Pontiac. From the passenger service he was promoted to Detroit freight agent for the Pontiac-Detroit line and the Wyandotte-Detroit River Railway.

He and his father did the first work on the Detroit-Pontiac Railroad rightof-way, measuring the yardage to be graded from Palmer Park to Royal Oak, and worked for the interurban company during the construction.

In partnership with his father they nvented and marketed 19 patents, including cash carrying systems for stores, check registers and the famous Springsteen driving bit for horses, which sold by thousands throughout the United States. His interest in horses led him to learn blacksmithing and at one time he operated a public

shop.

He holds two certificates, one as an auditor and accountant and the other as a master horseshoer.

"I can and will, if elected, operate the sheriff's department for the benefit of the people and not as a politcal machine or for personal gain," Mr. Springsteen said in his announcement today. "If the voters believe my efforts as a supervisor for seven years have been for the best interests of the taxpayers, I solicit and shall appreciate their support: Even those who oppose me cannot deny that my work on county matters, despite stubborn opposition, has caused a tremendous saving in the operating costs of the county and a result saving to the taxpayers.

It was largely due to Mr. Springsteen's efforts in furnishing information and cues to the 23-man grand jury a year ago that enabled that body to force the contractor to rebuild Coolidge highway from the Eight mile road to the Eleven Mile road, saving the county \$75,000.




